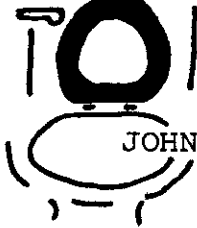

JOHN'S NOTES

One of the drawbacks of being a hellraiser instead of a toady brownnoser is the uncertainty it creates. And if you had a clerk's job, shovelling shit would be a welcome break.

Well anyway, I didn't even bother going home. I went straight to Dunhill Personnel, known for being all-fee-paid and where Pilant has been lining up his next spot for some months, and got started on the next job right away. They were less than enthusiastic, being down with a big case of Friday Fever, but the girl did recommend that I go to another agency that was run by a former Dunhill supervisor. That turned out to be the trick. I went there that afternoon, and it was a small but "hungry" office: they were out to do business, not wait for calls to come in, and they got me an appointment for the first thing Monday morning while I was right there talking to them! Well, about 7 years ago, Harper was the first place I interviewed at, and I was hired before I could get to the second interview. I didn't expect to do that well again, although I was hoping, but it helped a lot to have "someplace to go" Monday morning already. Now me, I wasn't really worried. I know both sides of oil & gas accounting, 6½ year record all at one place, etc., so you could hardly have written a better background for finding work in Okla City if you were making it up. I didn't worry, but my wife sure did! For some reason, the instant loss of 60% of your income bothers wives, even those who, like mine, were fortunate enough to be in a household that wasn't living from one check to the next. (Of course I did get paid for the 3 weeks of vacation I would have had this year too). Anyhow, as it turned out, lightning struck a second time, and I found myself hired on the spot at the first place I tried. It is something of a piece of moral satisfaction in pulling off something like that. I'm now with a smaller firm, but one growing faster; I have 30 miles to drive each way instead of the old 22, and I have to be here 30 minutes earlier, but on the other hand, I'm making a little more money than Harper gave me last year, I don't have to pay for parking, and as Shaffer said (who works near where I now am), "You don't have to worry about some wino puking on your car in the lot either", which is all too true if you could see our old part of downtown Oklahoma City. This place is more people-oriented, too. At Harper, you were lucky to get coffee, and had to make it yourself. Here, there's free coffee, hot chocolate, instant soup mixes, lite lunches, cider mix, something called "hot nog" (not bad stuff); our own microwave, a full sized refrigerator for 6 of us when Harper had a 30" one for the whole 10th floor; free cokes, and a newly-installed ice maker, even though these are temporary quarters from which we'll move again in just 90 days. I have less work to do, as I'm now staff instead of supervisor, yet aside from the driving, I'm a lot better off. I seriously doubt that Harper will be able to say the same. Oh, they won't collapse without me, but for all the time I was there, a lot of stuff that came along (like Windfall Tax) just was taken over by ol' John, and all anyone ever knew about it was "Oh, John does that". I suppose a lot of the oldtimers thought I did a lot of sitting around and fucking off (which wasn't always incorrect) and not much else, but I think they'll start finding out in about 60 days when the problems come up. You see, they don't even have anyone there who can TRAIN a new person. They could try hiring an experienced man from outside, pissing off a few who had hoped to move up; or they can try and promote from within and hope like hell

that they can just learn it as they go, like I did as it came out. Either way, there are going to be problems. There are already more than a few sections headed up by people who run them for reasons that do not exactly include broad experience or depth at the job. There are other sections headed up by people who wouldn't say boo if you shit in their face (these are the ones most loved by management). But you try and process \$4 million a month through someone that fits one of those molds, and you're going to be in trouble. It's all up to the Controller now.

I was sick most of my last week, then the week I had off before starting, and as I type this at the end of the first week of March, I'm still not in too good a shape. However, I feel a lot better, having put myself into a new spot already. No matter what your attitude is, getting kicked out isn't really a laughing matter, but I'm glad I was employed at least prospectively on the very next working day, and of course, the BRUTUS BULLETIN goes on. I was forced to switch off of Harper's machine some months ago, so that will be no problem. I'm still looking at BB 100 off in the distance of the end of this year sometime. Neither unemployment nor disease will stop this. (Although you may wish...)

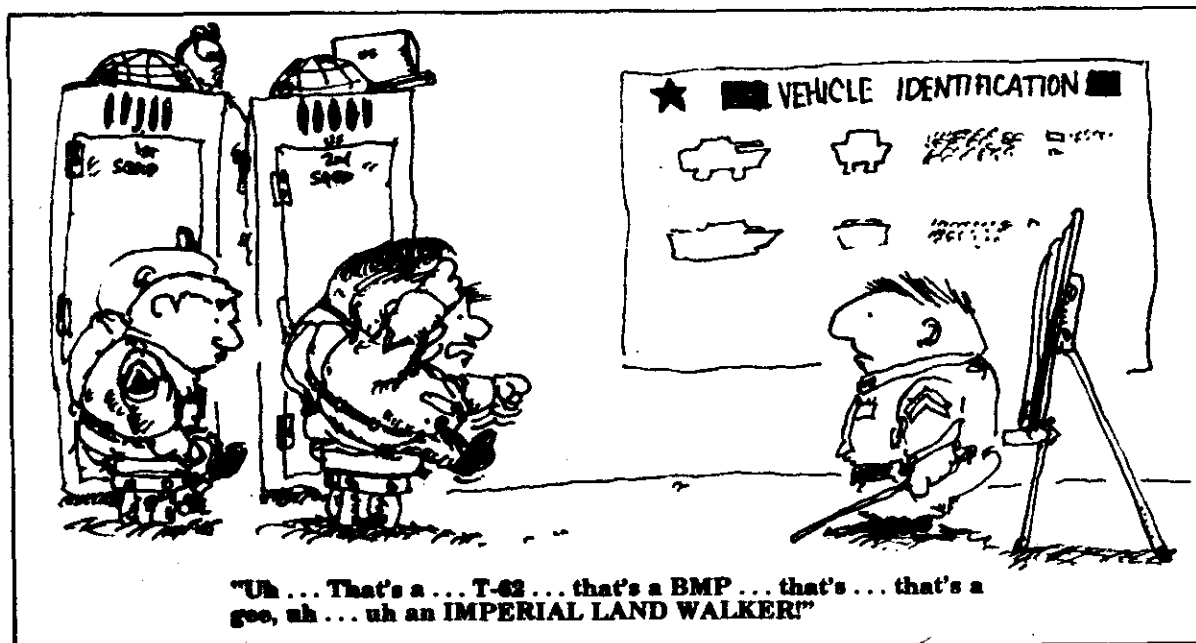

Here are two quotes from the book, "The Big Bands", 1974 by George T. Simon:

From the interview with Artie Shaw, pp. 549-550, "And what about what the Beatles have contributed musically? 'Not very much. Basie has done more. Ellington has done more. I did more. Goodman did more. We did something musically. These people haven't done very much musically. Sure, they wrote some fairly nice songs, but then so did Cole Porter, and so did Larry Hart and so did Rodgers. So did Hammerstein. As I said, the Beatles have written some fairly good things, but you're not going to ask me to take 'We All Live in a Yellow Submarine' very seriously, are you? I mean, hardly as a musical statement.'"

From the interview with Stan Kenton, p. 540, "'As far as the Beatles are concerned, I think most of their music is still children's music.' When Stan wants to make a point, he talks very slowly - for him. 'If the Beatles can be credited with one thing,' he almost drawled, 'it is that they came along and they made fans out of six- and seven-year-old kids. They took it down that low. And the adults went for that stuff, because I think it's natural that an adult feels a kid is more perceptive and hip. And so they started looking at those things and started reading things into them. But there really wasn't anything there. It's just children's music. You compare the Beatles' lyrics with those of some great writers like Johnny Burke, Johnny Mercer, Jimmy Van Heusen or Sammy Cahn - are we kiddin' each other?'"

