THE WARGAME should get started in this issue, or at least a copy of the initial defense will appear. See notes inside somewhere (I hope) on this.

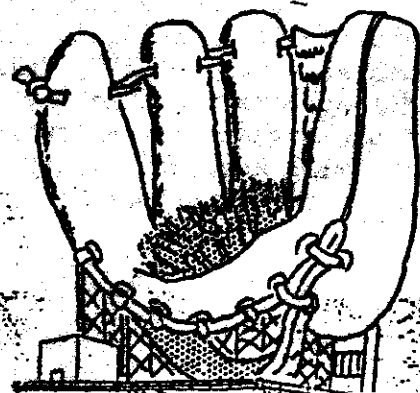

If I had more time, I'd take issue with you on a couple of points. I wonder what you base your comments about grad assistants vs McDonald ~~slaves~~ workers on. Having had experience with both (I worked at a local McDonalds for about a year when I was 16), I won't argue about conditions at the hamburger factory, but I think your conception of what TAs do is pretty distorted. I've known a few, had experience as a reader (who does everything short of teaching a regular class) and am now preparing for a full teaching position in the fall. I don't know what it was like where you sent to school, or at Univ of Okla, but its not babysitting here, or at any of the other schools I've had contact with. Perhaps you believe its just appearing for 3 hours a week and bullshitting?

About the Angola thing: the trouble is that US does not even measure such enterprises on their own merits. The US is a status quo power and status quo powers just don't behave that way. The question is not "why not Angola" but "why are we content to behave in a way that upholds the status quo, rather than follow policies that upset it--to our advantage?"

((I'd have to disagree, since we are actively LOSING the status quo, not only of our once-held world dominance, but even of approximate equilibrium. Why won't we even act to hang onto whatever little of the old status quo is left?

Per TAs, my own experiences are with Univ of Wisconsin-Milwaukee and OU, and based on what I saw, I'd answer your 1st paragraph with a Yes. See the following letter also.))

I do not know enough about the services that English grad assistant at the U of Okla provide; however, I can't help feeling that you would easily generalize the statement that English grad assts "are little more than fancy babysitters" to include all US professors and teachers.

As a Senior High Math teacher and part-time community college professor, I am the first to admit that for SOME unmotivated and apathetic students, I am a fancy babysitter. I am also the first to admit that teachers have more vacation time than common laborers (approximately 45 fewer workdays per year than those folks who have just 2 weeks vacation). But I take offense at the generalization I've projected you to say.

The fruits of our labor are not directly edible (as are the fruits of our Big Mac makers), but rather, they are indirectly apparent. The algebra, geometry, and calculus used by the engineers, architects, etc., etc., to build the McDonald's empire was taught by math teachers, no??

Granted, many, or perhaps most students who successfully complete algebra, geometry, or calculus courses do not use the learned information to help produce anything real or tangible. I contend, however, that often they have to some degree learned to think more analytically and/or logically. Is this not valuable?

We have been called fancy babysitters before and we will be called fancy babysitters again; but I hope, John, you think twice before saying something that could be similarly be generalized. By the way, consider this: The average family has a little more than 2 children in it. The average babysitter is paid a little more than a dollar an hour to babysit 2 average kids. I averaged 160 students per day, one hour per student, this year.

That would be 80 one-dollar babysitter fees per day. 180 of 196 teacher work days include students. $180 \times \$80 = \$14,400/\text{year}$. In my fifth year of teaching (with tenure), I'm being paid \$10,400. This does not include the time spent on lesson planning, test writing, test grading & averaging, report card work, extra help (withmath & personal problems). (Please excuse the sloppiness of this letter. The value in rewriting this is not logically apparent to me).

Or maybe vice versa. But it has definitely been established that the dishonest and unreliable Gamesmaster who was a few years ago using the name "Buddy Tretick" is the same individual who is now playing Russia in this postal Diplomacy game, and publishing Le Front De Liberation du Diplomacy, as "Bernie Oaklyn".

