CONRAD BROUGHT YOU . . . MONGO

Somebody (I forgot who) not too long ago had the poor judgement to accuse me of doing nothing but reminisce, as if this were some sort of bad thing. Aside from the fact that the accusation is untrue, when I do this sort of thing I regard it as sharing memories. Postal Diplomacy is lucky that, after 20 years of existence, it has people with memories of its early days to share. So now we will have a few more, right from the very beginnings of the hobby.

The story of MONGO, the first postal Diplomacy 'zine, is an odd one, full of unexpected developments. Of course the actual postal Diplomacy hobby did not grow out of MONGO; that came with GRAUSTARK nearly a year later. But MONGO was the first, even if, in the end, it was stillborn. The story of MONGO can be read in RUDDIGORE 2, which reproduces all the issues of the "zine", and can be obtained from the writer (1273 Crest Dr., Encinitas, CA, 92024) for a buck. But here is the story without the copies.

Wargaming had come to San Diego in the 50s. For multiple players, the big thing in those days was Risk and there were several of us who played it now and then on weekends. Then in 1961 Conrad von Metzke noticed an ad in a major magazine (THE ATLANTIC, I believe) for something called "Diplomacy". He thought it sounded spiffy, and so did I. So I ordered a copy. It must have been all of \$5.95 or some such in those days, a veritable fortune! And then it came, the first Diplomacy set in San Diego (I still have it), and we were instantly captivated by it. The game made Risk look like Fish in comparison to Bridge! We immediately converted our Risk-playing friends and the San Diego Diplomacy and Cheap Beer Warehouse (a name it got later, not then) was born. We played all that summer, fall, winter, and spring... on into 1962. The summer of 1962, however, saw many of the group going to new jobs and new locations. Conrad von Metzke was one who remained behind, and he wanted our old group to stay together by mail.

Thus the first postal Diplomacy game (1962A it would be called now) was born. It was proposed, organized, and conducted by carbon letters, although those quickly took on the aspect of a 'zine. The game lasted through the end of 1962, after which several of the players decided they would not be able to continue and the game ceased.

Well, why "MONGO"? The name appeared prominently in the game reports, although not as a 'zine title as such. However, many seasons of the game were reported as having been seen from the Mongo Observatory, and the name crept into the heading of the letter...what would be the masthead of a 'zine.

Thus ended MONGO, but not its saga. Conrad discovered mainstream postal Diplomacy in 1965 and got me into it in 1966 when we accidentally ran into each other at San Diego State U. where I was working on an advanced degree. We had by then almost forgotten MONGO and the subject did not arise for some years. But by that year, 1966, 5 of the original 8 players in the MONGO game were back in postal Diplomacy. Three of them were to publish 'zines of their own: Conrad (COSTAGUANA), Bob Ward (MARSOVIA),

and myself (ERENWON). Conrad and I both published numerous other 'zines as well, but that's another story. Well...that's the people, but what of MONGO itself?

I returned to San Diego permanently in 1969. Late that year we learned that another of the MONGO players, Lewis Perry, was paying an extended visit to San Diego. When we tried to recruit Lewis into postal play, he demurred, but reminded us about the old 1962 game and said he still had all the letters. It was then we remembered! I had gotten into the hobby bibliography by then, and desperately wanted those old carbon letters. Lewis promised to send them, but then dropped out of sight again and they never arrived.

Conrad and I were keenly disappointed. However, ultimately we decided that if we could not produce the real MONGO (neither of us had copies), we would produce a fake. So we both set about producing one, based on our patchy recall of the game and what the publication actually was. We put together a bibliographic listing for the 'zine and moves for the game. Conrad went so far as to start up a game based on the post W02 positions we had set up, and it was this fake game which became known by the Boardman Number 1962A. The proposed fake issues, however, were never produced: partly lack of time and partly the feeling that we could not produce a convincing forgery of a pre-1963 postal game. But it was fun touting the fake as real for a while...the screams from Brooklyn were audible as far as Hawaii...although eventually we owned up to the scam.

