

There is no game#ee, players must maintain a sub or trade. Subs are eight for \$2. Sub credit is awarded at the rate of four issues per page, inculding press. CONTRIBUTIONS ARE GREATLY ENCOURAGED. L is six full sheets of assorted insanity typical of the eastern zines I've noticed. I kind of hated to turn down his trade offer, but don't have much room left for paying customers who ARE still trickling in. Issue six contained a feature story two pages long on "GRILLED CHEESE", where to buy it, where NOT to buy it, how to make it, etc. Zany, but typical of what we publishers are forced to run to fill these issues! ( $\vee$ ). A clever product.

Der FLIEGENDE HOLLANDER Don Wileman et. al.; various addresses in Canada and the US. DFH arrived unhetalded, but was impressive by its size and bulk of material. LDENS EXCLUSIVE giving quite an indirect compliment/plug for them both)) up with some very interesting information. It was brought to our attention that there were quite a few games that were dropped from the production line just prior to Origins 77. As a service to our subscribers we want to pass on some of the information about these games. This is not the entire list but a selection of what we considered to be some of the better games.

- "TRUCKIN' USA": Two to four players. Game covered all of the aspects of big rig trucking; finding a load, speeding, drinking beer, beating up Hippies at truck stops and in general all of the fun things that truckers do while traveling cross-country. Player with the most money after paying all fines and repairs to his truck is the winner. Rules are fairly simple and the Smokie CRT was easy to understand. Game was dropped due to the high cost, \$532.00. Game included board of the United States, four semi and one Highway Patrol markers, die, rules, and four CB radios (antenna and battery packs not included).
- "THE ALAMO": Box advertising read; "See if you as General Santa Anna can take a handful of Mexican volenteers and over-run three thousand crack trained American troops held up in a fort." There was much controversy over the apparent discrepency of facts. We, here at LDENS, tried to contact the game designer but he, Jose Morales, was not available for comment.
- "ARMS RACE": A real fun game to play. The main problem was the small size of the board. The board was 4" by 4". There were over six thousand cardboard pieces representing ICBM's and anti-ICBM's. Each player would start by picking up as many pieces as he can with one hand and then set up behind a divider that separated the two players. Then they would offer to get rid of x number of ICBM's if the other player would get rid of x number of ICBM's. At the and of each game year each country would increase his stockpile by 150%. One player could . attack the board at any time he wished and then the other player has the opportunity to retaliate and sendup available anti-ICBM's. The game was dropped because no one could up with any winning requiements.
- "IN THE RING": A true to life boxing game with dives, tax law evasions, closed circuit TV rights. Game used the same style CRT as in Avalon Hills WS&IM. Dropped due to the amount of violence that seemed to stem from the game.
- " THE CIA": A good game for those with imagination. Each player has a different objective (Political overthrow, spying on subversive , groups, cover-ups, etc.) The game didn't play too well because of its major drawback. The major drawback being that there were no rules.
- "ZINE MAKER": Each player starts the game by selecting scard that indicate how he will have to run his zine. Possible cards are; mimeo offset printing, or ditto machines; 2,3,4 week deadlines; amount of free time availible; and number of contributing editors. The game incorporates certain problems for the publishers such as; "Player NMR's and all stand-bys are stricken by the plague", Mimeo machine breaks down", and "GM goes bankrupt and subscribers storm his house." Game playtested well but was dropped because of the real frustation and mental problems that it was causing the players.

## A Cosmic Calendar

CARL SAGAN, professor of astronomy and space sciences at Cornell University

human beings are very young. Significant events in our personal lives are measured in years or less; our lifetimes in decades; our family genealogies in centuries; and all of recorded history in millennia. But we have been preceded by an awesome vista of time, extending for prodigious periods into the past, about which we know little—both because there are no written records and because we have real difficulty in grasping the immensity of the intervals involved.

Yet we are able to date events in the remote past. Geological stratification and radioactive dating provide

information on archeological, paleontological and geological events; and astrophysical theory provides data on the ages of planetary surfaces, stars, and the Milky Way galaxy, as well as an estimate of the time that has elapsed since the earliest event about which we have any record—the Big Bang explosion, which may have been the beginning of the universe.

The most instructive way I know to express this cosmic chronology is to imagine the 15-billion-year lifetime of the universe (or at least its present incarnation since the Big Bang) compressed into the span of a single year. Thus foreshortened, every billion years of Earth history corresponds to about 24 days of our "cosmic year." I present this cosmic calendar in three forms: major dates in the January-to-November period; a daily calendar for December; and a close-up look at the late hours of New Year's Eye.

The construction of such tables and calendars is inevitably humbling. For example, it is disconcerting to find that in such a cosmic year

time from the waning of the Middle Ages to the present occupies little more than one second.

Yet, despite the insignificance of the instant we humans have so far occupied in cosmic time, it is clear that what happens on and near Earth at the beginning of the second cosmic year will depend very much on the scientific wisdom and the distinctly human sensitivity of mankind.

#### JUNK MAIL

NO, this is NOT an article about the BRUTUS BULLETIN. Rather, it is an article to both inform you of a bad situation and an appeal for your assistance in combating it. The topic is the proverbial 'junk mail'. I define the latter as all that undesired stuff that appears in your mailbox trying to screw you on some deal you neither need nor want. And, it gets delivered there by hand, right to your door, for one and seven-tenths cents. At least that's what the stamp shows, if not a bulk rate permit number. Actually, it costs just as much as your own letters do to deliver, of course, only theirs are usually heavier. YOU pay the difference. You do so every time you mail a letter. Your 13¢ stamp ia about 8¢ to carry itself and 5¢ to carry all that crud to your mailbox, since it's First Class mail that carries the burden of all the magazines, bulk mailings, and 3d/4th class freight moving at a loss. It doesn't quite make it ALL up, of course, for postal salaries are so high that all the First Class mail the mailboxes could hold couldn't cover them; but, your first class letter is the \$ workhorse of the system.