GRAUSTARK set out to settle this mystery in January, and asked all readers the following questions: "Are you able honestly to set your name to the following statement: 'I have personally met both Buddy Tretick and Bernie Oaklyn, and I can honestly assert that they are two separate and distinct human beings?'" "None of the over 100 readers of GRAUSTARK has been able to do this. In fact, several assert the contrary. For example, Jack Frost writes: 'I have been quiet too long. I telephoned Bernie-Buddy in November of last year and started the conversation with, 'Buddy?...What's going on?' Buddy-Bernie answered, 'Yes.' After this greeting, when I identified myself as Jack Frost he was quiet for about 30 seconds. I continued to make conversation as if I was talking to 'Bernie', addressing the person on the other end of the phone by that name several times. Bernie-Buddy then started to converse normally, probably thinking he had misheard my opening salutation.

"There is more, however. I have in my possession several envelopes and hand-writing samples from persons reported to be 'Stephen Andrews', 'Brian Edwards', and others from Silver Spring, Maryland. The unusual thing about them is they all have the same typewriter and scrawl used by Buddy-Bernie.

"When I accused Bernie-Buddy of being these persons he said they were kids that he had to help with their mail."

This is quite conclusive. There is the minor problem that perhaps "Oaklyn" is the real name, and that we all use "Tretick" simply because that name came to the attention of postal Diplomacy fandom a few years earlier. However, "Tretick" sounds like the sort of name that Real People have. "Oaklyn" sounds like what a contractor of Jerry-built houses would call a new suburban development.

I would like to apologize to the honest players in 1978IE for letting Tretick into this game before I knew that he was using the "Oaklyn" pseudonym. I want to assure all players in future GRAUSTARK games that if they have any reason for assuming that a new entrant is another Tretick pseudonym, they should let me know and I will suspend the opening of play until I have investigated the matter.

Tretick will continue to get GRAUSTARK at his "Oaklyn" address, since he may not be known there under his real name, and I want to make damn sure that he gets this. And, beginning with the "Spring 1905", moved, I am going to insist that he obey Postal Rule 11 as quoted on p. 5 of the last issue of GRAUSTARK. His moves in this game must be signed with his real name, Buddy Tretick, or they will not be printed. (Unless, of course, it happens that Oaklyn is his real name and Tretick is the pseudonym. If this is the case, then he need merely say so in his next letter, and his moves will be printed under the name "Oaklyn".)

I got a letter from Bernie Oaklyn, who has been having some troubles with the standby policy that he uses in Le Front, his zine. In it, he gives his position on standby players, which is a little different, to say the least. It follows:

"Thanks to a letter sent to me by Lee Mendler, Sr., concerning the use of standby and replacement players in our games, and to noting exactly what has been happening in games in which I myself am a player and those that I have monitored in past this article emerges.

Let us first look at the fairness to each of the seven players in the game when one of them misses his moves. Consider the setback of a country if those orders fall within the first game year. Then consider the importance of missed moves somewhere down the pike. Each time orders are not given for a country, that country, and certainly its alliance structure, suffer a setback. And, neighboring countries gain a decided advantage, which is somewhat similar to real war where a commander failed to give an order, or did not plan ahead, and was a little late in setting up his defenses off offensives.

Nevertheless, a set of missed moves in this game results in hard feelings which must contribute at least substantially to a growing distaste for the game in the mind of the players. Surely none of the players need a win so badly that they would ask for a set of missed orders. Nor should they wish to condone a such missed orders. The gamesmaster is the key here. He is in a position to stop or at least minimize missed orders in his house rules. For instance, the GM can make as a requirement for enrollment in the game, that the player submit to him on a separate sheet of paper, properly dated and signed, and continually update the alliance structure for that country. The GM can announce that the last stated alliance structure on file will be used by a standby player whose name and address and telephone number that GM will publish under the game (giving each and every player a chance, if they dare, to negotiate in advance with the standby player). In addition, the GM should assign a standby player for that game. But, once that standby player has been assigned to report for duty under the name of a particular country, and has had the advantage of prior communication from the other players, that replacement player should not be given any other assignment in that particular game, else the GM has caused a violation.

Nowhere in our publications is there room for such statements by a GM that "orders were submitted by a neutral party", or some such nonsense. If it becomes necessary to call on a local player, or even write to another player and request that orders be submitted for a game, that person's name, address, and telephone number should be published under the game season that such orders are used, giving the other players the right and chance to verify those orders as coming from other than the gamesmaster, and that the standby player was given access to the alliance structure on file for that country and give the other players the right and chance to communications with that standby player far before that player supersedes the game with a published set of moves (which usually result in a stab). We see that there is a question of ethics here, and this is a problem to solve.

