



From Steve Hutton - London, Ontario: Ken:

You believe that the opinion of the majority <u>is</u> morality ((Oversimplification.)), and that this morality helps society and the human race to survive. Fine so far, but this doesn't tell me your real (ultimate) moral standard. Suppose I could show you that "the majority is always right" doesn't help mankind and society to survive, or that it doesn't help mankind and society to survive as well as some other moral system. Would you then admit defeat, or would you say, "it doesn't matter; the majority is <u>inherently</u> right"?

This is what I was getting at in my previous letter (although I obviously wasn't clear enough): what is your moral standard? Is it the opinion of the majority, or is it the survival of the human race, or is it the maintenance of "society" (whatever that is)? I don't really see how it can be more than one of these. ((You're mixing apples and oranges again... "The opinion of the majority" is not comparable to "the survival of the human race" and "the maintenance of society" as a moral standard. How you can fail to see that amazes me. "The opinion of the majority" is in the same category as "the Bible", "the Koran", and so forth as a means to an end, the end being whatever priorities are held by the people deciding what means (or moral code) to use. "The survival of the human race" and "the maintenance of society" are in the ends category. For example, a society can choose to base its laws on the Koran, the Bible, or the opinion of the majority (among other things) but not on "the maintenance of society" or "the survival of the human race" because neither of those things is a moral code. If it were suggested to my hypothetical society that one of the two ends I have just mentioned be used as a basis for its constitution, hot argument would likely ensue as to which moral code would most effectively serve to bring about that end. Comprenez? To make it even clearer, "being worthy servants of Allah" is to "the maintenance of society" what "the Koran" is to "the opinion of the majority" (in my opinion, anyway). You can say "The laws addressing the legality of murder will be based upon the majority opinion" but you cannot say "The laws addressing the legality of murder will be based on what is best for the maintenance of society" because it would then be open to debate what is best for the maintenance of society.)) Put another way, what exactly must I demonstrate to convince you that you are wrong?

Until I get you pinned down to a specific position, there is no way I can launch an effective attack against your position. ((I have stated and clarified my position endlessly. It's becoming tiresome.)) The best I can do is random pot-shots, such as:

1. The majority is always right. (i.e. the term "moral majority" is a redundancy.) Fine, but which majority?

la. Do you mean the majority of people in the world, or in each country, or in each city... If each country can have its own morality, you could have a war in which each country "has God on its side" ((How utterly absurd! How could I possibly believe

in the lack of absolute morality and believe in God?!?! God's morality would be absolute if he existed. In fact, it is fundamental to my belief that there is no absolute morality that I am an atheist.)) If you mean the majority of people in the world, please consider the fact that most people in the world are extremely ignorant, and have never seen a government that was not corrupt and brutal.

- 1b. You, Eric and I are washed ashore on a desert You and I decide that Eric must die; you and Eric decide that I must die; Eric and I decide that you must die. At midnight, the sentences are carried out. Each of us wanted to live but is dead, murdered, but no one has done anything wrong because "the majority" approved in each case. Do you agree? ((That is a very silly example, since each of those involved have voted two different ways. However, if it were necessary for one person to die that the other two might live, then a vote would be as fair a way as any to do it. This, however, is not what my arguments apply to in the main, as this is a situation that absolute morality would find hard to resolve as well. Most morality systems value all persons lives equally, so there is really no prescribed ("moral") way of resolving the above situation.)) (This is not wholly artificial: it is a scaled-down and more violent version of what goes on in the U.S. Congress every day.) This illustrates (I hope) the absurdity of regarding "the majority" as an entity. In our group of 3, there are 3 majorities, in a world of 4 billion, there are a virtually infinite number. Which majority is right?
- 2. Let's assume that \underline{you} are more intelligent and knowledgeable than the average person (an assumption that I'm quite willing to make). "The majority is right" means that there is no higher standard of morality than the opinions of people who are, compared with you, \underline{stupid} and ignorant. Seems like "the blind leading the sighted" to me.
- 3. Probably a majority of people in the U.S. and Canada (certainly a majority in the world) think that atheists are a corrupting influence on the young and should, at the very least, be thrown in jail. ((That, of course, is utterly false.)) Where does that leave two atheists like you and me?
- 4. When you assert your right to say things you don't mean, you aren't just attacking <u>debate</u>, but <u>communication</u>. ((Come on!! Clearly, I don't assert my right to say things I don't mean I question your right to misinterpret things I say.)) Suppose you asked me where Toronto is and I replied, "it is 100km south of New York City". Because I didn't say what I meant, I would have failed to communicate with you. It does no good for me to say, "from context I obviously meant 600km" ((oh brother!)) or "only a fool would think that Toronto was south of New York City". It's up to me to say what I mean! ((Pretty laughable example. I would like you to produce some evidence from my letters to back up your absurd claims. The only things you have cited are the Hitler comment, which I have clarified, and the physical truth contention, which I thought was obviously not part of my argument from the beginning.))
- 4a. Contextual meaning. When you hide behind contextual meaning, you essentially say, "I am unwilling or unable to say

