MORE MONSTERS FOR D&D!

First off on our exciting list is the RTD bus...Number appearing:1-2, Armor class:1, Moves in inches:17-28, hit dice:3-7, % in lair:5%, type or amount of treasure:Type I + 30 SILVER PIECES.

DESCRIPTION:For those of you who live in IA, you should know what this is. It is actually a transport vehicle, and can take from 10-20 occupants (roll on 20-sided die. If it is less than or equal to ten, it is ten; on up to 20.) This monster's length may be determined by the GM (snicker, snicker) although it's height is 8', (width determined by GM). In melee, besides the first round for the RTD Bus, the windows may be opened and swords, spears, wands, and even magic be used on the windows (roll on a 12-sided die if the window works for that particular character. 12 indicates that the window is broken.). RTD Buses also may hijack the driver, roll on an 8-sided die (8 indicates that the bus will drive itself, 7 indicates that the bus will have a 50% chance of driving itself on the next turn.). Buses may have no occupants. If so, the bus will be driving itself (1-3 on 6 sided die) or being driven by magic (4-5 on 6 sided die) or be stalled (6 on 6 sided die). I might have left something out, but I don't think so.

The next monster is the CHIHUAHUA. Number appearing:1-500(!), hit dice: 1-8, % in lair:40%, type or amount of treasure:TYPE G+ 2 Magical Items!

The Chihuahua is a small (1' high) monster, that can be ~~friendly~~ lawful, or chaotic, NEVER neutral. They can be accompanied (roll 1-3 on 6-sided die) by a giant chihuahua (next in this article.). If found outside their lair, they will contain 4-7 magical items in their collars. They also may be wearing

Nobody else, save Blair Cusack, probably even remembers what happened in this game back in Costaguana. An Anglo-French alliance made progress into Germany. I took our Russia (Greg Warden) while France (Dennis Brackman) took out Italy. He lucked out because Hilliker dropped, leaving free centers.

In the south, I still didn't know what was up. Aus-Rus-Tur were fighting but little came of it. The reason was the over-riding characteristic of this game: missed moves. Gehrke (Austria) made a move, then missed, and repeated the cycle. He was replaced by John Carroll, who pulled the same antics, then by Herb Barents who finally submitted moves consistently.

Brackman and I had a good alliance. Despite the fact that he had fallen into the Italian centers I probably wouldn't have attacked him, which would mean a 2-way draw (I don't think he would have pulled a quickie, and he gave no impression of attempting to pull away from me). Therefore, I was none too happy when I learned he had resigned. On that turn, a draw vote was proposed (for me and Brackman). I asked his replacement-to-be (Staples) whether he'd take a second, draw, or what. He said he didn't know yet, but I should vote 'no' and allow him to enter the game (NOTE: Dave Staples had no vote in the proposed draw between me and Brackman, and I'm sure either Austria or Turkey vetoed it because Conrad told me my vote didn't matter because the draw was defeated). I had no intention of allowing him to take a 12-center France in for a cheapie win or 2-way draw. The original player, yes (he deserved it), but not a sub itching for it. Further I noticed a migration of French units close to my centers (which had not occurred with Dennis). So I hit him, and succeeded.

Blair was the only other original player left. He had a hard time throughout and when I asked him if he'd help, he agreed. In return, I helped him vs. Austria as well as I could. Tactically, I could have been stopped against a united board, but there was no cohesion. I was friendly with Turkey, only semi-belligerent concerning Austria; Blair wanted to get Herb, and I don't know what Herb wanted.

Thanks for completing the game, Russell. It ended a 6-month limbo when Costaguana stopped publishing (unfortunately) without any word.

THE RUSSIAN BEAR AFLOAT:

A history Of Russians At Sea AD 940-1975 (or 1976...)