It is up to each and every GM to solve this problem for himself, under the pressure of the players in his zine if necessary. It is not the responsibility of certain persons, like one Rodney Walker, to police and condemn and ostracize any GM from the hobby because the GM uses certain practices. After all, if the players do not like to play under such practices, that players can take his money elsewhere and close down that GM once and for all. In fact, if certain policies are not liked by the players, they can most certainly get together and vote to take their game to another publisher and GM and get out from objectionable policies."

In issue #38 of BB, you said that if anyone has any personal attacks, to send it to you and you'll print it. Therefore, enclosed is one for you to print:

Dear Editor,

I read with interest the article "Oaklyn Is Tretick" in issue 397 of GRAUSTARK, and also a letter from "Bernie Oaklyn" which appeared in the recent issues of several zines, such as RUNESTONE and AGAINST THE ODDS, in which "Oaklyn" attempts to defend his methods of GMing, and makes certain claims that his system of using standby players is a fair and honest system.

This reminded me of a previous experience I had with "Oaklyn". On 19 Jan 78 I sent him a money order for \$3.50 for a sub to his zine, and requested to be a standby for regular games of Diplomacy (see enclosures). I then received the 17 Feb 78 issue of his zine (see enclosures) in which he listed me as the standby player for the game 1978XX, which had not yet been assigned a BN.

There was nothing unusual about issue #2 of his zine, dated 15 March, giving the Spring 01 moves. I then received issue 3 of F.L.D. (Oaklyn's zine) dated 5 April 78 (see enclosures) in which Austria was listed as NMR. In spite of the NMR, the Austrian units moved, and it was stated that a Becky Cofman had submitted Austrian orders. However, there was no address given for this "Becky Cofman", in order to allow anyone to verify if such a person really existed. There was nothing in issue 3 which requested me to submit standby moves for Austria, and since the Fall 01 moves for Austria had been submitted by a third party, I assumed my position as a standby for this game had been overlooked, and thus I did not send in any Winter 01 orders for Austria, nor did I contact the GM in any way whatsoever. I assumed Austria would be played by either the original player or by the "Becky Cofman". You will also note that this issue lists Buddy Tretick as co-editor.

When I received issue #4 of F.L.D. dated 2 May 78, to my surprise and shock, I read that I had submitted winter 01 orders for Austria, as the original player had again NMR'd. This is an absolute and total lie, and proves beyond any doubt that Oaklyn-Tretick is an absolute liar, and a dishonest GM. I have never submitted any orders to any game whatsoever to Oaklyn-Tretick.

In this same issue, I was called on to submit Spring 02 orders for Austria, with the understanding that I would take over the Austrian position if the original Austrian player again NMR'd. However, since it was obvious that I was dealing with a dishonest GM, I chose not to send in orders for the game, as I did not want to get involved in games run by a GM I knew beforehand to be dishonest. I have been burned enough during my years in the hobby by GMs who I did not discover to be dishonest and/or incompetent until after I had gotten into their games (Rowland, Truman, Shamray, and others come readily to mind.).

In view of this proveable lie by Oaklyn-Tretick, I can't help but wonder if there really is a "Becky Coffman" or if this is another one of the many "front" names under which "Oaklyn" operates, and if in fact he didn't actually make the Fall 01 moves for Austria himself. Has anyone in the hobby ever heard of a "Becky Coffman"? This example is one of several reasons why I always wonder about, and frown on the practice of any GM who uses "phantom" or 'neutral' moves for NMRing countries in his games, except for those GMs who use pre-set spring and fall 1901 moves only, which have been published in his house rules for everyone to see beforehand.

In spite of the fact that I chose not to participate in any games in F.L.D., I did want to continue to receive the zine, and therefore I did not request a refund of the balance of my sub. However, Oaklyn-Tretick then cut off my sub, and never sent me another copy of F.L.D., nor did he refund my sub balance. Thus, in effect, he stole the balance of my sub money. Thus, in addition to being a liar and dishonest GM, he is also a THIEF!

In the article "Oaklyn is Tretick" in GRAUSTARK #397, Jack Frost states that

he has evidence that "Stephen Andrews", "Brian Edwards", and others are more "front" names under which Oaklyn-Tretick operates. I call upon Frost to reveal to us these "other" names, so that all hobby members can be aware of as many as possible of the many "ghost" and "front" names under which Oaklyn-Tretick operates. Also, I would like to point out that you will notice in the enclosures that "Andrews" and "Edwards" are the Russian and Turkish players in 1978XX in "Oaklyn's" zine FLD. Thus, in effect Oaklyn-Tretick was controlling at least two of the countries in the game he was GMing.

