For Standbys, it's \$5.00 for newcomers, \$4.00 for current readers. For your Fee, you receive copies of the rules/maps for your variant game(s), <u>plus</u> receipt of BUSH for the duration of your game. No additional sub requirements. That's why these figures shound so high.

SUBSCRIPTIONS for non-players: 12 issues for \$6.00. There is an additional \$1.00 discount on all of these rates for members of the Mensa Diplomacy SIG. We also TRADE with many other zines on an all-for-all basis. Sample copy, 50¢.

GAME OPENINGS: None for Starting positions. However, we can always use more Standbys, both for Turnabout and for Vacation Dip. III. Our next Game Opening will probably be for "Balkan Wars III." If you're interested in a scenario involving the 1910 Balkans - Greece, Turkey, Transylvania and the like - drop me a line and I'll sign you up. This is a little gem, with just 21 Supply Centers. You wouldn't have to wait until 1995 in real time for the outcome.

NORTH AMERICAN DIPLOMACY PLAYERS SURVEY #3 - A Brief Summary

This poll was designed by Lew Pulsipher, and the votes counted by Bruce Linsey. 72 ballots were received. A complete report is in DIPLOMACY WORLD #42.

Ages ranged from 16 to 59. A surprising 39 respondents were in their 30's or older. Almost half have been playing Postal Dip back to the 70's. 24 are or have been publishers. Everyone was asked to list their Five Favorite active Dipzines, the Five Most Skilled Postal Players, and the Five Top People in Dip Fandom. The results of those surveys were:

Favorite Dipzines: 1. Diplomacy World, 2. Europa Express, 3. Excelsior, 4. Diplomacy Digest, 5. No Fixed Address, 6. Magus. (I was dumfounded to see that BUSH was tied for 7th place with The Diplomat).

Most Skilled Players: 1. Kathy Byrne, 2. Dan Stafford, 3. Randolph Smyth, 4. Mark Berch, 5. Paul Rauterberg. 6 (tie). Edi Birsan, Doug Beyerlein, Phil Redmond.

Top People in Fandom: 1. Kathy Byrne, 2. Bruce Linsey, 3. Mark Berch, 4. Rod Walker,

LIFER AWARDS WINNERS (from LIFE OF MONTY #62, published by Don del Grande)

HOBBY GENIUS: No Award this year. Larry Peery had the most points (58), but was one vote short of the 30% mention (on all ballots) required. Bob Olsen came in second with 52 points.

MOST IMPROVED ZINE: Again, no zine met the 30% minimum mention. Highest three were COSTAGUANA (45), CANADIAN DIPLOMAT (40) and DIPLOMACY WORLD (39).

BEST ZINE FOR HOBBY NEWS: 1. EUROPA EXPRESS (102 points), 2. MAGUS (89), 3. KAISSA (75)

BIGGEST HOBBY PERSONALITY: 1. Kathy Byrne (140), 2. Larry Peery (88), 3. Steve "Woody" Arnawoodian (71)

TRUE HOBBY MASTER: Again, it was Kathy Byrne lapping the field, with a total of 103 points and six first place votes (worth 15 points ea.). The only other person receiving more than one 1st place vote was Bruce Linsey, with two. Bruce finished second, with 55 points. No one else was in contention, although Mark Berch rec'd 36 points and BNC Bill Quinn 35. Bob Olsen got 26, Terry Peery 24. Somebody gave me one 1st place vote!

Since no one else received enough points, Kathy remains alone in the True Hobby Master Society for another year. Next year, Don del Grande intends to switch to a Hall of Fame voting system, with anyone whose name appears on about 3/4 of the ballots being elected to the Society.

For Favorite Game (other than Dip/Variants), it was Trivial Pursuit(55), Titan (42), and Civilization (40). Hardest Country to Play went to Austria (surprise) (185), followed by Italy (144). France was rated the easiest country to play.

IT'S AWARD TIME

Enclosed is the ballot for the Don Miller Memorial Award for outstanding service to the Diplomacy hobby during the year 1985, the Rod Walker Award for literary excellence, and the John Koning Memorial Award for Diplomacy Player of the year.

This will be the fourth year for the Miller Award, the third for the Walker Award, and the first year for the Koning Award. As Treasurer of the Committee, I have already purchased the engraved plaques for the individual winners, plus a new Master plaque for the Koning Award. The Miller and Koning perpetual plaques are designed to resemble each other as much as possible. As the Walker Award plaque was donated to the hobby by the Avalon Hill Co., it looks slightly different. You will get to see all of these plaques if you attend DipCon. All I have to do now is to bring them back to the trophy store on May 19th to have the winners' names engraved thereon.

You will note there are six nominees for the Miller Award, and write-ins are allowed. You will notice that a certain obvious name is missing. I refer to Larry Peery, who raised DIPLOMACY WORLD from the dead to a new life. Many people nominated Larry for consideration for the Miller Award. However, as Larry is Secretary to the Awards Committee, he adamently declined the nomination, even though some people were very insistant. Larry felt that any vote count conducted by him where he was also a nominee might be looked upon with suspicion in certain quarters. In practice, it would have meant having to split up the ballots, with the Miller Award ones going to a different person for counting.

Peery has urged all publishers to reprint the ballots without any additions or deletions. I will concur with his request. Personally, I have not yet decided whether to cast a write-in vote, or to give my vote to my second choice for the Award. I have only half-jestingly suggested that the 1986 winner should have a Roger Maris-like asterisk after his name, stating "*in lieu of Larry Peery."

There are nine nominees for the Literary Award this year. They are also from a much broader spectrum, only one being from DIPLOMACY WORLD. Hopefully, this will prevent anyone from attempting a write-in campaign this year, as write-ins are not allowed. I have seen only seven of the pieces, but I've already made up my mind to vote for Bruce McIntyre's article, as this was the funniest thing I've ready anywhere in the past year.

Please note the mail deadline is Saturday, May 17th. This barely gives you enough time to fill out your ballot and get it in. Sorry about that, but there was no way I could mail BUSH any earlier. DipCon is being held unusually early this year, and the Committee does want to announce the winners at DipCon. Any winners attending will be awarded their plaques on the site. The others will receive theirs in the mail.

The winners get to keep and display the Master plaques for a one-year period, if they wish, and then must either mail or return the plaques in person for the following Dip-Con. Winners cannot repeat. There is a 3-year waiting period before anyone is again eligible for nomination (for the Miller and Walker Awards). This is why, for example, neither Lee Kendter nor Bob Olsen is eligible for the Miller Award in 1986.

The ballots are on the other side of this page. You do not have to vote in all three awards if you would prefer to participate in only one or two. Remember, you may vote for only one person in each category. If you wish to make a contribution toward the Award expenses, you may do so with your ballots. Let larry know how much you're enclosing. If you send a check, please make it payable to "Fred C. Davis, Jr.," since I'm the Treasurer for this-here outfit.

BALKAN WARS III - Original design by Charles N. Reinsel, 1974
This modification by Fred C. Davis, Jr., 1986

(Balkan Wars II, a 5-player game, has vanished without trace).

Introduction: The board For Balkan Wars is the period just before World War I, when a couple of historical wars occurred in this area. Austria-Hungary and Russia are not in the game, as was true in fact, when they remained neutral. Slight liberties have been taken with the map to include Croatia, Bessarabia and Transylvania on the board for playability purposes. These areas are certainly part of the Balkans. (Rumania owned Bessarabia between the two World Wars, and controls Transylvania today. Croatia is part of modern Yugoslavia.) The map is a somewhat stylized version of the Balkans. In a few cases, the more modern name for a province has been substituted, such as Skopje for Uskub and Plovdiv for Philippopolis, to aid in familiarity. Additional ordinary spaces have been placed in the center of the map for maneuvering purposes. Besnia, Macedonia and Oltenia are real areas. Disputes over who should control Macedonia were one of the causes of the Balkan wars of 1911-1913. Arda is the name of a river near Adrianople, and an irresistable pun. (The old NAVB publication was called ARDA). Mt. Jara is a shortened version of the name of the tallest mountain in that area. Note that Albania and Montenegro are played as a single Pewer.

- 1. Where not otherwise specified, the Standard Rules of Diplomacy will apply.
- 2. The seven Powers and their starting units are as follows: (Capitals underscored).

ALBANIA: A Montenegro, A Valona, F Tirana

BULGARIA: A Sofia, A Plovdiv, F Varna
GREECE: A Athens, A Salonika, F Crete
ITALY: F Rome, F Sicily, Choice Trieste
RUMANIA: A Bucharest, A Galati, F Constantsa

SERBIA: A Belgrade, A Nish, A Skopje

TURKEY: A Constantinople, F Scutari, F Smyrna

- 3. There are 21 Supply Centers. The Victory Criteria are either: a. Ownership of 11 Supply Centers; or, B. A majority of the units on the board at any time.

