
LABELS!!

Maybe it will come to the neighborhood theaters next... This time, my seventh, the splicing was fixed so that the dialogue was understandable when the Millenium Falcon came out into the debris of Alderaan. The one bad thing was that I'm such a bump-on-a-log that anytime I'm gone over an hour and a half, I come home to "Don't tell me you went to see that dopey mov ie AGAIN?" Where else would I have been?

One piece of good news for you: those sick pink covers may be a thing of the past. There is now some assorted lightweight paper in various nicer colors I may be able to use here. The only problem is that the reverse is printed up with timesheet format...

AUSTRIA-WORLD: "It's not long now!"

VIENNA: In a press conference today, the current state of the boundary talks was explained. "Turkey will be given control of all our Balkan interests. We feel this should help placate the Sultan and at the same time give him the power he needs to crawl out from under Russia's control".

Fortunately Johnny Carson has Burt Reynolds on tonight. The thought of watching Reynolds mug for fifteen minutes has roused me from my catatonic television= viewing state and brought me to the typewriter. It's time to deal with a number of backlogged issues.

Now that the games have been given their due, let's move on to the side issues raised in BB. Before I launch myself into ideological orbit over the virtues of being a liberal, however, I want to pat your ego once again. (Bending over, he ruffled the gamemaster's ears. "Atta boy, John. Good boy!") BB continues to offer fast games and interesting issues. Your effort in adjudicating the moves is obvious, and I cannot suggest any improvements in your methods. The nongame pages of BB continue to be worth reading. The sincerity and diversity of your subscribers make the diatribes and dissertations valuable.

You generally treat people writing in well, even though you may not agree with them. That is, you publish their opinions seemingly without censorship and without interrupting their ideas with hostile comments. This style makes for the best reading, I think.

Now, as for aguing with you about the merits of conservatives <u>versus</u> those of liberals, I had best retreat a bit. Rereading a number of <u>BB</u>'s I feel that you use "liberal" as a synonym for "perverted," "illogical," "un-American," or worse. It is your catchall pejorative expression. Therefore, I doubt that it would be wise to argue for something you seem to define as evil. I have no mystical attraction for the word "liberal," either, and I will gladly abandon the defense against a general assault. Although I consider myself a liberal I have no desire to protect

all actions taken in the name of liberalism, nor do I have an inbred hatred for all conservative positions. Accordingly I will fall back to new lines and entrench myself to defend only specific issues. On this lower level of abstraction perhaps our disagreements will be fewer and more easily defined.

My 78AX press was not intended to be a serious ideological statement, no more than I take <u>CD</u>'s "Bureaucratic Blunders" as an exposition of conservative views. I wrote my paragraphs with retaliatory humor after suffering through nine issues of barbs aimed at the present American government.

When I wrote the press item I was in the midst of a funkinduced by the annual income-tax-deadline-show-distain-for-the-government comments. Hardly a newscast, paper, or Dip 'zine passes up the occassion. Rather than suggesting that "the huge HEW nonstrosity is to be blindly supported ..." (BB XIII, p.33) as you inferred, I ment only to object to the straw men set up and so viciously knocked down by the media and disgruntled citizens. My objection was not designed as a blanket under which all bureaucratic action could hide; I was just attempting a broad spoof.

In general the most annoying lines to me in BB are the quick snipes at "liberals" and the government. I do not think you are serious always when you snap off an opinion, and I am frustrated that you do not express yourself or the conservative viewpoint with more linear logic. Since I already have page 33 in front of me I'll use this example: "In fact, if the (HEW(?)) bureaucracy did ANY of that (keep the poor from starving, help the lame, etc.) EVERYONE would support it; but the right wing looks at it and doesn't see any starving masses being sheltered from harm, etc., but rather, a nonworking mass of bureaucrats growing fat on their GS16 salaries 'administering' over programs that do more harm than good, if in fact they do any good at all." I am forced to consider your comments as a hyperbole against inefficient organization. This is similar to what all too many of your notes and the "Bureaucratic Blunders" wind up saying. Pitting yourself, or conservatives in the whole, against waste is a cheap shot, I believe. A gluttonous official gorging himself on tax money is hardly the liberals, or anyone's, poster child.