The Russian Baltic Sea Fleet, renamed the Second Pacific Squadron, began its historic transfer on 2 October 1904. Almost immediately, Rozhdestvenskiy's motley conglomeration of mostly antiquated warships and revolutionary crews ran into trouble. The flagship, Kniaz Suvorov, leading the van from Port Aleksander III at Libau, had just emerged from the confining waters of the Denmark Straits when a nervous "Mitchman" (sub-Lieutenant) serving one of her 3-inch quickfires spotted a shadowy form out to sea, and opened fire. Within seconds every trigger-happy gun commander in the fleet seemed to open up, some at shapes they could hardly see, others at shapes they thought they could see, and others merely because everyone else was firing. It took many long minutes for the Russian officers to regain control of their ship, and when Rozhdestvenskiy learned that he had just about obliterated the British North Sea Fisheries Fleet, his reaction was violent, and hardly assuaged when it was learned that the gun

crews had mistaken the English fishing trawlers for Japanese torpedo boats sent on a suicide mission to sink the Baltic Fleet! Barely a few hours out, and the Fleet's voyage had started on a very bad footing. It was a portent of things to come.

Desperate Russian diplomacy narrowly prevented a British declaration of war for the "Dogger Vank Incident", and the British, who sympathized with the Japanese anyways, announced that none of their coaling stations were to be available to the Russians. One by one the other European powers followed suit, and it was only through pleas, threats, and bribes that Rozhestvenskiy was able to herd his polyglot force into Korea Bay on 27 May 1905, ending a voyage that had taken the Russian Second Pacific Squadron more than half of the way across the globe.

By now Port Arthur was ringing to "Banzai!" cheers, and Rozhestvenskiy ordered the Fleet to proceed toward Vladivostok, there to join up with the Blockaded cruisers of what was left of Wiren's First Pacific Squadron. But as the lead elements of the Russian vanguard were entering the straits of Tsushima, Admiral Togo's battle fleet was seen standing off to starboard. The Battle of Tsushima was about to be joined.

~~By now~~ In this battle the Japanese had just about every advantage in the book. The condition of the Russian ships has already been detailed; by now their crews were as tired as their hulks, and demoralized by the manner in which they had been treated by foreigners during their record voyage. The Japanese, on the other hand, maintained the highest morale following their victory at Arthur. That campaign had demonstrated their superior weaponry and command; they held the strategic position between Rozhestvenskiy and Vladivostok; and in case of trouble their major naval bases were close at hand.

Rozhestvenskiy's chain of command collapsed at the battles commencement, and as his ships were forced to operate on their own, Togo took the initiative, crossed the Russians' bows, and opened fire. Within a few hours the Russian Second Pacific Squadron had ceased to exist. Sunk were battleships Kniaz Suvorov, Borodino, Imperator Alexander III, Oslavya, Navarin, Sissoi Velikiy, and Cushakov, armored cruisers Dmitri Donskoi, Vladimir Monomakh, and Nakhimov, light cruisers Izumrud and Svietlana--~~xxx~~ in all, somewhere about 4,000 men killed. Captured were battleships Orel, Apraksin, and Amiral Seniavin, cruiser Imperator Nikolai I, and about six destroyers, one carrying the wounded Admiral Rozhestvenskiy. Japanese casualties: no ships lost or damaged, 113 men killed, 424 men wounded. In one day the Japanese had won a battle as decisive as Trafalger, the first major battleship duel in history.

Unperturbed by this overwhelming defeat, Tsar Nikolai II remained firm in his desire for a naval victory over Japan, and summonsed together his last remaining battleships, those of the Black Sea Fleet, and ordered them to proceed to the Orient under the designation of "3rd Pacific Squadron."

But the crews aboard the Black Sea Fleet warships had other ideas: knowing full well of the destruction of their fellows and of their own inadequacy to force a different outcome, the crew revolted, inspired by the revolt by the crew of the Russian Black Sea Fleet flagship Kniaz Potemkin Tavricheskiy, hoisted the red flag of revolution, and made it clear Manchuria was the last place they'd go. Despairing at last, Tsar Nikolai threw in the towel, ironically just as his land forces were regaining the upper hand in the East.

