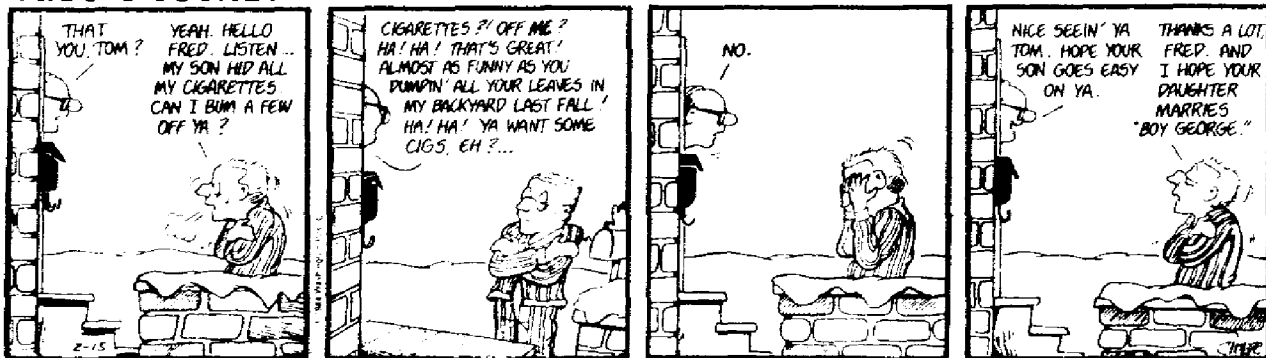

From Mark Larzelere - New Carrollton, MD:

Actually, I did want to chip in something in your discussion of religion.

People will turn to some form of religion as long as there are things which cannot be explained by science or in any other way. This is just human nature - our natural curiosity makes us demand answers to everything we perceive.

And science today does not have all the answers. We can trace our universe to a Big Bang, but we can't say why the Big Bang took place. We can divide matter down into protons or quarks, but we can't say why these came to be the smallest unit of matter.

Science may someday answer the deeper questions, but people need some kind of explanation in the meantime. Religion provides these explanations. Even Carl Sagan ended up quoting from an Indian religious text while discussing (in his Cosmos series) possible explanations of an expanding and contracting universe.

To say "Down with religion" is like saying "Down with human nature". We'll always have some kind of religion. Even if you just say, "Science will someday have all the answers", this is also a leap to faith. How can we know that the universe consists only of things that are discoverable and explainable by the scientific method?

But then again, any religious explanation that turns out to be true will have to be included as "science". If you ask where science ends and religion begins, the best answer I've heard is that science tells you "what", "where", "when" and "how", while religion tells you "why" and "who".

((Well put. I agree with just about everything you said. Down with Human Nature? Not a bad idea. Look where it has gotten us so far.))

From Steve Langley - Sacramento CA:

This double issue business is getting out of hand. Perhaps if you dropped the games.

I bow to your superior debating skills. Answering my "science is a religion arguments" with "It's not true." was masterful. Then to go on and admit that you do accept a lot of "science" on "faith" wasn't truly inconsistent, only a show of generosity to a crushed opponent. Bravo!

So someone published an article that says The Shroud of Turin was a hoax. Stupid scientists to still be examining the thing. Don't they realize that someone has already demonstrated that it is a hoax? And Kane doesn't even know any more about the subject than he has typed into Anduin. From Scott Cameron - Hicksville NY:

I generally agree with your comments on my letter but I must disagree, in part, with your view that people are "inherently ignorant". Ignorance (& informedness) are acquired traits. A person is born average & becomes, as a result of his own efforts or lack thereof, either ignorant or knowledgeable. I would certainly agree though that the average person is too willing to be ignorant. Most people seem to be quite content to be treated like cattle & go mooing along whatever fate the more ambitious types have set out for them. I think the main thing I'm disagreeing with you on is the idea that people can be "inherently" anything. Besides the fact that I think it's simply wrong, the theory fails logically as well. If people are inherently evil then you are evil too &, therefore, cannot pass judgement on the "evil" acts of others since you, being evil, should see nothing wrong with them.

