Well, if I have any vacation next year, I might consider it. But probably not


THIS ISSUE should hopefully not make the mails until September. I detect a certain slowing down now that schools are reopening, and perhaps that will allow me to slow the recent pace a little.

The latest BLACK FROG, #1 zeen, had an update of Jack's modified Calhamer point rating system that basically only considers games of the past few years. The top ten looked like this: Kendter, Caruso, Crockett, McLendon, Sergeant, Hart, Verheiden, Harmon, Michalski, and Kassel. The weighting for recently-reported conclusions gets rid of a lot of old inactive players, but the fact that I'm in there makes me leary; I haven't done well in two years. I guess the trick is to bask in the glow of victories won from games fought out in 78-79 now, in 1981. Hell, I'll take what I can get. Jack's system is about as current as one can have in a hobby around a game that takes 1½-2 years to play in most cases. Also, a low number of games in which you did well helps. I see Gary Howe is in a tie for 21st, yet I doubt he's been in more than 3 or 4 games, and is now inactive. He did well in those few tho, usually drawing. Of these top ten, I think Crockett is now inactive, at least under his own name; and Kassel is another I don't think is playing much anymore.

JUNK MAIL: About one third of you may have received, or may YET receive, some sort of data-industry newspaper in your mailbox. These are free gifts courtesy of the fatgreat Bill Shaffer who had a box full of them at his office last weekend. Since they were postpaid, I offered to send them out as free advertising, since I have labels for a mob of people who enjoy junk mail (you enjoy getting BB, right?). It turned out there were only 18, so I took 18 names off the list and put them on the issues. I was tempted to follow his suggestion and put another label on it saying this is BB 102 &103. Thanks for the buck, guys", but that would be in poor taste. Funny, but perhaps poor taste, so I just sent them as-is. Something different, instead of the usual dipzines, and free. This way Tro Sherwood won't get the blame; your cat or bird can thank me instead.

All the Canadian zines have been rumbling in of late. First, Smyth's FSF, then Carter's SLEEPLESS KNIGHTS and Brown's SNAFU!, and last night, a set of RUNESTONEs from Leeder. I thought I'd see the hardcopy poll results, but instead they proved to be just the old ones that had built up before the strike. Maybe one of these days... I think that these four are about the only active Canpubbers anymore, since I've heard that Cuerrier has folded and left.

Speaking of RON BROWN, our own US Ron has put out another big double issue of his MURD'RING MINISTERS with lots of material in it. This was his #38-39, postmarked Aug 22 and received here August 24. Pretty decent, esp. after some recent problems he's reported.



THIS WEEKEND (Aug 22-23) was pretty exceptional, in that I managed to get in a bunch of wargaming. Poor old Pilant was Friday night's victim, as we went at RUSSIAN VICTORY of AH's, and 'surprisingly,' my Russians won. Actually, the surprise was that I won so quickly. Dave's opening attacks bogged down and killed him in one, then a double whammy knocked out the Ukraine from him in the very next. That second game started well enough, he putting a good force across the central Prut and Dnester rivers, but, that's ALL he had in the south. The Odessa garrison, a cavalry unit, moved 7 west on my turn, adjacent to Bucharest, and Rumania surrendered. His southern HQ was stacked with two units, both of which were unfortunately Rumanian. I hit the bare HQ at 4-1 and zapped it, then the next turn, he had his forces in three stacks awaiting a breakthrough from Lvov (which worked). So I in turn hit each stack at 1/1-surrounded, by way of stripping everything west of the Dnieper and throwing it in, and instead of scaring him and killing 2 infantry corps, I rolled two EX and one DR. His losses, total, were 3 Panzer corps and four infantry. No German unit survived. Then we exchanged sides, and between good weather and high Russian losses, the end of 1941 saw Dave taking 3 points of replacements in Nov-Dec, drawn on the Moscow "3" worker unit. I'd killed the rest, and that 3 had just repelled a 1/1 frontal. We gave it up and went to see the cheapie midnight show of EMPIRE for \$2.

Saturday was wasted at home, but Sunday saw a meet with The Fluff at his office (for peace and escape from wives). That was fun. We went through about 4 AFRICAN CAMPAIGN games, and a Russian Campaign. He was glad to give me the Russians, for he feels he has a German win system down pat. Had that luck held, maybe I'd have had a good new job Monday, but no, here I am.

