I was astonished to read your description of how fast you get out the adjudications, complete with your wife reading you the mail over the phone, so the mailing yould go out on the deadline day. This means that the players actually have about as much negotiating time as a player in a typical three-week deadline zine. Calling your third game "second class"was clearly the wrong word. Sorry. I mean "phantom". It looks like it will be a phantom game. Thus, you tell usthat the game is "now under way", but we get only a hint as to who is in the game. Even Don Horton gives the names of the players. I can see how you can't get the moves in to the same issue. But will we ever see this game, or its press? If players know that only the other players in the game will see the press, they are less likely to write it. I believe that you should reprint the moves and press, because some of us like to follow at least the game starts. If you lack the space, kick out some of your non-dippy material. But if all that the rest of us see of the game is an occasional cryptic reference in your "John's "Notes", I'm not sure I can see how you can sy say the game is being carried in the zine.

As for Tony Watson's "all this was decided nearly a year ago": totally untrue. The second and third disputes that I had with him took place in August 1977. Tony's final action against me -- expulsion from 1975IJ --took place in the zine postmarked Oct 10. My article appeared in late Feb, 1978, hardly a year later. Its also sad to see that he interpreted your suggestion that he "respond" as an invitation to "resort to attacking" me, rather than an invitation to explain how his own GMing philosophy can justify his various actions.

How to judge what your readers think of your "filler" is a virtually impossible task, because those who don't care for it are much less likely to write. Don't forget that to your non-players, things tend to be reversed: its the games that are the filler. As for myself, I rank the John's notes (&zine reviews) and the letter column tops, the games intermediate, and the non-Dippy material reprinted, bottom.

Question: Do you allow persons who are not in a given game to insert press? Most GMs do not, I suspect, but at least one (John Leeder) does.

As for your quiz, the next numbers are presumably 7, 6, 3, 2 -- putting the numbers in alphabetical order when the Englishnames are used. Unfortunately, you blew it when you said "whole integers" (which is redundant, incidently); you meant digitds. because with all integers available, what about seventeen, seventy one, etc?! All those infinity of integers would have to be slipped in.

((In regard to your question, yes, press is wide open at present, and that would permit ANYone from submitting some. Few people care enough outside a game to "interfere" much, so I don't think it's any big danger, but I'd outlaw it if the players chose, and would more heavily censor "outside" press than I would otherwise. I've never censored anything yet, but, the possibility is there.))
((In regard to the puzzle, you're right, I did word it wrong.Digits would be correct. Also, "zero" should be at the end))

Mark's DIPLOMACY DIGEST # 9 arrived yesterday, so I can pass on the word from it. It is now center-stapled, $5\frac{1}{8} \times 8\frac{1}{2}$, and is said to be bigger. That means material, I'm sure, for the type size is photo-reduced and made my eyes water. Or, I should say, water more, because the hay-fever season is here, and my eyes itch a little and water a lot off and on for three weeks each spring and fall. 