When I read Frost's statements, I was reminded of a player from Silver Spring MD I encountered in 1978, a "James Alan", who was a fellow player in a game in AGAINST THE ODDS. When I first encountered him, there was something about his letters (see enclosure), his style of writing, negotiating, etc., which reminded me of "Oaklyn". However, I decided there was probably no connection, as the phone numbers were different, and dismissed it from my mind. But after reading what Frost had to say, I decided to try to check this "Alan" out. I decided to call there late that night, when I would hopefully wake up the person answering, and thus catch him off guard. I called him a little after 11:00 pm, and a lady answered. I could tell from her voice that she had obviously been asleep. I said "Good evening, ma'm, may I speak to Bernie?" She responded, in a sleepy voice, "He doesn't live here, you'll have to call him at his house. This is where his son James lives". I asked "You mean James Alan?", and she answered, "of course, but he isn't here at the present time. Would you like to leave a message?" I then said, "No, thank you. I'll just call Bernie over at his house. By the way, you are speaking of Bernie Oaklyn, is that correct?", to which she responded, "Yes, would you like his phone number?" I said "No, thank you, I already have it", and hung up.

First of all, in the enclosures you will notice that James Alan of Silver Spring, MD is the German player in game 78XX which "Oaklyn" is GMing in his zine F.L.D.. This is further evidence that Oaklyn-Tretick is engaging in improper activities as a GM. The fact that James and Bernie have different last names is no big mystery, when you consider the possibilities of divorce, step-father, step-children, name changes, etc. There are several possible reasonable explanations.

The fact that Bernie Oaklyn is James Alan's father does not prove that Oaklyn and Tretick are the same person. In fact, it tends to show there really is a Bernie Oaklyn. But, it is one more piece of evidence to indicate that Oaklyn is engaging in underhanded and dishonest activities, and is capable of doing all the dishonest and illegal acts he has been accused of by various people in the hobby. From this, I would assume Oaklyn is his real name, and Buddy Tretick was a "front" name he used during his first entry into the hobby. My guess is that Tretick is his middle name, Buddy is his nickname, his full name is Bernard "Buddy" Tretick Oaklyn, and they are both one and the same person. In conclusion, I think that all games published and/or GMed by Oaklyn-Tretick should be declared irregular by the BNC, due to dishonesty and interference in the games.

((The above is slightly altered in so far as the original referred to specific enclosures, only two of which are reproduced in this issue. Others were money orders, FLD issues, and the like, plus the original of a letter from son James. I'd like to thank Ron for this expose', and would join in asking Jack Frost to give us the full list of actual and suspect names he has. In a way this is futile, in that a fraud like Tretick can invent names a lot faster than they can be discovered; but it can help reveal some past and current ones such as these games where Oaklyn is already 2 or 3 of the players. Another question I would ask is why, with all this monkey business so obviously going on, are there still people signed up for his upcoming games, esp. Frost himself, according to lists I see in FLD II-6? Oh, well. Reductions of some of Ron's enclosures follows, and then on to some more letters.))

I thought I'd toss in a few comments on your house rules. Considering the fact that they are quite short, they are VERY good---yours are the first I've seen that cover the incomplete order. Do you print the name of the person requesting the draw or concession vote? The biggest omission is this: Does a draw have to include all the survivors, i.e., can T,R,A,G all vote to have a RA draw? Does NVR count as a yes or a no? Proxy orders? Can, say, Fall 1904 orders be made conditional on whether a player did OTB vs No Ret received, i.e., do A if OTB, do B if NVR? What about the unwanted, unnecessary convoy paradox? Do you allow perpetual orders?

Incidentally, what do you mean, subs are optional? Do you accept phone orders? I've spoken to two people on the phone in this game, and they both happened to mention what a reliable GM you were... In that regard, in Fall 05, I notice that you list both A Smy and F Smy for Turkey. Ooh, nasty, aren't I?

** Moving on to BB (unnumbered) of April 10--this was quite a shock, especially since the FOL SI FIE came the same day. Unfortunately, page 1 and page 2 don't seem to agree with each other; it's unclear what you intend to do. ((Page 2 is correct)) J.M.

