The EASTERN FRONT WARGAME finally has some progress to report, as you will find on numerous pages this issue. If my presentation is too high or too low or too dumb or whatever for you, please let me know. It is an advanced variant, not at all familiar to even those within the wargaming community, so I'm not really sure how to best present it. Your comments will be appreciated. ALSO, for those of you able to follow it, there is a typo in the "Editor's comments" where I wrote that the Axis commander must "destroy 12 Soviet cities" for a chance at victory. That should have read "at least 12 Soviet cities in 1941" for a chance at victory. At best, I've seen as many as 20 cities go under, but with the Soviet defense what it is in this one, I doubt if we'll see that here. If Bill Shaffer continues his sample openings against the unnamed Soviet player, at least one, and just possibly both of THOSE might produce a 1941 total of 20, but that's up to them. This game is way too much work for me to effectively "GM" more than one. If they want to keep their own records, though, I'll act as intermediary and roll the dice, and report at intervals here.

STAR WARS will return in September for a brief 2-3 week run, according to everyone's favorite SF reporter, TONY WATSON of RURITANIA fame. (201 Minnesota St, Las Vegas, NV 89107). Also, he reports that the sequel is to have something about a bounty hunter out after Solo. I'll be glad to pass on whatever I hear, but for now, I have trouble enough just trying to find the Sunday comics that are running a SW strip. I only see the daily once a week, Saturday. Those are usually tackier--I hope I'm not missing anything good.

POSTAL WARNING TO ALL: effective July 15, the Post Office will start to really

enforce their new rule regarding minimum size (3½x5), AND, envelopes larger than the standard legal size (no bigger than the one this issue came in, that is), will incur a 7¢ surcharge due to having to be handled by hand. THAT will likely cause trouble for a LOT of publishers who fold their zines just once, staple it, and send it first class. A 5½x8½ could be considered what in postal jargon is a "flat" to which the surcharge applies, so if you get some zines later this month that arrive 7¢ postage-due, that's why. (I suggest you pay it and accept the zine, but you don't have to. You can mark the "postage due" cover "Refused" and leave it for the mailman to take back, and owe nothing. You can't have opened it, though. They'll return it to the pubber, and HE'll then pay.)

CRUDE OIL prices I mentioned last issue have since been updated, and the "un-controlled" price is going through the roof. The June 1 price (latest officially available) hit a flat \$22 a barrel. (Remember, it was \$15.10 December 31). One price we were just quoted was \$25 a barrel early this month, and that from a major. This exceeds the OPEC official ceiling price. If it goes up much more beyond the transport costs, it might become cheaper to buy Arab oil than to buy our own. Prices this winter are going to be fantastic. And Carter plans to run next year? PARIS: The French War Ministry is committed to world peace. To further this aim, no new offensives are planned, only defensive safeguards.

The Eastern Front wargame begins!

Soviet initial comments:

The opening problem is that you are outmanned AND outgunned. The Panzers can mass enough firepower to go anywhere they want. My decision was to make the line so strong that they could only do it in ONE place, one small sector. The danger is an overrun, 12 units in a pocket, and nothing between the Germans and Moscow.

Axis initial comments:

Well, here we go. I just hope the army lasts through the first winter. The untried units really provide an interesting twist and unknown to the game.

Rather than attack all or most of the units, I decided to make deep penetrations in the north and south and see if I can seal off most of the front line units, making them attack me. I don't know if this will work or even if it is the best strategy, but it's a start.

Editor comments: 1) Re: Soviet comments. The Soviet player's newness showed in his defense, as numerous sectors could have been overrun, and indeed, between this game and the two "sample" starts sent in by Bill Shaffer who is more knowledgeable of this game, numerous overruns WERE made. I think that the Soviet player lucked out in having only 8 units in the bag, as it could have been a max of 12, which would have been catastrophic.