Slowly and very painfully the Russian Navy was rebuilt, so that by the outbreak of the First World War, eight modern Russian dreadnoughts were on the stocks, and the Fleet's strength on paper (not showing the same drawbacks, now magnified, that existed in 1904-5) was not inconsiderable. Nikolai, allied with Great Britain, agreed to the naval blockade of the German coast, in which the British Grand Fleet was to blockade the German coast, west of the Danish Jutland peninsula, while the Russian ~~Black~~ Baltic Sea Fleet was to close the German Baltic coastal ports. Because the Baltic sea dreadnought were incomplete, the Russians, outnumbered ~~in~~ by the German High Seas Fleet, resorted to the laying of minefields, and the establishment of naval patrols to keep the Germans in check. As the attention of the High Seas Fleet was focused toward the North Sea, light units of the

Russian navy won several engagements with minor elements of the German Navy, and succeeded in severing Germany's vital transport of iron ore from Sweden. This re-focused Berlin's attention to the east, and following the Battle of Jutland, German dreadnoughts entered the Baltic via the Kiel Canal and crushed the inferior pre-dreadnoughts of the Russian Baltic Sea Fleet, which retreated and succeeded in blocking the entrance to the Gulf of Finland.

Russian naval successes versus the Turkish Navy in the Black Sea ended suddenly with the appearance of the German battlecruiser Goeben (Yavuz) with attendant German ship through the Bosphorus. The naval actions stalemated, but by this time the Russians needed naval successes to win, and thus their last chance of victory in the south ended.

In mid-1917 the massive and decisive German Summer Offensive began. In the Baltic, Russian light craft continued to keep German vessels outside the Gulf of Finland. But in the South the situation deteriorated rapidly. By the beginning of 1918 (the start of Bolshevik control), all of the Ukraine had been occupied by the Austro-Germans. The Russian Fleet, leaving the now untenable naval base at Sevastopol, retreated to Novorossiisk, and when the Central Powers threatened to capture these ships, on the first of May 1918 Vladimir Lenin ordered the Black Sea Fleet scuttled at Tsemesskaya Bay. The Black Sea Fleet was destroyed by the Bolsheviks, and what was left of the Baltic Sea Fleet was almost totally wiped out in the following "Interventions" and Russian civil War.

During the Civil War, Red river flotillas provided useful aid to Trotsky's land forces. Securing total power, in 1923 Lenin ordered the "birth" of a Soviet Navy, and by 1924 the Russian Soviet Navy included former Tsarist dreadnoughts, two ~~xxx~~ cruisers, ten destroyers, and eleven submarines. In the years 1924-1926 Soviet tonnage increased from 82,000t to 139,000t, and the slow task of rebuilding continued through the '30s, and as the minor arm of the Red military machine, escaped the worst of the Stalinist purges of the late 1930's.

The Soviet navy was caught unprepared by the German blitzkrieg of 1941, like every other branch of the Red military. Although the Navy was not of a considerable size, numbering three dreadnoughts (scantily modernized), eight cruisers, seventy-seven destroyers, and two hundred submarines, the German juggernaut ended any possibility of effective Russian naval resistance for a good time to come during the war.

In the Baltic German U-boats and the Luftwaffe combined to neutralize the Soviet Baltic Sea Fleet, crippling the dreadnought and destroying important naval equipment at Riga, Libau, and Kronstadt-Leningrad. In the south, German naval and air superiority kept the Black Sea Fleet units huddled in the Caucasian hideaways, and by 1942 the bulk of Russia's naval complement was engaged in fighting the Nazis on the ground. This was to continue for most of the war...

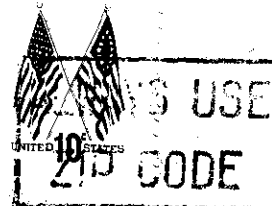