((You must understand that any statement I make about the human condition simply doesn't apply to me. In other words, 17-year olds shouldn't be allowed to drink and drive but I should; people are inherently evil but I'm not; etc. Seriously, what our forefathers said 200 years ago wasn't exactly true. "We are all created equal"? I doubt it. And incidentally, you say that ignorance is an acquired trait. I think it is an acquired taste. With that note the religious discussion comes pretty much to a close. Maybe a few more stray remarks might make their way into these pages occasionally. We'll see. I'd like to thank everyone who contributed to the discussion (even you Langley), I have learned a lot from it, and I think it has been interesting.))

More Cameron:

I'd like to add an Amen (in a non-religious sense) to your smoking editorial. I didn't mention it at the time, but I was very pleasantly surprised at your no-smoking rule and your enforcement of it at KaneCon. I have a minor, chronic lung condition which acts up in the presence of cigarette smoke & had expected something like the average chess tournament with 20 or so people crammed into a small room filled with cigarette smoke. It was nice to be able to spend the weekend playing Dip & not coughing & wheezing. I disagree with your expressed position on suicide though. If someone wants to commit suicide then I'd say that it's his body and if he wants to destroy it it's his affair. Just as it's OK with me if someone wants to smoke as long as it's not around me, it's also OK if someone wants to jump off of a building just so long as he doesn't land on anybody. ((Yeah, but who's going to clean the mess up?))

Finally, if you find people getting tired of the religious discussion, why not write an insulting editorial about people who

believe in the Bermuda Triangle, Bigfoot, parapsychology, etc. They're just as irrational as the religious types and can be more fun to attack.

((You mean there is no Bigfoot? I'm crushed.))

From Steve Knight - Reston VA:

I agree with you 100% on smoking. One of the things I really miss since moving to Virginia is Minnesota's Clean Air Act, wherein smoking is by default illegal in public places, and restaurants and the like are required to have no-smoking sections. Fortunately, only four people at my job smoke, so I don't have to deal with it too much...

((In Nassau County (here) there is a similiar type of law. Unfortunately it is not obeyed and it is not enforced. Still, I'm quick to point out the law to offenders.))

From Ed Wrobel - Arlington VA:

Your editorial on smoking was quite a piece of work. I found it mildly alarmist in places but moderate in other places. As you point out, people take risks every day. For example, I, myself, was at substantial risk driving through New Jersey, Staten Island and Long Island to reach KaneKon last August. I would have been much safer staying home and smoking a pack of cigarettes a day for 3 days (as long as I did not continue for several years). What is a necessary or unnecessary risk is a subjective judgement. I do not smoke, never have, and generally find tobacco smoke obnoxious. I am fortunate to work in a room with non-smokers. (Thank goodness for Joe Califano, god rest his secretaryship...) Like you, I object to having my air polluted (though I do it every day commuting to and from work). Certainly, smoking should not be outlawed - this is a free country - but it should be regulated to limit its adverse effects on non-smokers. One obvious way is the provision of smoke-free public places, such as sections in restaurants, workrooms, and so forth. There is also a "hidden cost" to non-smokers in the form of increased utilization of health care facilities by smokers. This means less doctor and hospital time for non-smokers and higher health insurance costs for everybody. Many urban general hospitals must turn away patients who cannot pay. Less illness in society in general would mean greater resources available to care for the indigent. A hospital may make a handsome profit doing cardiac bypass surgery on a well-insured smoker - but somebody pays: the insurance company and everybody who pays insurance premiums. Smokers should pay higher premiums and the federal excise tax on cigarettes should be maintained at a high level and used to provide relief to those hospitals providing care to the poor.

Regarding the risks involved with smoking: smokers are at much higher risk for heart and lung disease but not all smokers develop these diseases, and many non-smokers do. Eating meat two or three times a day may play a substantial role in the development of heart disease and certain cancers of the

gastro-intestinal tract. And, of course, there's lack of exercise, breathing city air and living on toxic waste dumpsites. Oh - and driving to KaneKon. You pays your money and you takes your chances. Don't be too moralistic about smokers - as long as they pay their fair share.