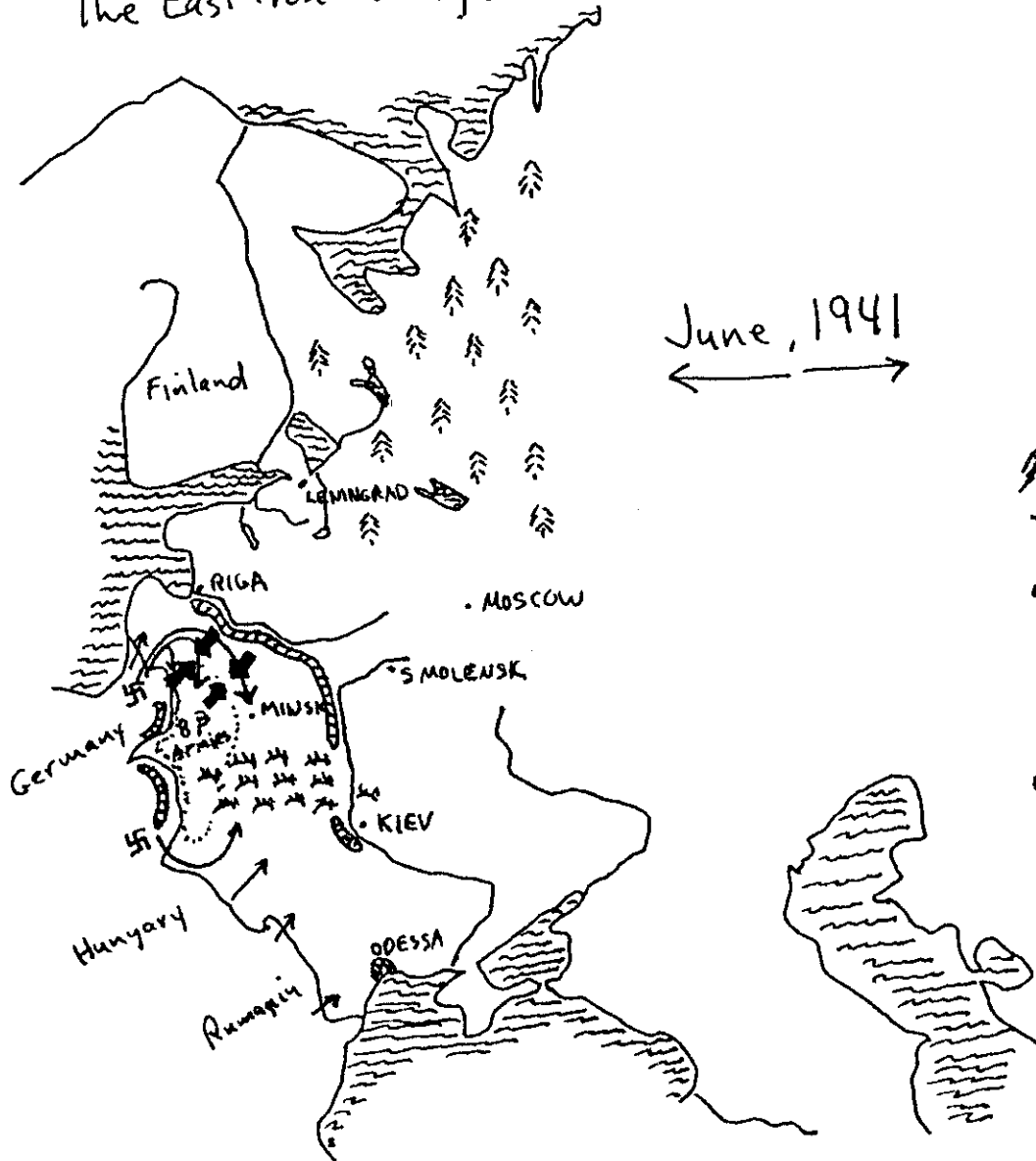
Re: German comments: The German plan sounds good, but unfortunately, the deep penetration in the north did not go deep enough, leaving the Russian with a doubled and overrun-proof line from the Baltic to Kiev for July, the second of the 3 best months Germany will have. Conversely, he has numerous good Soviet units either in the open for easy picking, or further isolation ($\frac{1}{2}$ the Soviet heavy Mech Corps are tied up in Brest and Kiev, e.g.). The German had terrible luck, getting exchanges in every attack that wasn't an automatic--still, the only one that really hurt was the big Minsk exchange. Those lost Pzkorps can't be taken back, as the $\frac{1}{2}$ -casualties-in-lieu-of-replacements is too costly in view of the pretty large July reinforcements due. So the war will go on with only 3 big "Panzerarmee" equivalents instead of the actual 4. He will receive the use of 3 handy air units, however, to partially compensate for this. The German bagged a reasonable number of Soviet units, but the pocket attacked out and SUCCEEDED in the main, taking out two infantry armies equivalence. The German won't notice the loss yet, but come late October and probable mud, their loss will begin to show.

As a rule of thumb, Germany needs to destroy 12 Soviet cities, that is, take them before their industry is removed. The USSR will be able to pull out 1 a month starting next month, so Germany needs to get about 7 more, or ten if we make allowance for removals under the wire. Brest is in the bag, but that means Germany must take the general line Rzhev-Kalinin-Orel-Kursk-Kharkov-Dnepropetrovsk before the winter snows come. He's sure to get SOME of them, but can he take them quickly enough? Kiev, having been declared a fortress, has no zone of control, so while strong, it's a gift bag for Germany. Watch next turn for Axis gains vs. these most vulnerable targets: Riga, Daugavpils, Odessa/Nikolayev. Coups in Finland, Hungary, and Bulgaria to try for allies more committed to the war are also a possibility. Germany's next big chance for critical-breakthrough-type moves will be the turn after next, his August 41 turn. Not a hell of a lot he can do for July now except to mop up the Kaunas group of open Soviet units, maybe force Riga and Odessa, and cross the Dnieper in force above and below Kiev. Other possibilities include forcing the central Dnieper and/or attacks to reduce Brest, and possible units shifted to Finland in preparation for any possible later coup attempt (as an insurance force). So, I'm predicting August will be more exciting than July, but let's see if these fellows can prove me wrong.