Before I lapse further into categorical terms and start humming "We Shall Overcome," I will return to the phillipic on mindless griping which I occassionally see in your off-hand comments in BB.

My greatest peeves are those comments which imply that somebody, somewhere is trying to maximize the stupidity and insensitivity in life. The style in conversation and in the media nowadays is to find a bad person behind every problem. Yet, not every bureaucratic idiocy or general misfortune is the result of someone's evil intention to screw up the system. In fact, along with a lot of other shortages, I believe that there is a malice shortage in public affairs. They claim that no necessary programs will be cut by the about 30% reduction in income to the various levels of government. Only the superfluous jobs in the unneeded departments that we all know exist will stop if the masure passes, they say. Only the greedy government will suffer. The proponents are intelligent enough not to pin down exactly where cuts will be made, and I guess the proposition will pass. Of course, every time a mayor or police chief or school board member talks about the results of the revenue cuts the proponents of the ballot question claim that the government is using "scare tactics."

Unfortunately there is no tangible beast called "government." It does not exist, devouring tax monies to soothe its biological craving fir waste. Would that such an evil animal did exist so that it could be mercilessly put to death.

People demanding services determine the form and extent of that organization we call the government. ((As indeed you have.It's nice to get well-thought-out, or at least, well-expressed letters, and surprising to get them from an avowed advocate of the other side'. It took an extra reading to find some specific places where we disagree, since your positions were generally couched in such terms as to make disagreement or response difficult if not impossible. Right down to "Atta boy, John. Good boy."

First, references to your AX press and the like are due to the fact that you and Mark Berch are the only ones in my audience who have expressed a liberal stance. (I think there were two conservative too, the rest wisely passing.) Thus, I am not singling you out, but merely have a lack of choices when concrete examples familiar to other readers are needed. Now, as to "liberal" being a catchall perjurative, you're right. I use it synonymously with "wrong", along with other things such as you mentioned. This ties in to your digiain for "quick snipes", whose existence I also admit to. This, however, is due to two factors, best perhaps illustrated by the use of an example. Take the word 'racist'. We all know what racist used to mean, and to many people it still means the same. However, on the left wing, the word racist today has a de facto definition of "anyone who disagrees with a liberal". Its development into that is similar to the use of profanity, or terms such as 'fascist'. It began as a gesture to reflect the deep-down hatred and disgust with whatever was under discussion or consideration: opponents to the crusade for integration, heavy-handed police tactics, and the like. Over time, however, the terms became so all inclusive that now 'racist' is as I said above, and 'fascist's wide uses have been quoted before. To what extent this reflects changing usage vs. a real spread of the original hatred and disgust is really irrelevent: only the end result is of interest here. I use liberal the same way, rightly or wrongly. Far more rightly than wrongly in MY view, but that's neither here nor there. I could ask how many HEW agencies were added under Johnson vs Ford, for instance, but that counts for little. The Congress does as it sees fit no matter who's in there, and the last Republican congress is so far back as to be irrelevant. I agree that there is no 'secret conspiracy' or Policy Board of Evil, as real hard-core right wing mythology purports. You're right that stupidity is spontaneous, as is waste in any large organization. government being the biggest and far and away the pacesetter as the worst, all at the insistance of the various segments of the populace below. However, we disagree after that. You describe potshots at waste, blamed on liberals directly or indirectly, as a cheap shot. I cannot agree. The very heartbeat of your own side's standardbearers, the McGoverns and Kennedy types of this country, have GOVERNMENTAL ACTION as the universal answer to all the multitudinous ills of mankind. Whether the trouble is rats in Chicago, hungry Indians in Montana, seaside debris off Delaware, or a dry summer in Arizone, their instant and unanimous cry is for a Federal program to deal with it. Not that Conservatives don't often do the same; rather, that they don't ALWAYS do so. Further, I agree that something like the spending ceilings you quoted

