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WITH SUMMER HERE, everyone takes vacations, including your Editor. That's why we're having longer than usual deadlines between issues. Years ago, there was a proposal made that all publishers take a "holiday" in August, but the consensus was that it would be better if each publisher set his own pace, since we don't all go away in August. We were away in Virginia Beach and Williamsburg, Va. for eight days near the end of June. Then, we went to New York for four days over "Liberty Weekend" to attend the Mensa Convention. SPACE NEWS ROUNDUP

ASTEROID 3129 named for Chesley Bonestell. The Planetary Society held a contest to select a name for this asteroid, which had been "donated" to the Society by its discoverer, Eleanor Helin of the Jet Propulsion Laboratory. The winning name is to honor the dean of astronomical painters, Chesley Bonestell, who is still living and painting at the age of 98. His illustrations for Willy Ley's classical book, The Conquest of Space (1949), are considered by many to have been the spark that started interest in space travel in the general population beyond the borders of SF fandom. Some of his paintings are on permanent display at the Air and Space Museum of the Smithsonian Institution in Washington.

Bonestell responded by saying he was glad the rules didn't require one to be dead to have an asteroid named after you, as would be the case with a moon crater and most other astronomical objects. (I presume if you live to be 90 you're eligible, since most life insurance policies terminate at 89). The original designator for Asteroid 3129, by the way, was 1979MK2, which sounds like a certain game we all know.

SEVEN OTHER RECENTLY DISCOVERED ASTEROIDS have now been officially named for the crew members of the Challenger. These are asteroids which had been discovered at the Lowell Observatory in Arizona, between 1980 and March 1984, using the same 13" telescope which was used to discover Pluto in 1930. There is usually quite a time lag between an asteroid's discovery and its official naming, with the discoverer having the final say-so on its name. In the beginning, the minor planets were all given classical names, but they ran out of such names years ago.

The new official names are: 3350 - Scobee, 3351 - Smith, 3352 - McAuliffe, 3353 - Jarvis, 3354 - McNair, 3355 - Onizuka, and 3356 - Resnik. All are main belt objects except McAuliffe, which is an "Apollo" type, meaning it comes close to Earth's orbit every 7 or 8 years.

THE DEFENSE DEPARTMENT MAY "USURP" most of the Shuttle payloads between 1987 and 1989 for their own purposes. The current Administration obviously places a higher value on bashing Commies than scientific research. While the Hubble Space Telescope remains safe, the fate of two extremely important probes, Galileo to Jupiter and Ulysses to study Sol's polar regions, are now in doubt. These were to be the first interplanetary probes launched by the United States since 1976. They are both powered by nuclear generators which have already been powered up. A two-year delay in their launching may cause the isotopes in the power supply to run "dry" before the ends of their missions. Why not refuel them? Well, gentlemen, that would be expensive, and we have a little thing called Gramm-Rudman which prevents us from spending the money... so, they may not get launched at all. Won't there be screams of indignation when all these discoveries are made by Russia, Japan and the European Space Agency? Let's face it, under Ronald Reagan America isn't even going to be No. Two in the space race.

COMPUTER PROCESSED IMAGE of the star Beta Pictoris shows a disc of gas orbiting the star out to at least a distance of 400 Astronomical Units. By comparison, Pluto is only 50 AU's from our Sun. Beta Pictoris, about 50 light years from Sol, is a comparatively new star, only a few hundred million years old, so it's possible that what we are seeing is a scenario in which the gas and dust has not yet settled down and formed a solar system. In any case, this is good hard evidence that such clouds circle other stars. Similar gas/dust clouds have been found surrounding Vega and Formalhaut. Still better evidence of other planetary systems will become available once the Hubble Space Telescope is launched. Unfortunately, this now appears to have been delayed for at least one year from the original October 1986 launch date by the Challenger disaster.

A POTPOURRI OF ITEMS

NORTH AMERICAN VARIANT BANK NEWS. I do have copies of the Draft Version of the 1986 Catalog available for sale, at \$3.00 each. I regret that I still don't have any nicely printed final versions available, but the information is identical in either form. Since I've been out of town so much, I haven't had time to get certain problems resolved.

I have received several new Diplomacy Variants from the Custodians of the U.K. and Dutch Variant Banks. If I can just get a few days to go through them, I should have a supplemental list of games to add to the main Catalog shortly. There is already a short supplement, but the next one will be much longer.

ATLANTICON '86 was held in Trenton, N.J., over the weekend of June 21st. Paul Kenny writes to say he attended. He reports there were only 35 players in the Diplomacy Tournament's First Round. Perhaps it was held too soon after MaryCon, since both Cons covered essentially the same geographic area.

FIRST CONTACT? The Gorilla Foundation has been communicating with two gorillas in their preserve near Woodside, California, using American Sign Language. Some of these episodes have been seen on TV and in the NATIONAL GEOGRAPHIC, which ran that famous photo of Koko and her kitten, All Ball, on the cover of its January 1985 issue. It's tragic to learn that just as man is starting to learn how to contact these creatures, they are on the verge of being wiped out in the wild. It is estimated that there are only about 240 mountain gorilla left in the wild, all in one small area of Africa, and they will probably be extinct within 15 years. The local government either cannot or will not protect them from poachers. The zoo populations may be all that's left of this species by the year 2000. They appear to have the intelligence of three or four year-old humans, judging from the transcripts of their conversations. We seem to have done much better in gorilla communication than in our efforts to talk to dolphins.