Then the unexpected happened! My mother called to tell me that my father was cleaning out the garage and would I come by to pick up my things. What things? Oh, some files I left at various times, some books, letters, things like that. Now, since I don't throw things away, it occurred to me right then that my missing copies of MONGO might be in those boxes. I virtually burned up the freeway getting down there.

And sure enough, in a neat little file folder, were all the issues of the real MONGO. There were 10 of them, and they look about as you might expect of a non-'zine carrying a postal Diplomacy game before there was a postal Diplomacy hobby. It is now, for me, an unusual experience to look at how the hobby almost started. (It is also fun to watch certain persons get all bent out of shape when you merely mention it.)

Gee...sorry about all that reminiscing there...don't know what came over me...

((Thanks very much Rod, for sharing that with us (and four free issues!). I, for one am very glad to have old fogeys like you and Davis and others around to tell us storys similair to this. It is an invaluable asset to the hobby today.))

First of all, it is a hobby. Second, if you don't want to lose so much, print less issues and cut most of your trades. Thirdly, if we all charged high prices, the hobby would become much more disembeled, one thing we cannot afford. We are already too seperated for my taste.

I'm flattered that you'd like to see more of my writing, I promise to do so, possibly in this issue. Though in truth, I'm at my best when I'm disjointed!

As for McGill, I'm honestly not considering it, and simply chose that letter (out of about 100) because it was brief and to the point. I have heard from both Carlton and U of SL and am not particularly interested in them either. Here is a list of the colleges I am applying to (in no particular order): U. of Virginia, Haverford, Swarthmore, Johns Hopkins, U. of Pennsylvania, Columbia, Cornell (ILR), Williams, Hamilton, Princeton, SUNY/Stonybrook, and Yale. From Terry Tallman:

Regarding Hutton's letter last issue:

If you've ever read any early Hunter Thompson, either in his books or Rolling Stone you're aware that "gonzo" is high praise indeed. I find that half my readers laugh their asses off and the other half don't know what the hell I'm talking about.

Steve is a good gonzo writer, but, sadly, clutters his zine with puzzles and letters from the east coasters/In 6.

His point about rabid organizers is well taken. No one currently playing less than three games should be allowed to print a zine (notice the official spelling Terry, and stop spelling szine! Does one read a magaszine? No!), run a service, or shine Brux's shoes.

The comment that a critic is simply someone who can't create him/herself fits very aptly here. In chess all the old burnt out masters sit around doing analysis of the still-active players, passing judgements, creating and destroying reputations. I played on the Northwest Chess Circuit from '74 through '78 or '79. You've never seen feuds in Dip to compare with the bickering in Chess. And in chess there is money and careers at stake.

Regarding Bruxism: I think it's interesting to note that in Supernova there is a warning about Bernie Tretick but not about John Boardman, Dan Falter, Brux, Del Grande or me for that matter.

I've played under Tretick, Falter & Boardman and to do so requires social skills above and beyond those for any other zine. The same obviously holds true with Brux.

Novices should probably start in a zine like Irksome, Anduin, or Winsome/Losesome where the GMing is gentler and a rookie can get his bearings.

To play for Falter you have to GM the games yourself or they tend to wander. Under Boardman-- you have to avoid being linked to demons -- the demons include fakes, Peery & Walker.

With Brux you've simply got to write your orders so that even a lawyer couldn't misconstrue them (is Wrobel a lawyer?).

And then of course one has to be prepared for the GM to enter the twilight zone on occasion. And they/we all do from time to time.

And what are you & Willard up too? Not nice to toss out hints and not give us the full blow by stomp account.

And yes, SAT scores ain't shit. I had the highest combined score in my class in 1968 but my grades kept me out of the small, private school I had my heart set on-- Williamette University. So I did 5 and a half years in the Air Force & came back and graduated from U. of Washington in Journalism.

