

The end, however, was very well handled in view of the forces and problems to be dealt with (i,e., the relative abilities of Luke, Darth Vader, and Leia). Anyhow, this is what the book looks like.

THIS LITTLE ITEM appeared on the bulletin board at work, so I take the liberty of reproducing it here. (That board is the source of a lot of little ditties; send in some from yours at work or school!) This one caught my eye because it reminds me of something that I learned myself a long time ago (in addition to it being the only thing on the board today). This can be applied to wargames in particular, where I first came across it.

It seems that a long time ago, I was a cynical young man (as opposed to being the cynical middle-aged man I am today), and reacted accordingly when a close friend of mine observed that a person rolling the die who FELT he was going to lose, invariably did so; and that further, a person on a losing streak who pressed his ill luck, thinking "it's GOT to change", invariably did WORSE, not

better, as time and the game progressed. On the other hand, a person who was confident and in good spirit, despite adverse board situations, could often turn things around with three or four 1/1s or 2/1s. I, being the strict & utilitarian type, rejected his idea out of hand. "Any time you roll that die, your chances of getting any number are one in six". Much playing experience later, I have come around to his view. Too often I've seen just what he said: someone throwing the die over his shoulder, back to the board saying "Why even bother?", is RIGHT. No need to look at the result. It certainly a 6, unless a 6 is good--then it's a 1.A person who FEELS sure he's beaten IS beaten. Sometimes, of course, this is only due to immaturity: a player gets two or three really bad breaks in a row and "gives up". Even with better players though, something like this can be used to advantage, for it seems people are like battleships in combat -- an occasional hit accomplishes nothing, but the same number of hits all in a short period of time, overloading the fire control system, will sink it. Thus, a couple of good breaks your way that you really GLOAT effectively over will accomplish much more than simple above-average luck. It could even counteract someone else's consistent above-average luck, if you play it up when your one good spurt comes along. Napoleon said that"the moral is to the physical as three to one", and although "moral impact" had a much more immediate impact on soldiers in HIS kind of war, things don't really change all that much. Read the side effects on both sides when the Germans introduced the first Panthers in large numbers, or the Russians introduced their Katyushas in WWII. In war games, the effects are still there; only the weapons are different. Look how Bobby Fisher handled chess. The action on the board was the smallest part of the struggle. This can be applicable in poker, and, of course, in our own DIPLOMACY. Press and the like can create a momentum for you...possibly at the cost of that other player's eternal enmity, of course, but, that's up to you. I really do belie we that a players morale will have a definite bearing on his play, including that 'objective' die roll.

I'd be interested to hear if any of you agree or not, whether from wargames, gambling, Dippy, or whatever.

I started this out as an anecdote, and its turned into an article of sorts. Maybe I'll just go ahead and title it that.

As I was listening to this story it occured to me that it sounded very similar to a D&D adventure. It got me to thinking about the popularity of D&D. Could it be that D&D is nothing more than a vehicle for the child in all of us to relive those fairy tales told to us by our mothers? Could such a thing be true? I'm sure it is!

All conflict simulations are slices of life in which the person takes on some role. In most of these games you play a general of armies, and as such are detachted from the blood and gore that are the real results of the actions you take. But in a role game such as D&D you're right there hacking away at the evil beasties yourself. Thus giving you the satisfaction of seeing the blood drip from your sword and of looting the bodies.

To be really interesting there also needs to be an element of danger involved. This is absent from most board and table top games, but is usually present in D&D. This danger hightens your senses and makes it easier for you to step into the role.

There is also a strong connotation of "Good" and "Evil". I'm sure this represents a lot of the appeal of the game. It allows the players to have the satisfaction of ridding the world of one more monster. One more evil thing.

Faced with greater and greater frustration in our dealings with the real world we shall turn ever more readily to role games in which we can smite the forces of oppression and evil with our own right arms. Perhaps it will make it easier to live, I certainly hope so!



ODDS & ENDS, UNSOLICITED PLUGS, + GENERAL FILLER

Natural Gas, Propane Reporting Systems Inadequate: GAO

Although the federal government collects reams of information on natural gas and propane supplies, the data is essentially useless, according to the General Accounting Office. There are three basic flaws in the existing information system, GAO said: (1) lengthy processing times outdate the data before it can be acted upon; (2) incomplete submissions lead to faulty conclusions or require extensive follow-up efforts; and (3) much of the information sought serves no purpose.

Time lags in target dates have delayed necessary staff analyses by as much as three months, GAO Energy Division Director Monte Canfield reported. A case in point was the July 1977 deadline for compilation of reports on alternative fuel demand resulting from projected natural gas curtailments last winter: the data processing was not completed until October 1977.

Another example cited occurred during the severely cold heating season of 1976-1977, when a regional FEA administrator stopped processing all requests for propane for industrial use because he had no idea how much fuel was available in his area.

Tardy Report Filings Cited

Canfield said that only about half of the companies surveyed in natural gas and propane reports respond on time, a fact that further delays data processing, and many companies submit incomplete information. The most significant omissions have been in the areas of planned purchases of emergency gas and of gas owned by customers but stored by suppliers, according to the GAO Director.

Probably the most effective method of obtaining information on natural gas and propane supplies and needs during emergency situations has been through telephone contacts. Continuation and expansion of telephone monitoring would not only reduce the potential for reliance on outdated data, it could be used to cut down some of the excess paperwork attendant with the existing reporting system, Canfield said.


In a letter to Department of Energy Secretary James Schlesinger, Canfield warned that the present system of gathering and publishing incomplete, superfluous, and outdated information could "lead to either costly fuel inventory buildups and the installation of unneeded alternate fuel capability by industry or an unpreparedness for shortages that could result in factory closings and unemployment."