One fun part of the weekend there is in looting the place. He gave me a soldering kit out of surplus, metered off a couple of mailing labels, gave me assorted other junk, and really grossed me out by preparing for the two black cleaning ladies that came out to do the building. When he saw them, he ran and took a shit in the john and left it for 'em, plus scattered even more packing material on the floors than there already was. It seems that his company and the building managers don't get on real well, and it is a constant war of them trying to steal all they can while Fluff does his part to get back at them. It was funny to watch. Attitude, that's the key.

Who cares about the shit stuff at work when there are important things going on in the world? And starting out on a new adventure like school is important. Claudine and I get a brief break here as Brian starts out on his own a little more, but Valerie is still a few years away from dating. About the time she is out and on her own, Brian will be ready to start driving, so after this short interlude, we'll be in it deep for a decade again.

Last night I opened a can of Libby's peas to go with the Tuna Helper I'd just whipped up for the kids, and as I warmed it in the microwave, I noticed a bad smell in the kitchen. That's not unheard of, so I ignored it and went on. But when I put it on the table, I found that the smell, like warm glue, was definitely coming from these darn peas I was eating. Much as I hate to write off the 40¢, I chucked that load down the



Bill "Fluff" Shaffer is already signed up, so I will too if only to read the press. Not only does Fluff put out good gross stuff, but if YOU like to write really gross, sick, perverted press, here's a chance to do so while using HIS dateline. Why not? He'll be using YOURS. If you don't want to play, but DO want to write press, just send it to me and I'll turn it in myself. Mark Lew is at 3120 W 79 St, Anchorage, AK 99502. Anyone want to be a godfather for this game in this format? OK, there it is. Nothing is more fun than typing charts... Anyhow, my comments, top to bottom:

First, what but congratulations to Blackjack for the win. He has put out a prodigious amount of material, altho slacking off lately, and between his own stuff and his many fakes, well deserves the spot. His main game subzine came in 11th, highest of any subzine making the main list, so he is pretty popular with his players as well. One thing too easy to overlook is that he also did so well with a total of 65 votes cast, one of the highest single turnouts registered and over half of the total received (126). An impressive win.

DOT HAPPY surprises me. It <u>is</u> good, very professionally printed, individual game maps, digest sized with reduced print and hardcover stock. However, it is more of a player's zine than a reading zine to me, so I didn't thinkit would place this high. Appparently it has enough non-game stuff to more than overcome the warehouse image. Two dozen votes, but apparently all good ones. A nice reward to a good looking newcomer.

On my own third place spot, I'll just say"thanks. I'm also glad so many of you voted, altho that "60" is interesting. My print run is only 60, including file copy, and John didn't count pubber's own votes for their zines this year, so that means that at least a few non-subbers voted. My estimate is a dozen myself. Apparently many of them were satisfied former subbers, for the few sour-grapes votes were apparently absorbed by a lot of you voting me 8 or higher, which gave me a VERY respectable showing overall. I really appreciate the score, and the great interest shown by so many of you voting. In a hobby like this where ANY response is a big response, and two letters a month

is above average, this tally, like your tremendous input reflected on these pages, is a real compliment, and I am very grateful.

Ron Brown's MM has broken into the top 10 in good style this year, as I beleive I predicted it would last year. Despite increasing workload, Ron has managed to continue putting out an impressive and interesting zine, with lots of reading material. THAT is something that all of the top half-dozen have: something more than average for the non-playing subber to look at. There are other zines that have this too of course and did NOT make the top 10: Whitestonia, DD, FSF at times, EM, DW, Volker,VD, D&L, e.g., but it is a common thread here at the top. Crud's RETALIATION is a classic at bulk of material, altho most of it is press. EE is another impressive newcomer, and is much more learned sounding than all this hicky shit about Gary Coughlan might lead you to believe. JAF is likewise a nice zine to get, but not as much non-game material. In this next group, from Mike Connor's professional looking LSD thru the rest of the top 10, we have a group of zines that all seem to me to be nice friendly zines to PLAY in. No controversy, no shabby repro, no attrocious English, but, not a LOT of material, and a heavier emphasis on the GAMES. I should add that I do not get JIHAD! in the #9 spot, so that might shoot the example's flow.

The next group I see, 12-21, is largely a group of zines that offers a decent amount of material for non-players, but didn't make the top 10 for various other reasons: irregular schedule, controversy, weak repro, something like that; and a second batch of good-playing zines that are disappointingly short on material outside the game. The first bunch would be W, FSF, DD, EM, DW; the latter batch, 13, 15,17,18. Of this second group (12-21), I do not get Torpedo and no longer get Bushwacker, tho I have seen samples or former sub issues.

