Ratings by Countries

In the last issue of Jutland Jollies Derek Welson suggests that there should be a rating list based on countries. I am not sure that I understand exactly what he intends. However, using just finished games, there is listed below, and on the following pages, the score of every player who has played that country, using the score as obtained in the usual BROB Rating List. Data are for all the seven-man games included in BROB Completed Game Rating List #13, published last issue. Results for England are as follows:

It will be noticed that after some names a figure appears in brackets. Those individuals have played the country more than once and the figure indicates the number of times they have played the country, here England, in completed games. I thought that for a listing of this type an average would be more interesting than a total. Smythe, for example, got a score of 6 in a game in which he won playing Egland, and a score of +1 in another game playing that country in which he tied for third place. The score shown here, +3.5, is the mean of those two figures.

If one refers to the Country List attached to the Rating List in the last issue one sees that England has a total score of +24 on the 22 games considered. That is the average player for England received +1.1 points per game. In the second score column, above, this amount, 1.1, is subtracted from each player's raw score. Therefore, a player who has a score appreciably above zero in this second column has done better than the average player for the country, a player with a markedly minus score has done worse than the average. An exactly similar scheme is used in tabulating the results for the six other countries on the following pages.

And that was in <u>Jutland Jollies</u>, #5, that Derek's editorial appeared. Copies available from Bob Lake, Apt. 904, Esterbrooke Ave., Willowdale, Ontario.

I must say that I am very dubious about the value of such a listing, at least at this time. When Nating Lists first ampeared, something over two years ago, only a few games had been completed, and everyone stated that they couldn't mean much until there was more data available. Well, it is only now, two years later, that we have arrived at the stage where such active and long-time players as Derek himself, Brannan, Moning, von Metzke, and the like are now rated on a half dozen games or so. And it is only now that we can begin to feel that Mating Lists do give some information, at least about such frequent players as those whose names are mentioned above. But if we split those scoret up among the seven countries we are right back where we started. A men is rated on the basis of a single game and it is hard to tell what his score means, if anything. Movever, there is hope for the future. Within the last three months seven games have ended and been brought

into the Mating Lists. It would seem reasonable to suppose that that rate will be maintained, and perhaps increased, through the coming year. If so we will have data from some fifty or sixty games by the end of 1968 and it may then be possible to say, with at least a little confidence, something like, "Derek plays Mngland, France, Italy, and Russia well, but he appears to be less happy with Germany." Taking the tables above at face value, one could say it now, but with very little confidence.

Strangely, during the 4 or 5 days immediately prior to getting the issue of Jutland Jollies mentioned. I had two long letters from John Roning, and there has been another one since. He also is concerned with the effect of countries on ratings, although his approach is quite different from the above. I think he plans to publish his views on the subject in stab so I will so no more here, other than to urge all interested in Rating Lists to not let their subscriptions to stab run out.

The objection has sometimes been made to this type of Rating List, and the same objection applies to the Centro-Y ear listings, that it treats the winner just like everyone else. The winner, of course, gets a little more than the second player, just as the second player gets a little more than the third survivor, but otherwise he is on a par with the other players. There is a contrary point of view, and it is one held by several notable players: namely, that ϵ win is something sui generis, and incapable of being measured on the same scale as one uses in awarding points to other survivors. In an effort to give the information required by people holding that philosophy, a change of notation has been adopted with this edition of the list. Previously a winner was noted by adding (W) after his name. In this list that has been changed to 407, to take John Smythe as an example. This means that John has won 4 games; and that, so far, he has been rated on 7 games. We may have been in more than 7: for instance, he may have been in another game, resigned his position which was taken over by some one else, the game now being credited to that player who took over. The seven means that seven completed games have been assigned to Smythe; of those 7 ha won 4. Similarly for other winners.

About the "stalemate" games I intend to administer them thusly:

A. After three years have gone by without sumply centers changing hands, I will call for a proposed "campaign to win the war" from each player.

D. If no satisfactory "campiagn" is sent in and all playens agree to a draw so be it - "c'est tout!"

C. If no satisfactory "campaign" is sent in and no players agree to a draw, the game will be placed on a subscription basis, whereby, each year, or 10 issues, the players will each pay ((an additional)) of in the hope of winning.

D. In the event of one or two people not agreeing to a draw and not submitting a satisfactory campaign plan, while the others do agree to a draw, the player or players wishing to continue the game shall pay accordingly. Now instance, if two players want to continue and two don't, the two who do will have to pay 22 each.

I had visualized sealed orders as something along the lines of your plant of campaign idea for stalemated games. The whole idea is to separate those who care and deserve a neutral player to make some moves, in acc rdance with those sealed orders, and those who don't deserve a neutral player to protect his interests and his allies. The player can send in sealed orders each time to insure against postal and other types of accidents.

((+(What I have sometimes done in games where my interest was great enough to warrant it, was to send in a set of orders immediately on receiving the magazine, this set of orders being something that my own forces could do on their own. Then, after that, I'd contact allies and potential allies. If I got a favorable response from them I'd send in revised moves. That way, whether or not negotiations have a favorable outcome, and whether or not the revised moves are in time to make the deadline, one is protected and will not be caught completely unprepared. And it can be done now in almost every taine without all the machinery of "sealed" orders and a neutral stand by player.-jamec)+))