Bureaucratic Blunders

The two scientists from the University of California at Irvine who discovered that 14 percent of the female seagulls off the California seacoast are lesbians have been given a \$62,000 National Science Foundation grant to further their studies.

Motorists in the northern Michigan tourist community of Sault Ste. Marie may soon be in the market for cars that go sideways. A new city ordinance designed to cut damages on parking meters makes it illegal to back an automobile into any metered parking space.

The City Commission intended the law to apply only to parking lots, but inadvertently worded it so it also applies to curb parking. Parallel parking, according to traditional driving techniques, almost always requires entering the space in reverse.

A linguist who spent \$89,000 in public funds to produce a dictionary in Tzotzil, a Mayan dialect, himself admits the project is essentially useless even to the people who speak the language. The author, who obtained a grant from the Smithsonian Institution to produce the reference work, warns in his introduction that the 10,000 Zinacantec tribe members for whom the dictionary was produced may end up using its pages for toilet paper.

Reorganization of the U.S. Senate has reduced the number of committees from 31 to 25 and subcommittees from 177 to 130. There's only one petty drawback: Committee employees have increased from 1,153 to 1,169.

The Federal Communications Commission is quietly stifling the millions of voices that jam the Citizens Band radio frequencies. An estimated 9 million licensees—truck drivers, teenagers, housewives, even a former First Lady—now operate more than 20 million CB sets. The airwaves have become so crowded that the CB industry has appealed for more frequencies. These would have to be taken from the ham

radio operators, who add up to no more than 300,000. Yet the commission has favored the few over the many. The 300,000 hams have 100 times more airspace than is available to the 9 million CB enthusiasts. The hams also have a lock on the higher frequencies, which are free from interference.

Jack Anderson

The federal government has paid off more than \$318 million in loans it guaranteed for a third of a million college students who defaulted.

A small radio station in New Hampshire recently spent \$26 in postage mailing its paperwork to the FCC during license renewal. And George Dodds, president of radio station WGGH in Marion, Ill., says he spends two months of every year working on federally-required paperwork.

It takes 24 pounds of forms for a public school system to request continued public support, according to Dr. Jack P. Nix, Georgia state superintendent of schools.

Even though the Commission on Federal Paperwork legally expired on October 2, 1977, some 30 staff members remained on the payroll for months longer—to prepare 36 voluminous reports for publication.

Harold Sproul

The federal government recently gave a psychology professor at the University of Michigan \$5,800 to study why Americans have children. Asked how the nation's taxpayers will benefit from her survey, Dr. Lois Hoffman replied, "I don't understand that question."

The National Science Foundation has spent \$60,000 to find out why Southerners talk with a Southern accent, and another \$136,100 to study the effect of CB radios on people.



A \$2.28 ashtray, sent as a birthday present to a Philadelphia resident by his cousin who lives in Salisbury, Rhodesia, violates the UN trade sanctions against Rhodesia, claims the U.S. Postal Service and the Customs Service. The Philadelphian was notified he would have to apply for a re-exportation license to return the undelivered package to his Salisbury cousin.

One division in the Iowa Department of Environmental Quality ordered the city of Hampton to cover its landfill with one foot of dirt to prevent contamination of the city's water supply. When city officials started to comply by excavating dirt along a nearby stream, another environmental bureaucrat blocked city bulldozers, claiming that the work could affect the water flow of the stream, governed by a different statute.

The Michigan Civil Service Department has sent out questionnaires to handicapped state employees, asking questions such as: "Have you ever encountered difficulties because of your handicap in being considered for promotion or transfer?" The questionnaire assures in bold, capital letters that all answers will be treated confidentially and used only for statistical and affirmative action purposes. Then comes the kicker: "Please complete and return to your supervisor."

Replying to an Environmental Protection Agency query whether Iowa's Department of Environmental Quality has power to regulate ocean dumping, the state's assistant attorney general replied, "Iowa has not established ocean discharge criteria, since the last area ocean receded from the state about two million years ago." Iowa is 1,000 miles from the nearest ocean.

Feminist leader Gloria Steinem, a 1978 Fellow at the Woodrow Wilson Center in Washington, D.C., explains that she hopes while at the center to write a book "of interrelated essays on Nationalism and Property, Definitions of Work, Organizational Forms, the Question of Ends and Means, Childhood and Community, Assumptions of Duality, and Religion and the Sense of Time. This is intended to be one feminist's contribution to the history of ideas, and to explain why feminism is more likely to be transforming than integrationist or imitative."

A federal judge has ruled that excessive exposure to rock 'n' roll music constituted cruel and unusual punishment for a Virginia prison inmate.

Clifton Tydings, an inmate at the Bland Correctional Center, argued that the center's policy of allowing prisoners to play radios, tape recorders and record players without earphones aggravated his nervous condition. The suit, filed against Supt. W. D. Blankenship, asked for damages of \$10,000.

U.S. District Court Judge Glen M. Williams awarded Tydings \$1,000 in damages and \$1,000 in attorney's fees and directed center officials to return to a previous policy of requiring earphones for listening to music. "No one should inflict their rock 'n' roll music on someone who doesn't want to hear it," he said.



The American struggles against the natural obstacles which oppose him; the adversaries of the Russian are men. The former combats the wilderness and savage life; the latter, civilization with all its weapons and its arts. The conquests of the one are therefore gained by the ploughshare; those of the other, by the sword.

"The Anglo-American relies upon personal interest to accomplish his ends, and gives free scope to the unguided exertions and common sense of the citizens; the Russian centres all the authority of society in a single arm. The principal instrument of the former is freedom; of the latter, servitude. Their starting-point is different; and their courses are not the same; yet each of them seems to be marked out by the will of Heaven to sway the destinies of half the globe."