Finally --I'm sure glad all the ~~faud~~-artists are on your coast. Keep'em flying, -Terry.

Regarding Chess, as you may or may not know, I play chess in NYC from time to time and I disagree with you. From Rod Walker:

Kevin Stone's suggestion that I ought to respect the belief--  
that the universe popped into existence one day because some  
entity said "fiat lux"--is not, I believe, to the point. One can  
respect the believer, certainly. Many otherwise quite logical  
people adhere to the "special creation" notion because they read  
it in a venerable book. It is intellectually respectable, I  
think, to harbor some ridiculous belief or other, and no doubt  
most people have one or more of these things in their intellectual  
baggage.

But to say that the believer is respectable is not to agree  
that the belief is likewise. One must perforce call a spade a  
spade here, or one cannot be intellectually honest. The  
"creation" story in Genesis is a very nice story, told with  
economy, elegance, and even beauty. Unfortunately, all of the  
vast and still rapidly growing body of information we have, about  
the past of the universe and of this planet, points decidedly  
toward a very different scenario. It is possible to respect a  
belief when there is no evidence one way or the other. It is  
impossible to respect a belief which is not only unsustainable but  
flatly denied by extensive evidence. We know that the Earth is in  
excess of  $3.5 \times 10^9$  years old. We know that there has been life on  
the planet for at least  $2.2 \times 10^9$  years. We know that the planetary  
surface was (and is) in a state of constant flux and movement,  
back to the time of Pangaea and beyond, reasonably well documented  
to  $7 \times 10^8$  years ago. We know that life has similarly been in a  
state of continual flux and change in its physical form during  
this entire period. None of these conclusions from the mass of  
available evidence confirms the Genesis narrative, but instead  
they all deny it. I would say that we have reached the point in  
our knowledge of our past to say that the Judeo-Christian  
"creation" narrative is totally untenable. If it did not cloak  
itself in the guise of "religion", we would be more wont to give  
it a more accurate assessment... "silly".

This is of course the rub. The thing is supposed to be  
"religion". Yet in point of fact the "creation" myth (and I use  
the term here in its correct technical sense; look it up) is  
totally irrelevant to the teachings of Jesus the Messiah (but of  
course one must excise the various bits of twaddle which have  
become attached to those teachings).

Now, if Kevin wants to say that the demonstrable processes of  
terrestrial evolution are aspects of the Creation process and that  
God, in essence, touched off the Big Bang itself, I am in no  
position to do other than respect his belief. That would be  
entirely possible (although not, in my opinion, very probable).  
But then one has to twist the Genesis narrative about to make it  
fit the observed facts and conclusions or one has to discard it

entirely. Either course would be reasonable, but not very orthodox, and I presume that Kevin believes in "fiat lux".

Based on the evidence, however, we should be more inclined to conclude that there is no God (a belief one can respect but which leads one into a real pothole when one studies such phenomena as Jesus and Sokrates) or that God is an entity which (a) was born as part of the cataclysmic events we call the Big Bang or (b) predates the Bang ... but which, in either event did not cause the Bang nor direct the course of its aftermath, the present Universe. Still, if one wishes to see a moving intelligence in the development of the Universe, that's fine and respectable... but the notion that all this popped into existence a few thousand years ago in response to verbal magic is a belief which can no longer command intellectual validity. But the thing dies hard, partly based on the supposition that "no creation, no God"... the atheist position, if you will. But this really does not compute: God transcends a few bits of myth in a venerable book. Genesis or no genesis, She is, I think, quite alive and well.

I may say a bit more on this in future.