what I mean; it's up to <u>you</u> to sort through my contradictions and figure out what I mean." Let's take a specific case. In Anduin #29, you wrote "I support (among other things) respect for the beliefs of others, a view which is certainly in opposition to the destruction of one's fellow human beings. Hitler deserved death because he violated the value systems of almost all humanity...". We have one vague, apple-pie statement (Hitler deserved death, here's why:...). I and other readers of Anduin were faced with the task of figuring out what you meant. If I understand your position correctly, we were supposed to come to the conclusion that you meant "Hitler deserved death because he killed a whole bunch of people, not just because he "violated the value systems' of most people". How we were supposed to reach this conclusion is beyond me. It's as if I said, "The Iranian hostage thing was kind of yucky. The U.S. was right to invade Grenada because Grenada is on U.S. shipping lanes" and expected people to interpret it as "the U.S. was right to invade Grenada because it avoided another hostage situation". ((See last double-parenthetical comment.))

4b. You say that I should haver known that reality was subjective because only an idiot could believe that. The philosopher Protagoras, who is seldom counted among the feeble-minded (Socrates called him the "wisest of all living men"), believed that reality was subjective. He said (essentially) that if I believe the world is flat, and you believe it is round, the world is flat for me, and it is round for you. I would suggest that you get out of your head right now the notion that some ideas can only be believed by idiots!

4c. You say that it was obvious that when you said "Truth is not absolute, it is relative", you were only referring to moral truth because that's all you later talked about. That's equivalent to me saying "California stinks" and then claiming you should have known I only meant southern California because I didn't hurl any abuse specifically at Sacramento. ((That is flawed. The example would make sense if you said "...because I didn't hurl any abuse specifically at the rest of California." And in that case, I would agree that that claim could be made, with slight modification. If I stated "The United States stinks" and then outlined all the reasons why California stinks, a defender of this nation (or anyone else for that matter) could force me to abandon my argument against the U.S. in favor of a position against California unless I could produce more evidence to back up my claims. That, in essence, is what happened in our argument. Of course, I never intended to say that physical/ factual truth was subjective anyway, and I thought that was obvious from the bulk of my letter. However, when you pointed out the ambiguity in your inimitable way, I clarified that point.))

Flease say what you mean. I'm not omniscient; I only know of you and your opinions what I read in $\underline{\text{Anduin}}$. If you won't say what you mean, I can't argue with you.

5. One of the rules of debate (or Debate or dEbaTe) is that you fight your opponent's ideas, not your opponent. You only make yourself look silly when you try to attribute motivations to my actions ("...but you wanted to look clever") and when you accuse me of being too smart to be stupid, or too stupid to be smart, or some other sort of walking paradox. ((I make myself look silly

only when I attribute motives that aren't there. In this case, however, the motives that I alleged are clearly evinced by some things you said earlier in this very letter: "Would you then admit defeat...", and "...just what exactly must I demonstrate to convince you that you are wrong?" As I purported, you are more interested in 'winning on the intellectual battlefield' than in finding the truth.))

