The Letters

EDITORS NOTE: I just wanted to mention that this will be the last issue that will have any massive amounts of political letters. One or two may slip through in the future, but I feel that the subject has been covered and more would just repeat and repeat. But for now......

TERRY SUITOR: First off Rod Walker's letter was mostly accurate, but he did make a major mistake. The West German Army is probably the strongest army in all of NATO, and is probably incapable in increasing any more. In fact it will be short 125,000 men within a decade, One thing most 'MATO bashers'on this side of the ocean forget, is that the U.S. has lived on European capital, during the first few years after Vietnam. For example, during the '70's the U.S. deployed only three weapon systems to Europe, all based upon the same weapon. the T.O.W., while the U.S.S.R. deployed nineteen. Another example is during the Iranian hostage crisis, a Pentagon offical made a trip to the carriers in the Arabian Sea and did an inspection of the weapons aboard her. He found out that the newest was a Shrike antiradation bomb made in 1966. Luckly, the U.S. has rearmed, and will hopefully continue, now the Europeans must continue adding newer and better

weapons systems.

Finally I can't help but reply to John Norris. His first idea, that Europe is better at diplomacy than the U.S. is, is probably right. However, I would like to remid him that the Europeans all signed and ratified the Treaty of Versailles while the U.S. Senate never did, so I guess both sides have made their mistakes. His second idea, about neclear war is somewhat more debatable. First off, I should say I am a somewhat believer inMAD. After all, not all nuclear weapons are equal, a conflict at sea using nuclear torpedoes and depth charges might be controllable, compared to a full scale SS-20 strike. May complaint is that neither side is going to use nuclear missiles and artillery until it has been defeated on the battlefield, so it is quite likely that there will be heavy casualties, Europe might survive intact, and if not at least the other continents are bound to survie more or less intact. Finally I have to disagree with his idea of our patriotism being 'knee jerk'. The U.S. has had a different experience gaining its freedom than any of the Europeans, and for two world wars it was the one who pulled Europe's shestnuts out of the fire. Not only that, the the American spirit has been can-do, not sit down and let the government do it as most Europeans seem to do recently. Maybe that Doesn't explain it all, but I would rather take the U.S. spirit over the European model any day, as I believe many of the Europeans would.

Finally I guess I should add a few ideas of my own. First off, why does everybody expect a nuclear freeze to reduce tensions between the superpowers. Even if all nuclear weapons were destroyed, the U.S.S.R. would have enough military force to grab W. Germany for example. I suggest that if we wanted to reduce tensions in Europe both sides should reduce the almount of bridging and pipeline material (the U.S.S.R. has 24,000 meters of Bridging material). That plus a treaty preventing each side from attacking each otheres bridges would obviously make it harder ofr each side to attack the other. Of cours it isn't asglamious as nukes, but it would be much more effective. Also why does everybody want only a nuclear freeze. For the last decade plus, the main U.S. advantage has been with accuracy, while the Russians had bigger and better missiles. A nuclear freeze would give the Russians a pernament lead in numbers and size, but wouldn't protect our lead in accuracy. This might not seem important in a world ruled by MAD, but remember thaere has never been any indication that the Russiam political and military leadership believes in such. I don't know, but maybe some of your European readers can answer the questions above. ((Sure I"ll try. Funny that I should balance this with Sir Dolton, but that's my job.))

The trouble is, I don't agree with the premises upon which he argues. For instance his coments about the USA "pulling the West's chestnut's out of the fire" are a little budious. World War I would almost certainly have lasted somewhat longer without U.S. intervention but I don't think that said intervention was still necessary. An in WW2, the UK was hardly snatched from the jaws of defeat: having failed to mount a successful invasion in 1940, Germany was never going to get another chance; and time favoured the UK and not Nazi Germany. Almost certainly, the USA's arrival on the scene in the form of materical help as well; as men was very helpful, but probably less helpful than someone assassination Hilter and the high-ranking officials of the SS would have been. War is a very ifefficient way of going about things, and has been for thousands of years. The trouble is that people are slow to learn and these days the people responsible for going to talk if they had to lead their forces to war?

An interesting note to observe is that in WW2, Russia was 'our' ally and Germany our enemey. Now Rod wants Germany to be a major power and join against the USSR. Funny how parter-swapping

On to Jim Burgess: some interesting comments and observation. Odd that he sould agree with Rod Walker, because I would agree with a lot of what Jim Says and not much of what Rod says. One point I'd take up is the one about "neutrality being an absolute or extreme policy? Doesn't seem to make sense to me. Nice to see someone realising how the American people see the outside world is as much down to 'official' propoganda as how the average Soviet citizen sees things.

John Morris: I mostly agree with, and since (as you, Cathy, point out) he writes far more lucidly and logically than I, perhapes I sould shut up...

((Ch, never let me do that. In regard to WW2 and Russia, remember that Russia was under the Realm of Nicholas II at the time of the start of that war. It was the war against Germany that drained and hurt Russia to the point of Revolution. The were other factors as well, but war was one of them. That we can start to talk to each other.))

I too, would like to see a nuclear free world (not just Europe), but given man's baser ideals it's not realistic. American foreign policy has many faults but I belive that the 'free' world should be thankful that she's there.