It seems to me that you are somewhat overreacting to something. You can't apparently keep up your old pace, so now you are planning to go to the other extreme, the warehouse route. You say you don't want to become "just another Dipzine". To begin with, there's no dishonor in that (says he, who runs no games at all in his attempt not to be just another dipzine)--many fine zines are or started just that way. Second, and more important, with 2 week deadlines, you'd never be just another Dipzine anyhow.

If the present system is too much work, then modify it, don't drop it. Keep to a strict 1 oz limit. Alternatively, why not alternate issues: once a month do the full 1 or 2 oz issue, depending on how much you feel you can do and the off-beat issues (mid month) would be just the games flyer. There would be 2 sub rates, depending on whether you wanted the flyers or not. And if that's too much,

one regular issue every 6 weeks, separated by 2 flyers.

Please think about it. The reduction of BB to a warehouse zine would be a loss to the hobby, even though you'd be performing a hobby service with 14 day games. But above all, please CLARIFY your position. I have spoken to 2 people about BB and both were confused (as I was) about your intentions.

Will you be at DIPCON?

((Normally I'd just say no, but there's a 1 in 1000 shot that I would fly to Houston and ride in with Steve McLendon or some such. I'm thinking about it, but probably won't go. It's just too far.

I certainly appreciate all your flattering remarks, implied or overt. Basically I am in fact following your outline: the games ALWAYS go to players on a flyer on deadline day (and always have,--sometimes the next day though) and are reprinted here only "for the record". What I think I'll do in the future is to REDUCE the games first and THEN run them; I really doubt many non-players are following them, altho the press is sometimes good. That way perhaps I can cut down on the size. Right now I'm using a whole page per game per SEASON, which is extreme by hobby standards; while I dislike finding a game I'm in lodged in as a cramped paragraph in some one ELSE's zine, a whole page is a bit extravagant. Up to now I've done so out of sheer laziness: the page you see is what I prepared for the players that deadline day, and I just delete (unless I forget!) the top line that says "Outrider to your Brutus Bulletin" and use it as a master for a page in the zine. This might permit more loz issues with just as much filler as an 'average' issue, if I ever get an average one. It seems I'm either buried under stuff, like letters this time, or else hard pressed to find ANYthing at all! So it goes.

The BB of April 10 was probably #37: the number only appears on the cover, and on 37 it virtually vanished in repro. Look real close in the upper right quadrant...

On to houserules. Everything about draws here is secret: submitter, votes, and even part of the RESULTS! I only print that 1) there has been a call for an XYZ draw, and 2) whether it passed or failed. No tallies are given. I don't specify the NVR situation in the houserules because it varies with cases; I indicate at the time of call, whether an NVR will count as a Yes or No. Basically they are always No unless the call is for a reasonably obvious and fair result. The game concludes whenever a draw passes. I've heard draws and/or concessions have gone to people earlier eliminated, powers in CD, etc.; I'd do that here if the players so voted. It's THEIR game; aside from calling NVR=No, should a unanimous vote go for a concession to Iceland, that's what I'd put down. Yes, I do allow orders to be conditional on NRR vs a specific "r OTB" order, since this is something that "should" be published before the players are required to submit next season's orders. To same time, I call for conditionals instead. But since the rules permit--indeed, require--that results appear "first", such conditionals are acceptable here. For the unwanted, unnecessary convoy, I would rule that the convoy was irrelevant and adjudicate accordingly. Since I ENCOURAGE people to submit provisional orders ahead of time by 1 season (seldom heeded, I might add), I'd certainly have to accept an order of "A TUN H forever" so, yes, perpetual orders would be accepted. Phone orders, a reluctant Yes.

A/F Smy was a typo: just forgot to paint it out before running it.

Whew; anyway, I really do appreciate your writing at length (---Parts dealing with games and other items have been deleted---) for it tells ME when I don't make stuff clear. Such as when both Watson & Baumeister (RURITANIA and EGGNOG)

announced my "fold" just a few short weeks before the Leeder balloting closes, grrrrr. I've sent out some clarifying notices to various pubbers to use as short filler items to help clear the air on this. Maybe it will help me in the '80 poll.... Oh, and subs are optional because you don't need the issues at all to see your game results as you go. I have one player in that status now.))

