It turns out that you may not get the items you ordered, although Mr Anschell will cash your check.

MARK BERCH jumped on me along with quite a few others the other day, sending in two of his DIPLOMACY DIGESTs on the same day I got EGGNOG, 4 RUNESTONES, 2 sample BROUHAHAS, a CAMPAIGN, and damn near a partridge in a pear tree to boot. This is the first time ever that a DIP DIGEST has arrived here and not been almost read cover to cover upon arrival . his more interesting articles this time concerned player's rights/control over orphaned games and transfers, adding a note at the end about how players can act together and do something more than just wait away the months. I say, 'Here, here'. (Or is it 'Hear, hear'?) Whichever, I know from my own experience that this is the case. I was in 77FJ and 77HH begun by a pure ripoff clown acting under the auspices of OUTPOSTS magazine, (a pretty shaky affair itself), and when it became apparent that this guy had hung it up for good, I got busy. Alan Rowland of WARMONGER kindly offered to pick them up and was in the process of doing so when John Mirassou, trying to get his SAYA DASTI-- going, asked for orphans. I worked with Alan and got him to let John have them so SAYA would have some games, when naturally, Mirassou gave it up. Well, now they among others are being salvaged by Jerry Jones (LD&NS), to whom I also sent game info. He, the current GM, is the third one I sent material to, yet I did get something from everyone I approached! So, if you try--and you don't need to do all THAT much--new homes are there. Jerry Jones right now is the best bet, and other publishers/prospective publishers can also contact Jerry to help take the load off too. (If you think I'm being hypocritical in not having any here, let me point out that this is a specialized zine dealing in FAST games to which the majority of players would NOT want to abide). One problem Mark's article did not address was that of protective agreements, such as specifically DNYMPA. As Alan Rowland put it (in a jokes section), "speaking of jokes, anyone heard of DNYMPA rescuing any games lately?" Specifically, I refer (and I beleive Alan does) to the collapse of Doug Reif's BLACK HOLE last spring. It took down what would have been my first win, 76IK, 76EI, and one other, I believe. What had he cranked out one more issue, plus 74HX, has happened? Not a hell of a lot, frankly. All DNYMPA pubbers supposedly "insure" each other's games, yet the last BLACK HOLE was late March or early April, and so far I've gotten a referal to Brad Hessel by Bob Lipton (the only regular DNYMPA pubber anyway, now defunct), no response to two letters to Hessel, and one note from Greg Costikyan (URF DURFAL--not a regular pubber, but does get them out now and then) saying that DNYMPA didn't want to transfer the games without Doug's permission, but Doug hadn't responde not. If he says 'screw my players', why respond to other curious publishers? I say, screw the irresponsible GM and transfer the games whether he likes it or not. Trouble here is, no one else will try to 'break in' on what DNYMPA has staked out as its turf and adopt an orphan that is DNYMPAs responsibility, and DNYMPA itself has a hard time turning out its own stuff, let alone take care of such mundane matters as picking up and resuscitating another brother-GMs abandoned games. I guess all there really is to say to that is, read NY zines if you like (they're good, when they come out), but don't be fool enough to sign up in one. I think it was Jerry Jones that I elaborated to on this already, and maybe he'll run my comments elsewhere, so I'll let it rest at that for now. I'll report any further developments, but don't hold your breath.

MiG-23s in Cuba

Soviet Premier Kosygin was described as bristling, last week, when visiting U.S. senators asked about the MiG-23s which the Russians have begun furnishing to Cuba — some 15 to 18 of the aircraft since July. According to one story he "accused the senators of going into too much detail."

The MiG-23—what kind of plane it is, why it's being sent to Cuba, what response if any is in order from President Carter—may seem to Mr. Kosygin a petty detail. Few Americans, we suspect, will see it that way.

