Your article on your trip to Italy (and the editorial within the article) was very interesting. You must have been in Italy about the same time I was in Germany and England. (first two weeks of August). One nice thing about Italy is that they like Americans there. In France, it seems that they hate Americans, probably because we've had to save their necks three times in this century.

We too, found Florence our favorite city. We didn't have a pool at our hotel, 'which was right on the river Arno, but we were brave enough, after instructions from the hall porter, to take public transportation to a public pool on two afternoons. 

Orders for "Fall, 1905" are due by Friday, December 3, 1982.