John Daly's DOGS OF WAR in 22 is another of those real nice, regular playing zines short on non-game stuff (tho not devoid of it). VOLKER, once impressive, has been winding down this past year, and got involved in personalities fights directly, which doesn't do anyone much good in standings. It's about done, I understand. BERSAG and SNAKE PIT are both subzs in EMHAIN MACHA, a zine I would have expected to (again) do better in the poll; I guess everyone thought the whole lot of them—zeen & subz—were all about the same. Either that, or everyone voted a point lower because of his being such a strong Democrat.

SLEEPLESS KNIGHTS at 25 is new and should be in the top dozen next year. The fact that in the middle of the Canadian postal strike, he put out an issue to US players from Ohio shows a degree of commitment that will carry him farther than most of the pack. SK is small now, but I look for it to jump at least 10 spots by next year's poll. 01' Bruxus weighs in at 26 this year, a disappointing spot for one of my own top 3 or 4. The turnout, 77 votes received, is illustrative of the problem though. This is more than his latest circulation figures have been running, and is the highest in the poll. Clearly a LOT of these votes are anti-Brux votes from either former subbers or non-subbers to VD.I'd like to see how the votes spread on this one. Also, watch for a better showing in Larzelere's Marco Poll that eliminates negative votes and which should be out shortly. VD is one of those zines that you either love or hate, but few are neutral.LOM at 28th is a new, cute product, but uses very reduced type, and between that and the xerox, it is often hard to read in places. I suspect that if LOM were in more of a BB type format, it would have done better. I don't get ENVOY at 29; the tie at thirty is between two Canadian ditto zines that are mediocre for different reasons. Leeder's own RUNESTONE is supposed to be a weekly ditto zine, but is more often just a flyer, and often delayed, with little besides game notes, and heavy on variants instead of Dip at that. It used to rank high as the poll host zine, but has slipped a lot in the standings while its intrinsic quality has only slipped somewhat. I guess with this being the fifth poll, people are more inclined to give RUNE an honest vote. 6% is at least a point higher than I would have put it. PASSCH on the other hand, has put out impressive issues at time, including the hobby record, 104 pages last year in one issue once. However, I have heard he has now folded after many months silence even aside from the strike, and regularity was never a strong point of it. Kind of like a lot of old NYC zines: often spectacular, but very erratic. Canadian zines also have a poor track record in a hobby made up of poor track records: RUNE and FSF chug on forever, it seems, but the rest are like comets, giving one bright pass and dying out. I hope the

new Canadians change this record. I think Dave Carter will.

Zines in the thirties are of two types: those with some definite weakness that keeps them low, and a smalller group that I think should have done 10 to 15 spots higher. Do they have some flaw I haven't seen? These include D&L at 32, T-R at 33, and AG At 37. Two of the three are ditto zines, and Leeder speculates that ditto zines may seem less impressive to people for that format. I don't think so, but perhaps he could be right. Of the top dozen, unless Jihad! is ditto, NONE others are; of zines in the 30s, 4 are. D*L seems pretty decent to me; Ter-ran is very established and has a fair amount of non-dip stuff; and AG is a nice looking newcomer. Of the others, Snafu! is a new Canadian zine getting started, and I expect it will move up nest year; Peek is an interesting Masters fake or humor-zine, and the hobby's first porno-dipzine. EVERYTHING is a dry stat sheet getting an honorary-type pat on the back; Libber is a 2-week zine that majors in a non-dip miniatures -type pbm game, minoring in Dippy, and uses a "phantom" player to cover NMRs, a sometimes strange situation. GRAUS is the hobby veteran filled with some pretty strange editorials; only its reliability and long track record kept it this high. Twice, on small votes, it actually won the poll, but while it has changed little in the last 5 years, 39th is a more honest placing of it.

The forties get us into odd ground. I don't get either TSS or Klepto, but with only a 5½ rating, they must have some weakness; I'm not about to start subbing now.RURI, C&F, and EGGNOG have folded, and folds always drop your score; Infidel and Invasion don't ring a bell at all. Inf I think was a Canadian zine, but I wouldn't be surprised to find they're both folds. Just a guess. The Chamber is the only surprise; a newcomer, it has looked pretty good lately for a new product. Perhaps the vote is based on the weaker early copies. LDNS has a terrible record for regularity, and is nothing but warehouse anymore even when you do see one.It was once an early favorite of mine, but I think it is overrated at $4\frac{1}{2}$ now.