In purely military terms, the plane probably has no great strategic significance — none, certainly, to match the nuclear submarines for which in 1970 the Russians were quietly constructing a maintenance base at Cienfuegos. The MiG-23 is a light-weight, single engine "single-seat supersonic fighter" (according to Jayne's Combat Aircraft); but in one configuration it is capable of carrying a small nuclear missile on a 1200-mile one-way mission. If the planes detected by U.S. satellites in Cuba turn out to be MiGs of strategic capacity, their presence will raise unwelcome questions for President Carter.

One question is simply, why? Given the history of U.S. sensitivity to Russian arms of strategic design in Cuba, dating back to the missile crisis of October 1962, there is no good time for sending such planes. But with a second SALT treaty around the corner, and shortly to be submitted to the Senate, it is the worst imaginable time for Soviet political pressure (if nothing more) on Mr. Carter.

The political pressure is already sensed. Secretary of Defense Harold Brown has dutifully asked in a confidential memo whether MiG-23s in Cuba are "offensive weapons" under the Kennedy-Khrushchev understanding of 1962. President Carter has found it timely to renew the SR-71 overflights of Cuba which he had called off as a gesture of good will in January 1977

Already it is asked if this is another of those "probes" of U.S. forbearance which the Russians in their incurable aggressiveness undertake from time to time, just to discover what they might get away with. We do not pretend to know. When the Russians are involved, one can never exclude mere blundering insensitivity to

the way American politics works. But however the MiG-23s are "wired," whether as interceptors or as nuclear craft, it is improbable that Russian motives are wholly innocent. These planes have been supplied to none of the Warsaw Pact nations, except Bulgaria. Why are they needed for Cuba's "defense"? Defense against what, precisely?

Whether or not the planes violate the 1962 understanding depends on several things — whether, for instance, they are nuclear armed or could be. And it is the president's task to define offensiveness. But too narrow a construction could be interpreted as a sign that he would swallow more than MiG-23s.

In 1962 President Kennedy insisted that Russian IL-28 fighter-bombers be removed from Cuba, along with intermediate-range missiles. This was done, over Mr. Khrushchev's solemn protestation that IL-28s were obsolescent, even harmless, and in any case belonged to the Cubans. If the IL-28s were deemed "offensive" then, may the MiG-23s be seen as less so now?

We do not know how seriously this "probe" is being taken by President Carter. That will probably depend on what the SR-71 photos reveal. But any evidence of a feint to alter the strategic equation in the Western Hemisphere, even a minor one, would have to be taken seriously. The price of indifference would be too great. If ignored, the MiG-23s could invite a more provocative followup - for instance, the activation of the Cienfuegos sub base. And in any case the matter presents the critics of SALT with damaging ammunition. For them, a fundamental issue. is whether Russian professions of interest in a stable U.S.-Soviet military relationship may be taken at face value; and only the president has the capacity to insist that agreements be honored to the letter.

We aren't suggesting that President Carter ought to make a sharp, noisy public issue of the MiG-23s in Cuba, especially if they are found to be truly "defensive." The graver issue of the submarine base in 1970 was quietly handled, but no less firmly for that, and the base has not been used. But President Carter should respond to the MiG-23 provocation firmly. If there is clear evidence that the planes are nuclear, he should quietly tell the Russians they will have to go before any new SALT agreement can be initialed or sent to the Senate.