((Thanks for an interesting and thought provoking letter. It certainly got me to thinking, specifically about my ongoing conversation with Steve Langley in past issues; concerning "live and let live", or, "you respect my belief, and I'll respect yours". But in truth, I can not in good conscience respect the Christian religion. Or any other religion for that matter. How can I respect a group responsible for the atrocities throughout history. Examples? Fine. How about the Holy Crusades. Or the fighting between India and Pakistan- What is that based on? The burning of "witches" in New Salem; The Holocaust; Northern Ireland; Calvinists and Lutherans (etc.), vs. The Church; Hussites; Lollards. Need I go on? How can I respect a religion which says that man should be miserable in his existence on earth. How can I respect a religion which advocates that a woman should not have an abortion no matter what the circumstances? How can I respect a religion which tortured people until they accepted that religion (Ex: The Inquisition.)? No, I cannot respect such a religion. Yet I consider Kevin Stone to be a very good friend and a fine, upstanding human being. But the fact of the matter is that religion is a man made concept and is responsible for more suffering than any other single factor in history.

Coming to grips with religion is something which each individual must do at some point in one's life. I did it at a fairly young age, some people won't do it until they are very old. But it is something which we each have to do, and many people will draw totally different conclusions. Fine, I can accept that, and as long as they keep it to themselves, and do not interfere with others, I see nothing wrong with it (I may disagree with it but that's another matter). But organized religion makes me sick. Please don't misconstrue my comments, religion can be a positive institution, I feel, but so far, the costs have out-weighed the benefits by far.

Only now did I have a chance to really read through A23. You, Linsey, and Caruso put out zines too big for one sitting. EE and DW are big too, but contain a lot I don't care to read. Oh, Magus also: too much press, not enough Steve and Daf. ((I agree)).

Were you able to send courtesy copies to the people mentioned in MES 43? If not, let me know quick so I can try to zerox excerpts before the zine gets sold with my other oldies. (I sell 'em as soon as I have a box full. I need the \$).

On letters, you're doing a real good job. The hobby is really short on open forums since the old BR shut down, Linsey and Coughlan cutting back on "controversy", etc. AG shot up in the polls with 1-3 pages of letters per issue. I wonder why more people don't try it?

Strangely enough, I have to find myself backing Rod Walker from the criticisms levelled against him. One writer asked that Rod "respect" the writer's religious views and not say religion was a product of human imagination. That guy should write for The Modern Embarrassment. Just a few quick notes before I go off on my trip to Europe. (Sorry my typewriter conked out again - they worked on it twice too, which really annoys me!)

I really enjoyed your anniversary issue last month. It's very clear that you put an incredible amount of time and effort into it. Your letter column is still my favorite part though. It just doesn't seem like two years to me. What about to you?

Poor Bruce Linsey! He seems to be taking it on the chin from everyone about everything! Can I join in, just briefly?!!!!

In Anduin #23, Linsey says "...there are many other GMs who are equally prompt and more accurate than I am, but not as strict. Coughlan and Lishett to name just two." This sounds vaguely bad to me so I would like to know in what sense I am not "as strict". He can write this to me privately, if he wishes.

One thing that Linsey is absolutely right on is about Dick Martin's characterization of my GMing as "dishonest", alluded to by Martin also in Anduin #23.

Martin said in that issue: "I certainly can't recall ever calling Gary Coughlan a "dishonest" GM. Where did I say that? You wouldn't be putting words in my mouth, would you Bruce? Again? While I certainly feel he may have been biased against me, that's not the same thing."

Hmmm, I wonder if being a "dishonest" GM is the same thing as a "crooked" GM as Martin wrote about me in his Retaliation? Or when, in that same issue, same page of his Retaliation, Martin said to me: "Yes, I jest about being in another game that you GM.... I really would rather play under an honest incompetent than a competent, yet dishonest, GM."

So I am wondering what the difference is between calling my GMing "crooked", me "a competent, yet dishonest, GM" on one hand and then saying, on the other hand as Martin did in Anduin #23, that he never called me a "dishonest GM".

Then again I'm still wondering why calling me a "drunkard" is not the same as calling me an "alcoholic" as Martin also did. Do you think lessons in "Martinese" would help, Eric? -Gary.