((Yes, but your driving to KaneKon causes no risk for me (unless I stab you in a game and you get angry!), whereas your smoking may be potentially harmful to me. I don't know, smoking just strikes me as one of man's stupider customs.))

From Steve Langley - Sacramento CA:

Smoking, along with all the other medical effects also statistically shortens the smokers lifespan. What is really worse (in our youth-oriented culture) is that it makes the skin age more rapidly than non-smoking. So far I've not read that such aging is proven medically harmful, but constant smokers not only die before their turn, they look older than their years. Sorry, it is a cumulative effect. A youth who smokes still looks immature. A person of thirty who smokes and has done so heavily since the teen years may often pass for thirty five.

If age and appearance of youth are accepted goals. Vegetarianism (balanced diets, of course...it can be done) seems to be the healthiest choice to make. Statistically, vegetarians in their late thirties and forties have the average appearance of thirty year olds - unless they smoke or overindulge or abstain, of course.

So many different choices. Perhaps you don't choose to be a vegetarian (perhaps you do, in which case pick someone else to be my hypothetical example) because you feel fine just as you are right now and you like a bit of meat in your life to make life interesting. Some people smoke with the same rationale.

((If they do, they are fools and are using a silly defence mechanism. Eating meat can be beneficial, though the ultra high concentration of cholesterol may not be great for you. On the other hand, if you exercise and stay in shape, you can probably afford this without too much risk, or too large a loss in years of your life. Again, over-indulgence can be very dangerous just as with anything else. The difference between smoking and meat consumption is that smoking damage is permanent. You aren't the only one to use this as an example though.))

From Rod Walker - Encinitas CA:

Smoking. I don't, never have, and I find the abuse of the habit in public places obnoxious. The anti-tobacco campaign is perfectly all right with me, so long as it stays within limits and does not attempt to prohibit the drug (and tobacco is a drug, like marijuana).

((Really? What are its medicinal uses?))

((I did some hefty cutting in the last few letters because I wanted to see what the LC would look like if I divided it into sections by topics. The next section I find quite amusing. Without further adieu, let us see why being editor is sometimes hard...))

Steve Langley: Eric, H<sub>2</sub>O (That's water) is a better solvent than alcohol. It is a more universal solvent at least. What basis do you have for your "Take a drink and dissolve a brain cell" theory? Quite a bit of medical research into the effect of alcohol on the human body has gone on over the past few years. We actually know things from experimental data. We no longer have to accept dogma about alcohol being totally bad for us. In experimental fact, a small daily dose is beneficial. If you accept longer life as a benefit. Overuse of alcohol is not beneficial. Total abstinence is better than over indulgence but it is not as healthy as a small glass of wine with dinner.

Dick Martin: Ah, Eric, where do you get some of your ideas? Alcohol dissolves brain cells? It didn't when I was taking Cellular Biology. Yes, alcohol is an organic solvent, but that doesn't mean it dissolves organs! More properly, it is a poison. Also, studies have shown that moderate drinkers of red wines tend to live longer (I'm not exactly sure what they live longer than, but I think it's the regular population. This was in Science News a few years back if anybody feels a need to check.). I would be very hesitant to say that red wine prolongs life, however. There may not be a causal relationship.

Rod Walker: Alcohol. Abuse is one thing, and one can abuse almost any ingestible substance. So what? The notion that alcohol is a "poison" is nonsense. In large enough quantities it is, of course. So is arsenic. But arsenic is also prescribed specifically as a medicine on occasion. In appropriate quantities, the ingestion of alcohol is good for the average person; it is a relaxant and depressant and a marvelous aid to winding down and going to sleep. "Wine for the afflicted heart" says the Song of Solomon, as I recall. A slice of bacon is more dangerous to your health than a glass of wine.

