

Estimates of when the world is going to run out of oil vary considerably, with the most pessimistic, to date, having been compiled by the Central Intelligency Agency and cited by President Carter when he unveiled his energy package in April 1977. The CIA projection was that the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries could produce some 45 million barrels of oil per day at best, which Schlesinger said has now been reduced by the Administration to the order of 37-38 million barrels per day. Barring political eruptions, he said that the world's energy situation could be "in considerable trouble" by 1982, and would almost certainly be—if present trends continue by 1984.

Whether or not an energy disaster is looming over the next horizon, Schlesinger said that his inuch-heralded Phase 2 plan to stimulate domestic energy production was decimated because the "economic climate has changed somewhat in recent months" to live higher priorities to holding the line on federal expenditures that had previously been the case.

Despite detente, the world is not safeguarded against imperialist military adventures, especially since mili-tary preparations are being carried out actively and militarization is gripping all aspects of capitalist reality in the United States and NATO countries. The political, economic, scientific and spiritual life of society is increasingly being subordinated to the insatiable military machine of imperialism. Military budgets are swelling, and the arms race is being built up.

If the uniforms were changed, the words coming from Marshal Ustinov could have been said by any modern warrior: "The might of modern weapons and combat equipment is growing continuously. It is essential to learn how to get the maximum combat potential out of them, to be able to destroy the enemy at great distances and, with the first shot, launch or run."

In line with the theme of preparedness for any contingency, Ustinov also repeated a warning he made last February that the USSR can

match any Western weapons development. "The economy, science and technology of the Soviet Union are now at such a high level," said the Marshal, "that we can create, very rapidly, any kind of armament on which the enemies of peace and socialism would like to put their

money."
With Respectful Salutes To. After admonishing field commanders to become more involved in tactical innovations, Ustinov, as is customary these days, paid tribute to "General Secretary of the CPSU Central Committee, Chairman of the USSR Su-preme Soviet Presidium and Chair-man of the USSR Defense Council"

Leonid Brezhnev.

Soviet watchers were quick to notice that the censors who cleared Ustinov's piece were a little behind the times; by the time the Marshal's words appeared in print, Mr. Brezhnev was already being referred to as the "Supreme Commander-in-Chief." It may seem like a little thing to someone in the West, but only two other men have ever held that title in post-Revolutionary Russia, Stalin and Khrushchev.

Book review: SPLINTER OF THE MIND'S EYE Alan Dean Foster, Ballantine, 199 pgs, \$1.95

Over a year after Ballantine's first paperback edition of George Lucas' STAR WARS and nearly ten months after the movie of the same name that took America by storm last summer, we are given a sequel. STAR WARS begged for a sequel: certain important conflict were left unresolved and the sheer magic of the film left us breathless for more adventure in'a galaxy far, far away'. Sequels being sequels, however, somewhat imperfect offshoots of the parent, one should not expect too much.

Good then; because if such is your outlook, SME will not be a dissappointment to

you. Damned fool idealist that I am, it was to me.

I've never read any of Alan Foster's other works, tho I see he wrote a good chunk of the "Star Trek" books, so one might expect he would have some skill at writing from other than a non-original soure (to him). I think it is sad that Lucas, a movie maker by trade, wrote a better novel than Foster did, a writer by trade. The result tends to smack of exploitation, of striking while the fire is hot. Ah well, Foster was

probably rushed.

This novel takes up directly after the action of the film. Han and Chewy have gone to do their pirate/trader things while Luke, the Princess, and the two 'droids remain behind. The Empire still exists, is unbeaten, and threatens. The Rebel Alliance must still struggle, and the gaining of a potential ally is the reason why Luke, Leia, and the droids are headed toward Circapous. They land, however, via accident, on Mimban. Mimban is an Imperial mining planet, and while at one of . its settlements, they meet Halla, and old woman who, coincidentally enough, is attuned to the Force, much like Obi-Wan of the prevous story. After a rather stupid incident (Luke and Leia reveal themselves to be rather weak characters when they are out of the influence of someone older and wiser), they are captured by the evil local magistrate and escape only with the help of Halla, the Force, and two big hairy guys remarkably similar to Wookies, called Yuzzem. Halla enlists their aid in the search for the Kaiburr crystal, a special focal point for the Force. Thence follows a few chapters of adventures, including a couple of giant critters and a underground civilization of Coways. The group is captured (droids included: C-3PO and R2-D2 are sadly relegated to superflous roles) and freed only after the now obligatory scene where the hero of one side battles the other to decid his party's fate. The impression made is favorable enough to convince the Coway to aid them when a detachment of Imperial troops, led by none other than good old Darth Vader himself appears. That battle won, they rush on to a hidden temple to fetch the crystal and are in the process of doing so when Vader appears again. The long awaited Skywalker-Vader lightsaber battle occurs, leaving much to be desired, especially when one considers that the whole book is not much more than an excuse for this scene. The result is, predictably, inconclusive.