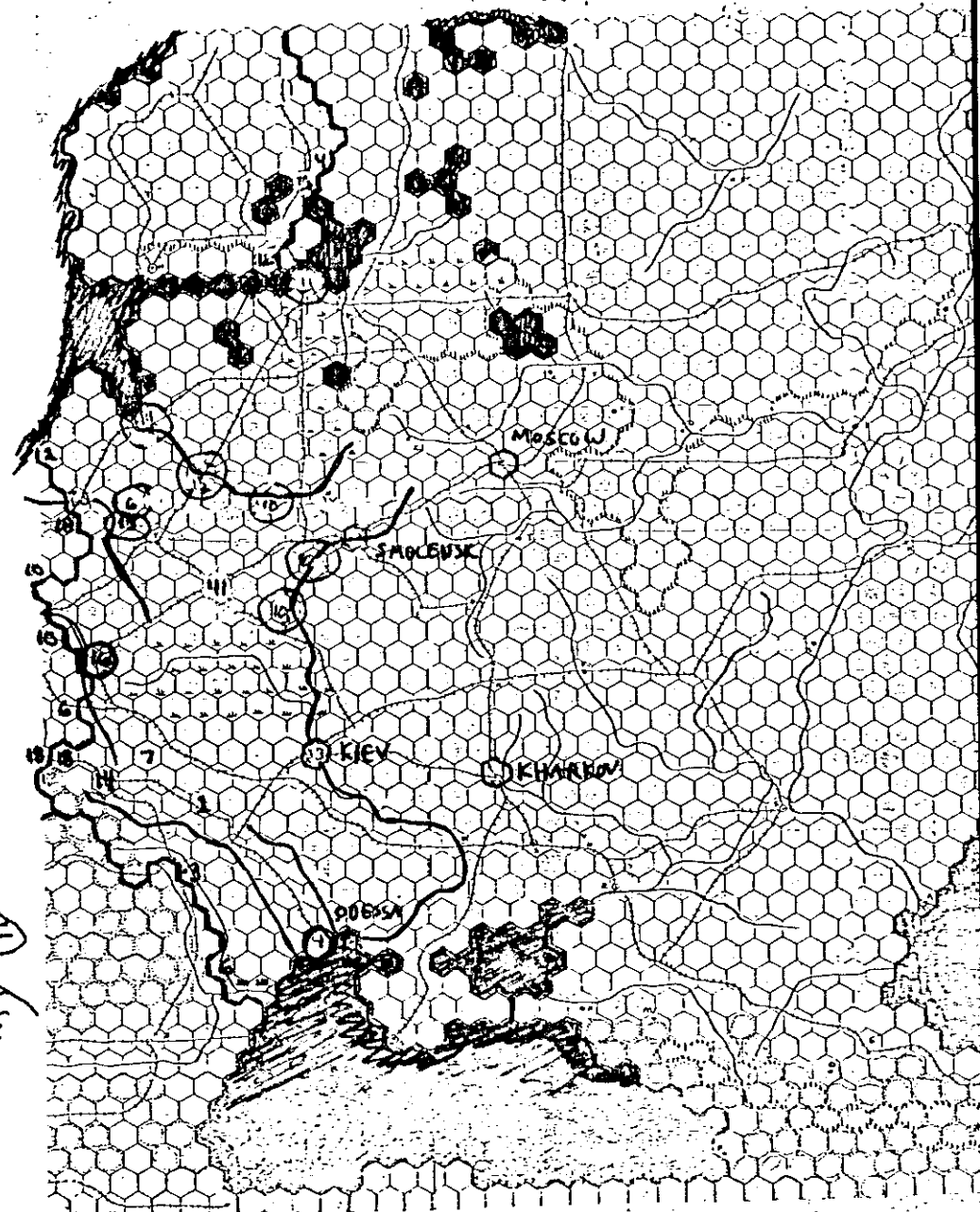
The East front Wargame

Wargame Commentary
From an Impartial Bystander:

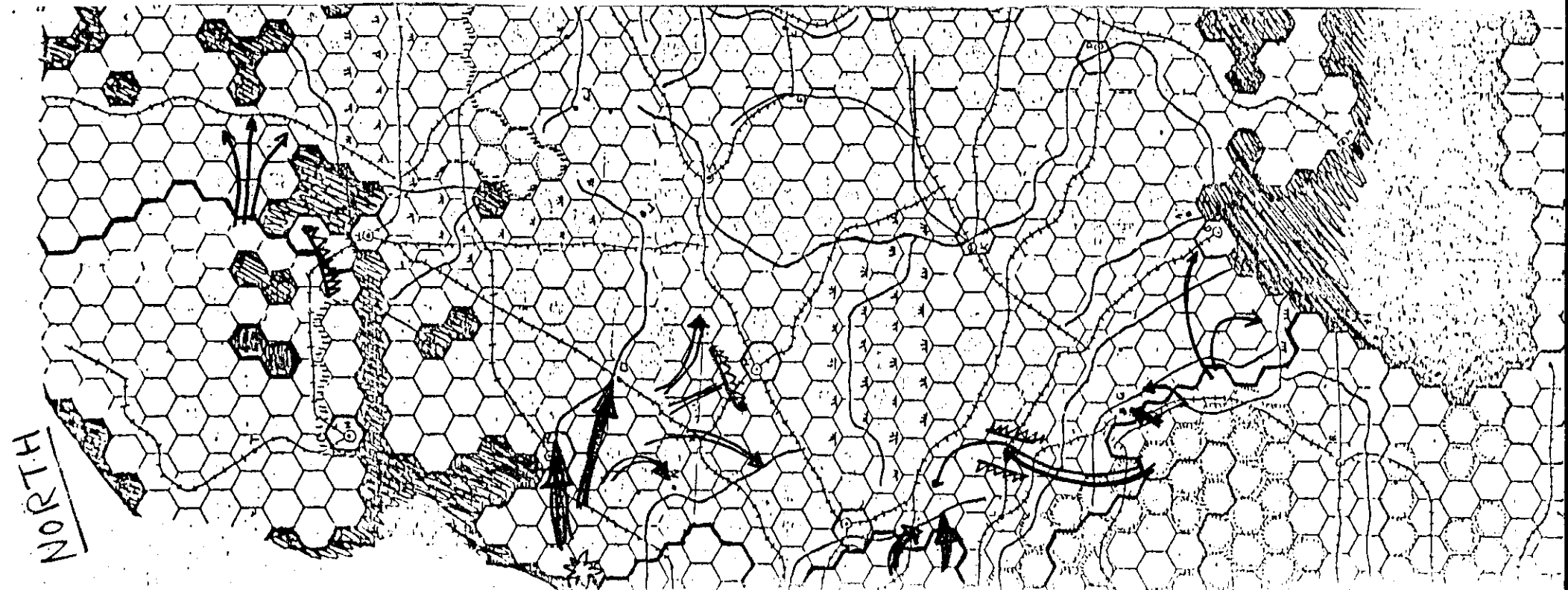
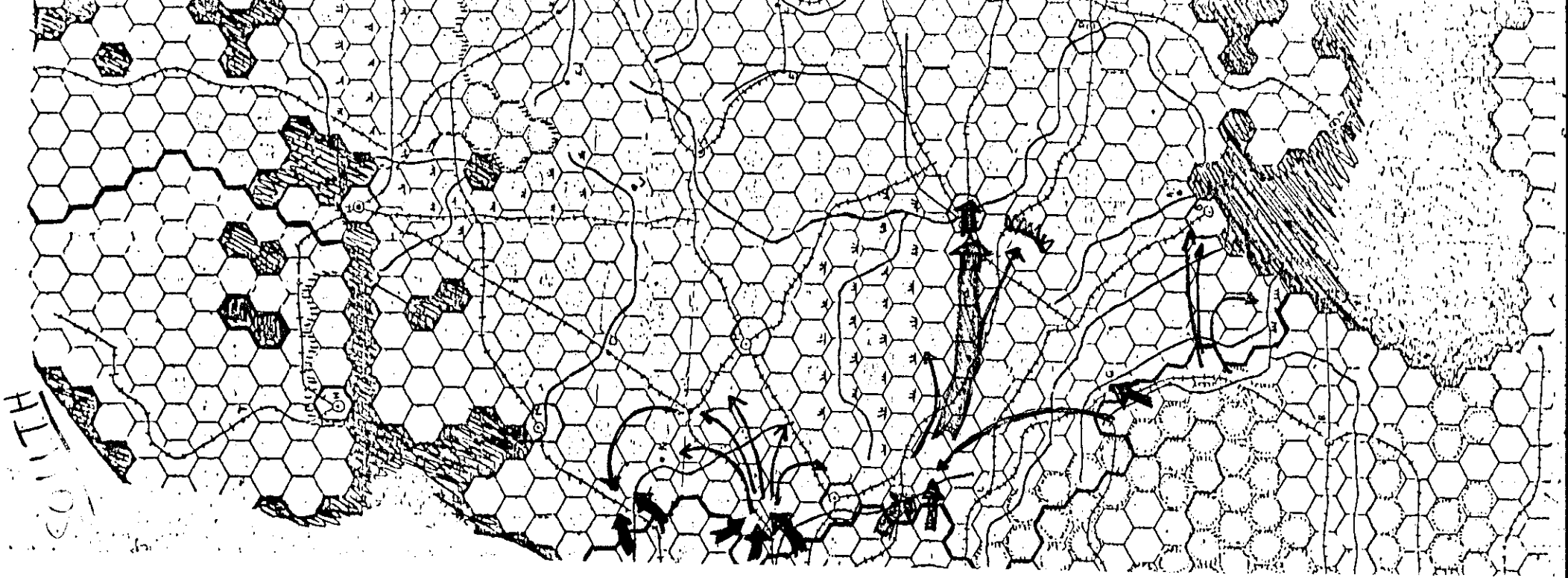
I know not who the Russian is in this game but it is quite obvious he has not been playing this version of the Eastern Front long. As a player of vast experience in this game I can see several short comings of this defense. One it opens a whole list of chances to the German player. Two of what I feel are the best options are one the Southern Thrust and you decide the game in a die roll for Kiev. The other being a northern thrust and keep the south clear for July.