Alcoholism is another matter entirely. That's a disease. It results from certain small but crucial alterations in the body chemistry and metabolism. Nobody knows why these occur in some individuals and not in others. Once they happen, though, they are (for the present) irreversible. An alcoholic can never consume alcohol again. A normal person can have a normal drink without any ill effects whatever. Winston Churchill drank like a fish his whole life. I didn't notice his brain cells dissolving. (By the way, what medical study are you quoting about alcohol dissolving brain cells, for chrissakes??? If you drop biotic tissue into alcohol, it gets pickled, not dissolved. Water is a far better solvent than alcohol, and we're all 2/3 water; I don't notice anybody dissolving because of that. Oil is also a solvent and we're full of oils and fats...nothing dissolving there either. An over-abundance of alcohol in the bloodstream will in fact kill

brain cells by pickling them, but the notion that alcohol dissolves brain cells is much the most fantastic notion I've heard in ages. Do, please, quote me an accepted medical study by a reliable institution, please.)

Mark Berch: On page 21, you say that alcohol is a solvent and when it gets into your bloodstream and gets to your brain, brain cells are dissolved. An old chemist like me can't let that go by. That's elementary school science, and it's not even remotely true.

Yes, alcohol is a solvent. So is water. Neither one of them dissolves brain cells. Even in dead-drunk concentrations, blood with alcohol in it is no better "solvent" than is blood without alcohol.

In fact, in the concentrations in which it is normally consumed--even straight vodka--alcohol has no discernible effect on the body at first blush. The problem is, the body quickly oxidizes alcohol to acetaldehyde, and that is a killer.

The ability of alcohol to destroy brain cells is a very murky subject, and its real importance is a dubious matter. Lots of things destroy brain cells, and we have a fantastic excess of them. If you want to talk tissue damage, cirrhosis of the liver is a much better case. The disease is irreversible, and by the time it's discovered, it is usually fatal. Almost the only way you can get it is excess booze. Excess booze can also devastate the circulatory system and weaken the heart. Brain damage is less predictable, but it can cause mental illness. It is addictive, meaning you have to go thru withdrawal if you are a heavy drinker, and alcohol withdrawal is more dangerous than heroin withdrawal.

Light or social drinking is a much more debatable area. There is no real evidence that significant medical problems result from this in most people. Each drink may kill a few liver cells, but a few drinks a week over a lifetime don't appear to add up to anything at all. The problems associated with social drinking are, in a word, social. And of course, people who develop drinking problems normally go thru a social drinking phase. If you don't go thru that, you'll never become a problem drinker. I don't mean by this letter to minimize anything. Alcohol is the number one drug problem, both in this society and worldwide, and is the leading cause of accidental deaths.

Ed Wrobel: Your comment about alcohol being a solvent which dissolves brain cells strikes me as an inaccurate. I have seen computerized tomography ("CAT") brain scans of alcoholics. Shrinkage of the brain does occur but is largely reversed with a period of prolonged abstinence. Alcohol is metabolized in the digestive system-- actually used as fuel by the liver (which, if overdone, leads to excessive fat deposits in that organ). Alcohol lowers the cholesterol level in the blood (alcoholics always have low blood cholesterol levels) and studies have shown that moderate consumption (say, about two drinks per day) decreases the risk of heart disease in many people, especially those with a diet rich in fat, like most Americans eat.

Also at a higher risk of heart disease are individuals with so-called "Type A" behavior patterns. Such individuals are overly ambitious, rigid in their thinking, conformist, and unable to

tolerate those who refuse to accept the same value system. You may wish to have a paramedic available if a certain housewife writer attends your next KaneKon.

Bruce Linsey: If the only thing wrong with alcohol is that it destroys brain cells, then I don't think I have much to lose by drinking.

((Well, Bruce pretty much summed it up there... SHEESH! I make one little mistake, bury it in the middle of Linsey's long-winded letter, and you guys still find it and plaster me to the wall!! Alright I was wrong and I'll be more careful about opening my mouth in the future before checking to make sure my foot isn't about to be inserted. In a way I appreciate having you detectives as subbers, keep it up.))

((We now return you to your regularly scheduled program...))

Dear Hal,

#### TRUTH
