For Standbys, it's \$5.00 for newcomers, \$4.00 for current readers. For your Fee, you receive copies of the rules/maps for your variant game(s), <u>plus</u> receipt of BUSH for the duration of your game. No additional sub requirements. That's why these figures shound so high.

SUBSCRIPTIONS for non-players: 12 issues for \$6.00. There is an additional \$1.00 discount on all of these rates for members of the Mensa Diplomacy SIG. We also TRADE with many other zines on an all-for-all basis. Sample copy, 50¢.

GAME OPENINGS: None for Starting positions. However, we can always use more Standbys, both for Turnabout and for Vacation Dip. III. Our next Game Opening will probably be for "Balkan Wars III." If you're interested in a scenario involving the 1910 Balkans - Greece, Turkey, Transylvania and the like - drop me a line and I'll sign you up. This is a little gem, with just 21 Supply Centers. You wouldn't have to wait until 1995 in real time for the outcome.

OUT OF THE VARIANT BANK FILES

We plan to bring back some long-forgotten variants which seem worth considering, on a space-available basis, from time to time. The first one offers a good solution to the problem of "How can we shorten the games?":

DIPLOWINN - by Norman Nathan - originally printed in DOLCHSTOSS #22, 11 August 1974

(North American Variant Bank edition, 1986)

Preface:

Very few FTF games produce a single outright winner, even after eight or nine hours of play. Some games end in a joint win, but more frequently, there is a three or four-way draw. So often one hears, "If only we could play anothergame year or two, then..." The same complaint is heard when it is agree that the game will end at a fixed time, as prescribed in Rule III.

The Rule Change

In Winter 1905, the number of units on the board is adjusted to be one less than the number of Supply Centers controlled by each country. In the next Winter, this becomes two less, and so on. The Victory Criterion remains the control of 18 SC's.

This change should produce the desired effect. Those countries still in the game with only one or two units will be rapidly eliminated. Static battles and stalemate lines cannot be maintained, since there will be fewer units available to man them. The strong countries will lose a smaller proportion of their strength than the weak ones, and hence become relatively stronger. With a decreasing number of units on the board there is more scope for movement and more need for diplomacy. Progressive weakening of all countries makes stabbing and risk-taking more attractive and more necessary.

This should eliminate the stagnation which often sets in when a game reaches the 1905-1906 period. It also bears a resemblance to reality. In real wars, a country initially gets stronger as it mobilizes its resources to the utmost, and then gets weaker as its human and material resources get depleted.

It could also encourage players with just two or three units on the board to agree to a concession or draw sooner, in order to guarantee their own survival on the game records, whether FTF or Postal.

((And of course, with fewer units on the board, it would be easier to CM, if this were played postally. The name DIPLOWINN stands for "Diplomacy Intended to Probably Leave an Outright Winner by Nineteen Nine." The author has also suggested an alternate title of DAFTEOR ("Diplomacy Allowing for The Exhaustion of Resources").))

FTF Diplomacy would be far more satisfactory were it reasonably certain that after about five hours' play there would be an outright winner or one player would be in a sufficiently strong position to claim a clear win. DIPLOWINN may be the answer to that need.

((Reports on the results of FTF DIPLOWINN games would be appreciated, to see how they actually work out in fact.))

OF NICARAGUA AND GRAMM-RUDMAN (An Editorial)

We were glad to see that Reagan was defeated on his bid to dump \$100 million down the rathole of "Contra Aid" in Plarch. If there were a bona fide organization of democratic Freedom Fighters opposing the Nicaraguan regieme, there might be some sense to the Radical Right's proposal, but the evidence seems to indicate that most of the Contras have connections with the former Somoza dictatorship, which did not exactly win any awards for respecting human rights during the 40-odd years they were in power (backed by U.S. Marines and the United Fruit Company). With due respect, I think the President has seen too many "Rambo" films.

The most obscene part of this operation is that the Administration wants to give away this \$100 million at the same time that Gramm-Rudman is virtually destroying great parts of the social fabric at home. For lack of financing, AMTRAK may close down October 1st. As one commentator said, "Under Reagan's plan, you may be able to fly from Los Angeles to Tokyo in two hours, but you won't be able to take a train from L.A.to San Diego." (Or from Baltimore to New York, where the Northeast Corridor is already dangerously overcrowded on the highways and in the air).