First I will take the Southern Strategy. You can cut off 11/12 units and overrun the 9 in the key position of the Lvov gap and put a 2/1 on Kiev which is up graded to a 3/1 on turn one. The advantages of this are great. 1) if the 3/1 gets a DE only God and the stupidity of the German player can stop him from overrunning the whole damn heartland of Russia in 41. What I mean is that the Russian will have 11 units caught in the bag with being surrounded in June. That leaves only 12 units in the cream of the Axis ways in July. With the Dnieper line broken the next possible line is the Kharkov/Kursk/Dnepetrovsk line. You let me have a shot at that with the units that are required to get the 2/1 on Kiev, and by God I'll hit all three with a Stuka to boot, oneotta fall. If the Germans get a EX at Kiev not much will happen if you have a half way competent Russian. So as you can see why I call the Southern Thrust a die roll. Good for a quick game, but not much more.

I prefer the 2nd option. To go North in 41. I also can put 11 units in Isolation and crack the Riga/Daugavpils line. You say what good can this bring me? Well, after 4 years at this game with John I can damn sure say that the way to win this one is get Moscow and Or Leningrad in summer of 41. With 11 units in the bag I can do it in this one. With the fall of Daugavpils I can hit Leningrad next turn or go for Moscow. He can stop me from one but not both. The reason for going this way the Russian cannot lose a major city in the first 6 months without a whopping penalty. It is this penalty that kills them for me. I have not seen the German offense but, The Russian can feel quite secure in that I am not in this one. For if I was I think I could get a 41 Victory, and a sure victory in 42.

((To back up his claim, the author sent in two different attack plans, one representing each one he describes. His southern strategy, just as in the main game, came up with an exchange in a key battle, here the Kiev attack. This was a crippling loss, as 4 Panzerkorps, over 25% of the real 1941 armored force available, went down the tubes. Conversely, the author above bagged more units than did the regular Axis commander, and the 4 surviving armored corps in the central Ukraine face clear sailing to KHARKOV for July 1941, a not inconsiderable accomplishment. Also, please note that in both of the plans submitted by the above author, he took considerable pains to cross the West Dvina River (Riga-Daugavpils--Vitebsk) the first turn, unlike the Axis commander in the regular game. The crucial aspect of this is apparent by the impasse faced by the Axis forces in the main game, where a doubled line of very considerable strength exists from the Baltic to Kiev, with the fortress of Brest blocking the shortest rail access to boot, eliminating the chance of shifting major forces to a more promising front. Actually, then, Bill Shaffer's tries on the next page give the Axis a better chance in EITHER case than it actually turned out for the "regular" German player! On the other hand, Shaffer does have some 40 or so games under his belt, which also helps. If these two continue these side "test" games, I'll let you know in broad outline, how they turn out.))

GSA employees aren't the only scofflaws on the public payroll these days. Two former senators and 10 ex-representatives have skipped out of office leaving unpaid phone bills—some of them enormous. Ultra-liberal congressman Michael Harrington (D-Mass.), who chose retirement over defeat in 1978, heads the list of delinquents with a \$8,154 bill—and has no intention of paying it, according to an aide. Other delinquents include Rep. Charles Diggs (D-Mich.), recently convicted of a payroll kickback scheme, who owes \$1,250; ex-Sen. Vance Hartke (D-Ind.), \$1,767; Rep. Parren J. Mitchell (D-Md.; ACU rating of 8 percent), \$860; Rep. Walter E. Fauntroy (D-Wash., D.C.), the prime mover behind the D.C. Amendment, \$262; and Bob Bergland, now U.S. Secretary of Agriculture, who owes \$65.