"So what" you say? Well, here's what. You might think you're getting back at these folks by saying "I throw all that stuff out unopened anyhow". No, you're making a big mistake. Remember, you've ALREADY PAID the subsidy to deliver that crud to your home; why do them the favor of tossing it out for your garbageman (whom youalso pay) to haul it away? Yes, I said "favor". I do NOT do them that favor. I do the following: 1) Open the stuff 2)throw away the envelope or face sheet or whatever has your name on it 3)take out the Business Reply Cards/Envelopes, if any 4) tear the advertisements up 5) stuff them back into the Business Reply envelope, and 6) MAIL ALL OF IT! The reason for doing so is simple. 'Business Reply' mail is first class mail. Who, if anyone, SHOULD be paying first class rates, and LOTS of it? The people who are stealing a nickel from us every time we mail a letter, that's who. That Good Housekeeping your wife or mother gets cost you a lot more than \$7 a year; at least do yourself and the rest of us a favor by mailing (blank, of course) all those reply cards inside. They contribute9¢ each, plus a few cents surcharge. In this way, the outfits bending your ear with their come-on ads fork over at least a token to the first class kitty. Two cards will CONTRIBUTE about as much gross as Good Housekeeping paid to deliver that one-pound zine to your door. 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### Bureaucratic Blunders



The Ohio Division of Wildlife used as many as five agents, including two undercover agents, to investigate and prosecute an 11-year-old boy for selling fishing worms and crawfish in his parents' front yard. Jeff Gyde was selling fish bait without a permit, which neither Jeff nor his parents knew was required. Over two weeks Jeff sold \$4.50 worth of bait, \$1 of which was to two undercover state agents.

The California Energy Commission has collapsed under the weight of its own paperwork: While the five-member commission was meeting in a second-floor office, the adjoining storage room crashed onto an outdoor garden. According to one commissioner, the only thing in the room was a bookcase, plus 1,000 copies of the commission's 1,600-page biennial report.

Department of Agriculture employees have named their cafeteria in honor of Alfred Packer, a Colorado pioneer whose life, according to Agriculture Secretary Bob Bergland, "exemplifies the spirit and fare of this cafeteria." Packer was convicted of cannibalism in the late 1800s.

Meanwhile, in nearby Baltimore the federal government recently opened the new Edward Garmatz Courthouse, named for a longtime Maryland congressman who retired in 1974. One of its first uses was in the political corruption trial—of Edward Garmatz.

More than 300 employees of HEW are Conservative Digest January 1978 among those who have defaulted on guaranteed student loans. The employees are making at least \$5800 per year and, in some cases, more than \$30,000.

When the grass on neighboring Corps of Engineers property became too tall and scraggly to bear, W. H. Fleming of Blakely, Georgia, did his civic duty and cut it. Little did he know that, as a Corps official promptly informed him, such grass-mowing "constitutes a private exclusive use privilege because the natural environmental condition has been modified," requiring a \$10.00 permit.

The National Endowment for the Arts granted Pittsburgh artist Leaann Wilchusky \$6025 to make a 20-minute film in which four mile-long crepe paper rolls were dropped from airplanes over El Paso, Tex. Mrs. Wilchusky explains that her work "calls attention to the higher spirit of mankind and the coming era of peace and harmony on Earth."

Meanwhile, the National Science Foundation is spending \$78,400 for two professors to study the love, sexual and working relationships of couples—two-thirds of whom will be homosexual. Says foundation official Herbert Costner, "I would say that heterosexual couples have something to learn from homosexual couples." To find participants for the study, which will involve 300 married or unmarried heterosexual couples, 300 lesbian couples, and 300

male homosexual couples, the researchers are putting up notices in bars, restaurants and other public places. If pleased with the project's progress, the NSF can fund it for a second and third year, making a total of \$217,700 spent on the project.

Another National Science Foundation project will spend \$53,000 to study the sex life of the Aplysia snail, which has both male and female reproductive organs. Says grant-recipient James Blankenship, "We're interested in what determines which role the animal is going to take—male, female or both."

A burn medicine made of simple castor and cod-liver oils that promotes healing better than conventional burn dressings has been denied distribution rights by the Food and Drug Administration. Portland, Ore., doctor Werner Zelleo says, "I think it's the best burn dressing I have seen. There is absolutely no reason why the FDA should act this way." The discoverer of the ointment, Dr. Otto George, has been battling the FDA for 10 years to get permission to sell the ointment, but the bureaucrats have done everything possible to thwart him. First, the FDA rejected the results of tests on 227 burn patients, demanding that he first use the ointment on animals. After he complied, the FDA again rejected him. Frustrated, Dr. George has given up, and concluded: "I am beginning to realize the FDA will never approve anything for an individual . . . they only want to deal with large companies with unquestioned finances."

Frances Salvage of Miami has been offered a job, but she can't have it until she uses up her unemployment benefits. The Jewish Home for the Aged wants to hire her as a part-time social worker. But they want to pay her from a new \$30,000 federal grant, under which jobs can be given only to persons who have exhausted all their employment benefits. State employment bureau James Dietrick told Mrs. Salvage. "You are eligible for that job after your unemployment benefits run out." Mrs. Salvage has fought the decision, saying "I don't want to collect unemployment, I want the job." Complained a secretary at the State Employment Office, "That lady sure made a big fuss. Some people just can't follow the rules."