"In three months I spent \$3,500 advertising in every daily, weekly and shopping center newspaper read in the area. We put ads on every radio station that covers the seacoast—AM, FM and even country and western. We got only a handful of takers."

Federal bureaucrats are dumbfounded. "It's never happened before, so we're not quite sure exactly what we do about money being returned to us," said Ed Leslie, a regional desk officer for the Department of Labor.

The Soviet mood: 'One of war'

A pseudonymous American living in Moscow has contributed a most important new insight into the decline of the West as seen from Russia.

Writing in the March 31 issue of *The New Republic*, "Robert Herr" reports on a multitude of conversations he has had with ordinary Russians over the last

several months. All predict an imminent war with the United States, in which "Soviet military power will crush the new flabby American military."

"The mood within the Soviet Union," Herr writes, "is clearly one of war." The "Russians perceive a weakness in America." A political information officer told him "how certain he was that in the next decade his country would be at war with either China or America. We should go to war sooner rather than later, he said, for if we wait another 10 years China may acquire the technology to beat Russia."

This Soviet officer wore jeans; he loved Stevie Wonder and American rock. "It's a shame to think that your country will be destroyed," he said. "Without America, this country would really be a prison. Such a shame."

Roy Medvedev, the famous physicist, told Mr. Herr that "the Soviet Union is moving in one direction — toward the strengthening of our military might . . . Our country is a military machine. We are continuing now as we did in World War II . . . We won because our system allowed the spending of colossal resources for one purpose alone — military strength . . . Americans are fools. They come to Russia, stay in our hotels, eat in the restaurants and find out that everything here is badly run . . . Then they return to the United States with the conclusion that since Russia can't run a hotel, it can't build a rocket either. They don't realize that we put everything into rocketry, that the government doesn't care whether or not anything is left over for the population . . . Americans cannot keep up with this kind of a system."

Medvedev added: "Nixon couldn't beat tiny Vietnam because the country was too divided to win a war. We

sent a few thousand troops down to Angola and we took over the place in just a few weeks."

Mr. Herr confesses that before he went to the USSR, he held views like those officially expressed by the early Carter administration, especially by U.S. SALT negotiator Paul Warnke, specifically "that the Soviet Union was ruled by responsible, conservative officeholders who would not risk their privileges with an expansionist foreign policy. It seemed absurd at that time to think in terms of the old bipolar world . . . But Russians have taught me that such notions as East versus West, however much the West may wish them to disappear, are still thriving in the East."

For those of us who are not experts, it is hard to know who is right about Soviet intentions.

Sen. Daniel Patrick Moynihan, in a brilliant, if loosely-constructed speech at the Naval Academy on March 22, cited the White Paper of the British Defense Ministry, which points out that "the Communist bloc has a 50 per cent edge over NATO in submarines, a 30 per cent edge in surface ships, three times as many tanks and heavy guns, and more than twice as many fixed-wing tactical aircraft — well beyond what can be considered necessary for purely defensive purposes."

Most of my friends, I find, are not aware of the actual amounts the U.S. has been spending on arms. Moynihan points out that we have not built a new strategic missile launcher since 1967. Half of our defense budget goes for salaries and personnel costs. Another 35 per cent goes for maintenance of facilities. Only about \$9 billion goes for strategic nuclear forces. For arms and ammunition, expenditures total barely \$20 billion.

By contrast, the Soviets spend far more than we do, a far larger proportion of their resources, and do not count most personnel costs in their military budget.

Perhaps — let us all hope — there will not be war. Yet in our national psyche, the mass media thrive on images of disaster. Our minds may say peace, but our imaginations are saying disaster.

Leonid Brezhnev is very ill. By the early 1980s, when Soviet power in virtually every sphere will exceed ours, even though there will still be a rough balance of ultimate terror, the Soviets will have a new government.

What sort of government will it be? It probably will be younger. "Very possibly," Moynihan points out, "it will be a government of uncertain or at least untested legitimacy, a government that might well desire a test of strength." Its power in relation to ours will be at an all-time favorable point.

The next eight years promise to be the most dangerous the United States has ever gone through. In 1962, when the Soviets had only 60 to 70 truly strategic weapons, while we had about 2,000 missiles and bombs, the Soviets did not hesitate to put missiles in Cuba. Now that they have parity, and even superiority in many respects, will they be more timid? They may well calculate that to delay is the more dangerous course.