A lot of things bothered me in this book. The Force is now more a kind of magic than a quasi-religious power. Luke uses his lightsaber, not as Excalibur, but like a Boy Scout knife: it functions as flashlight or knife as often as the weapon of a knight. The dialog is poor in many spots; as mentioned, Luke and the Princess are too weak of character to up a novel by themselves, and Halla doesn't really provide the direction that Ben Kenobi did.

There are good points. The Ralph McQuarrie cover is a real beauty. Quite impressive. Also, it is more "Star Wars" if not of as high a quality as the first. So then, SPLINTER OF THE MIND'S EYE should be taken with a grain of salt, and its purpose and limitations (being a sequel) should be remembered.

((Tony did a good review, altho I wish my copy of RURI 49 had been stronger so I could copy this without retyping it! But, on to the issues. I heartily agree on the poor droids being reduced to window dressing, as I mentioned earlier. R2D2 has his moment of glory early when, after Luke crashes and is trying to get out, R2 helps him out. Luke is surprised, for he'd forgotten about R2's presence inthe course of the crash. So is the reader, for we'd forgotten them too. From there on they only tag along for the rest of

the book, a major blunder. They could be used with the Coways easily, for instance, The book follows true to the original in many critical areas. For one thing, altho it puts Luke and Leia together alone in the jungle at night, etc., Luke naturally comes through as a person of good intentions, opportunity aside. He Does want her, though, which is good. Another thing is the open-ended rature of the story. Altho their discoveries on Circapous IV ('Mimban' locally) make it all the more important that they get to Circapous III for their meeting with potential Rebels there, the story ends with them still completely lacking an escape means. You could write a novel on that alone, and another on their adventures upon reaching III. In regard to the ending, I think it was mostly well-done, considering what SHOULD happen in a battle between Luke and Vader, even if there is a little Obi-halp putting in an appearance (poorly done at that). Leia does her part and comes out about as expected; I was very impressed with the scene where Vader's right arm with saber is severed: he leans over with his left and pries the sword out of the grip of the now-independent 'limb'. Grisly, but very well handled. While Leia's wounds are restored by the Force win the Organical Tube DIPS and is existed brought back by 101 TIMP to what I thought was appropriate: Vader ought to be able to win even if tired after toying with the Princess. The thing I disliked most about the ending was what happened to remove Vader: better had Halla used the crystal to OPEN a chasm for him to fall into, than for he to just literally 'drop out of sight'. If the crystal brings back Luke, Vader has the splinter: it will regenerate HIM when he returns. And, if the presence of the crystal can do what it did, Luke, leaving with it, ought to be a Superman or almost a minor god. Instead, its tucked in his knapsack like the saber, and off they go into the sunset. I was amused in the latter part of the escape scene, where Luke rolls a captured handgrenade/bomb down the hall, and, after the huge explosions described, very typically utters an innocent "Gee, they've improved these things since I learned about them...". So, it has its failings, but like Tony says, it IS "Star Wars" stuff for an audience (like he & I) starved for more. If you want to read it but don't think its worth \$2 to you, send me some postage and I'll lend you my copy. (Do return it...) \ \ \(\))

huge Eastfront variant on about battallion-brigade level or so.))



Brief Uproar Interrupts Drone of Traffic

Norman, Okla. —UPI— The roundup took 10 hours. but the init the 10 million escapees from a semitrailer truck were captured, according to the Oklahoma High-

Authorities said 300 hives of honey bees burst open when the truck's trailer came loose and ran onto the center median of a highway about 9 a.m.

A local beekeeper helped round up the bees and credited overcast skies, cool temperature and high humidity with keeping them near the hives.

"There were no incidents," a highway patrol dispatcher said. "All that potential for a big story. But there were no incidents."

The New Soviet T-72 Tank

Thanks to some French visitors and a Gamma photographer, the new Soviet T-72 tank can be examined in detail. The model shown here, belonging to the Taman Guards Division, differs from those seen earlier in East Germany.

The production version of the tank measures approximately 23 feet long, 10.5 feet wide and only 4.7 feet high. The crew of three is, necessarily, short.

