Dear Mr. Horton,

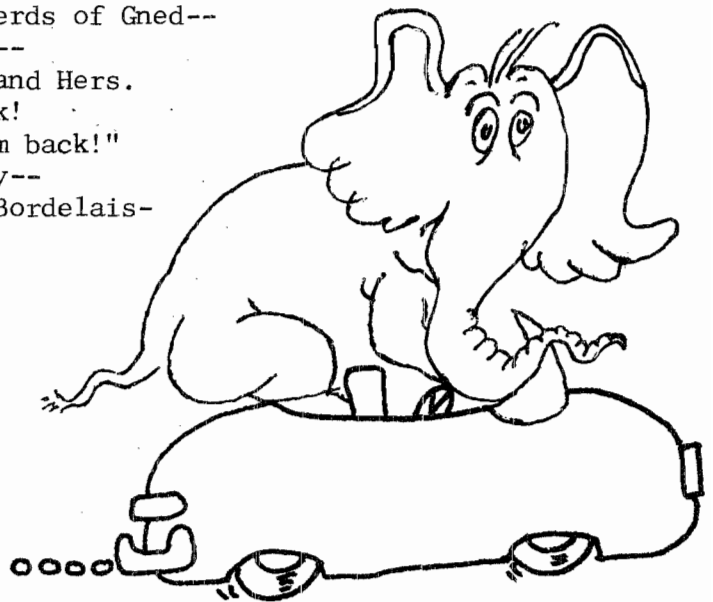

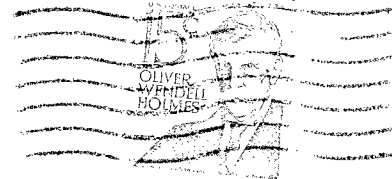