would be a short-term disaster: just as in the NYC Police Dept, cuts won't be made among the purely leach-like areas of administration, but rather, the street cops will be laid off first. Still, the propositions reflect one critical issue. There is at present NO CONTROL at all over spending. The ONLY considerations govt at ALL levels now faces is, is a proposed program popular enough to pass? There is NO control such as "Can we afford it?" The latter question is meaningless to government. These proposals, despite their immediate calamitous effects, would serve to put SOME outside limit on what the govt could do, and thereby force a priority to be put on items under consideration. It would turn the budgets into something like 1902- Diplomacy: a zero-sum system where all gains for one program are made only at the cost of a loss elsewhere. The best interests of the people would then, like now, count for nothing. But there would be some control. I would support them across the board. If your side can ram something as calamitous as federal control of every neighborhood school in the land down the throats of the people, I would not flinch from the disruptions, such as they might or might not be, caused by a ceiling on governmental power to tax. So, while you say liberals are not to blame for waste, I disagree. We're living under their policy of everything-foreverybody-for-nothing, planned or unplanned. Your motives are of the highest order, I will acknowledge. But the result of pursuing them is the current mess, a mess for which your side in turn must take full responsibility. Like it or not. A similar case, more extreme, but therefore well illustrative, is the other alternative on the world 'coin': the other side AISO has the best interests of "the people" at heart. Marxism, like everything else being preached, damn near, is all for the good of all mankind. The only problem with it is that it doesn't work. ((First, on the houserule. Future copies will say "Neutral orders will be used in Spring and Fall of 1901 as necessary". That should do it. On the Blunders paragraph one, you MIGHT be right if in fact the item focuses on an obscure point instead of what may well be one of a very few major points raised. You assume they're nitpicking; I assume they are reporting that the project produced nothing. There it sits.

On the second item, you are dead wrong. I'm afraid this time you just tried to make a case where there simply isn't one. The Michigan law is idiotic, period. There are no multiple meanings to Polish sausage. No one expects Polish sausage to be "sausage imported from Poland" any more than they or even you would expect that Venetian blinds were blinds imported from Venice. Their point is well made and correct. Some Blunders are less than optimum cases: I personally remember one on the 'unfairness' of giving CBers only 40 channels whi le many higher channels are reserved for far fewer hams. That was a blatant distortion—typically, it was from a Jack Anderson column, whose livelihood is built on such nonsense. But in this one, you're just wrong.))

I enjoy both reading and writing all kinds of press, the more variety the better. It is for this reason that I am catagorically opposed to Black press. In a regular game, there are two kinds of press: Writer identified ("Dateline Moscow") and writer unknown ("Dateline Volgagrad"). In a Black Press Game (BPG) there is only one type: Writer unknown. Specifically, game-related press is curtailed or eliminated. Altho absolute statements in dippy are risky, I'll venture one: No experienced, prudent player will ever put substantial reliance in game-related press in a BPG. So long as there is the possibility of a clever forgery, the reader must engage in a pointless guessing game. Take for example your resourceful use of press in 77CW. I don't know if that game is a BPG, but if so, your ploy is easily foiled. Austria need only claim that your complaints (agter he takes Se) are after the fact grousing, that there never was such a deal and that you never wrote press. Indeed, he could even claim that he wrote it himself, to forestall pressure from a third party who was pressuring him to take Sev. You'd perhaps protest but no one would care, as the matter could never be resolved. You as a pubber have a .. slight edge in this matter, as you have your own zine to print the press in to establish authenticity (I assume that you mention this in BB partly to increase the pressure on Eric not to take the center, you sneak you!), but most don't. I myself would not submit any press in a BPG and would inform other players of this. If I cannot control the use of my own name, then I will deny creditability to others seeking to use it. In the real world, there is no such thing as not being able to release a statement officially i.e. without doubt of ownership.

