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THE DEMISE OF CLAW & FANG

With the increase of demands on my time by other interests, last December I reached a tentative decision to wind down publishing. I knew that it would take at least a year for the games to run down to a manageable size. I first announced only a cessation of game openings which would still give me a chance to change my mind about quitting. Next I announced that I would not accept any subscriptions past issue number 124. This seemed like a nice number and was over a year in the future (and longer than some people publish). Still the decision was not irrevocable. However, I'm now making it official. CLAW & FANG will cease to exist with issue #124. The remaining games will be carried to completion by "carbon copy".

I will have been publishing for over 8 years in a field where few publish for much more than two years. My circulation has been (and is) higher than almost any other gamezine past and present and this is with virtually no trades.

I feel that no one knows the work and time and expense that goes into putting out a gamezine unless they have done so themselves. Gamemastering alone has its headaches that most of my Guest GM's learned quickly. However, I'm not gone yet. There are still 8 issues of C&F left.

This issue is dedicated to the Tasmanian wolf--an endangered species.

The Players Statements:

Tom McMillen (Germany): A rather sorry ending for what was, for me at least, a very exciting game--as any game would be when you're fighting for victory without ever approaching any edge of the board. Our initial E-G alliance was very successful, probably due mainly to surprise since such things seem out of vogue right now.

(Actually, in the 20 or so games I've seen in C&F, German survival is out of vogue.) By 1905 we had about 25 centers in the bag, so with 13 centers and a good shot at 3 more I went for the win. I figured if it didn't work I could always cede victory to my loyal ally. So I made a superfecta of wrong guesses, then Don quits. Bummer, bummer. After his resignation things didn't make much sense--E & T seemed capable of biting off large chunks of me at will, but they didn't make immediate headway and,

strangely, agreed to a quick draw. I think there was a lot of play left in the final position, but not for me.

A tip of the proverbial cap to Don Dorsett, the perfect ally. We averaged better than a letter a week for over a year, and I hope he gets some consolation from the fact that he would have had a tidy 1907 win in his maiden game if he hadn't had to resign. Also to Ben, the perfect arch enemy. His only communication was a 1901 phone call, but our struggle for the hearts and minds (and centers) of A-R-I was the main action of the game. And of course, great thanks to whatshisname for crisp, professional Cfling.

Ben Zablocki (Turkey): This was a challenging and enjoyable game throughout. The game was dominated by McMillen's Germany from the very beginning. He was the driving force behind the faultlessly executed Anglo-German alliance that dominated the game and provided the central political fact that the rest of us could only try to respond to as best we could. In the east, I was early faced with a critical decision: to build a countervailing coalition to oppose the Anglo-Germans or try to confront them myself on equal terms. I chose the latter and it was almost a fatal mistake. More exactly, I should say it was a fatal mistake that I was rescued from by McMillen's bad luck.

All game long, I was devoting most of my efforts to trying to pry England away from Germany. Although I had grown to a dominating position in the east, I knew that I would never be able to survive the joint anglo-german attack that was surely coming. Then in 1906, Germany executed a brilliant stab of England. Because the alliance was so well crafted, no sure-thing stab was possible but the odds on this one were in his favor. But a bunch of right guesses saved England's Scandinavian holdings and the game became a three way stalemate, although some doubt and suspense remained for another two years.

I learned a lot from this game. It was a pleasure to play against an opponent of McMillen's caliber and, having done so, I feel fortunate to have come out of it with a share of a three way draw. We were both also lucky, I would say, to have a man of Gary Schmidt's skill and integrity come into the game so late as a standby to keep the game from disintegrating after Don Dorsett dropped out.

Gary Schmidt (England): Don Dorsett, the original England, played very well into a fine position. Both Tom McMillen and Ben Zablocki played well, and anything other than a draw would be unfair. Congratulations to Don, Tom, and Ben. I enjoyed my part in this game, and my sincere thanks to all.

Analysis of Demonstration Game 1979CT

While it may seem ironic that this time, unlike the similar situation at Dunkirk, it is the Germans who by abdicating their responsibilities have forced the doughty English to accept embarrassing and humiliating defeat, it should not surprise the historian that it is once again the haughty French who loom as a dark cloud on the horizon for our most splendid isle. As the spectre of the fleur-de-lis once again glares malevolently across our all too narrow channel we must return to the thousand year old question. Will the glory of Agincourt, whence the desperately outmanned yet doughty yeomenry of Albion did stand the charge of the human fortresses with blooded lances astride their fire breathing non-shod steeds--will such glory be forgotten? Will the invincible Marlborough's dazzling litany of victories--from Malplaquet to Oudonarde to Ramilles to Lille and Tournai--to the blessed gap in the line at Blenheim--that splendid gap that the peerless duke did midwife and nurture and raise as if it were a sickly child until it stood full bloom in the center of the enemy line--where like a battle-axe through butter the duke did smash the French center so completely that the shards stood for nothing--shall all of this go for naught? And if the good Lord Nelson should see that his incomparable smashing of the French fleet, not once but three separate times, at the eventual cost of his life--were he to see that it were all in vain would he not pluck out his good eye that such scenes be forever hidden from his sight. And finally on that glorious June day at the nameless yet immortal crossroads in Flanders, will the "Hurrahs" of the Scots Greys, their scarlet coats blazing in the sun, matching the crimson of the French blood streaming down their upraised sabres as they crashed into the fleeing blue clad infantry--will those cheers be forever silenced as the tyrants of the "Sun King" with their fleur-de-lis finally crush the champions of democracy and the Union Jack? Never! I SAY NEVER! It can not be! It must not be! IT SHALL NOT BE!!