I wish to use the extra space on this page to point out that this will NOT work that way in BRUTUS BULLETIN. Here, as stated in both the Dip rules and my houserules, a badly written order will be carried out, and obvious oversights will be corrected. So, if you order "A Bla-Con", it will NOT appear as "A Bla-Con/NSU; F BLA unordered, H" as it apparently would in most other zines. Here, it will come out "F Bla-CON", as Dong as you really DO have a fleet in the Black Sea. (Now I know Mark Berch will write right back and say, 'But what if he really DOES have an army in the Black Sea?' I won't answer that, but leave it up to the audience...) F Con-Bul, however, WOULD fail, here on gounds of ambiguity. F Con-Bulec or F Con-Bulsc are both possible, so it would fail (and wouldn't block, say, A Ser-Bul). 
A Note on what all this is: More than one of you is a complete newcomer, so "for the record", let me go over the abbteviations "just in case". I will use Russia as an example. "F Sev-RUM" indicates that fleet Sevastopol was ordered to RUMania, and the move succeeded; "A WAR-Gal" shows that army Warsaw was ordered to GALicia, but the move maximum FAILED because of the Austrian order Vie-Gal. Therefore, both army Vienna and army Warsaw are still in their original starting places. By scanning the orders, the underlined ones failed, and the units are now located wherever the CAPITAL letters indicate. See 77KS for examples of displacements ("r", retreat) and annihilations.

Austria Nixes Nuclear Alternative

Austrian voters have decided that they do not want nuclear power even though

they have a \$530 million atomic plant that is fully operational and needs only to be turned on. The vote on the referendum, which was called by Chancellor Bruno Kreisky to avoid a troublesome parliamentary fight, was extremely close: 1.57 million pronuclear to 1.6 million antis. Kreisky, a Socialist, blamed the defeat of the referendum on Conservatives who, though in favor of nuclear power, could not bring themselves to lend political support to the Socialist government.

Mothballing the plant will deprive the nation—already importing 65% of its energy—of 692 megawatts of electric power. That amount of electricity could fulfill the needs of almost 700,000 people, or nearly 10% of the 7.5 million Austrian population. Supporters of the project claimed that, unless nuclear power and other domestic energy sources are developed, the country would be 80% dependent on foreign fuel supplies by the end of the next decade.

Dear Mr. Columbus:

Thank you for your good letter which enclosed a proposal entitled, "Reaching the East by Sailing Westward." We have read this with interest. Certainly what you describe represents an ambitious undertaking, and members of our staff have reviewed the proposal in some detail. Unfortunately, the plan you describe falls somewhat outside the scope of our particular fields of interest; but we feel you still may benefit from some of our staff's comments, which follow:

- 1. Although I personally agree with you that "the world is round" (and indeed it was through a grant from this very foundation that the original round-world theory was developed) you must understand that we have a rather conservative board, whose members are unlikely to base any substantial grant upon an unproven theory, so open to public controversy.
- 2. When you claim that "the distance by sea between Spain and India is very short," we are not certain just what evidence you have for this, or indeed, just what you mean by "very short." Perhaps you could clarify this.
- 3. We wonder why you feel that three ships are required for this voyage. In view of the considerable criticism to which foundations are subject, we wonder if this is not an area in which the budget could be trimmed back, to avoid undue criticism.

Finally, some of our staff are wondering just what overall effect you expect your proposed voyage to have. Our foundation staff has been encouraged by its board to look for programs of particular leverage and significance rather than to support routine, pedestrain projects. Incidentally, there is some question as to whether the forthcoming tax reform law will allow foundations to pay travel expenses for individuals to the extent required by your proposal.

I am in no position to make any firm commitment; but should you wish to revise your proposal in such a way that all of the above questions can be satisfied, I would be most happy to meet with you again.

I want to assure you that your revised proposal will be given every consideration and regret that we cannot encourage you concerning the one you sent us.

ANOTHER REASON WHY BRIAN, ROY, TONY, AND OTHERS ARE SUCH IDIOTS

Some weeks ago we were playing some game (Risk or bridge or D&D or something in that vein) when the conversation turned to nuclear war with the Soviet Union. Roy proceeded to demonstrate his lack of knowledge and fufill the stereotype of an obnoxious, pompous, pseudo-intellectual member of a certain ethnic group which controls the Senate and the Federal Reserve System. His logic began that in case of a nuclear war we would all be dead.