Why was (and am) I uncertain about your moral standard? It's because you haven't clearly set it out for me to see. I just re-read your comments in Anduin 30/31. After trudging through the green soup and irrelevant attacks on theism, I could not find a single word on your part on the majority, which you supposedly "supported...straight down the line". ((Steve, that is simply not true. The "green soup" led up to my rationale for majority rule, which was submitted thusly: "Inherent in maintaining the integrity of this society and the dignity of its members is consideration of the beliefs of every member to be of equal value." Of course I didn't reiterate my entire position, as I had stated it in the previous issue. I essentially responded to your attacks - surely you realize how absurd it would be for me to rewrite everything I have said to date in every correspondence.)) When I wrote my last letter, I was genuinely confused about your position. I'm less confused now and hope to be less confused still when I read your reply to this letter. ((All right. Here we go again. The green soup stuff was an explanation of the scientific basis of my In my opinion a man is no more than an assemblege of chemicals functioning in a systemic way, lacking a soul or any other sort of inherent divine spirit or affiliation. This belief and the belief that there is no supreme perfect being that would determine an absolute moral standard convinced me that there is, in fact, no absolute moral standard. There is nothing universal that makes murder (or anything else) wrong, though I personally consider it wrong. That is, I recognize that my moral standard (and everyone else's for that matter) has no universal validity, and therefore I allow for everyone else's on an equal level with my own. Lacking an absolute morality, I believe that when a society's laws are decided, every person's opinion should have equal weight. Certainly, there is nothing absolute that says mankind should survive, or have a working society, or anything for that matter. I submitted the survival (and progress) of mankind as worthwhile goals in my opinion. In other words, Steve, I can have my own opinion about what moral code is best to achieve what I consider worthwhile ends while recognizing all the time that each and every other individual in the human race is in the same position that I am. Getting back to the green soup stuff, I believe that human beings possess a natural potential (more so than any other species) for forming a cooperative society, which is why I believe a viable moral code can be reached by considering every person's opinions of equal value, weighing all opinions and reaching a consensus decision. If you wish more specifics on the

scientific basis of this, I will provide it on request.))

Thank you for having the patience to argue with one who is not quite stupid enough to be smart... ((You're welcome.))

From Gary Coughlan - Memphis, TN: Hi Eric!

I've taken 5 days off from work (including my 2 regular off days) so I'm able to clean my home, get stuff organized, rest and write letters.

I think polls prove to be meaningless when a great zine like Anduin comes in 28th with an average of 6.66 based on 45 voters. Please don't take it to heart, Eric. You've got one of the best letter columns going and I eagerly await your zine each month. When I called Randolph Smyth to get the results of the Runestone Poll, I couldn't believe where Anduin was. You're a Top Ten Zine despite what the poll says. He said that someone else had also expressed surprise over Anduin's placing—Steve Hutton. I got the breakdown on your votes and I have to say that you were apparently not the victim of grudge votes; you got a lot of medium numbers which greatly surprised me. I mean what do people want from a zine?!! Keep up the good work!

I'm enjoying the comments of Dan Palter and yourself. I have read and enjoyed the books he mentions, <u>The Origins of the Second World War</u> by A.J.P. Taylor who also wrote a history of World War I. Taylor is generally objective in his treatment of these histories and I like that. You know in history classes, especially in high school, it's clear that America and her allies were right and Germany and Japan were the "enemy". The victors write the history. So, for me, it is refreshing to read someone who treats all sides as having bad points and good points. ((I agree. No one side is ever completely right or wrong.))

