PRESS (No dateline): We now begin a series on Great Austrians for the education of our readers. Count Edward von Taaffe, 1833-1895, Viscount of Austria, Baron of Ballymote in the Peerage of Ireland, Premier and Minister of the Interior, 1868-1870, 1879-1893. "Count Taaffe made good use of his ancestry. A descendant of Irish peers who had settled in Austria after the Thirty Years War, His Excellency was Cork County handsome, with a dark, softly curling mustache. He parlayed blarney, Gemutlichkeit and elegance into a political infallibility which kept him at the right hand of the throne longer than any other Prime Minister during Franz Joseph's long reign. Armed with adroit ideas, unencumbered by ideals, he cheated the inevitable, crises in, crises out, for fourteen years. Clericals liked him for his industrious churchgoing. Anti-clericals were disarmed by his statements against the Vatican concordat. His federalist leanings appeased Czechs and Poles, while German liberals liked his asides that personally and emotionally he was really one of them. Anti-Semites sometimes detected a sympathizer in him when he spoke out against "foreign capitalists." But Jews did not worry: Wasn't His Excellency's chief counselor named Blumenstock?

Nobody could worry effectively in Count Taaffe's presence. With a bit of light-hearted manipulation here, a touch of jovial chicanery there, he not only reconciled irreconcilables but spun out of them a parliamentary majority: Catholic politicians, Slav nationalists, aristocrats, and even a smattering of liberals. His fine tuned ambiguities, his opaque showmanship enabled the Emperor to remain sober, straight

and immaculate. Bravo, Count Taaffe! He rode the steeplechase, jumped the moats, leaped barriers while blowing smoke rings and lifting his derby to the ladies.

Vienna loved him for that. It loved him particularly that fall (1888) because he made an old Viennese slang word officially immortal. "Our government's policy," he said in a speech before Parliament, "can be best defined as 'fortwursteln.'"

Henceforward fortwursteln stood legitimized not only as a statesman's philosophy but as the eternal Austrian way of life. The genus loci so saturates the word that fortwursteln cannot be transported intact into other languages. Maybe its English sense could be rendered best (but still inadequately) by a mixture of three phrases: Keep improvising...keep slogging on...keep clowning..." pp. 158-159, A Nervous Splendor, Vienna 1888/1889, Frederic Morton, 1979. Look for future accounts of Great Austrians.

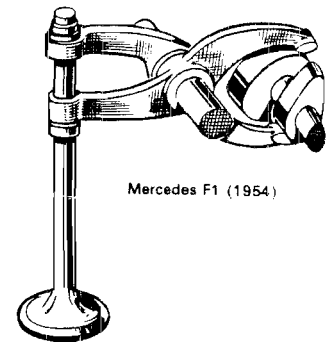

CDO ELECTIONS

Elections will be held for CDO (Canadian Diplomacy Organization) Coordinator and for CDO Ombudsman between June 1, 1980 and September 1, 1980. Nominations to run for these offices will be accepted up until June 1st.

If you are Canadian, you may nominate any Canadian you wish for either or both positions, by sending the nominee a nomination with your signature and hobby status. If the person receiving the nomination chooses to run, he can countersign the nomination and mail it to John Leeder (121 19th Ave. NE., Calgary, Alberta T2E 1N6). Nobody may run for more than one of the two positions, but may be nominated for both. I assume you may nominate yourself.

The candidates and voting procedures will be announced after the nominating deadline of June 1st.

The following CDO constitutional proposals have been formulated by Francois Cuerrier (the Acting President (Coordinator?) and Acting Ombudsman) and Randolph Smyth.

You may vote for or against these proposals by answering yes or no to the following questions, and mailing your votes to John Leeder by September 1, but please read the proposals first. The majority opinion of the votes received will win.

- 1) Do you agree that there should be any constitution at all?
- 2) Do you agree with the formula for allowing U.S. Americans in proposed by Randolph Smyth and Francois Cuerrier?

CDO'S CONSTITUTIONAL PROPOSALS

Preamble:

Note that this "document" is not a matter of fact: they are Randolph Smyth's and my (Francois Cuerrier) proposals.

There are many sensible arguments in favour of a CDO Constitution. It will legitimize CDO, and may well be its best description ever. It is a good idea to assemble all dispersed bits of information in one clear paper. In addition, there have been past problems, such as officer dropouts; this outlines, for the first time, the procedures used in many cases to correct them. A CDO Constitution may be the occasion for a new wave of publicity for us.

But these proposals also are attempting to definitively tackle one particular issue: the role of U.S. residents. Should they be eligible for CDO office? Should they have complete franchise rights? Given the moderate volume of U.S. interest, we think a moderate representation is appropriate. Below is the formula we propose.

The authors have written these proposals with a few basic principles in mind: CDO traditional policies should be cleared up a little, and its traditional procedures re-affirmed. Yet we want the document to be highly flexible; for this reason, we haven't gone into individual office procedures, which vary according to the person in charge.

80.1. Admissibility and Eligibility:

Anyone subscribing to a Canadian Diplomacy zine is a CDO member. The Census attempts to mention all of them despite some inevitable minor shortcomings.

Non-Canadian residents may fill any CDO office except CDO Publisher, CDO Coordinator (President), and CDO Ombudsman. They may sit on the OAC (Ombudsman Advisory Committee) as long as they do not form more than 50% of all sitting members.

80.2. Offices and Functions:

- A) CDO Coordinator (ELECTIVE). His functions include:
- i. creating offices: he may create new offices at his whim, as long as they take nothing away from other officers.
 - ii. select a date for elections at least once every other year.