The Small Business Administration is reported to be dead. This is the agency which helps the little people, including many minority clients, to achieve the goal of self-employment - supposedly one of the great ideals of the Republican Party. The funds for many family planning organizations at home and abroad have already been cut off. This President seems to equate contraception and "sin." (I wonder if he changed his mind after reading his daughter's book?) There seems to be no understanding that for every dollar spent on family planning now, we may save \$70 a year on Welfare costs for the next 18 years. Or that birth control pills are more powerful than Rambo's bullets in the fight for whether parts of the Third World are going to go Communist. A man rarely joins the guerillas until he has hungry children to feed, and nowhere else to look to for help.

There are also going to be horrendous cuttings in Federal funds for education,/college scholarships, school lunch programs, Medicare, air traffic controllers, mass transit, even for meat inspectors who are trying to keep us from becoming sick eating the bad meat the beef barons would foist on us. They have even closed the Library of Congress on Sundays and evenings. This is almost the equivalent of burning the Library at Alexandria, since scholars come from all over the world to study the material in the Library of Congress, which does not circulate. Thousands of research projects may now be down the drain, since many researchers have to work during the day at other jobs in order to eat. (A grand total of \$500,000 is being saved by that move. I guess the military spends that in a few minutes.) Another \$350,000 a year is being saved by closing all the Smithsonian Museums at 5:30 p.m. daily. They used to stay open till 7:30 from May through September.

I'm sure anybody who can think realizes that the "deficit crisis" was deliberate. The President himself may have believed in the fairy tale of "supply side economics" once taxes were cut in 1981, but the people around him knew exactly what they were doing. To quote Richard Reeves in the Baltimore Sun, Senators Gramm and Rudman "have devoted their political lives to trying to reduce the federal government to nothing more than an external and internal police force."

The FEDERAL TIMES editorial of March 10, 1986, states: "Revenues were arbitrarily cut by President Reagan during his first year of office... The target was not to create a deficit but to create a frame of mind that would allow the administration to dismantle large portions of the federal government, some of which are highly valued by private industry... But, remember that some of the services have had to be provided by the government because private industry either refused to supply them or did an inferior job."

Read the history of what happened in this country between 1929 and 1937 for some examples of what the Federal government did <u>not</u> do under Hoover, and what it <u>did</u> do under F.D.R., when people needed help which could not be provided by either private industry or private charity. Nobody has had to go to the county poor house since 1936, but the way things are going that institution may be making a compeback. (Oh, yes, Hoover did do one thing. When the W.W. I veterans gathered in Anacostia Flat to ask for their bonus money, he sent General MacArthur down there to burn their tents and drive them out of town at bayonet point. Is it any wonder the Socialist Party received one million votes in 1932?)

They are even stating that Gramm-Rudman will force severe cuts in the ranks of the FBI, the Coast Guard and the Border Patrol. To say nothing of the financial losses to virtually all classes of pensioners outside of Social Security beneficiaries. Meanwhile, money continues to be pumped into the military. What price glory, Mr. President? How do you save a country with military might when its heart is dying?

The Supreme Court will probably throw out Gramm-Rudman as unconstitutional when they review the case in July. But, that will not stop the Radical Right from trying to dismantle the government. Fortunately, the Supreme Court is not the only line of defense. There will be an election in November 1986. This will give all the little people who are being so badly hurt a chance to give the President a message — that we're not going to throw the baby out with the bath as we settle the deficit "crisis." We want more attention paid to the Americans in the Center, and less to Central America!

A SCIENCE FICTION STORY REVIEW

RAILFANS as well as regular SF fans will enjoy reading "The Iron Elephant," a short story by Harry Turtledove in the May 1986 issue of ANALOG. This is the latest of his "alternate world" series in which pre-human hominids (called "sims") and other prehistoric animals like wooly mammoths and sabre-tooth tigers survived in the New World, to be discovered by the Europeans in the 16th century. Earlier stories included one in which Samuel Pepys reports in his Diery how the English intellectuals in the Royal Society of the 1660's (including Newton and Halley) make an intuitive leap from a study of the sims to the theory of evolution, some two centuries earlier than happened in our universe.

In the current story, railroads have arrived in North America around 1790, as new thinking speeds up development. However, they are powered by teams of wooly mammoths controlled by mahouts the British imported from India. These creatures can pull much heavier loads than horses. The inevitable happens one day when the train pulls into the station to find the arrival of the first steam engine out of Boston. A race is set up between the team of elephants and the steam engine. I was expecting something like the race between the "Tom Thumb" and the white stallion here in Maryland, or perhaps a tragedy along the line of "John Henry and the Steam Drill." However, the authors puts a different twist on the ending, which I won't reveal here.

I believe this is the same Harry Turtledove who used to be a member of the Mensa Diplomacy SIG, and played Russia in a Swiss Dip variant game in DIPLOMAG and BUSH-WACKER (1978V jc). He used to write under the name "Eric G. Iverson," which is why I didn't know anything about him, but he began using his real name in 1985. I voted his "Vilest Beast" (the first sims story) the best novelette of 1985 in ANALOG's annual readers' poll. I'll let you know how it fared when I see the results.

IF ANYONE WONDERS WHY SWITZERIAND IS IMPASSABLE, you may wish to read the article on Switzerland in the March 1986 issue of The NATIONAL GEOGRAPHIC. Among other things, the article describes how the field of fire has been computed to the last centimeter in every mountain pass, and the necessary weaponry is set in place. I was amazed to learn that underground radiation-proof shelters have been built to hold about 90% of the native Swiss population in the event the balloon goes up. I don't think any other country in the world has developed nearly so much protection for its civilian population. Assuming that there was a limited exchange of nuclear weapons, and not a Nuclear Winter, it appears that the Swiss would come out of it better than anyone else, although there might be no one else left to sell watches and insurance policies to!

I saw some of the "Dragon's Teeth" fortifications on the Swiss frontier when I was a G.I. stationed in Germany in the 50's. A Swiss Army officer in my train compartment stated that they were still paying the bill for fortifications which were already obsolete. Apparently, a lot more fortifying has been done since then. These run all around Switzerland - not just on the side facing Germany. The Swiss don't want anybody to get the idea of making a quick gain via their space. So, I guess Calhamer was right.

THE DOMINANCE RATINGS

Elmer Hinton has produced a player rating system called the "Dominance Ratings." I won't bore you with the technical basis for his system. I'll just say that he has now produced a second report, called Dominance II, which includes all games reported through EVERYTHING #65. I don't know how far back this Listing goes in counting games, but it has been pruned of deadwood, reporting only on the 189 players who are currently active (or were recently active) who have won at least one Postal game or played in two games which have been completed. The results are quite different from what has been reported under other ratings systems, such as "Dragon's Tooth.

In the <u>Dominance I</u> Listings, the <u>Top Ten players</u> were: 1. Dave McCarty, 2. Greg Fritz, 3. J. Punches, 4. Ron (Canada) Brown, 5. David Frick, 6. Stephen Wilcox, 7. Ichiro Matsumura, 8. Andy Lischett, 9. Steve Langley, and 10. Bert Schoose. (I've never ever <u>heard</u> of three of those people!). Dan Stafford (first on some other systems) was rated 22nd, and Kathy Byrne 97th!

In Dominance II, which includes more recent games, you will be surprised to learn that first place is occupied by - Elmer Hinton. Other top players are: 2. Dave McCarty. 3. Andy Lischett (+5), 4. Greg Fritz (-2), 5. J. Punches (-2), 6. Stephen Wilcox (-), 7. David Frick (-2), 8. Philip Redmond (+9), 9. Julie Glass Martin (+9!) and 10. Tom Graessle (+5). Dan Stefford is now rated 13th, and Kathy Byrne has gained 47 points to be rated #40. Com'on Kathy!

Since no Wins are shown for Kathy, and only 2 Wins for Stafford, it does not appear that this system has a very large database. In fact, no one on the list is shown to have more than 2 outright Wins. It may be that this system is useful for showing who is "hot" right now, whereas other systems usually show who has been on top over a period of the past 5 or 6 years. Ah, the mysteries of statistics.

FAIL 1948 Revisited: There was an error in the game report, The CHINESE move F Norway-Finland(nc) succeeded, (S) by USA F West Arctic Ocean. Accordingly, RUSSIAN F Finland (nc) was dislodged and Annihilated. GERMAN A Sweden-Norway then succeeded, per Rule IX, 7 of the 1971/77 Rulebook.

The USSR SC Count is "2 (-3), Remove 1. (1 short, 1 annihilated)."
CHINA still has just 13 Centers, but owns FINIAND, not Norway.
CERMANY now owns NOHWAY. SC Count is "10 (+1), Build 12"
Players were notified by mail on March 14th. Consequently, there has been a request for separation of seasons, which has been granted.