WHILE I agree with a lot that John Norris had to say, I find it a wee bit presumptuous for him to lecture all and sundry about the supposed political sophistication of Europeans, as opposed to Americans, by alleged virtue of their long, long history of making ghastly miscalculations on the international scene. How quickly we forget that we Americans are Europeans too, and we have the same long-term background as to they-all who stayed behind in the Old Country. If we are to believe that somehow the Europeans are less naive than we are, we must first explain away Munich Agreement of 1938...which represents an act of the grossest naivete, combined with the most cynical act of betrayal since Lloyd George hoodwinked poor old Woody Wilson at Versailles. It is possible that the Europeans have learned a lot more in the intervening 46 years than we have, but I am inclined to doubt it. Some very sophisticated Americans, such as Bill Buckley, would surely say it is even now the Europeans who are being naive. I do not mean to endorse Buckly generally, but one must recognize that there is no conclusive argument on either side. And this whole business about who's naive and who isn't smacks of (as they say in San Francisco) the fondue pot calling the crepe pan beige.

Jim Burgess is a fine man. "There is not 'right' way to live, but accepting that is very difficult." Nicely put, Jim! One of my weaknesses is my tendency to think that my (for 'my' read 'British) politics/lifestyle/music is superior to everyone elses (for 'everyone' else's read particularly American). Sometimes this bigotry is unconscious and Barbara has to point it out to me. Now that I've actually spent time in America and been able to talk to many Americans, I can begin to accept many of their views (yes, even Brux's support for Reagan) even though I don't agree with them. I don't really think my socio-political views have altered by being here, although my dislike of rapant consumerism has intensified. I'm still as left-wing as ever by American standards, though, by British standards, I'm sure I'll still be regarded as a soggy centrist.

- There are eight players, representing seven powerful Ranches (LOWE STAR, RANCHO GRANDE, RED RIVER, LAZY S, SOUTH FORK, MULE RIDGE and LOWESOME PINE) on the Texas/Nexico border, plus the local band of Outlaws (THE DEVIL'S HOLE GANG).
- 3. Printed on the game map are 15 supply centres 8 home centres (the seven ranch houses, plus the Devil's Hole), 6 neutral centres (the Rio Grande Mine plus the towns of Tombstone, Cripple Creek, Medecine Hat, Broken Jaw and Santa Elena) and one owned centre (the town of High Roon). The latter is exactly the same as a neutral except that when the game begins it is already under the control of the Devil's Hole Gang. These 15 centres do
- 4. Not printed on the game map are, at the start of the game, a further 21 centres 8 owned and 13 neutral. These centres are herds of cattle, and All the players start with one herd (abbreviated 'H') except for the Lazy S and the DRG. The Lazy S starts with two herds, the DRG with none.
- 5. The only other unit used is the Gang (abbreviated 'G') of ranch hands or outlaws. The Lazy S starts with three gangs, the other seven players have two apiece. Gangs move as do Armies in regular Diplomacy.
- 6. Initial Placement:-

G(Devil's Hole), G(High Noon) Devil's Hole Gang:


8. Although each player includes any herds he controls in each set of orders (e.g. "G(Coo)-Lsy, G(LPR)-Fir, H(Val)") herds may never move on their own nor may they give support in any way. The only way to move a herd is to move it with a gang (e.g. "GH(ISJ)-Rio"). Note that "GH" is not a permanent unit - it merely shows that the gang and the herd are moving together. Like gangs, herds may move only one space.

- 9. When a gang is ordered to move to a space with its herd, including the case where it enters the space against opposition (i.e. it is successfull; supported into a space) it may take its hard with it (the 'GH' order is used) <u>provided</u> the space entered does not already contain a herd. If it does, the attacking gang's herd remains where it is and the gang moves on its own. However, gangs forced to retreat from a space may never retreat their her with them. If a gang is removed through being forced to retreat but havin no retreat orders (or no available retreat spaces) its herd remains in
- any herd in an area occupied by a gang may be moved (as per 8 and 9) by the player owning the gang, who includes the herd on his orders for that
- There are two seasons per year, Summer and Winter, with Branding (i.e. Adjustments) in the Spring. Ownership of supply centres is determined at the end of the Winter move. However, any herd in a space occupied by a rival gang during the Summer move is returned to neutral status unless the owning player can recapture the herd before the Spring Branding count. (This represents the muisance value of fence-cutting raids, and does not apply to non-movable supply centres.)
- 12. Builds may be of two types new gangs or new herds (but see 13). These must be placed on the board on a player's home centre if it is available. (Note that a gang occupying a space does not block the building of a herd and vice versa. A gang and a herd may be built in the same space at the same time if it is completely empty.) Failing this, a player may build in any other non-movable supply centres he owns (including captured how centres). If none of these are free, he may build in any space occupied by one of his herds. (Note that these builds must therefore be gangs.)
- 13. Whenever a player captures a rival home centre for the first time, he may choose to make one of his builds a herd (provided he has some builds coming to his) during the following Spring. Herds may not be built a any other time, including the subsequent recapture of that home centre by the same player. Herds built in this way do not require a supply centre to meintain them - they are counted, in fact, as supply centres in their own right when the next Spring Branding count begins.
- 14. It is perfectly possible for herds to occupy non-movable supply centres. Any player having control of that space at the end of the Winter move thus controls two centres, and reaps the benefits.
- 15. There are two rivers on the map the Red River and the Rio Grande. The Red River in no way impedes movement (e.g. "G(CCN)-Tom" and "G(COS)-CON" are both legal) but the Rio Grande, which divides the board into Texas and Mexico, forms three board spaces of its own. Any herd left unattended in one of these at the end of a move is removed from play.
- 16. The Victory Criterion is the sole control of 19 supply centres.


