## GAMI 1965B

Brobdingnag would like to congratulate Conrad F. von Metzke on his recent win as Russia in Game 1965B. This game was the first to be organized in Wild 'n Wooly when it began publication over two and a half years ago. Called game 1965KK in that magazine it was no tenle inseveral repects. Ending in playing "year" 1914 it was somewhat over the average playing length for postal games and took two and half years, calendar time, to complete. In spite of its length there were no replacements of players in it.

The winner, Conrad von Metzke, is a very well known player. At one time he was enrolled in more standard games than any other player. Me also is reputed to be the tallest of postal Dip adicts as well as being the most polyglot. For well over a year he edited the journal Costaguana, one of the brightest Diplomacy journals of its day. Rumour has it that he intends to revive it, and needs only a few more players to begin the first of his new series of games. Conrad probably has only one regret about his win: it was not made with Austria. Austria-Mungary is his favorite country, which he has played innumerable times. It is mildly ironic that he first win was made with another country.

Wild'n Wooly 103, which announces the win has a brief summary of the game, which those interested should read. However, as WinW does not publish a centre-year list for its games one is given below:
