I've played postal Diplomacy for a long time and for two years I edited and published "20 Years On", the quarterly European zine listing. I think I have the right experience to edit the "Zine Register": I hope I'm also sufficiently fair and objective to do so with the support of al sections of the American hobby.

The only change I intend to make is to turn the "Zine Register" into a regular four-monthly zine with subscribers and traders... You may think it odd that such an infrequent zine is asking for trades with larger and faster zines, nevertheless it will be worth your while. It will help me to get to know your zines and allow me to write your listing if you're too busy to do your own. In addition all trades will go to form the new "American Zine Bank". This will be a new hobby service based on the successful British Zine Bank. Any newcomers to hte hobby who want to sample zines in bulk can simply send me a large envelope and \$1-\$2 postage and in return they will receive as many zines as I can send. This idea has proved very popular in Britain, so I hope it will catch on here.

THE STATE OF DIPLOMACY WORLD:

First off, Diplocacy World was faked recently. The fake was sent out to all suscribers. You might not know that it is a fake, but believe me it is. Next, Larry Peery put out a five page release telling us publishers the problems with Dw and asking us to republish the information by Oct. 15,. I don't have the space to cover it all, but I'll try to paraphase Larry and let you all know the problems.

- Diplomacy World is bankrupt. DW lacks the resources to fulfill its current and future obligations with it's current resources. In fact, it has no resources at the moment. However, that does not necessarily mean that DW will fold. That decision will be made by DW subbers who are being polled to determine if they will wish to fold the zine, and take out their sub obligations in back issues or issue: donated by other hobby pubbers; or whether they wish to forgive thier past sub debts, take out a new sub, make a donation to the zine, and save it. If the decision is to fold, Larry will do it the best way that he can. They want back issues from publishers to cover the cost of fold, if needed. Larry and Kathy want to save DW because without it, the Diplomacy hobby is truely without a backbone and a source of new members. The needs DW because it needs a flagship publication, it needs an unbiased single source of information, with no feuding, it needs a place to keep its records, it needs a source of original writing about all aspects of the zine. It also needs a sound financial basis and published regularly.

Again, what worries me (particularly with the Survival Game) is that people will begin thinking war is fun. And if that happens, watch out: We're in for Rambo, Part III.

By the way, you don't need to tell me to look at photographs of Hiroshima's victims. We've all seen them. We all know the consequences of nuclear war. I personally believe an all-out nuclear exchange is highly unlikely unless we form up our conventional deterrance.






