## LATE NEWS FROM THE FRONT

GENEVA: The Turkish Government has protested the suggestion that 5 pounds is being requested of the English Government as the price of the late Turkish Ambassador. Said Muhammad al-Orc. "The sum covers the value of his <u>suit</u>, which was spoilt by the ducks." Some Swiss authorities have suggested that no price has been set for the late Ambassador himself because the smallest coin minted in England is the farthing.

GASTRITIS, PODERKAGG: Italian soldiers from the Italian First Army, recently victorious in Trieste, are pouring into Poderkagg to visit the various cultural centers, such as Novi Sodom, Neu-Gomorrah, and Nuevo Las Vegas. The First Army's commander, General Barfo di Lasagna, gave a vivid account of their great victory. "They began to fly Ethiopian flags during the first charge. It was horrifying. To rally our spirits we began to sing. We sang the Funicular Railway Song. Funiculi, Funicula, FUNICULIIIII ...". The interview was then terminated by the instantaneous departure of all reporters and other observers. Even now, several days later, the smell of stale garlic permeates the air for miles around.
