#### NORTH AMERICAN VARIANT BANK NEWS

I received the completed draft copy of the 1987-88 NAVB Catalog around August 29th. I completed the proofreading and returned this to Bruce Geryk in Chicago around labor Day. I was later able to add another dozen newly arrived variants to the list. The final master copy of the Catalog will be printed in Chicago on October 5th, on a laser printer. I will then bring the master to my printer here in Baltimore, to have the copies made. I am hoping to keep the price down to the \$3.00 I've charged in the past, but won't be able to give you a firm price until the printer gives me the overall cost. If all goes well, I plan to begin accepting orders for the new Catalog on October 31, 1987. (I will be out of town between 18 and 28 October; hence the delay).

Because this project has taken much longer than initially anticipated, this will be called the "1987-88" Catalog, since I would not expect to be preparing another

edition for at least another 18 months. This will include everything which I was able to classify by September 17, 1987.

The NAVB Catalog will run about 34 pages, plus front and back covers, and may have a spiral binding. I'll have further details in the next issue.

## SPACE ITEMS

June 1, 1989 is now the scheduled date for the launching of the Hubble Space Telescope. This will be on Shuttle Flight #31. That happens to be on my birthday, and will be very close to marking my father's 100th birthday.

In the first seven months of 1987, the USSR launched 59 spacecraft, the U.S. five, and Japan two. The Soviet space mission to Phobos will depart in 1988. This will be followed by a mission to return Martian soil samples to Earth laboratories.

The July 13th issue of NEWSWEEK reports that the irregularities in the orbit of Uranus which led to the discovery of Neptune in 1845 stopped around 1900. Neither Neptune nor Pluto were found to be responsible for some of Uranus's strange movements. Some astronomers now believe the perturbations were caused by a 10th planet, which orbits the sun at <u>right angles</u> to the rest of the Solar System, thereby affecting the movements of the outer planets only once every couple of hundred years. If the so-called Planet X exists in a right-angle orbit, instead of the ecliptic plane, this would explain why it hasn't been discovered yet.

Incidentally, several astronomers are now suggesting that Pluto be "demoted" from the classification of a planet to that of a special type of asteroid. Having a meon (Charon) is no longer a criterion for major planet status, as it is now believed that several of the asteroids have moons, or, more scientifically, companions. This will bring the design on Chicago's Adler Planetarium back to accuracy. Built in 1930, it shows only eight major planets. As kids, we sometimes commented on this "error." Appears they were right, after all.

Note in your future book that 9,800 years from now, Barnard's Star, the fastest moving star across our line of sight, will be only 3.85 light years away, and will be the nearest star to the sun. It will be "travelling" so fast that it will cross a distance equivalent to the diameter of the full Moon every 76 years. However, it will still be invisible to the naked eye, as it's only a red dwarf star.

Barnard's Star will pass swiftly, and Alpha Centauri will/continue to be the closest star in our skies for many millenia. The Alpha Centauri system, which is a triple star, will approach to within 2.9 light years in 38,000 years, and will shine with a magnitude of -1.11. That will only make it the second brightest star in the heavens, since Sirius is also coming closer, and will have a magnitude of -1.69 at that time.

I'm sure we will have flown out to meet Barnard and "Far Centaurus" long before the years shown above. The above two paragraphs are taken from Isaac Asimov's book, Counting the Eons, Doubleday, 1983.

## CANADIAN POSTAL STRIKE NEWS

My Canadian correspondents inform me that a <u>rotating</u> strike of the Inside Canadian Postal workers will begin on October 1st. This means that the mail will probably eventually get through, but there may be significant delays in its receipt. I will mail this issue of BUSHWACKER out normally, as there has been no embargo placed on Canadian mail. Canadian players are free to phone in their orders and to ask me for the game reports by phone. I only request that you wait until two days after a deadline to do so. (i.e. Don't call before November 2nd re the Oct. 31st deadline games). Otherwise, you'd have an unfair advantage over the players receiving their results by mail. I hope that we will be able to continue the games without interuptions.

One issue in the Canadian showdown is that of setting up privately run post offices throughout the country. Fifty such franchises are planned by next March. I didn't know that Ronald Reagan's "contracting out" fever had spread north of the border!

## BASEBALL WARZ

Well, unless the Mets pull a rabbit out of the hat, we will have missed all four of the Division Championships. In the AL East we'd picked the Yankees to win, and now they'll be lucky to finish third. It appears 99% certain that Toronto will win the division. We'd picked them to finish second.

