ATLANTIS has been delayed because of several reasons. Among them, my heavy work schedule at the end of the summer, and my commitment to publish <u>Wazir</u>.

We are now back on schedule as regards ATLANTIS.

ATLANTIS will be carrying the games for THE DIPLOMACY ASSOCIATION'S <u>First</u>

<u>Postal Diplomacy World Championship Tournament</u>. There will be seven games, with
seven players and at least one stand-by player for each. Winners of these seven
games will play a final game for the title of Diplomacy's World Champion.

Rules will be those of the 1971 Rulebook, with some variations. Any rules disputes will be settled by the Chairman of the Board, THE DIPLOMACY ASSOCIATION.

The following is a commentary by Mr. John Beshara, in response to an editorial by John Boardman.

### Prologue

In <u>Graustark</u> 273, John Boardman published an editorial titled, "Murder in Munich," in which he stated in the last paragraph: "Anyone who approves the terrorists' actions, any Arab leader who breaks diplomatic relations with Germany because German authorities dared to resist them, anyone who tries to find "justifications" in terms of Israeli deeds for these murders — he is and should be held as a co-conspirator with the killers." Since John Boardman refused to publish the following article in <u>Graustark</u>, it is presented herewith:

# MESGUIDED PATRIOTS IN MUNICH . By John J. Beshara

Carlotte and the State of the S

"The most remarkable and, over the long run, positive political development in Israel in recent months has been the growing recognition that the Palestinian Arabs were wronged in the creation of the Zionist state. In the past, Israeli establishment figures would denounce this view, when expressed by disaffected intellectuals, as a guilt obsession. Now it is possible for a political leader to state publicly that Israel's duty and best interests lie in moving to redress the grievances of the displaced Palestinians...It would be a tragedy if Israel's top leaders let outmoded perceptions of the Palestinian people blind them to the psychological and political opportunities that may now be opening up."

That quote is from the lead editorial in The New York Times, September 4, 1972. The next day 11 Israelis and 5 Arabs were killed in Munich. All of those Israelis were members of the Israeli armed forces. All of the Arabs were patriots using the same kind of force perpetrated for generations against the Palestinians and other Arabs by Zionists and especially by the Jewish Irgun secret terrorist organization.

I've abhorred the violence, the atrocities and the wars resulting in the creation of the State of Israel and by the expansionist-minded leaders of that country. I advocated amicable relations between the Arabs and the Israelis after the Zionists, through the use of force, forged their state in 1948.

For most of my life, I have pondered the problems of the troubled Middle East in modern times. It is unreal, knowing that for 2,000 years the only place in the world the Jewish people could live in peace and freedom was in Arab countries. But despite my hopes for peace in 1948, I knew that the gun that killed the Israelis and the Arabs in Munich was cocked long before I was born and the reverberrations will continue long after I am dead.

In conscience, I cannot condone the acts of the Arabs in Munich, nor can I within my heart condemn the individuals. They were misguided patriots, but patriots nevertheless, for they were fighting Israeli soldiers, not civilians, the way they thought best. In doing so, they accomplished nothing and triggered the deaths of hundreds of Arabs, including women and children, by equally-misguided leaders of the Zionist enclave.

It is within our province to condemn violence, to protest the irrational actions of the politicians, past and present, who fertilized the fields of blood, to decry the infamy of a "civilized" world that tolerates the incarceration of one-and-a-half million Palestinians for 25 years and the disenfranchisement of five million Palestinians, most of whom are either refugees or subject to the whims of Zionist overlords.

If this makes me a co-conspirator, mea culpa.