With regard to your change in HRs #2, while I don't want to get into a huge discussion, you have completely missed the point I was making, and I strongly urge that you reread what you have written in BB #7, p 13. You say in #12 "...problems will be avoided because I will probably be the one to determine what a neutral, non-hostile move is...

I would likely go for Ukr S Sev..." If you did that, you'd be vulnerable to the criticism not that it wasn't neutral for course its neutral because your HR change requires that you go for the neutral: "orders will only be to neutral centers" In my various readings of old postal Diplomacy Zines to find material for my zine, I've occasionally come across disputes that arose when the HRs said A but the GM meant B. This can be a terrible dillema for a concientious GM, because if he rules A then he lands up running his own games not then way he intended. If he rules B, then he is saying to his players that they cannot rely on the HRs. Again I urge that your second sentence be amended to read "Fall moves will not be directed toward a neighbor's home center".

As for the swastika, Craig Reges, (why is it we're not writing each other direct?) I didn't say I was insulted, I said it was a "loathsome reminder" and "unpleasant". I am aware that the symbol predates the Nazis and indeed even appears in Amerindian art. However, its the context that younts. It did not appear in BB along with some 1910 poetry, Craig, or in the context of labels or designs for game-pieces, John, but along with "Mein Kampf" and in a zine which features a lot of right wing propaganda and recently featured a photo of a high Nazi official. I know that you didn't put it there because you are a Nazi, or because you wanted an unpleasant cover, but I'm just responding that that's how I reacted to it. And you're probably right in that if I were into WWII games I'd be desensitized by now.

With respect to Craig's letter on Oaklyn, he is off-base in suggesting that you should have done "some concrete investigation" before publishing Walker's letter. If you had to investigate every critical letter, half this stuff couldn't be printed. All I can add is that a friend tells me that in 1977IK Oaklyn has been a reliable player, and that Horton has game openings in a game to open shortly with Oaklyn as GM, so he must continue to have confidence in him.

As for your crack about provoking me with your right wing propaganda, I suppose I'll take the bait. I hope you won't be offended, but I read little of it. Solicitations for causes that I don't believe in are of course ignored, but much of the "article" material appears to be written by people with little in the way of talent or principles. For exam-

ple, the "Bureaucratic Blunders" column which you seem to be so fond of, is to me a collection of mostly cheap shots and trivia. Let me take two example fro BB #12

A new Michigan law bans the labeling of sausage made in the United States as "Polish sausage" and says instead it must be termed "Polish-style sausage." Which of the following phrases will Michigan outlaw next: Danish pastry,

French fries, Dutch apple pie, Cornish hens, Swiss cheese, Italian dressing, Chinese checkers, Hawaiian punch, baked Alaska, Canadian bacon, Swedish meat balls, English muffins, Brussels sprouts, Copenhagen snuff, German potato salad, Grecian Formula Nine, Labrador retrievers, Singapore slings, Spanish peanuts, Irish stew, Hungarian goulash, Bermuda onions, Norway spruce, Roman Catholics, Russian dressing, Panama hats, Scotch plaids or Venetian blinds?

The first item is a formula job, which can be done by almost any hack on almost any report, governmental or otherwise. You start off with some indicia of importance for the report, such as cost, size, or prestige of the issuing agency, select a minor conclusion, and report it but nothing else. This can be done almost regardless of the quality of the report by someone with neither talent nor scruples. It would be like saying, "John Michalski, in his 36 page Brutus Bulletin #12 states, amoung other things, that DIPLOMACY is copyrighted by Avalon Hill", This is what I mean by a cheap shot.