The AL West was won by Minnesota, which we'd picked for <u>fifth</u>. Our favorites, the Kansas City Royals, will finish second after being way back for most of the season. We'd picked Cincinnati to win the NL West. They collapsed in September, but at least they will finish second. The division winners, San Francisco, were fourth in my future book. In the NL East, we'd predicted St. Louis would finish second, behind the N.Y. Mets, last year's World Champions. The Mets had a terrible start; then climbed into second place around July 4th, but haven't been able to catch the Cardinals as of this writing.

I'll predict St. Louis will defeat San Francisco in the ML Playoffs, while Toronte will easily dispatch the Minnesota Twins in the American League. So, the World's Series will come to Canada for the first time. My money will be on Toronto, as I think the BlueJays are the best team in baseball this year. Just hope it doesn't snow on the ballgames. Toronto's new indoor stadium won't be ready until 1988.

As we write this, we got only one prediction right. The Houston Astros, last year's NL West champions, will finish third in that division. The surprise teams of 1987 were the Detroit Tigers, nearly winning in the AL East; and Minnesota winning in the AL West. The biggest collapse was that of the L.A. Dodgers, picked for second place in the NL West by many, including me, and barely finishing out of last place. The collapse of the 1986 AL Champion Boston Red Sox was predicted by nearly everyone, although I did not expect them to drop all the way to fifth place.

The highlight of the season for me was Paul Molitor's 39-game hitting streak. We saw him get hit #29 here in Baltimore in August.



I'd like to thank everybody who wrote to me with information about the games BRITANNIA and VICTORY IN THE PACIFIC. BRITANNIA is definitely not a Diplomacy variant, but may be a lot of fun for people who like negotiation—type board games. The game's author, Lew Pulsipher, wrote to tell me something about the game, including the fact that it was specifically designed for four players. The three and five—player rules were tacked on by the publisher in order to increase sales appeal. It may be something you'd want to try the next time you can only get four or five people together.

Two people wrote lengthy reports on VITP. Mark Gorski advised that it uses a system similar to that of an earlier and simpler game, WAR AT SEA, which covers the European theater during W.W. II. In fact, there is a kit available which enables you to merge WAR AT SEA and VITP into a single giant game. Mark says they're good games for novices, especially if you're a naval buff. (And simple enough for someone like me, who dislikes games with hundreds of cardboard counters). I saw WAR AT SEA in my local quality game store, where it sells for just \$16. They did not stock VITP. I haven't bought either one yet. If I do, I'll let you know my opinions.

## KING FOR A DAY

We have some extra space here, so I'll tell you about my recent spell of good fortune. In May, I attended the annual meeting of the Social Security Alumni Assn., an umbrella group for everyone who has retired from an SSA post. I had not intended to go, as most of the attendees are real old-timers who tend to reminisce on the early days (1937—1950) of the agency, before I came aboard. However, the lady in charge of we Red Cross Blood Bank volunteers told me, "You'd better attend, as they're going to present certificates to all you volunteers." So, reluctantly, I went. Derned if I didn't win the door prize, a beautiful oil painting by one of the retired Division Chiefs. I had to pay to get it fremed, but it does very nicely fill a blank space on our new living room wall that badly needed a picture.

Then, in August, we received free tickets to the Maryland State Fair from Channel 67, the local PBS station, for having served on their phone bank last December, during one of their phone-pledge money reising periods. This was for Sunday, Aug. 30th, which was Volunteers Day at the Fair. We had a wonderful time. Around 3 p.m., they had a drawing from among the approximately 5,000 cards the volunteers had dropped in a drum as we entered. My name was one of just 15 drawn for a free ride on the Maryland Independence, the Governor's new yacht. So, on Sep.t 15th, Inge and I drove down to Annapolis, and were welcomed aboard the coverted 55-foot sub chaser that now serves as the water conveyance for The Guv and the upper crust of Maryland politics and society.

I could get very easily accustomed to the lifestyle aboard the yacht. As I said to another visitar, "Now we know how the other 1% lives." The inside cabins are airconditioned, the fantail had awnings and comfortable seats, and the sundeck on top was just great on what was one of our last warm days of summer. They serves us a delicious lunch featuring Maryland crabcakes. The yacht carries a chef, not a cook. Since I'd just paid my quarterly Md. income taxes, I felt that I had a small share of ownership of the boat. The 4-hour cruise on Chesapeake Bay did make the payment of those taxes easier to take.