Tank commander and gunner ride in the turret, which is equipped with a 125-mm smooth bore, auto-loading gun, capable of firing three kinds of ammunition, while the driver is located in the center of long, steep from glacis.

The vehicle is reported to be 41 tons, have a new 700 hp engine, a maximum speed of 100 kph (60 mph), an unrefueled range of 500 km (300 miles), and carry 40 rounds of main our ammunition. A 7.62-mm machine gun is mounted coaxially with the main gun and a 12.7-mm machine gun is mounted atop the turret.

Both tank commander and gunner have two forward looking periscopes and separate infrared lights and sights. The commander also has two rear looking vision blocks, while the gunner has what may be either a laser rangefinder, a stereoscopic rangefinder or both.

Observant tank watchers will also note the T-72 has only one antenna, meaning the battalion operates on only one frequency; there is a built-in bulldozer below the front glacis, so the already low tank can dig itself in even lower; and the T-72 has forward hinged side skirts over the road wheels to detonate antitank rounds before they can do any real damage. All in all, this is a formidable and innovative machine.

I maintain that that any publisher who fails to respond to solicited inquiries, for whatever reason, has no buisness continuing such solicitations in the hobby' genzine. Mark says "some did not reply because of difficulty with their own zines." For those who are having such trouble, can it be said that such trouble is so overwhelming that five minutes cannot be taken to write a short note explaining the difficulty? Why don't publishers who no longer have openings write von Metzke and ask to be taken off the list, thereby saving themselves and a lot of other people wasted energy and needless hassle?

Why has there been no IDA Novice Project Chairman for more than a year??

I have been, and will continue to be, busy writing IDA Councilpeople and other hobby bigwigs trying to uncover any interest in helping the US Novice. I am actively seeking the position of Novice Project Chairman. I intend to use my zine to make a Yor of enemies help solve some of these problems. The federal government recalled a total of eight retread tires between 1971 and 1976—at a cost of \$3 million in record-keeping. Miami landlord Jeff Rudolph has been convicted of a misdemeanor for spraying the garbage cans behind his apartment complex in an effort to get rid of flies and roaches. His crime: depositing "poison . . . in any common street, alley, lane or thoroughfare of any kind."

The two-to-five-year prison sentence of Ronald Valerin, found guilty of stealing art works worth \$14,500 and suspected of stealing an additional \$100,000 in paintings, was suspended by Ohio judge Russell Yeazel because "We don't have the prison facilities to handle a genius... The system is set up for people with more normal intelligence. I don't understand the dummies, and I don't understand the brighties."

HEW has proposed that anyone 55 years of age or older who cannot speak English



or do basic arithmetic should be eligible for disability aid. The department explains. "The inability to perform simple calculations in addition and subtraction would represent vocational restrictions. An individual's inability to communicate in English may be a decisive factor resulting in a finding that he is disabled."

The Labor Department has just given Cesar Chavez \$500,000, ostensibly to teach English to members of his militant United Farm Workers. Labor Secretary Ray Marshall, who insisted on the grant against recommendations of the Washington office of CETA (Comprehensive Employment and Training Act Program), from whose funds the grant will come, and without consulting the relevant regional office of CETA in Kern County, Calif., declines comment on the matter.

HEW also gave a \$487,000 grant to research "The Relationship of Hoaxes and the Roots of Urban Violence." Among the study's findings: Rural Southerners excel in practical jokes—because of their "aggravated boredom or repressed hostility toward the environment."

The Justice Department decided earlier this year that Utah's Brigham Young University has caused landlords to violate the Fair Housing Act by requiring students living off campus to rent from landlords who agree to house men and women in separate buildings.

Japanese dentists can now fill cavities without drilling or pain by a chemical (GK-101) that washes away decay without harming the healthy tooth or bone tissue. The process was originally developed at Tufts University, but it will not

be available to Americans for at least another two years because the Food and Drug Administration has not completed testing it.

In 1976 federal agencies threw away or sold as scrap over \$15 million worth of salvageable gold and silver. The gold and silver come from such used items as batteries, electronic components, uniform buttons and insignia, and photographic and x-ray films.

Boulder, Colo., is building a public restroom with federal money at a cost of \$408 per square foot, nearly ten times what Denver would pay for restrooms in a park. The facility, containing one stall for men and one for women, will cost \$67,000.

There are five federal agencies in which at least one-quarter of all employees earn more than \$30,000: Nuclear Regulatory Commission, National Science Foundation, NASA, USIA and State Department.