Of the 50s, well, here is the bottom of the barrel folks, no doubt about that. IP is a ditto zine that I don't think carries much dip, if any, anymore. Dave Grabar puts it out to carry his Nuclear Holocaust games and other strange variants. TT and BTD have folded, and in less than salutary style; Boast I understand is a classic case of mis-GMing, poor repro, and irregularity. Tetra barely makes quarterly status in practice, and would do the hobby a favor by folding. It is put out by the incompetent Kovalcik. And nailing down the pits firmly is the hobby fraud zine, LE FRONT, puked out by the widely-known Tretick. It, like Hitler, epitomizes the worst there can be. Unlike Hitler, it is still around.

IN SUMMATION, a quick overview. Zines voted in the 8s: Great zines! Don't miss them. 7s: Real good zines. Try to get a lot of them. 6s: Pretty good: most are worth getting, but be selective. 5s, passable products, but lacking something. Could use more work. 4s: Have definite problems. Wait until they improve. 3s: Piss poor efforts. Avoid 'em. 2s: Raw shit. Denounce them.

Her Husband Shot, Woman Kills 2 Store Robbers

MOUNT CLEMENS, Mich. (AF) — Mary Markham said she never thought she'd have to use the guns she stashed under the counter at her liquor store. But when two masked bandits walked in, put a gun to her son's head and shot her husband, she killed them both in a hail of gunfire.

Several Mount Clemens police officers described it as "something out of the Wild West"

"Quick justice," said Lt. Max Patrick.
"I'm really sorry about what happened," Markham said. "I saw a gun at my

son's head. What more can I say?"

Markham, 44, had been training in the use of firearms since a January robbery when her family was out of the state.

At 10 p.m. Wednesday, she was in Bob Davey's Wine Shop with her 13-year-old son, Chad, when two men walked in wearing ski masks and carrying pistols.

One put a gun to the teenager's head and demanded money. The other put a gun to Markham's head.

"I said, 'I'll give you all the money, but

leave my son alone," she recalled Friday.

She started to empty the cash register and had managed to set off the store's silent alarm when her husband, Richard, 41, came out of his office and demanded to know what was going on.

The bandits shot him, but it was a smallcaliber bullet and he was able to grapple with one of the gunmen.

In desperation, Mary Markham reached under the counter for her .357-caliber Magnum handgun and .32-caliber pistol and started blasting away, one gun in each hand, as bystanders hit the floor.

Police rushed to the scene within minutes, but by then both gunmen were dead.

"One man was hit five times, the other three," said police Lt. Nick Rouns. "That's pretty good shooting from two hands — for anyone."

Macomb County Prosecutor George N. Parris said the incident was under investigation and he had not decided whether charges would be filed.

Hours after the shooting, Mary Mar-

kham was back at work with an armed security guard who is to remain until her husband returns to work. He was in stable condition in the intensive care unit of Mount Clemens General Hospital with a wound in his left side.

The Markhams' son wasn't wounded, but he will not be permitted to work in the

store again, his mother said.

The two dead men were identified by Rouns as Jerome Kelly, also known as George Jones, 37, of Mount Clemens, and Demarze Strong, 31, of Detroit. Markham said that, when she saw photographs of the two men on television, she realized one had been in the store previously.

Re. Omaha: I don't remember the name of the waitress. I thought the point was that I didn't want my mother pimping for me. Anyhow, there must be friendly waitresses in Oklahoma, n'est-ce pas? Or do they all carry those white-covered Bibles I saw so many of when I passed through?

Re. Bittersweet. I've always found people respond according to the way you treat them. If you want to come on to people in a heavy machismo way, you're probably going to run into more violent reactions than if you're polite and calm. And no, I'm not naive. I've run into lunatics during my time and had guns pulled on me a few times. I'm still here to tell about it.