The second item is more complex. In a simpler era, "Polish Sausage" would have only one xwxxxxx meaning. But as time moves on, it acquires a second meaning, not requiring that it was actually made in Poland. Language does not change so rapidly, so there remains only one term, with two meanings, giving the possibility for either confusion or deception. An easy solution is just to coin another word, which is what the Michigan law does. This is a meaningful distinction. Tho I'm not familiar with that product, I assure you that to some people, there's all the difference in the world between, say, a kosher hot dog and a kosher-style hot dog. I imagine that for some people, reasons of authenticity or gustatory preference would dictate that they'd only want the madein-Poland product, just as 🛴 t others might for ideological reasons not want to buy anything made in (communist) Poland. The law would cater to these pasple's legitimate interests. Such distinctions are common, for example, in the wine industry. One might question whether this should be handled on the state, local or national level. Perhaps a better approach would be just to require prominent labling of the country-of-origin. Or maybe a voluntary approach would be more sensible. But the writer wasn't interested in such ramifications, so instead he prattles on about such trivia as Grecian Formula Nine. I don't think that either of these qualify as "Bureaucratic Blunders", nor do most of the ... others. For my own aesthetics, its not entertainment either

Next, I think I'll grouse about motherhood and apple pie...As for Newell's list of non-responsive pubbers, one should not infer an antipathy to new players. Some did not reply because of difficulty with their own zines. Thus Kovalcik and Mann have virtually stopped publishing, and Wileman recently folded...Your policy of requiring several people to request a season-delay, not just one, is, Kendter's impression notwithstanding, fairly common in the hobby...I hear that Mr. Reges is in charge of putting out an IDA handbook (this from his predecessor). Is he soliciting articles or will he write it all himself?...Le Guin fans should be pleased to hear that "The Lather of Heaven" will be on TV, on PBS..As for Newell's comments on failure to spot errors, not all dippy players believe they are under any obligation to report an error favorable to themselves. Newell's statement that "cloaked errors" are "quite rare" is simply not true. But they do have a lower reporting rate, for obvious reasons

How about your own government. Do you know how it works? Do you know what powers the President has, and his limitations? The Congress? The Supreme Court?

Do you know how the SALT talks are going? Do you even know what they are? Do you know what the Soviets are doing in central Europe? What NATO is doing in central Europe?

Do you know how much money the United States spends on defense? On welfare? How about the latest weapon introduced by the Soviet Union?

Mr. and Mrs. Average American would be completely baffled by most of these questions, could not begin to give even the most basic responses. But ask him how the Dodgers are doing, how the NFL draft went, or what show comes on at 9:00 on Channel 2 on Thursday and he can answer with precision.

Collapse and defeat come quickly for a nation or society that pays the person who entertains far more than the person who teaches. A good baseball player makes over \$100,000 for 7 months work; a recognized Hollywood star can make \$500,000 for one picture; but about \$20,000 is all a good college professor can expect.

Why? Because Americans would rather be entertained than taught. We sit each night and are fascinated by such idiocies as "Laverne and Shirley", "Three's Company", etc., complete with laugh tracks. Business recognized this long ago.

This is why they are now more concerned with coming up with a "catchy" or "cute" commercial than with a better product.

And if Americans were alone on this planet there would be nothing wrong with all this. But the people of Russia and the people of China are not so leisurely For them, graduation from high school or college is only the beginning of their learning process, not the end. They have no time to daydream and grow soft, the State sees to that. The Soviet Union is today the most powerful nation in the world. You do not believe? You indignantly retort that the United States is the most powerful? Again, dear Mr. Average American, your ignorance asserts itself.

The Soviet Union has more than 4000 tanks in central Europe alone; we and the combined forces of NATO have less than half that number. The Soviet Union has an air defense system (fighter interceptors, surface-to-air missiles, etc.) that, is second to none; the United States indeed has none. The Soviet Union outnumbers us in ICBMs, warships, fighters, tanks, field pieces, and military manpower. Only in the number of submarines and long range bombers does the United States have an edge, and even that will evaporate in five years. For the past six years the Soviet government has been drilling its populace in civil defense. It's been ten years since Mr. Average American even heard of it.

The United States has fallen from the lofty perch it attained after World War II Twenty-five years ago, would we have let a country like Saudi Arabia dare to try to set our foreign policy by holding an energy hammer over our heads? No: Then we had the creativeness and the ingenuity to discover for ourselves more reliable and more abundant sources of energy. Our overwhelmingly hedonistic way of life is the trigger for a long line of fatal dominoes. But our dear Mr. Average American cares for none of these. Just so long as he can fill up his Mark V, buy his case of beer, and turn on his television.