One of the truly amazing things the investigators have learned is that gorillas are aware of their own mortality. It has always been said that no animal knew of death until the moment of its own dying. They have also created new signs, such as "water-bird," which was Koko's invention when she saw a flamingo. It would seem that the xenobiologists ought to get into this program, if for no other reason that to learn how to contact aliens. How can we expect to talk with little green men if we can't even talk to our own primates?

My ratings are based on their long-term overall importance, rather than their importance to a single Power. Here is how I'd rate these groups: 1. Belgium/Holland, 2. Serbia/Greece, 3. Denmark/Norway/Sweden, 4. Spain/Portugal, 5. Bulgaria/Rumania (4 & 5 are tied), 6. Tunis.

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HOBBY NEWS

There is now a third Novice Handbook available. This is called "A Word to the Wise," by Elmer Hinton. It was produced as issue #100 of KAISSA, in May 1985, but I did not get to read it until May of 1986. This is a 14,000 word article covering 21 pages of text in his zine. There are ten sections and two appendices. I find most of the article well written and interesting. (With the exceptions of the books written by Peery, Walker and Richard Sharp, it's probably the longest Diplomacy piece written by a single person). My only disagreement would be with Appendix B, in which Elmer states that the revised Convoy rules in the 1982 (sic) Rulebook, XII.4, 5, and 6, should be ignored by Postal GM's, since they make Diplomacy into a variant. Allan Calhamer gave an explanation of these new Rules at the 1986 DipCon which clarified how they should be interpreted. All that's necessary would be to have Calhamer's interpretation added as an Example to the 1982 (really 1983) Rulebook.

FINAL COMMENTS

ROBERT CHEEK (Germany): I think it would improve the game if each Power had only one African Supply Center, i.e. just one unit in Africa at the start of the game. Then, people would have to ally with each other, rather than ignoring what went on there.

GM: I regret that I did not receive a Winner's statement from Kevin Kozlowski. I think this is the first BUSHWACKER game where one was not received. Kevin has received his Winner's Certificate. Mark Keller wrote to say he was sorry the game had to end so suddenly and without universal agreement. I was disappointed, too, but I felt I had no choice here. No other end-game comments were received.

I believe the suggestion for limiting each Power to one starting unit in Africa, combined with a slight decrease in the total number of SC's, would make this a better game. I have not tested this, but off the top of my head I'd say that Rhodesia, Sudan and Tunis would be the most likely candidates for demotion to ordinary spaces. This would reduce the total number of SC's to 50, and the V.C. to 26. Turkey would start with two Fleets instead of one. And I would keep my use of Iberia as the 7th Great Power instead of Russia, as we did in "II-B."

This modification would be "L'Imperialisme III." If anyone would care to make any further suggestions or modifications, please drop me a line. If I complete a revision of the map and rules, I'll let you know. Otherwise, that wraps it up for 1984H xm16. My thanks again to the players who slugged it out, and especially to two of the standby players, Mark Keller and Brad Wilson, who took over somewhat hopeless positions, but never said die.

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ATTENTION ALL PLAYERS: You are reminded that the designation of a unit must include whether it is an Army or Fleet. Merely naming its starting space is insufficient. I also wish you would show the moving unit first in your orders, followed by a list of the units supporting that move. Also, use a separate sheet of paper for each set of orders, please. Your press must be on the same page or pages with your orders for that game. This is your last warning.

EVERYBODY WANTS TO GO TO DENMARK. ITALY TRIES TO HELP GERMANY, BUT THERE'S A BREAK-DOWN IN SIGNALS. AUSTRIA GIVES TURK THE "BOOT"-APEST. FRANCE IS FINISHED.

SPRING 1905 Revisited: The TURKISH move F Smyrna-Aegean Sea should have been underscored. Adjacent parties were notified by postcard.

GM'S NOTE: Players are reminded that Rule 5 provides that the game will end after the Winter 1912 adjustments, if it has not ended earlier, since we start running out of Event Cards by that time. 84 cards will have been dealt by Winter 1911, assuming there are still seven players in the game, out of the 100-odd we're using. I wouldn't want to see every card used in a game. It's the constant variation in which cards come up that make each game unique.

Rule 5 also provides that if the players unanimously agree to a continuation, it can continue. You may recall that before the game started, I asked everyone if you wanted to play beyond 1911 (the original ending date, before the rules were revised). Only one person replied, and his vote was "Yes." How about everybody sending in a vote with your Winter 1905 orders. "YES" = game should continue beyond W 12. "NO" = game should end in W 12. Also, let me have your opinion on whether we should reshuffle the deck at that point even if the "Reshuffle" card (#15) has not been played.

GM's Comments: France, like Austria, is not out of the game. A new French Vacation Unit could be created by the play of Cards #34, 39, 39A, 76 or 83. Also, France can play any cards dealt to him each year. The only requirement is that the Frenchman drop me a postcard each season, whether or not he plays a card, to let me know he is "alive." Same will apply to anyone else in the same boat.

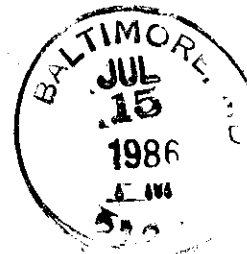