This bothered me a great deal because it is a fallacy which has been perpetrated by people infected with what I refer to as the "On the Beach" syndrome. I explained that not everyone would die, but we probably would incenerated in a fireball. The reason for our inevitable destruction is that your typical i megaton warhead can destroy everything within about a 15 mile radius, if my memory serve me correctly. As Mahwah (about 15 miles away with a great many hills in the way) has a very large Ford assembly plant and Ridgefield Park (about 15 miles to the south) has a PSE&G generating plant, and Paramus and Saddlebrook have (about 5 to 7 miles away to the south) I-80, the Garden State Parkway, US-46, and NJ-14 and NJ-4 running through their boundaries, I concluded that the odds were quite good the Soviet Union would drop a few warheads on Bergen County. Roy told us that there was no reason to nuke Bergen County. Brian felt secure in the knowledge that only major cities (New York, Los Angeles, London, Paris, etc.) and major military bases (Fort Dix, Brooklyn Navy Yard, Groton, CT, etc.) were targets.

I asked if they had any ideas as to the number of warheads the Soviet Union had. No response. I imquired as to the number of major cities and military instillations there were in the West. "A couple of hundred"was the reply from Roy. I had dug up something showing the number of warheads, both tactical and non-tactical. Even the people in the background (probably Greg and Andrew) figured out that there were still a coupl" of thousand left over. I asked if the intent of nuclear weapons was merely decorative or utilitarian. Then I let lose with questions dealing with the nature of war, the nature of thermonuclear war, the economic and demographic breakdown of the country, the effects of a nuclear attack upon our culture and Bergen County. After several uncertain and unsatisfactory attempts at responses. Tony swung over to my side. He realized that a retaliatory strike is important. He also began to grasp the idea that the "winner" would have more people, more industry, more available resources, better transportation and communication, and a unified government (which probably won't be much of a problem for either the Soviet Union or this country, both have undertaken measure to protect the bureacracy) so as to impose a conventional or nuclear, san economic, or a diplomatic solution on the "loser", and attempt to reconstruct the devastated society. Dear Alan,

I was pleasantly surprised to find a WARMONGER here already. I don't agree on the evaluation of Bergen County being so strategically valuable as to merit any Soviet warheads, however. Sure, they'll have thousands of warheads "left"--assuming that every warhead of the first wave works perfectly, hits its target dead center, and completely devastates both the target and the ability to recover. Bergen County, wherever it is, might be devastated if a Soviet army were using nukes to aid its GROUND ADVANCE across Bergen County, but even Idi Amin wouldn't launch an ICBM from Kazahkstan to cut New Jersey state highway 14. Not unless Soviet troops were landing at Asbury Park. Even then, the road would be cut by a cruiser or submarine's missle, not an ICBM in a first (or even 2d,3d) wave. If the Soviets used enough nukes to flatten Bergen County and east coast counties with similiar "industrial" targets, they would have enough missles to knock us out between the Alleghenys and the sea, leaving out N Carolina and below. Orbiting Telescope Delights Scientists

A new orbiting observatory carrying the world's largest X-ray telescope radioed back its first picture. yesterday - the image of X-rays coming from the edge of what may be one of space's mysterious black holes.

When the picture first appeared on a Goddard Space Flight Center television monitor as a collection of bright dots against a black background, scientists and engineers who had worked for years on the \$87 mil-

lion project were ecstatic.

The significance of today's event is for the first time X-ray astronomy has become of age, and it has achieved the kind of resolution and sensitivity which has been traditional in the fields of radio and optical astronomy," said Dr. Riccardo Giacconi of the Smithsonian Astrophysical Observatory.

HE SAID THE telescope should be able to detect X-rays from objects two thirds of the way toward the edge of the universe, meaning the "satellite will be seeing radiation created roughly 10 billion years ago.


The automated space agency satel-lite, known officially as HEAO 2 but scalled Linstein by its scientists, was launched from Cape Canaveral on Monday into a near-perfect 330-mile high orbit. Yesterday's operation was the culmination of a week of ster-by-step activation procedures.