 (Note there are no neutral SC's. There are only 5 Inland SC's unreachable by F's.)
- 4. A Power may build new units in any unoccupied Supply Center that he owns. Armies may be built in any of them. Fleets must be built in coastal SC's. In addition, Serbia may build units in Besnia when she owns that space.
- 5. The game starts with the Spring 1911 moves.
- 6. Optional starting places in Spring 1911:
 - a. Greece may either start A Athens in Epirus or start F Crete in the Aegean or Corinthian Sea, if she wishes.
 - b. Albania may starts its initial F from any of its 3 Home Centers, w/ A's in others. c. Italy may have either an A or a F in Trieste.

These choices may be kept secret until the Spring 1911 orders are read.

- 7. Fleets in Bessarabia or Constantsa may move or support, via the Danube R., into Galati, and vice-versa. Fleets may be built in Galati. The Danube is not a space. Fleets remain in the regular provinces.
- 8. Winter builds are made secretly, both with respect to the types of units built and the locations where built. Therefore, the Winter and Spring seasons will be played together in both Postal and FTF play.

- 9. Retreats. Players should write potential Retreats, in order of preference, for all their units each turn. Since this is a crowded board, many dislodgements may result in annihilations. Unordered Retreats after Spring moves will be handled by Just's Right-Hand Rule. (Units moved by GM to first open space, starting with the space immediately to the right of the space from which the attack came, then the first space to the left, etc.). Retreats following Fall moves will be handled with the Winter orders. Retreats take precedence over Builds.
- 10. Direct Passages & Fleet Jumps. There are Direct Passages between Rome and Sicily, Constantinople and Smyrna, and Con and Scutari. Both Armies and Fleets may move directly between these spaces without need of Convoy, without interfering with the passage of Fleets between the adjacent sea spaces. Fleets may also "Jump" between the Ionian and South Adriatic seas, but may not Convoy armies directly between these two sea spaces.

* * * *

Game Notes: There are 21 Supply Centers, 13 ordinary land spaces, and 10 sea spaces in Balkan Wars III. The original design had no ordinary land spaces. This resulted in a crowded board, where very little maneuvering could be done, making the game virtually unplayable. Only the sea spaces were available for Retreats and tactical manuevers. There is a rule of thumb in the design of Diplomacy variants that not more than 50% of the spaces should be Supply Centers, and preferably less. In this case, with 23 "other" spaces, I was able to cut the SC percentage down to just under 50%.

This is still going to be a deadly game, where one error or NMR could ruin a player. Much diplomacy will be required to enable countries to work together for success. No one can get very far on his own.

One thing which bothered me in the original version of this variant was that Serbia was landlocked. Eventually, Serbia could build fleets in captured SC's, but I wanted to provide another option. So, I decided to allow Serbia to build in Bosnia. Thus, she can build a fleet without first having to overrun Albania or Greece. This makes it possible for Serbia to ally with those countries from the beginning. The GM will have to keep note of the ownership of Bosnia.

I believe the original designer must have meant Rome and Sicily to be adjacent, as well as Constantinople and its adjacent SC's. Otherwise, Italy and Turkey could not hold together as contiguous countries. These passages were not shown on the initial map, but I have added them to "III" to establish this without a doubt.

In Balkans I, Trieste's "dot" and outline is located in Venice's position. My first impulse was to change its name to "Venice." Then, I thought that since the scenario was The Balkans, Trieste was a better name. Between 1919 and 1945, Italy owned the entire Istrian Peninsula, as shown on the "III" map. Using the Trieste name and boundaries as drawn here does make Italy more of a Balkan power.

It might have been more authentic if I had added the Dodecanese Is. area, off the south Turkish coast, since Italy owned this area during the period 1912-1943, but I felt that that might have added an extraneous issue to the game. I did not want to stray that far beyond the boundaries of the Balkans.


Recommended colors to use:

Italy - Green (traditional color) Rumania - Light Blue (most similar to France)

Turkey - Yellow (" ") Serbia - Red (closest to Austria)

Bulgaria - Black (German influence) Albania - White (only color left over)

Greece - Dark Blue (for her blue seas)
