DIPLOMACY GAMES

John McCallum's call for (BROB 82) and Rod Walker's actual compilation of a current rating list (ERE III,#1), spurred action on a planned AEOLUS rating list. STRATEGY AND TACTICS WHEN PLAYING ITALY by Eugene Prosnitz

Other commentators, including some recent contributors to AEOLUS, have stated both that Italy is one of the weakest countries, and also that when playing

Italy, there's little scope for negotiations. I disagree on both counts.

Italy is probably the most centrally located country on the board. It is close enough to both the eastern and western fronts to be vitally concerned with the outcome of the war on all fronts, probably more directly concerned than any other power, with the possible exception of Russia.

In a current game in which I'm playing Italy, I wrote ten letters, and received seven, before the Spring 1901 moves were even published! (And believe it or not, I was being 90% honest). These letters included a turn down of a French request for a non-aggression pact.

Italy has the good fortune to be the only country on the board which is rarely, if ever, in danger of being ganged up on by two or more countries at the beginning of the game. Usually, no one wants to fight Italy at that stage. Therefore, the Italian player often has the luxury of being noncommittal at the outset, and waiting for a favorable opening.

At the same time, Italy should definitely involve itself in the forming of alliances by the other powers. Consider the three western powers. The worst thing for Italy is a French-German alliance, as France builds fleets to conquer England, and often later sends the fleets against Italy. An Anglo-French alliance is better, since then France builds mostly armies. Best of all is a Anglo-German alliance, removing the threat on Ital's western frontier.

Similarly, in the East: An Austro-Turkish alliance creates the grave danger that after they conquer Russia, they'll turn on Italy. A Russo-Turkish alliance is an improvement, since Russia primarily becomes a land power and can not easily invade Italy proper, and may well side with Italy after the fall of Austria. A Russo-Austrian alliance is best of all (unless Italy wants to conquer Austria) for then Italy's main danger, Turkey, is eliminated, and Italy and Russia now have Austria in between them.

The above paragraphs are relevant strategy for an Italian player who plans to go in the opposite direction. For example, if Italy wants to attack France, the Italian player should also try to negotiate a favorable situation on the eastern front, and vice versa.

Italy almost always survives the opening; the problems start in the midgame. Italy often crushes Austria, with help from Russia and Turkey, only to find itself the next victim of a joint Russo-Turkish effort. Or, even worse, Italy may get caught in the scissors between the navies of France and Turkey. The Italians are in the dilemma of needing armies to conquer Austria, and desperately needing fleets for later defense.

An Italian attack on France, although less immediately lucrative, has definite possibilies, i.e. the acquisition of Spain, Portugal, and Marseilles. Also an Italian-Austrian non-aggression pact has the advantage that since Italy is primarily a sea power and Austria is primarily a land power, that they can stay out of each other's hair.

However, in order to attack France, Italian forces have to be sent far from home. Since Austria is so close to the Italian homeland (not to mention the danger of a Turkish fleet sailing into the Ionian), Italy risks leaving its homeland in jeopardy.

By contrast, the Italo-French non-agression pact is probably the most stable on the board, because of the wide gulf which can be left vacant between the two.

Suppose Italy conquers southern France? What next? The next Italian move will leave Italy very spread out, every potential victim presents serious problems. In this respect, Italy differs with the other central powers, Austria and Germany, which usually have a fairly compact position to operate from. End
