### DIPLOMACY AT JIM O'KELLEY'S

Briefly, on Sunday, the 12th, I again went to Jim O'Kelley's house to play *Diplomacy* and I got creamed.

Jim had 14 players on two boards, and I was randomly assigned Russia on Board 2. I opened 1901 with A War-Sil because I didn't feel like pussy-footing and because I am stupid. France (Greg Riedel) joined my anti-Germany campaign, and so did Italy (Ted Torgerson), but England (Bryan Westhoff) - who could have smashed Germany - was talked into an anti-*me* alliance by my back stabbing ally Turkey (Marc Peters).

So my grand alliance desolved as Marc reorchestrated things and Turkey, Austria, England and Germany came after me while Turkey, Austria and France went after Italy. I lasted through 1907 and barely outlived Italy, through lucky retreats of my last unit: War to Pru, Pru to Ber, Ber to Mun, Mun to Tyo.

By the end of S'07, I'd become irrelevant and apparently invisible. As the other players went from room to room working out tactics, stabs and strategies, I sat at the board twiddling my thumbs. France and Austria had just allied, and they approached the board together and Austria said to France, "I can't afford to lose Venice, but if you order A Pie-Ven and I order A Tri-Ven, we'll bounce, covering Venice without risking losing Trieste." "Good idea," said France, and they both began writing orders.

Annoyed at being nonexistent, I spoke, "Yeah, good idea. I wonder which of you two my A Tyo will support into Venice." "Oh," said France. Suddenly I was visible.

But being visible didn't help me survive. Germany sat in *my* Munich and I could not replace the center, so instead I bounced France over Venice, allowing Austria to face the rampaging Turkey, and then *poof*, I was gone.

Just before my elimination, England had stabbed Germany and Turkey had stabbed Austria, and soon Germany and Austria were also poofed. In 1909 it was Turkey 13, England 12 and France 9 with England starting to work with France to stop Marc. At the end of 1910 Turkey had 16, England 11 and France 7, but England and France were close to establishing a stalemate line.

The game was at a crucial point, and as everyone gathered around the board there was open speculation as to whether England/France could stop Turkey. The ex-Austrian, Mike Roth, looked over at me and said, "Andy, what do you think?" I wanted to say, "If England orders A Fin-Stp with Nwy supporting and F Bot-Bal, Turkey will take Tunis next year but not Berlin and will be stopped forever at 17," but such kibitzing from a dead player is crummy, so I just shrugged my shoulders.

And England ordered F Bot-StP with Nwy supporting and A Fin-Swe, and Turkey took Tunis and Berlin and won.

It was an enjoyable game, and well played by everyone but me. Marc made not one mistake that I saw, yet *just* managed the solo win because of the only mistake I saw Bryan make. Good game.

Another game was played as well, on Board 1 in the next room.

Jim was Germany, Chris Davis was Austria, Nick Rohn - who I'd met at Jim's in November - was England, Christian Kline was France, Thom Comstock - a novice - was Italy, Jason Raynovich from November was Russia, and Chris Young - a fellow Mini driver - was Turkey. Also in attendance, sort of, was a woman's voice on Jim's computer which audibly counted down the deadlines as the seconds ticked off on the screen: "15 minutes." "10 minutes." "5 minutes." "2 minutes." "1 minute." "45 seconds." "30 seconds." "15 seconds." "10, 9, 8, 7, 6, 5, 4, 3, 2, 1, 0." Her accent reminded me of Twiggy, who I have always had a crush on.

Anyway, as I occasionally looked in, this game seemed less methodical than Board 2. When we were down to three players, they still had six. When our game had ended and I left for home, I believe that England and France on Board 1 each had 10 centers, while Jim had 2 and Turkey 3, with Austria and Russia sharing 9. The original Turk had left early, so Alex Riedel, the harried German from my game, took over. I learned the next day that over the next two hours Alex had worked Turkey up to 11 centers and shared in an England/France/Turkey draw.

BOOK REVIEW - LOLITA

I expected *Lolita* to be lively, funny and slightly twisted, and found it to be lively, funny and slightly sick. It is also compelling, although I wish I had a less *NPRish* word.

The narrator/protagonist, Humbert Humbert, is a middle-aged man obsessed with pre-teen girls, who ends up marrying Lolita's mother to be near Lolita. I won't tell any more of the story, so as not to ruin it, but it is funny, engaging (another *NPR* word), unexpected and sometimes repulsive. I don't think I would call this pornography but sometimes when Humbert Humbert is describing his attraction toward girls, and I realized he was talking about 11 year olds, I felt like closing the book, putting it in a paper bag and putting the bag out in the garage.

But as the reviewer on the radio who prompted me to read the book said, remember that it's a story about obsession, not pedophilia. Humbert Humbert is a creep, and portrayed as a creep, and pedophilia is not promoted.

But, the pedophilia is there, so if you don't want to read *Lolita*, don't. If you do read it, skip any introductory notes: they will probably ruin the story, however, skip the *Forward*, which is the actual beginning of the novel.

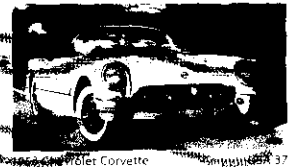