In years past the people listened to the intellectuals and well informed, even though they were in the smallest minority. Because of that, America has progressed and become a paradise compared to other countries. But now, in this highly technological age, they are heard no longer because Mr. Average American will not listen to those who call upon him to sacrifice or give up in any way his life of leisure and softness.

A final note is taken from Biblical prophesy. Read the book of Daniel and the book of Revelation where events leading up to the final battle of Armageddon are discussed. It describes how the nations will be lined up against each other the United States is not mentioned in these final days but Russia, the countries of central and western Europe, Isreal, and the Arab States are. Even the Bible tells us that the United States will not be a player, either because it no longer exists or because it is too weak to take part.

So carry on, dear Mr. Average American, in your lethargy and your ignorance. Sit back and dream your daydreams, for your children will inherit the nightmare

Breckinridge: Soviets Have

WASHINGTON — A delegation of the House Armed Services Committee spent 10 days in the Soviet Union and "came away with the feeling that it's much later than we thought," Rep. John Breckinridge (D-Ky.) has told reporters.

Breckinridge, who joined the

committee only recently, said the world's balance of power is not shifting in favor of the Soviet Union. "It has shifted," he said.

Speaking to reporters at a luncheon sponsored by the American Security Council, Breckin-ridge said the balance shift is not irrevocable, but the United States must take "immediate and dramatic steps to reverse the trend."

Earlier this year, Breckinridge offered an amendment to add \$15 billion to the FY 1979 defense budget, but the amendment was rejected by the House Armed Services Committee. Now, he said, he is considering a similar amendment before the full House. He noted that attempts will be made to reduce the defense budget by that much also.

America needs to stop arguing over which types of weapons systems are best and to spend more money on defense, he said. The American people are ahead of the politicians, he said, and would spend more for national defense.

While the 20-member delegation to Russia held a wide variety of views, he said, the Russians spoke clearly with one voice. "There was no variation among those with whom I spoke," he said. "There was no evidence of 'hard liners' or 'soft liners.' All statements about military affairs were expressed as though they came out of the Book of Common Prayer."

He said the Soviet Union competes with the United States only in the area of military power. Their economy is on a wartime footing, he said, with a pair of shoes costing \$60 and a simple hat \$50

"The Soviets said the United States alone was responsible for the arms race," Breckinridge said, "and they insisted that they were spending only enough for the maintenance of a defensive security of the 'motherland.' In every instance, American military forces were viewed as an offensive threat to the survival of the Soviet Union while their own forces were seen as defensive in nature."

Breckinridge said it is time America concerned itself less with Soviet intentions and more with Soviet capabilities. He said First Deputy Minister of Defense N.V. Ogarkov told him:

"The United States always has been in a position where it could not be threatened by foreign powers. That is no longer true. Today the Soviet Union has military superiority over the United States and henceforth the United States will be threatened. You had better get used to it."

Breckinridge said the Soviets will use their military superiority to support foreign policy goals which could result in war.

"The United States has moved into an era where it will be unable to conduct an independent foreign policy," he said. "No longer can we set our own pace to do whatever is necessary to protect our vital interests. Instead, we have adopted a policy of allowing another nation — the Soviet Union — to dictate the level and urgency of our military effort.

"In the process, we have inevitably relinquished the ability to protect our interests abroad and, ultimately, to remain free at home.

"Let there be no mistake: The policies of the past have mort gaged the future. The only question which remains is whether on not we can pay the debt in time."

In a separate but related congressional development, Sen Robert Dole (R-Kan.) has said the Senate will not approve a treaty on strategic arms limitations with the Soviet Union unless the Soviets and Cubans stop "aggressive military adventurism" in Africa and their military presence is withdrawn.