"Fifty percent of Americans are beneath twenty-five years old today. Does that mean the rest of us have to live like kindergartener? But radio is programmed today to appeal to the young kids. TV is now geared to the eight- and ten-year-old mentality. Where the hell do people go that are hungry for something more sophisticated? Do they have to eat all that sht all the time? To me, you look at pop art and that's what you see on kindergarten walls. That's not mature. There's nothing there.'"

The Spotlight, January 5, 1981 reported the following excerpt by Hal Gould, a columnist for the Gaithersburg Gazette: "I deplore the current effort to attempt to deify John Lennon. I may be the only person in the land who feels this way, but I believe his philosophy was as dangerous to impressionable young minds as the gun that took his life. It has been said that the key to Lennon was his rebellious desire to go beyond the norm. It went far beyond hair, it went into the psychedelic era of hallucinogenic drugs, into transcendental meditation and into active resistance of the Vietnam War. The Beatles not only said they smoked pot, but also that they dropped acid. They have probably done more to encourage drug addiction in the world than any other musical group."

National Review, December 31, 1980 and The American Spectator, February, 1981 did have some positive comments on Lennon. See copies enclosed.

I note, with interest, that many of your correspondents are "babes in the woods" on economic matters. For them, I would recommend "Shirtsleeve Economics", by William A Paton, PH.D., C.P.A., LITT.D., and Edwin Francis Gay University Professor of Accounting, University of Michigan. (Published by Appleton-Century-Crofts, Inc., New York, 1952)

Professor Paton's Prologue is a dream that he had one night. This dream induced him to write the book:

"I suddenly found myself overlooking a vast plain, the edges of which were lost in a sort of purple fog. In the central area stood an enormous glass-like vat or tank, open at the top, giving off vapors that strongly suggested hot Irish stew or mulligan. Surrounding this container were a great multitude of creatures, something like human beings but reminding one of recent pictures of imaginary visitors from Mars. Although varying in size and other characteristics a prominent feature of all was the paunch. I also noticed that all or nearly all of these weird creatures were equipped with two long pipes, a pouring-in pipe and a drawing-out pipe. The general practice seemed to be for each to spend considerable time and effort pouring in some ingredient which represented its special contribution to the stew and from time to time each would lay aside its pouring-in pipe and devote itself to sucking out from the top of the tank, through its other pipe, some of the savory mixture. As I watched this strange scene a change began to develop. More and more individuals began to neglect the pouring-in operation and spend an increasing amount of time at the business end of their drawing-out pipes. At first the change was not very noticeable and the majority went ahead with the intermittent activities of pouring in and drawing out. But as the number devoting their attention solely to consuming stew increased and the number actively engaged in pouring in dwindled, those who were continuing to pour in finally began to see what was going on. When this stage was reached - realization by the decreasing number of pour-inners that they were being exploited by the increasing number of draw-outers - the process of change moved with startling rapidity to a climax. In what seemed no longer than a matter of seconds the orderly rhythmic process of contributing and consuming disintegrated before my eyes. Almost with one accord the remaining contributors threw their pouring-in pipes away and frantically grabbed their drawing-out pipes. And as the contents of the tank rapidly declined under the mass attack the creatures set up a horrible howling and pressed toward the tank in a desperate effort to keep the ends of their pipes in contact with the falling level of the life-giving stew. In an instant, as often happens in dreams, what had been no more than interestingly disturbing became a frightening nightmare. In the final mad rush great numbers of the creatures were trampled to the ground around the base of the tank, and those temporarily surviving climbed on the bodies of the dead and dying in their struggle to reach the top and thus get within sucking distance of the fast-diminishing contents. The howling became unbearable, the pleasant odor was replaced by a terrible stench - and I woke up, literally in a cold sweat and with a feeling of nausea."

