Also, we did not know that it was actually an unfavorable term which the North applied to Confederate irregulars in the American Civil War. We just liked the sound of it. We got tired of Roman numerals, and switched our Volume Nos. to Arabic. It gets pretty involved when you get up to "XVIII".

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GAME FEES: \$9.00 Flat Fee for newcomers. \$8.00 for current readers. STANDBY FEES: \$5.00 for newcomers; \$4.00 for everyone else. Note that a standby signs up for a specific game of his choice. For your money, you receive copies of the rules/maps for your game(s) and BUSH for the duration of your game, providing you don't drop out. If you NMR twice in a row, you're out of the game, and BUSH stops coming unless you decide to sub or sign up for another game. Players and standbys don't have to worry about their subs expiring. Mensa Diplomacy SIG members receive an additional \$1.00 discount on these fees.

SUBSCRIPTIONS for non-players are 12 issues for \$6.00. OVERSEAS SUBS are \$8.00 for 12 issues, by sea mail. SAMPLE copies are 50ϕ . We also TRADE with many other zines on an all-for-all basis.

This issue contains reports on VACATION DIP III (1985R rm39), CHARACTER DIP (1987AF rm49), and, hopefully, on ATLANTICA III (1988AR oa 01). The CONQUEST OF THE NEW WORLD game is moving to DIPLOMAG, which will be out at mid-month, but those three people whose only connection with BUSH is in that game will receive this one last issue of the zine, giving you one last chance to sub or sign up as a standby for another game.

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The enclosed Mailing List was printed early, when a neighborhood printshop offered a special 3¢ per copy sale. Since it was printed, we have lost one player, Bruce Peat, and gained two new readers, Jef Bryant of Belgium, and Tim Moore of Costa Mesa, CA. So, our total circulation should now read "79" instead of 78, with 12 Californians, and only five Marylanders.

N.A.V.B. NEWS

As we were running out of copies of the 1987-88 NAVB Catalog, I have made a small Second Printing. The only differences are that I have bound the three UPDATES and the Errata Sheet into the Catalog; included the two new subcategories, "rc" and "rh;" and made a few white-out corrections "by hand" in the book.

I had been afraid to order more than 75 copies of the original printing back in Nov., 1987, as I was afraid of getting stuck with a mass of unsold copies. I would have been stuck with them if it hadn't been for the "Diplomacy" article in THE GENERAL. At least 17 copies were sold as a direct result of the NAVB plug in THE GENERAL. So, as my supply shrank and orders continued to come in at a rate of about one per week, I realized I'd better make a Second Printing as an interim measure, especially since several copies of the first printing need to be saved for the permanent files. Anyone who already has a copy of the 87-88 Catalog need not order a Second Printing. If you need copies of UPDATES #2 & #3, just send me a SASE and 25¢. The Second Printing is meant for new-comers ordering their first copy.

THE CANADIAN BRANCH of the NAVB is in the process of being transferred from Ronald J. Brown in Kanata, Ont., to Douglas W. Acheson, in Barrie, Ont. Douglis the new Coordinator of the Canadian Diplomacy Organization. Ron is extremely busy now with other matters, so they felt it would be a good idea to centralize this Branch under Doug's control. The Canadian Branch has about 25% of the total number of titles carried here in the Main Bank, but this may include many of the more popular designs. The idea is that since most American banks will no longer accept Canadian cheques without an outrageous service charge, Canadians should have an opportunity to first order a variant from a source that can accept their cheques or currency. If the particular game is not available in the Canadian Branch, the Custodian will forward the order to me.

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RE DIPCON/WORLDCON SITES. Brad Wilson comments that most people in the hobby cannot afford to jet all over the continent to attend such conventions. ((This is especially true since many of the discount fares were abolished in December 1988.)) Therefore, he says, it's important to hold the DipCons on a rotating basis near where the bulk of the participants live. "I have said this before: DipCons should be held in the Northeast, the Chicago/Milwaukee/Detroit ((triangle)) or California - no where else. That would assure attendance!"

Thems my words, too, pardner. I had once offered a suggestion that the two middle DipCon Regions (II-Great Lakes; and III-Central) be merged, to provide for a single midamerican DipCon site in between the East Coast and Pacific locations. This was shot down in flames, as there was a sudden rise in the number of DipLomats in Texas, coincident with the Texas Oil Boom. (Many people moved from places like Michigan and Pennsylvania to Texas). The Boom went bust, and it seems that the 1988 DipCon in San Antonio followed suit. What we need now is to see some current Census figures to see whether there are enough people in Tex-homs to warrant the existence of Region III. As many of you know, I took the Census figures from Larry Peery and broke them down by States for many years. If Dick Martin is doing a 1989 Census, I hope he'll include such a breakdown. Anyone who wants to see a copy of my last breakdown, for 1987, may have one if you'll send mea SASE.