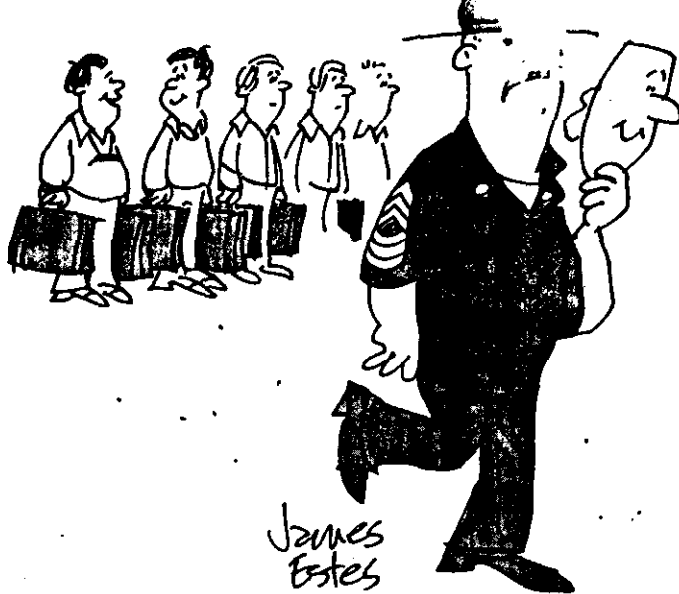

Not content merely to study wildlife, the federal government has also been housing and feeding it: \$100,000 in federal money recently went to Anheuser-Busch, Inc., for tending 205 Amazon parrots. The federal Fish and Wildlife Service seized the parrots in the fall of 1974 because they had been illegally imported, but then discovered it had nowhere to put the birds. So it asked Anheuser-Busch to keep the parrots in the company's Van Nuys, Calif., Busch Gardens and run up a tab. The Fish and Wildlife folks then forgot about the parrots for three years, until they received a care-and-feeding bill from Busch Gardens this past April.

Memorandum of Agreement and Covenant concluded 14 June 1979

1. Transfer of Office of Miller Number Custodian

Effective immediately, Gregory Costikyan succeeds Robert Sacks as Miller Number Custodian. At a date to be set by the acting Miller Number Custodian, Michael Smolin, at his convenience, not earlier than 30 June 1979 nor later than 31 August 1979, he will transfer all Miller Number operations to the new Custodian.

2. Initial Staff for the new Custodian

Control of the staff of the Miller Number Custodian rests fully with the new Custodian. Initially the Vice Custodian shall be John Leeder. Robert Sacks shall continue to serve as Associate Custodian for Projects with such responsibilities as may be agreed upon from time to time, initially the Miller Number Designator Recategorization project and the regular provision of a Known Variants Openings list for the Miller Number 'zine. Raymond Heuer and his successors as Director of Orphan Games, for as long as they are mindful of their duties to variant orphans and recognize the authority of the Miller Number Custodian, shall serve as Associate Custodian for Orphans, until and unless some alternate arrangement is agreed to by the Custodian and the Director, or the office of Director of Orphan Games is directly included in the Constitution for Variants. At the earliest opportunity (on conclusion of the Irish postal strike) Robert Sacks will tender to Dermot Garvey the posts of Associate Custodian for Europe and Orphans in Europe, provided he recognizes the authority of the Miller Number Custodian.

3. Constitutional Provisions


The Miller Number Custodian is an independent hobby officer responsible for the assignment of numbers for postal games of diplomacy variants. The Diplomacy Variant Commission (when it is reconstituted) has the right to advise the Custodian; no other group has any control over the Custodian. Should the office of Custodian fall vacant without any designated successor or Vice Custodian, the Commission shall elect the next Custodian. The Custodian may only be removed by an impeachment for cause by the Vice Custodian, or the previous Custodian if there is no Vice Custodian, adopted by the Commission after a juridical hearing. Cause for removal shall be refusal or inability to assign or have an Associate Custodian assign a valid Miller Number on presentation of information commonly required for such assignment, either in a consistent manner or as a deliberate act against any person or group. These Constitutional provisions shall be included in the Constitution for Variants.

4. Miscellaneous

The Miller Number Custodian has full rights to have published as the Miller Number 'zine the 'zine founded by Robert Sacks for that purpose, "Lord of Hosts", except for the personal coat-of-arms he used, but if the Miller Number Custodian should ever renounce "Lord of Hosts", all rights to publication as a private 'zine revert to Robert Sacks.

No Miller Number Custodian, nor any Associate authorized to assign Miller Numbers, will ever require payment or trade or other value as a prerequisite for the assignment of a Miller Number.

It is specifically understood under the Constitutional provisions that no radical change will be made in the Miller Numbers or Designators except on the considered and reasoned advice of the Diplomacy Variant Commission and the Miller Number Custodian Staff to which the Custodian concurs.

I wrote Mark on it, but the more I think about it, the more incomprehensible such stupidity seems to me. Here Mark, who did an admirable job in expanding on Ron Kelly's expose' of Tretick's crimes, gets my list of suggestions of responses to Tretick (primarily, that he be thrown out of all games across the face of the hobby) by jumping in to the DEFENSE of this same clown he has just shown to be a fraud and thief, whining that it would be unfair to punish Tretick in games that we haven't yet caught him screwing up. REVIEWS

'Zine reviews provide publishers and players alike with a valuable service. Publishers get a free plug, as well as (hopefully) helpful criticism, while players can get some idea of the qualities of 'zines which may be unknown to them. Although I only receive six 'zines at present, my opinion of each may be of some benefit to my subscribers.

However, I don't feel like reviewing 'zines, so I'll review chicken pot pies.

SWANSON (Campbell Soup Comp., Camden, N.J. 08101)

I had high hopes for this 'pie, based on Campbell's excellent TOMATO SOUP, but it just doesn't measure up. Considering what you get, the price is high at 52¢. A unique feature which other 'pies could do well to copy is the pre-punched air vents.

BANQUET (Banquet Foods Corp., St. Louis, Missouri 63102)

The FOL-SI-FIE of chicken pot pies. BANQUET is still my favorite 'pie although lately there're more potatoes and not as much chicken. An average price of 39¢ makes BANQUET a bargain.

MORTON (Morton Frozen Foods Div., Rye, N.Y. 10580)

Not as tasty as BANQUET -despite more meat- but a fairly close second. One odd feature which takes some getting used to is no pie shell beneath the crust. 35 minute deadlines.

SWANSON TV DINNERS (Campbell Soup Comp. -address above)

Though not strictly a pot 'pie, TV DINNERS deserve a mention. STD has many fine features, with an emphasis on S&T (steak & 'tators) and always has another vegetable and dessert. The rates are high -anywhere from 83¢ to \$1.85 depending on the contents- but usually worth it.

I hope nobody is offended by my opinions. I've tried to be objective, and welcome any rebuttals.

How Many Bullets for One War?

THERE are a lot of people waiting for a lot of people to take a definitive position on SALT II before doing so themselves. Sen. Henry Jackson is a valiant exception. Valiant because he has done his homework, which distinguishes him from most of the rest of the world, understandably dismayed by the awesomeness of the assignment.

A few days ago The New York Times' Anthony Lewis raised this year's version of what I call the Seymour Melman Syndrome, that there are more bullets in the world than there are people, so we don't need so many bullets.

Here are some figures which will help you in dealing with the Melman Syndrome.

During World War II, we dropped the equivalent of 500 Hiroshima-sized bombs (170 kilotons) on Germany. We killed a lot of Germans, but not, as we know, enough to save us the necessity of an invasion.

We dropped over twice as many tons of bombs on Indochina as on

we lost the war there, notwithstanding over a half-million American soldiers on the ground.

Now each one of our Minuteman missiles has three warheads, each one eight times as powerful as a Hiroshima bomb. Moreover, the projected MX missile will carry 10 bombs, each twice as powerful as existing Minuteman bombs. That means 10 bombs, each 16 times as powerful as the Hiroshima bomb.

One MX missile will carry more firepower than was dropped by all the bombs used in World War II plus Korea. SALT II limits ICBMs to 10 warheads each. Inasmuch as the Soviet SS-18 could carry as many as 40 MIRVed missiles, SALT II could have the effect of bringing down potential Soviet throw-weight by 75 percent per ICBM.

Since the force of an explosion has only a finite purpose, it is not clear what SALT hopes to effect by this apparent concession. The only conceivable purpose of forty 300,000-ton bombs instead of ten 30,000-ton

in the event you run short.

Why might one run short? Let us suppose the other powers snuffed out enough of your missiles that you were down to just one missile per major population center. But then, what circumstances would bring a superpower to take out some of the other superpower's missiles, when there were enough left to bring on suicidal retaliation?

We are dangerously close to asking, What is the point in the exercise? Defenders of SALT II have a terrible logical problem. They tell us we already have more than enough bombs to blow our respective land masses to smithereens, but then they tell us that without SALT II, the Russians would build more missiles. Why, if they already have more than they need?

And if President Carter is going to reassure those concerned about the looming Soviet advantage by launching a \$30 billion MX-MAPS program, what is the relevant economic point?

GETTING A JOB

Some 5 years ago, I had finally received a degree (BBA, business, accounting Major), and set about the business of finding employment. First, I went to all the big outfits in town: banks, insurance companies, utilities. Fortunately for me, as it turned out, none of them hired me. Oh, the school had lots of offices and departments and what-not for getting you a job, but unless you're an engineer, forget that. For non-specialist or advanced stuff, the only other reason those places are seeking you is because they're too atrocious to draw applicants off the street. Or they're trying to find some token minority-type to fill their gov't quota. So skip that. Out in the real world, regular companies pick from among applicants, they don't go beating the bushes trying to find them. Five years ago, the utilities were paying the average starting pay, \$650 a month, gross. Some private firms, like I started with, paid above average for starters, \$700 a month. (The clerk we hired in my section last month started at that, thanks to the Democrat's inflation). The state gov't pegged the bottom of the barrel wage, \$550 a month.

Well, after looking on my own for a few weeks, I went to the state employment agency. Most folks going there could care less about work; all they want is unemployment money. I surprised them and sought job references. As a veteran, they were glad to. (Seems they get federal brownie points for employing veterans). Non-veterans looking for work were virtually non-existent.) Well, they did have some, and I learned something from them. People who hire through the (free) state employment agency do so because again, the jobs they have to offer were below par, and "normal" (=fee) agencies wouldn't refer anyone to them except the bottom-of-the-barrel types anyhow. I'd decided that, if I hadn't found work in 2 months, i.e., mid-July, I'd go to an agency. Well, I did some recruiting duty for the Air National Guard for earnings, and then went to an agency, a regular fee-type one. That too was an experience. First, they were real glad and eager to see me despite the fact that I'd just called to inquire how things work with employment agencies: I didn't know a thing about them. The woman was very eager to get me in there, tho, and off I went, still in the ANG uniform. The key factor, other than their natural greed to get warm bodies out on job calls to earn them fees, was that as an accounting major, I had a salable skill, unlike, say, some dude with his degree in English, or International Relations, or Art Appreciation, or Black Studies. Even such nicely-titled degrees such as "Marketing" are of little real value aside from the Civil Service where the above-mentioned types are forced to go ("Here's my degree, make me a GS 7"). The schools prepare this Marketing Major for positions such as president of a company, vice president, or at the very least, major department head; unfortunately, the personnel man doing the hiring wants to know if you can fill that first-line supervisory job he's got open, not whether you can decide the finances of the whole corporation. The student learns to make command decisions, but the people hiring want to know if you can work the cash register for your night shift job they've got with Kinney Shoes. Accountants are one of those rare areas anymore where you have something approaching a useable skill right at the start, and thus the eagerness of agencies to place such people. (What would YOU do with someone with a BA in Art Appreciation, after all?) They were further pleased in that, when asked what type of job I was looking for, I told them "a straight 9-to-5, sit-at-the-desk-and-chug-it-out-type job". Apparently from their happy reaction, they get a lot of wet behind the ears kids who come in asking for jobs with lots of "challenge", "excitement", and "contribution to the good of humanity" crap. I know there aren't any such animals, aside maybe from that of street cop, which is too dangerous for me. I figure, humanity can take care of itself and I'll get a job to take care of ME.

Now, how do the agencies work? The way mine went, it was a flat 10% of the gross annual income figure they got you, prorated if you worked less than 2 months. An important fact is that THEY want to be paid within 10 days of placing you, so don't think you can tell them to take $\frac{1}{2}$ your first 3 checks. They want it all, quick,

so if you don't have a couple of thousand stashed away or on call, check out some loan outfits at the same time. (The agencies are real friendly until it comes to the meaty stuff, like how do you propose to pay their fee next week. They want to waste no time nor effort with deadbeats without a dime, after all.) Still, from my experience, (I got hired by the first place I went, even before prospect #2 could interview me, for reasons that would make a second article on hiring), the fee you pay is well worth it. The agency doesn't want to place you in a joint that you'll leave in disgust after 2 weeks, after all. It is to their advantage to place you where both you and the employer will be happy, since it means money in their pockets. Never deal with a hole-in-the-wall outfit, but any large agency earns the chunk of bucks they hit you up for. They know where the jobs are, and they know where the highest-paying jobs are, and know what you're worth out there in the world, which you may not know. So if you're looking for a serious job, go in and lay it out for them, and be able to show you can pay, and you'll be placed pretty well.

Finally, salaries. Oklahoma used to be 25% below the national level for wages and cost-of-living, and probably still is 10-15% below. Here, a starting accountant can get \$1000 a month pretty easily; work out your own from there. (Thus, engineers could go 50% above that, while English majors and such can at best go straight to the Civil Service schedule, unless you want to enlist in the Services or the Post Office.) And women are discriminated against, and can expect 10% less if they can get hired at all.

Any of you just getting started are welcome to send in your own experiences, even if not for publication. I'd be interested in hearing how the market is outside of Oklahoma. (Anyone really wanting a job here can get one. That may not be true in the northeast, for instance. I don't know). Let's hear from you!