What I like about Taylor is that he makes you think. He doesn't consider Hitler as a field incarnate or a demon-possessed madman but as a politician, and a very successful one. It's as if you are placed in the context of the 1930's and not knowing what is about to happen. I found myself saying, "Did that really happen?" and checking other sources. Too often in our reading history, we see the central thread which becomes so obvious to later generations. Taylor shows many threads and one was at a loss to predict the future. ((You bring up an important point, this is a common flaw in history books - hindsight is a lot easier than foresight. Hitler was a madman. He suffered from schizophrenia. As Phil Dancause pointed out to me, "One minute he was a good politician in complete command and control - helping Germany out of its economic problems, and the next minute he was 'Der Fuehrer'."

Until College, I used to have rather firm opinions of what had happened. One girl in my German class there, said that the Nazis had tried to send the Jews to other contries who generally refused them (the Depression was on and the Jews would take jobs from any prospective host country). I didn't believe this at all. But it was true. Do you remember the movie "Voyage of the Damned" with Orson Welles & Faye Dunaway? That was based on this incident.

Another thing that I doubted was that Hitler was sincere in negotiating with the British after the fall of France in 1940. I agree with you that he would not have given up the Low Countries or France but he was willing to make a deal with the British whom he both admired and hated. The general reasoning goes that if

Britain would agree to give Germany a free hand in Europe, he wouldn't move against the British Empire. Indeed there was really nothing he could do against the British; the Germans had prepared no plans to conquer England. They felt that the fall of France would make the British see the light. This is not to say that Hitler might not have attacked England later but I think he was sincere in wanting peace with them in 1940. In his <u>Mein Kampf</u>, Hitler named the two allies that Germany should seek: Italy and He always criticized the Kaiser's Germany for challenging the British by building a rival fleet instead of seeking cooperation with England. ((None of this surprises me. Had Hitler reached a bargain with his "Aryan Cousins" (as he called the British), he would have been able to concentrate his forces against Russia and complete his control of Europe. Then he could slowly starve Britain to death much in the same way Napoleon tried to do with his Continental System. England would then have been easy prey for Germany both at home and in Africa.))

William Shirer in his book <u>The Rise and Fall of the Third Reich</u> mentions the persecution of the Jews, but it was pretty dry to me. What really opened my eyes, and made me very aware of the horror, was the mini-series <u>Holocaust</u>. Did you see it? ((Yes)) That series also made a tremendous impact in West Germany. When I went to Europe last year I saw Dachau and visited Anne Frank's house. It's almost beyond imagining what evils were done. Yet in the Dachau museum there are many artifacts, among them German newspapers of the 1930s telling of the concentration camps. This proves that the common German did know that something was going on. William Shirer states in his book I mentioned earlier these words on page 586-587 about Kristallnacht:

"On the flaming, rictous night of November 9, 1938, the Third Reich had deliberately turned down a dark and savage path from which there was to be no return. A good many Jews had been murdered and tortured and robbyed before, but these crimes, except for those which took place in concentration camps, had been committed mostly by brown-shirted rowdies, acting out of their own sadism and greed while State authorities looked on, or looked the other way. Now the German Government itself had organized and carried out a vast pogrom. The killings, the lootings, the burning of synagogues and houses and shops on the night of November 9 were its doing.... Individually, as this writer can testify from personal experience, many Germans were horrified by the November 9 inferno as were Americans and Englishmen and other foreigners. But neither the leaders of the Chirstian churches nor the generals nor any other representatives of the "good" Germany spoke out at once in open protest."

Certainly before this time, the German man-in-the-street was aware that Jews were excluded from being teachers, doctors, government workers; that books, plays and music done by Jews were forbidden; and of course the consequences for violating the Nurememburg Laws which were designed to prevent "race mixing".

But the question is, what could the Germans have realistically done about it? They lived under a dictatorship and many non-Jewish Germans were put in the concentration camps too. The <u>extermination</u> camps did not exist until after World War II had started.

Hope you have a good KaneKon. How many showed up?

((16, I think. I guess there really was very little that the German people could have done. Still, they got themselves into that horrible predicament, and they allowed it to continue. Fortunately, the US and other nations did not allow themselves to get into as bad trouble. Can you imagine if we allowed the persecution of blacks to continue today? Or women?))