"So long as Moscow shows no sign of restraint in Africa or in its posture towards Europe, we should reflect carefully upon any new commitments that would limit our ability to respond to future Soviet provocations," Dole

Silence is Guilt

WASHINGTON—NBC-TV performed an enormous public service in showing a dramatic version of "The Holocaust" to a generation that wishes that memory would go away. That service is being nitpicked by viewers distressed at the need for commercial interruption; by people who might have preferred a "pure" documentary that might have reached a fraction of the audience; and by a minority of Jews who still fly the battle flag of "don't make trouble."

The nitpicking ignores the central question driven at least into nearly half of America's homes: Where the hell was the rest of the world when a part of the world was a Hell?

The best way to find the answer about a previous generation's lack of concern is to examine the turning-away from horror prevalent in this generation.

1. The Soviet slave labor camps. A former high official of the C.I.A. tells me that he vividly recalls a briefing of several years ago showing the extent of the Soviet slave labor program, with a map pinpointing the scores of camps in Eastern Europe and throughout the U.S.S.R. This was not guesswork: As the Soviets know, we have high-altitude photographic surveillance detailing the barracks and work areas of each one of those camps.

Why do we tacitly condone this slave-labor practice by helping the Soviets keep it a secret? None of our intelligence-gathering sources and methods would be compromised by making public the pictures and details we know of camps and "asylums."

Not even Soviet dissidents know as much as we do about the logistics and location of all the camps. The publication of the photos' and maps would hardly contribute to the spirit of detente, but might remind the world that the Soviet system has some festering sores to hide.

2. The slaughter in Uganda. Taking the low side of the best estimates, Idi Amin, butcher of Central Africa, has murdered at least 150,000 tribal dissidents. As a result, other leaders of Africa are slightly embarrassed but none want to say so publicly.

Does the White House, so ready to undermine internal settlements in Rhodesia, publicly exceriate the murdering Amin and urge sanctions to help topple him?

Hardly. A United States company, Page Airways, sells Uganda its commercial jet aircraft and helps supply its pilots and crews, thereby helping build Mr. Amin's power. Who runs Page Airways? James Wilmot of Rochester, New York. Who has long been the chief fundraiser for House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill? James Wilmot. Who has been a most significant contributor to and fundraiser for the campaigns of Daniel Inouye, Democrat of Hawaii, until recently chairman of the intelligence committee, and a leading light on the transportation committee? James Wilmot.

The Speaker of the House—from John F. Kennedy's old district, one of the most liberal in the nation—is

rarely even asked about his close association with the man who helps one of the bloodiest dictators in the world stay in power.

3. The harassment of the Kurdish people. The Communist-supplied government of Iraq has been systematically uprooting and destroying the

culture of the non-Arab Kurds, who only want a degree of autonomy so as to continue their civilization.

But the United States, which secretly joined with the Shah of Iran to guarantee help to the Kurds in return for a 1973 agreement not to revolt, has washed its hands of the affair. One of the men who acquiesced in the sellout, Harold Saunders, is our newest Assistant Secretary of State, and will not permit the dying leader of the Kurds, General Barzani, to make a personal appeal to President Carter.

4. The bloodbath in Cambodia. In terms of numbers of people murdered, this generation's rival to Adolph Hitler is the leader of Communist Cambodia, Pol Pot. A population of two million was death-marched out of Phnom Penh. Many of the Cambodians being killed are of "mixed blood," marked for death because they are part Vietnamese.

Where are all the people who used to march around with those "stop the killing" signs? Untelevised death does not inspire them. At the United Nations, only one ambassador—Israeli's Chaim Herzog—speaks against the genocide in Cambodia. The United States Ambassador, Andrew Young, cannot bring himself to upset thirdworld colleagues by demanding lavestigation and condemnation of the slaughter; to the shame of this nation, he sits silent as hundreds of thousands of human beings die.

Therefore, ask not how a previous generation could tolerate the murder of six million Jews; on a smaller scale, this generation is doing just dandy along those lines. The world still sees victims as pests, which should help us understand why Israelis are not about to let themselves become victims again.