Responding to the Postal Service's level of performance, *Reader's Digest*, the largest magazine in the nation, has decided to use exclusively private delivery services.

Since ERISA (Employee Retirement Income Security Act) took effect in 1974, 18,610 private pension plans have been closed down, with 35 percent of the employers blaming the huge paperwork burden imposed by ERISA. In other words, Congress' effort to improve pension coverage has cut employees of 6,500 firms out of any pension plan.

DRIVING IN OKLAHOMA

Why 'Driving in Oklahoma'? Well, beleive it or not, (and probably not), Oklahoma is really something of a crossroads for crosscountry driving. I35 going N-S through the middle of the state is the last N-S road connecting anything or anyplace of consequence to anything else between here and the west coast. I40, going E-W through the middle of the state, is one of three real through-routes from the west coast to the east; and just above their intersection is the southern terminal of I44, connecting the NE with the best route to California. Anything from what I called "civilization"—i.e., the area N of the Ohio and east of the Mississippi—wanting to go to California has two real choices: the 'high' road, I70, along the axis Kansas City-Denver, or I40 along the axis MemphisOkla City- Amarillo-Albequrque-San Bernadino (LA). I 40 has the advantage over I70 of not crossing the heaviest part of the Rockies, and the best way to go is via I44 (St Louis-OKC). (The eastern I40 terminus is south of DC in North Caroliana somewhere.).

So, maybe you'll be passing through here. Since you won't think much about stopping if you don't have to, why worry? Well, there are some locally distinct problems you need to watch out for. They're out there on the Interstate with you, so it does matter. First among these is:

- ✓ PICKUP TRUCKS These are driven exclusively by people who imagine themselves to be the heroes of the Marlboro Country ads, but are really a cross between the 'drugstore cowboy' and an outright fairy. (You'll notice lots of prety lace curtains in the back windows, often with little white tassles..).ALL are mentally retarded. Most are barefoot. All are empty-headed. If they weren't, they wouldn't be in a pickup truck. Whenever you see a pickup truck, tell yourself that its driver is out to kill you, and act accordingly. You'll generally be right. And beware of dry chips (or not so dry chips) of cow dung known to often flake off of the truck. Or possibly the occupants.
- ✓ ON RAMPS Getting onto an Interstate in Okalhoma presents two distinct dangers. The first is that there generally is no acceleration or merge zone; rather, the ramp's approach is really just an angled intersection, often with a CURB between the road and shoulder so you can't cheat and use the shoulder as an extension. Oklahoma ramps are designed to force you to 'blast' directly into 60mph traffic from a dead stop. And when YOU'RE on the highway, remember that that's what the oncoming traffic will do. Now, why from a dead stop? Well, that's the other danger. You see, locals don't know how to enter an Interstate. There's a little animal fear of the high speed traffic out there, added to the cowbay mentality that says "Y'all watch out cuz here sh cum!" Plus, ignorance as to what a YIELD sign means. To an Okie, YIELD means GIVE UP, and thats what they do at the end of the ramp. They give up at trying to figure it out, so they either close their eyes and blast (esp women), or, stop. After stopping for a while, they realize they're supposed to be moving on the highway, not sitting on the ramp, so they then blast from a dead stop into the oncoming traffic, just like they do in their pastures. So, if you're getting back on the road, ignore what's out there: the only real danger is from the car ahead of you. It WILL stop.
- ✓ TURN SIGNALS In Okalhoma, turn signals are generally synonymous with brake lights. When you see brake lights come on, watch for a turn. (While you're here, always signal, ESPECIALLY for a lane change, which is unheard of here. It will tell everyone else that you're from out of state. I've been here almost seven years and I'm still quick to point out that I'm from out of state. It's like people from New York State: they'll always be quick to say "..State" sometimes even adding a redundant ",NOT the City." They sure don't want to be mistaken for one of those. Ditto here, RBLipton.
- We BACKUP LIGHTS mean nothing here. One car in seven has them on all the time, except perhaps when actually backing up. I don't know how or why they do it, but, that's the way it is. Maybe it's wet hay or something in the wiring.


"A mess hall could just as well be called something else if we could only think of a better name for it."

the Army is the same as a captain in the Navy. Please write back to me and tell me if any of this is true or false."


"I want to be in the Army like you are. I have decided you are my ninth favorite person in the universe."


Truth-telling, complete candor and awful sincerity are to be found in both the talk and the scribblings of children. This seems to be especially true when they comment on their own personal experiences:
