THE EMPIRE STRIKES BACK

"I had originally not intended to review this, on the assumption that everyone would have seen it by the time this issue came out. But I read in the latest BRUTUS BULLETIN that EMPIRE has not reached there yet, so perhaps a few words are in order.

First let me say that if you read anywhere that Empire is disappointing due to its ending, or that, as a local "critic" said, it suffers in comparison with the original, - don't you believe it. EMPIRE is every bit as good as we had hoped when a sequel to STAR WARS was announced.

EMPIRE is filled with special effects. A number of viewings will be required to get full appreciation since EMPIRE does not, as STAR TREK did in an endlessly boring fashion, dwell on each special effect. You only get a brief sighting of the snow beast, the viscera of the Tauntaun, the tanks, etc.

The tanks in particular, are a good effect. In the blurbs for EMPIRE on TV, the tanks were shown repeatedly. I thought their design a little hokey, since they look like a giant animal in design. But the sheer realism with which they are presented lead you to accept the design.

The real achievement of the film is Yoda, trainer of Jedi Knights for 800 years. I knew Yoda was to be done by Frank Oz, and so expected to have to exercise some suspension of disbelief. I did not. I don't know how Yoda was done; I imagine he is a combination of techniques, but the people responsible deserve some sort of award. If you don't know who Frank Oz is, I'll tell you after the film, so you don't go into it with some preconceived notions.

The only part of the film which I really had difficulty accepting was the city in the clouds-and the token black, Billy Dee Williams. The matte paintings used for the city's background looked like that to me. I never got any illusion or realism from them, though perhaps others might. They were well done, but I just got no illusion of depth. As for Williams, I can only conjecture that he was added to the cast because of the noticeable whiteness of the STAR WARS human cast. I have no feelings about Williams one way or the other, but his character is not a sympathetic one, and I don't even consider him on Our Side at all. But these are minor quibbles, and I don't mean that the film was disappointing because of them. It was in no sense disappointing.

Something should be said about the ending. NOTE: if you have not seen the film, and have no idea how it ends, STOP READING NOW. The following may reveal things you would rather find out by viewing the film.

It has been said that EMPIRE does not end; there are too many loose ends. This is not strictly true. EMPIRE does not end only if you consider it inevitable that Our Side is going to win. If you consider this from the Empire's point of view, the film does have an ending. The rebels are soundly defeated, they are driven from their final base, Solo has been turned over to his creditors, and while Leia and Luke are still free, they have no plans in progress. The only carry-over, besides Luke's training, which it is not inevitable that it will be resumed, is an attempt to rescue Solo which is not guaranteed of success. We have been lead into believing that unless a movie ends with success for our side, it hasn't ended. By that token, the Vietnam war didn't end. But we do know that it will end happily, but three years to wait is a long time.

I've already gotten a chance to see THE EMPIRE STRIKES BACK twice, and it's a fine follow-up to STAR WARS. We were very discouraged the first time, as it seemingly has no end! (Instead of credits, I expected : TO BE CONTINUED to flash up on the screen) However, the whole thing was far better the second time, as I could just enjoy the show and not worry about the end, and the show is FANTASTIC! This one even has a slow enough pace to give the characters a chance to develop some, but without dwelling on them. Contrary to John Michalski's fears of long ago, Billy Dee Williams is a welcome addition to the cast. You also learn some new bits about my hero, Darth Vader, that just tossed me out of my seat. Great movie, I give it six stars, just like I rated STAR WARS, with the only drawback being that you literally must see it twice to really enjoy it. Eat your heart out Tony Watson!



OK, folks, now for my views. EMPIRE opened here June 18, and I managed to see it three times the first week although missing the first OKC show: I was #336 in line at a theater that holds 330. The lines are down now though, and you no longer need to buy tickets 2 hours ahead of time to get in. 45 minutes will do.

Part of that is because no sequel can ever capture the magic of the first, and the thing that made STAR WARS incredible instead of just great was the fannishness it created in folks like Tony Watson (24 viewings) or me (14 so far) or even people who were less impressed by it (Greg Costikyan, 5) who would go back many times. I will see EMPIRE another 3 or 5 times, but honestly, it is because it is STAR WARS material as much as for the intrinsics of EMPIRE.

Not that EMPIRE is at all bad. It is excellent. However, as I have said before, I agree fully with Tony Watson's seeming overstatement that STAR WARS was the greatest movie of all time. It is the first, and quite possibly the only, new 'classic' fairy tale story to come along since Walt Disney's early classics of many decades ago that has really established itself in the public mass mind. These other followup stories will help cement it in, but not really rival it. They can't. STAR WARS was truly a classic story, and not a new story. It contained all the basic elements of adventure, youth, wisdom, beauty, etc. in a raw good-vs-evil tale in which courage and sacrifice and determination (and a touch of mysticism) triumph over evil. What more can be done to something like that?

Nothing. And EMPIRE, to its credit, does not attempt to. As Dick Martin writes, it does not seem to end as STAR WARS did; yet the first words we see (without realizing what it means the first time) right after the words STAR WARS flash their familiar and heart-warming logo on the screen, are "Episode V". And that is what EMPIRE is, an EPISODE. A day in the life of... that type of thing. We see what is; what happens then; and then...the credits! This is as it should be. STAR WARS was complete in and of itself. EMPIRE is part of a new class of films, and shows the way these others will be (or at least can be) handled. It creates a lot of potential for expansion. Probably one of the most intriguing to me was this quiet exchange in the darkness as the pale glow of Luke's engines shift across Dagobah: Ben: "That boy is our last hope". Yoda, faintly: "No, there is another". Think about it. Do you know what THAT could mean, or lead to if handled right? The 'ending' also creates a situation unique in the history of film. It seems to me that you could now make TWO films, one about Luke and Leia vs the Empire, the other Lando and Chewie seeking Han, and have the last few minutes of BOTH films identical! Tie them in perhaps along the way at points, but tie it ALL up at the end. Quite a challenge, but the type of thing that the Lucas efforts might well handle.

There are some loose ends that are too loose for me though. I didn't notice the background paintings that Bob mentions: guess that I didn't expect to see actual bustling activity out there. To me, most of the minor 'quibblings' I might have are in the initial sequences. The animals move stiffly, though this might be assigned to the cold. Still, I've come to expect such miracles from Lucasfilms that I would have thought they'd move better than they did. The innards looked too much like clear balloons; the snow beast was identical to something in a Christmas special the kids saw on TV last year, something about an abominable snow monster that later gets its teeth pulled. These are just flashes. The serious loose ends come later, though less obvious. Toward the end, for instance, Lando announces that the Empire has taken over the city and advises everyone to leave: to someone paying close attention to the story line, this is presumably a scare tactic he uses to create a panic in which they can safely escape, not being noticed amid a mass exodus from the cloud city. Yet we see no evidence of it either on their initial escape or after they return to rescue Luke. Not another ship in the sky save the traditional 3 or 4 sentry ships of the Empire. The most irritating spot to me is the dialogue as Han goes down. Having seen the film, you know what it was. Now let me ask you: if Han says exactly the same things in the same order, but Leia just says "Han!" and abruptly cuts it off, wouldn't we get the same effect without the clearly phony schmaltziness? He can even keep the "I know" response as he's lowered, and the only difference is in greater believability and greater faith in keeping with the whole tone and fabric of the film setting. One final thing, not a flub per se, but a danger. Bob didn't mention the blockbuster item that comes out in EMPIRE, and Dick only alludes to it. I will keep with that, since some of you out there might be so degenerate as to not have seen it, or, like Jack Frost, too cheap to pay these first run prices now. So

nothing will you get from me on it directly either. However, you sentient beings who have seen EMPIRE at least once know of course what it is; do you see the dangers here to the story and HISTORY we have opened? IF the claim is true—and I am assuming for now that it is, since the episode of Luke's encounter with the image on Dagobass has no comprehensible meaning to me other than as a precursory confirmation of this claim—there are serious dangers here. Historically, i.e., in STAR WARS, Luke's entrance into the story is virtually an accident. The droids drop in out of the blue and involve him, heavily. Yet aside from the story of his father having fought for the Rebellion and having been a Jeddi, Luke is only a face in the crowd, the right guy in the wrong place at the wrong time. Yet look at what we now have. Look at the situation, the tie we have when, as Luke escapes at the very end, he is 'called' and answers. Given this tie, will we have another movie where the Empire has to SEARCH OUT any rebel position Luke is in? Indeed, will Luke be able to work directly with the Rebellion at all anymore, or is he now, as Ben was, virtually "feelable" by anyone strong with the Force, presumably even the Emperor himself? This might be good, of course. Luke can wage a separate campaign, can become another Ben, or can even go over to the Dark Side and become a baddie who maybe just goes out in a final gesture of good. But if the latter, we come to Sergeant's point that the Rebellion might well become crushed. I don't see the end of EMPIRE as he does, as the Hoth base was at least as temporary as any, hardly their "last base" in the "final" sense of the term, just in the sense of "most recent" base. Indeed, the last scene gives a BATTLESTAR GALACTICA image of an ongoing trek by hardy freedom loving survivors, etc, etc. But aside from the "good-guys-always-win" idea, why should this Rebellion be any less expendable than was Alderaan? We are still left with Yoda's "another". And remember who and WHAT Yoda is, and can do. "Another" need not be in even the current century there! (This aspect is especially important in that STAR TREK was tied up a long time by Leonard Nimoy's anxiousness to disassociate himself from the Spock image. What if a former nobody like Hamill should decide his career lies elsewhere than in Episode 22 of the Luke Skywalker/Andy Hardy/Charlie Chan series?) The bombshell that EMPIRE drops on us then can have many effects down the line. I just hope it doesn't tear up the line. (E.g., one might ask, why didn't the Empire visit Tatooine much sooner?) The bombshell is tinkering with the very basics of the STAR WARS aura potentially, and that's what bothers me.

But, enough of this jumping on the exceptions. Let's get on to the general cases, the excellence of the movie overall. It has many high marks. The characterization, naturally, moves out of the strict stereotypes that were forced upon STAR WARS. Here we have people, and people with established relationships (sort of) with each other, rather than just epitome-roles to fill. They handle this well, and still keep the light side in there well too. The look Luke gives after Leia's buss is outstanding; I crack up every time I see it, as does most of the audience over 15. Han's banter, the humorous and earthly "it's not my fault" parallelism of Han and Calrissian, the place and character of the droids, is all excellently handled. And as Dick mentioned, my fears of EMPIRE yielding to the absurd racist BS flung at it, mercifully are unfounded. The Calrissian character is so well done, and so properly done, that his race is irrelevant. That is as it should be. I am very pleased that they got over that hurdle so well, without selling out. The battle scenes are again masterpieces; especially well woven in with the humor (did you detect that when the second admiral calls for "evasive maneuvers" and those huge Star Destroyers are falling all over each other, it's funny?), the air scenes, the ground battle, all are outstanding effects. Also great was the way the writers went beyond merely creating a straight story for you to follow, one step ahead of you: they instead opted to go three steps ahead, and the surprises show. Did you expect the asteroid result? COULD you? We've all seen swordfights from Zorro to Blackbeard now to Vader, yet even having read SPLINTER OF THE MIND'S EYE, the end of the Luke-Darth contest still took me by surprise. It should have been an even greater surprise to those of you who never read SPLINTER. How often did Zorro pull off a stunt like THAT? As Bob said, the "tanks"—"crawlers" I believe they were called in the film—were believable. At first sight (I never saw them in any commercial) I too thought them a little hokey, but upon reflection, to have vehicles that could traverse Hoth, Tatooine, or even Dagobass out there, wouldn't you actually NEED something like the Crawlers? The impression of their massiveness is definitely a high point of the special effects people. Vader's command

shell may have been a little overdone, but it does go well with his nature. We even get what seems to be a glimpse of him without his helmet for just a moment, which heightens his mysterious nature. That part is well played, both in this one and in the original. This time he has more dialogue, and is more of a direct participant; he comes across well. I saw it the fourth time June 29, and I understand the shows are still selling out, although the midnight show has been dropped from the schedule. For as long as it's here, it will provide something pleasant to fall back on whenever a spare few hours present themselves. Wargame opponents are hard to find, but as long as STAR WARS or now EMPIRE is around, there's something to enjoy out there. Too bad it's \$4 a throw though...

Basically, the salient points that impressed me are the new uses for indirect fire weapons, a main thrust of the article. The 'good' parts cover how you can lay minefields even in the enemy rear area via shelling, then pull such cute tricks as to shell the minefield you just laid to suppress attempts at clearing the minefield. If an enemy unit gets stuck in it, not only can you shell them, but you can fire-lay a new minefield behind them to slow up supplies and engineers, etc, that might try and come up to help. the vote. SCANDALOUS! I don't know, maybe it's nothing.

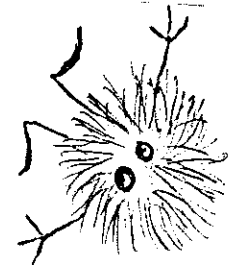

The Second Blind Madman Game

IS OVER. GARY HOWE'S FRANCE WINS IN FALL, 1907
Here is the complete history.

A brief recap: Each player could see all provinces of his home country as long as he still owned a single supply center in it. They were also told who and what was in any foreign supply center they owned, through the turn they lost it. "NSO" and "NSU" were used as normally occurred, so one could hold and "look" to some extent by ordering supports for other areas.

Each season listed below will show what the big picture was, plus "other events" notes that each player was informed of. I suggest that you set up a gameboard and play this thing through season by season if you really want to replay the feel of the game activities.

Russia backed off on Austria, and Austria knows it. Perhaps it was just for "security". Austria also knows that Italy tried for Trieste, but Italy doesn't know if Austria knows. (Had Austria had a unit holding in Trieste, the hold order would not indicate it was unseccuessfully attacked). England is lulled by his standoff over Bel by Ger rather than by France, and of course doesn't know of Fr F Iri. France palyed very safe, and it cost him Burgundy. The big surprise is that Russia ordered F Bla back to port, and then found the order failing! This could only be either a Turkish unit in Arm or an Austrian unit displaced from Rum that turn that had been ordered to Sev.

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I see that I added commentary to page 1, then didn't when I typed page 2 a week or two later. Hmm. Anyway, what happened was that in Spring 02, the Madman made a major and massive lunge eastwards, one which would never be reversed. The Madman died with Vienna one of his last centers, and never again threatened the new leader, France, but instead acted as a front man for him in so far as keeping all potential opponents looking away from France. 1903 saw Turkey open with a cute trick, convoying A Con-Sev in the face of an oncoming Austria, but this is typical Shaffer. Russia annihilated the Sev garrison in the fall while Austria supported himself into a vacant and abandoned Constantinople, but Russia would never return to Turkey, while Turkey would make a surprising comeback from this FO3 low point. Italy is making a mild resurgence as the Madman goes way down. England completes the takeover of Scandanavia which he would hold stubbornly throughout the game, even at the cost of the English homeland itself.

Just as Austria makes gains in the east, he gets bit hard in the west, and the cut support of A Bud shows him that Russia is not benevolent either. The Austrian order of F Con-Bla was cute, but everyone wants into or thru the Black Sea, and Austria would never get it. France is gearing up to move across the Med now, but no one knows it. The French campaign in Germany and England proceeds methodically vs token resistance. The madman orders only add emphasis on the new danger front for Austria.

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Austria's build of a fleet was its salvation. Italy ordered well, but could not count on the cut of support for F Adr. Italy had an excellent year with a +2, but Austria is ready and positioned to go on the offensive. The repeated order of F Con-Bla again by Austria shows good offense-mindedness. It only served to keep Turkey from gaining Sev in reality, but shows Austria's intent. England begins its long slide downwards now in earnest: those units committed to the Scandanavian front will never be called home.

England has written England off, but continues to vigorously defend Scandanavia against any aggressor, insuring that France has no opponent on the northern front. The French romp continues.

France completes his conquest of England and Italy, giving him all of 4 homelands (Fr, Eng, Ger, It) plus the neutrals of Spa-Por, Bel-Hol, Den, and Tun. Everyone except the madman survived, even the CD Russia almost tying for 3d place!

One of the bad parts of these games is the lack of interplay between players. There is virtually no way of knowing if they're even in the game with you yet, let alone telling you the truth, so a "why bother" fatalism seems to take hold. One of the most telling points is that the winner himself has expressed his dissatisfaction with the way these things play. And note that Gary not only won this one, but drew (1/3) of Iid, the first blind madman game. This is not true of all; at least one player above has expressed his willingness to enter the 'next' one I run, and eagerly so, but I believe that for the foreseeable future, I'll let them drop. My own experience with games like this run by others has been poor also. Personally, I think that these type games are more fun to GM than to play in, and shouldn't be less interesting than a normal game to the player, but there are obviously mixed views on this. Anyhow, it is an awful lot of work to do them, and it will be a LONG time before I consider another. It was fun, but I'm glad they're over.