In any event, I add my voice to Brad's in calling for DipCon to be held where the Diplomats live.


THE WINNERS IN THE RUSTY BOLT (N.A.) AWARDS

Six players voted on the two proposed Draws. The player who failed to vote was counted as voting "Yes." Even with that, there was a bare majority voting in favor of the 3-way T-I-R Draw (Proposal #1). Proposal #2, the 5-way Draw, was overwhelmingly defeated. Several people made it clear that they would not approve any Draw in which they were not included.

A Concession to Turkey has been proposed. However, in view of the strong stands against any such proposals by certain parties, I'm not going to put that up for a vote now. Let's play Spring 1916 first, and then you can submit new proposals.

I have tentative orders for Spring 1916 on file from nearly everyone. However, feel free to submit amended orders if you wish. I am hoping that this will happen in at least one case. I wish to thank Eric Brosius for submitting back-up orders for Austria. While they weren't needed, they were helpful in letting me know that there weren't going to be any MMR's.

Brad Wilson wishes to go on record as being opposed to the Winter 1920 ending date for this game. However, I wish to remind everyone that the original ending game for Vacation Dip was going to be 1912. Fortunately, the starting players voted to extend the game back in 1985, so we could work on introducing new Event Cards. I have never liked "Perpetual" games. I have this awful feeling that if some sort of cap isn't put on 1985R, it might go on forever! This still gives you five more game years to come to a conclusion. Shall we take another vote on this matter? Please let me know how you feel with your next set of orders, or just a postcard if you don't need to submit any revised orders.

PRESS:

FRANCE to Turkey: Thanks. Now, I need to ask to predict that Fred will give me better cards.

RUSSIA to Turkey: People do things for the powerful; they don't wait to be asked. RUSSIA to Austria: The prudent man does himself good. The virtuous man does it to other men.

Sevastopol: A DOT TOO FAR. The elita German parachute unit was routed here last September when they unknowingly landed in an area where two crack camal divisions were resting. The German attack, called OPERATION BLACKMARKET-GARDEN, was suppost to have the paratroops capture key bridges to the Crimea while the German army marched in. As all players were informed, George Kilmer's orders for Germany arrived just one day late, before I mailed the December BUSH, and were accepted. Then, Dan Palter contacted me in mid-December, to say he was positive he'd mailed me a set of orders for C.S.A. in September. He had mailed me a lengthy comment on my German Battleship article at that time. He subsequently sent me a revised version of same. It is possible that a set of orders might have been included with the first letter, and overlooked by me. Or, Dan may have intended to enclose his orders and forgotten to do so, as all of us have done on occasion. The only thing I'm certain of is that when the revised letter arrived, I threw away the first envelope without reopening it. (I asked him whether the letter was meant to be printed in BUSH, as he hadn't said one way or the other. This is the only reason I'd saved either letter.)

Dan advises me that, subsequently, he was away from home for a lengthy period, and was not aware of his NMR until he received my letter. He promotly sent in another set of CSA orders for April 1870, which, he says, are as close to his original set as he can remember after this length of time. So, I have to give Dan Palter the benefit of the doubt, and restore him as the righful ruler of CSA.

Nothing more was heard from Bruce Peat, so I have to assume that he was another of those "shooting stars" we've had in the Postal hobby. As you were all informed, Steve Smith is now the Canadian player of record. Steve had written asking for a further delay, as he had not received replies from some of the other players.

I asked Steve to please submit a set of Canadian orders ASAP, so we could get this game started, as I didn't want to delay the game any further. I'm very pleased to report that the Canadian orders arrived on December 30th, so this game can now begin.

FRANCE to Germany: I like your peace proposal, but if you moved to Burgundy, I'll assume you were joking.

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THE SERVICE-INDUSTRY SOCIETY is not just limited to the United States. A recent article in <u>The German Tribune</u> (an English-language summary of highlights from the German press) shows that this is happening everywhere in the First World.

As of 1987, only 30% of employed Americans worked in Production industries (farming, manufacturing, construction), while 70% worked in Service industries, such as banking, insurance, transport, restaurants, etc. However, in the rest of the First World, the same trend is evident. The percentage of Production workers rises from a low of 31% in Holland and 33% in Britain to a high of 46% in Germany and Austria. (In Germany and some other countries, farmers are subsidized to keep them "down on the farm" instead of moving to the cities, for social rather than economic reasons).

In poorer countries, Production work is still the norm. The figures for workers in these fields are 56% for Greece, 58% for East Germany, 59% in the USSR, and a whopping 83% in China. Even here, the figures have been dropping for the past 20 years. While only one worker in four is female in Production industries, 50% of the workers in the Service industries are women. Thus, the services have been the key to independence for women in the West. They are also where virtually all job growth in occurring in all parts of the world.