- iii. coordinate CDO, including: giving help and advice to novice GMs and publishers when requested, coordinate CDO GMs when necessary, encourage overseas contacts, assume the responsibilities of departed subordinate offices until a replacement can be found, and generally perform all functions useful in coordinating the hobby.
- iv. remove officers for abuse of power, incompetence, or lack of interest.
- B) CDO Publisher. His functions include:
 - i. print THE NATIONAL 4 times a year at fairly regular intervals.
 - ii. encourage contributions to THE NATIONAL.
 - iii. answer questions on the CDO.
 - iv. replace the Coordinator if an emergency arises and if he drops out, until elections can be held.
- C) CDO Novice Directors: One director is in charge of Francophone novices, whereas the other deals with all others. Their functions include:
 - i. publish their respective Novice Packages (V'LA LE BON VENT and CEPHEIDS or their equivalent).
 - ii. introduce novices to CDO and the Canadian hobby.
- D) CDO Returning Officer: His function is compiling election and plebiscite results.
- E) CDO Census Officer: His functions include:
 - i. compiling the Census twice a year.
 - ii. sending the compilation (which must at least include a list of CDO members and addresses) to the CDO Publisher for publication in THE NATIONAL.
- F) CDO Orphaned Games Project: The Orphans Officer's functions include:
 - i. printing FAGIN when necessary.
 - ii. relocating Canadian orphaned games.

The following is completely independent of the CDO Coordinator:

- G) CDO Ombudsman (ELECTIVE). His functions include:
 - i. arbitrating disputes (among CDO officers, GMs and players) upon appeal from one of the involved parties.
 - ii. selecting OAC members after consultation with CDO publishers.
 - iii. summoning and presiding over the OAC.
 - iv. assuming other functions dealing with ethics.
- H) The OAC (Ombudsman Advisory Committee). The OAC may consist of any number of members (at the Ombudsman's discretion) as long as no more than 50% are non-Canadian residents. Its functions are:
 - i. interpreting the Constitution when necessary.
 - ii. making recommendations on any ethics issue.
 - iii. acting as final appeal to previous Ombudsman arbitrations.

The positions of CDO Coordinator, CDO Ombudsman, or CDO Returning Officer may never be combined in a single individual.

80.3 Election and Replacement Procedures:

- A) The CDO Coordinator calls for elections for both elective positions once every other year. This must be followed by a sufficient length of time in which nominations are submitted. Unless all candidates are acclaimed, this must be followed by an adequate length of time in which candidates may campaign and votes may be cast and compiled.
- B) A resigning officer may nominate his own replacement, with approval of the CDO Coordinator. By-elections are immediately called should the CDO Coordinator or the CDO Ombudsman resign or drop out. The CDO Publisher may not appoint a non-Canadian as his own replacement.
- C) Should an officer fail to nominate an acceptable replacement then the CDO Coordinator may appoint one. Clearly, he may not appoint a non-Canadian resident to the position of CDO Publisher and may not make appointments to the position of CDO Ombudsman. Finally, his choice for CDO Returning Officer must be approved by the CDO Ombudsman.
- D) An officer who doesn't show interest in his functions may be considered a dropout and the CDO Coordinator may appoint a replacement, subject to the above restrictions.
- E) Any CDO member may vote for or nominate a candidate for each elective position.

80.4. Amendments:

Amendments may be implemented following the approval by 66% of all voters in a plebiscite. The plebiscite must be preceded by a sufficient length of time in which the opposition may get a chance to be heard.

Comments:

Note that everything, except the idea of a Constitution (and of introducing U.S. citizens) respects the spirit of CDO. Not much is revolutionary: it only formalizes what was done informally in the past.

We believe non-Canadian residents should be allowed a greater part in the organization. After all, they are 40% of the Census! Besides, at least 3 American publishers have shown great interest. On the other hand, CDO is a Canadian organization so Coordinator, Publisher, and Ombudsman have been retained as "Canadian-only" jobs.

Officers should remember that the foundation of their "authority" (if any) lies in their cohesion, their credibility, and everyone's support. Petty feuding and ego-trips are no-nos: they are contrary to the very philosophy the organization was built on. There is no reason why CDO should be any different now: CDO has worked out OK in the past: the major reason may well be that no one was interested in "power".

The CDO Coordinator's power to remove an officer has never been used in the past, and hopefully never will; this particular officer should keep in mind that this truly is an extraordinary measure which should be used with caution.

Comments from anyone are invited: remember, these only are proposals.

THE DREAM by Eric Ozog

They speak to you in riddles and all your senses are affected. Vivid colors, piercing sounds, and tepid smells accompany them. ANOTHER STANDBY POLICY CHANGE

In the past I've used the first standby on the list who has never been associated with a particular game. If someone was asked to standby and didn't get that position, he was ineligible for that game in the future.

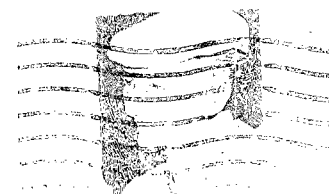
From now on, anyone asked to submit orders which are not used will still be eligible for that same country in the future, and will in fact get top priority. Of course, he may be disqualified by then because of changes in geographic distribution of the players, or the number of games he is in.

Such standbys will still be eligible for other games, under the normal rotation. This policy is not retroactive, and will not cover standby positions called prior to this issue.

This change increases the possibility that any communications between the standby and other players will not be wasted when he doesn't get the position initially, as he may get it in the future. Also, it may decrease the disruption caused when another standby comes into the game cold.