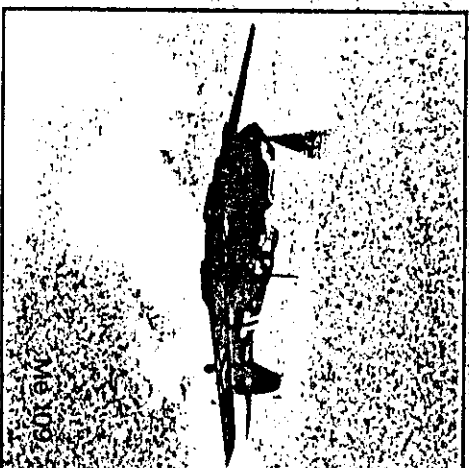
After 15 years of anti-war feeling, it is difficult for the public to face new realities. Such a turn was required once before, at the beginning of World War II. This time, we will not have the luxury of suffering a surprise attack and months of early defeats.

It is more than irony that peace is obtained by preparation for war. It is a moral responsibility.

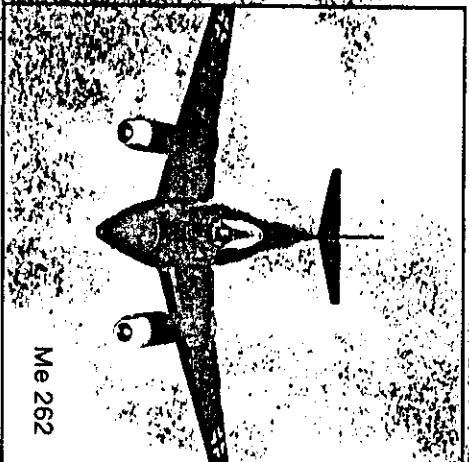

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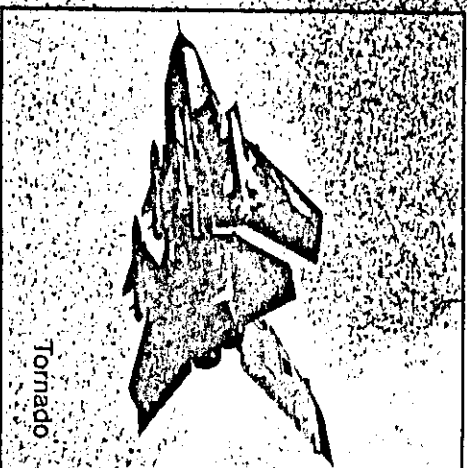
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DIPLOMACY TOURNAMENT - ORIGINS '79/DIPCON XII By John Boyer

Saturday, June 23rd: Round 1 is from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m.

Round 2 is from 6:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m.

Sunday, June 24th: Round 3 is from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m.

There will be a room for a meeting of postal Diplomacy hobbyists after the end of the second round. Information on the exact location of the room(s) is not known, but I have been assured it will be sufficiently large and air conditioned.

Entry fee has been set at \$2. You can pre-register if you have a copy of the schedule and pre-registration flyer. I'm sure you can get one from: Origins '79 c/o Strategy & Fantasy World, Valley Forge Shopping Center, King of Prussia, PA 19406.

There are several motels/hotels within 10-15 minutes of the campus. Also, there is dormitory lodging available. Cost for the latter is \$9 a night and includes linen. In all cases, I urge those coming to pre-register and reserve rooms as early as you can to avoid disappointment.

The Diplomacy tournament, as stated above, will be a 3 round affair. The Berch scoring system will be used. (printed in several postal hobby dipzines). The first two rounds will be set up randomly except to avoid family-relationships and Zipcode proximities. Of course, no one will play the same country twice. A cadre of stand-bys is being solicited. These people will be my "helpers" and for their sacrifice (to give up chances for prizes) to fill out those boards with less than 7 players, they will receive free passes to the con. I need 5 such helpers. Please write to me ASAP, if you are interested. You will have to be mature, reliable, and knowledgeable in the game. You will be expected to play a fair and dependable game, both as fill-ins (for a full 7 man game) and to replace drop-outs. You may even be required to play more than one game at a time, but we will avoid this if at all possible. A free convention pass is worth \$8.00. I will have to send in the names at least two weeks prior to the convention so that proper tags and allowances are made.