Re. Québec. I don't see how separation would solve the language problem. Somewhere between 10 and 20% of the population is "English." There are lots of countries which survive quite well with more than one official language. The problem is that the French have felt threatened with assimilation so they're fighting to protect their culture. It gets funny some times. Eg. Stop signs in Québec were always "bilingual," reading "Arret/Stop." The English word used to upset young Québecois so they'd go around with spray-paint at night and paint out the offending word. As some as the Parti Québecois was elected in '75 the bilingual signs started being replaced with signs that read "Arret" only. Part way through this change, someone discovered that in France "Arret" means to actually stop your car and shut off the engine and the word "Stop" was used on stop signs. In fact, "stop" is the accentable French (France) word for pausing before continuing. So, a red-faced Parti Québecois left the signs as they were, hoping the problem would disappear, I guess. Now re. gun control. First off, anyone who carries or keeps a mandgun is insane. A handgun will not prevent a robbery or assault. All it can do is make a bad situation worse. I'm pretty sure that's how most Canadians would see it. It's almost impossible to get a handgun in Canada and no one feels the loss. Our murder rate, for example, is far below that of the USA. Toronto, for example, is about the same size as Detroit. Right now there's a big fuss about the high murder rate in Toronto and special squads are being set up to deal with this crisis. Oh yeah, the rate for Toronto is about 50 per year (Detroit's is about 500!). I heard on a newscast the other day that there are an estimated 50,000 handguns in the USA; that's about one for every five people! What on earth are all those guns for, if not for shooting other people? Roughly half of American murders are domestic disputes. Man and woman have fight, one of them runs to get gun, boom, game over! (In Canada, the scenario would be: Man and woman have fight, one of them slugs the other and goes to jail. Guns are just too damn easy to use.

One thing I can't understand is the National Rifle Association's stand against controls. Do they really go hunting for deer with 32 caliber pistols? Do you have to have a bazecka to shoot a rabbit? I don't know what your hunting licenses are like, but ours describe the kinds of weapons suitable for different types of game. Handguns are useful only for people hunting.

One argument that makes sense is that your criminal groups are armed. But who made all those weapons available to them in the first place? It'll take generations for handguns to disappear now, even if they were banned outright. But one has to start somewhere. Making even more guns available certainly isn't going to get rid of them. Canadian law (and I assume American as well) makes quite a distinction between crimes committed with or without guns. If you use a gun in a robbery you're going to the slammer for sure, while if you pulled a robbery without using a gun, you're more likely to get a slap on the wrist. I don't know if crooks ever think of that, but that's part of reality.

It's hard to believe that Americans need guns for defense. Try standing off an atomic missile with a Saturday Night Special! That whole argument is nonsense.

I think the real reason Americans need their guns so much is because guns make them feel tough. Blowing people away is a hell of a price to pay to sooth fragile egos! The Canadian West was a relatively peaceful place at the same time that gangs of thugs were taking over American Western towns, mainly because the police set up posts before settlers arrived in areas. The settlement of the Yukon and Alaska is instructive. You'd get two wowns, a few miles apart, on either side of the border. The American town would be "wide open", which means people were free to shoot each other, while the Canadian town would be a quiet place where people went about their business. If only 10-20% of Quebecers speak English, why do the Frenchies feel threatened with assimilation? Is the influence of Alberta and Manitoba that strong in Quebec? I thought it was the other way around, with the Quebec/Eastern masses keeping Alberta and Manitoba selling their oil cheaply instead of what it was worth. If they do feel this "threat", then wouldn't the sovereignty of independence be a better protection than street-sign swaps?

The heat isn't a lot of fun, but on the other hand, it doesn't make the roads impassable, or eat up cars in two years with rocksalt, or destroy the plumbing or cut off power for days. The North American Variant Bank (NAVB) serves the continent of North America for the purpose of providing copies of Diplomacy variants to designers, publishers, gamesmasters, and players. Our official publication is ARDA, published by the Custodian of NAVB-West and the NAVB Archives, Rod Walker. In addition to the catalogue of NAVB holdings and updates to it, ARDA publishes articles on Diplomacy variants, news and information relating to the variant strand of the hobby, and new or reprint variant games. Cost per issue varies according to size. A subscription to ARDA is 5 cents per page plus postage and envelope. Games available from us may be ordered at a cost of loc per xeroxed sheet plus handling charges (50c for orders of 20 sheets and under; \$1 for orders of 21 sheets or more). All orders placed through NAVB-West must be paid in U.S. currency. The same is true of NAVB-East, although the prices may vary from those stated above. Canadian orders should be placed through NAVB-North and, again, prices may vary. Make checks payable to the appropriate Custodian. Inquiries regarding Diplomacy variants will be answered on a time-available basis by NAVB-West, within 60 days; a SASE (stamped, self-addressed envelope) must accompany any inquiry.