This is a bad time to resub, isn't it? With the increase in postal rates I mean. But some times I can't do without and BB is one. I am sending a check for \$4.00 but let me know what additional amount to send, when you do adjust them. Just keep BB coming!

Speaking of the postal increase, I was at the post office getting stamps today and the clerk said there that now they are hearing March 20th as a target date for new rates of 18¢/12¢. Maybe you can get another issue in by then.

I work for the post office, but I work nights in bulk mail----not the "glamor" of the postal carrier. The contract comes up for renewal in July with talks starting in April. The last contract was negotiated three years ago which was before I worked for them so I don't know what to expect. We are prevented by law from striking and at any rate, the postal workers should not strike. I think we are overpaid and overworked.

Several times in the last two months the P.O. has taken away one of our two off-days which means overtime pay. They really need to hire more people. The hangup is that they don't want to shell out all the benefits like annual leave and sick leave etc.

What galls me is that we are forced to work extensive amounts of overtime that most of us do not want and really do not need (But let's face it, whatever money you get, you find something to spend it on!).

For what they pay one of us on overtime, they could hire two casual workers (who are temporary workers with no benefits at all) and save money. They are so stupid. It makes me sick when so many people are out of work and could use the money and we are worked beyond what we want and don't need the money.

A thought on BB. You publish more frequently than once a month. Have you thought of a package deal like VOD has for either 10 issues or 25 issues? You could always, as you say, adjust your balance later. Well gotta go to work so I have to eat and get dressed.

((People can sign up for as many issues as they like; the resub rate right now is a simple 3/\$1, and I'll prorate that for any amount sent. On the other hand, when the rates go up, I will prorate the balances too. The new postage may exceed the 33¢ I get for non-trades.

I flipped flats for 3½ months myself. Another big problem is the emphasis on equipment. It costs millions, doesn't work, and the people getting the maintenance jobs are those picked strictly on a basis of seniority in the incredibly strong postal union. Most of them I saw were in completely over their heads. Better to put up more pigeon holes--really--and give more people a nice PS5 slot sorting mail. The Bruce Linsey checks in with a delightful letter which, along with som JM responses runs nearly 4 pages. He discusses the Lennon editorial, his hopes for Ronald Reagan and world peace, and makes a request that he not be attacked in BB press. He makes some interesting comments about prices for zines, his Rulebook discussion in VOD, and the philosophical attitude he took toward compiling the material for the novice hadnbook (making the valid point that it was not designed to be a "neutral" publication.) More interesting comments follow on his own attitude toward the use of HouseRules and has some comments on weeding out criminals. As for the controversial stuff, he defends himself rather calmly aga inst some comments made by Wilson, and his comments about Arnett's criticisms are mostly done in humor. Wislson checks in with some critical material, but its fairly short, not all of its is serious, and most touches on the Holocaust issue. Mills jumps on Perlmutter briefly, but most of his letter is on gun control and his favorite records. Along with Smyth's letter, that's it for the non-game material. In short, the material that RS objects to simply does not amount to a major part of the issue. Nor was this a fluke. #82 is much the same, with only the Wilson letter even possibly qualifying for RS's shit list. I'm not saying every issue is like this. #79 was one of the rougher ones. But the fact of the matter is, things just haven't worked out in BB the way RS's theory indicates they would. I have read a lot of old zines in the process of collecting reprint material for DD. In my opinion, BB has had the livliest --- and best --- lettercol that has ever appeared in a U.S. dipzine, and RS is going to really miss out.

By the way, San Quentin hasn't had anybody die in the gas chamber since 1965. If they aren't going to use it, why waste the taxpayers' money with the thing? The two seats can be turned into dandy thrones for Ronnie and Nancy....

Although I do not necessarily feel that the postal Dip hobby is in need of a mascot, I have nevertheless cast my vote for my choice. Before I am called a hypocrite, let me say that the American right to vote is one of our most important freedoms, and I have chosen to use my right to vote.
