Ahoy, Avast, And Where The Hell Is Starboard?

People who do not live in California may have the mistaken idea that all rivers in this state are cementditches like the Los Angeles River. That river is more suited to a high speed auto chase than a leisurely boat cruise. However, such concrete gorges are not the case in Northern California. The Sacramento River is eminently navigable with merchant ships having for years made their way up from the San Francisco Bay to the Port of Sacramento.

All of this is background to the recent adventure I had riding a houseboat up and down the river on a Sunday. I didn't want any of you out-of-staters picturing me driving a camper up and down a dry canal.

Anyhow, Helpmate and I belong to a gourmet club. Once a month six couples get together for an evening of eating and drinking. Each couple brings a prearranged dish to the gathering. (Helpmate usually maneuvers our contribution into being either a bread or a dessert since I do all the baking in the house.) Ordinarily, we rotate houses but this being summer and the group of an adventurous turn of mind, we decided (while I was out of the room) to hold an Armenian dinner on a houseboat.

Not to bore you with the details, the arrangements were set. I was assigned the task of making Armenian finger cookies (which weren't too hard except for the fingernails), and we reported to the houseboat at 10:00 a.m. One of our group had reported an hour earlier for some instruction in running the thing. This was the extent of our nautical experience. We all hauled our food and belongings aboard. It looked as if we were preparing to stay a few months instead of a few hours. I brought along the Diplomacy set figuring we would need something to while away the hours. None of the group had ever played Diplomacy but I thought that a houseboat would be a neat place for a game. It would be so easy to slip bodies over the side--backs pierced with shishkebab skewers and weighed down with Armenian finger cookies. (I'm just kidding about the cookies, actually, they were pretty good and if the demand is great enough I may print the recipe--sometime.) As I said, none of the group had ever played Diplomacy and their records remained intact. There was too much else to do.

Our senior officer backed the houseboat away from the dock and we started upstream at a breezneck pace of 5 mph (or was it knots?). The party began to pick up tempo as the Bloody Marys were cracked out. I took over the wheel. Fortunately, the river was very wide at that spot. I've never even rowed a boat before. I would turn the wheel to the right and seemingly several minutes later the boat would turn to the right. Likewise to the left. However, with the wheel in one hand and a Bloody Mary in the other, I was already mentally shopping for a yachting cap. I couldn't be piggish, though, and I gave someone else a chance at it.

As dinner time approached, the group switched from Bloody Marys to wine and dropped anchor. I don't know if it was the scent of tomato juice, grape juice (fermented), or Armenian finger cookies, but a Coast Guard boat cruised up besides us and gave us the once over. No, it wasn't one of those big sea-going jobs that you see in the movies, but little more than an oversized motor boat, but with five men aboard. I didn't really get to see much of it as my companions pushed me down out of sight. I don't think my fellow sailors thought they could convince the Coast Guard that that stuff dripping off my fangs was really Burgundy.

That crisis past, we prepared for the next one--dinner. The barbecue was fired up and the shishkebab (lamb, peppers, and eggplant) was put on the cock. All in all, the dinner came off quite well (not one case of scurvy was reported among the crew). After the majority of the group felt sober enough to get underway, we hoisted anchor and started back. About half way to our dock a couple of red warning lights came on. Since our sink had stopped giving out fresh water (we weren't drinking it anyway) we weren't sure if the lights meant we were out of water, oil, wine, or whatever. We stopped and fed the engine some oil which seemed to satisfy the lights but we discovered that we had lost our night rudder (well mostly). However, we did make it home. It had been an enjoyable day. Take the bitter with the sweet, I philosophized, reaching for another glass of wine and wondering why I was still seasick after I was home.

Did you realize that I went two issues without an article on game theory?

PAYOFF MATRIX REDUCTION

In the second article of this series, "Back in the Saddle," C&F #47, John Torrey discusses his use of a game theory payoff matrix for the Fall 1902 moves in 1974FA (C&F #39). His basic statement is that he had "three possible strategies:"

1. A Pru-War; A Liv-Mos
 2. Supported attack on War
 3. No attack
- (Actually the German army in question was in Silesia, not Prussia. However, this does not affect his discussion.)

Russia's defensive strategies, according to the same article, were:

1. A Gal-War; A Ukr-Mos
2. Supported move on War
3. Don't defend either
4. Defend one center with one unit

Mr. Torrey then set up the following payoff matrix:

He then eliminated dominated strategies and obtained:

This is an example of a payoff matrix with no saddlepoint and hence no best single solution. For this type of situation game theory dictates "mixed strategies", that is, combination of several "pure" strategies into one by the use of chance. In the current example, the best mixed strategy is one that selects either strategy 1 or 2 according to a random event such that the probability of choosing 1 is .5 and that of choosing 2 is .5. Mr. Torrey quite properly flipped a coin.

All of this is quite correct and clear in the original article. The question to be raised here is how does one arrive at a simple three by four matrix in the first place? Fall 1902 in 1974FA was a fairly simple situation and it is perhaps worthwhile to investigate it in detail.

The first thing that we discover is that Germany had five units, F Bal, A Liv, A Sil, and A Den. A table accompanies this article showing most of the possible orders for each unit. Altogether, with the possibilities shown, there would be $29 \times 17 \times 25 \times 19 \times 10 = 2,341,750$ combinations. This is indeed a long way from the "three strategies" discussed above. On the other hand, examination of the table shows that many of the orders could only serve psychological ends. F Bal S RUSSIAN F Bot is perhaps the best example. The only unit that could attempt to move into the Gulf of Bothnia is that very same F Bal. Also, most of the combinations would involve "uncoordinated orders" e.g.: A Sil S A Den-Pru, A Den-Liv, F Bal C A Den-Ber. Yet even if all supports and convoys are eliminated, (and some of the convoys could make a great deal of sense) there are $8 \times 5 \times 7 \times 3 \times 4 = 3,360$ possible combinations. It is not practical to examine all of these in detail.

How then can meaningful tactics for a season be found? The answer lies in a very simple technique that is undoubtedly used by every player who ever bothers to analyze a position--the technique of goals. Goals may involve the capture of a supply center, the annihilation of an enemy unit, or movement into a strategically important area. They will depend very heavily on the diplomatic situation, and on the overall strategic approach of the alliance involved.

Consider again Fall 1902 in 1974FA. Not being in the game we can only speculate on the diplomatic situation, but the moves made involve apparent conflict between Austria-Hungary and Italy; between Turkey and Russia; between France and England; and between England and Russia. We already know of the conflict between Germany and Russia.

With this background, the possible goals for Germany can be discussed unit by unit. Army Holland: The only supply center in sight is the French occupied Belgium, capture would be possible if France were to vacate or if support could be had from the English fleet Nth. But the English have to guard against French F Eng-Lon, and France may be neutral toward Germany. A defense of holding is sufficient unless the English and French work together in which case no defense would serve. Conclusion: hold. Army Denmark: Denmark is in no way threatened, unless by the presumably friendly English F Nth. Sweden is neutral, and threatened by Russian F Bothnia. Support can be given to or by German F Bal. No other goals are in sight for A Den--except for the rather low value of a convoy to the Russian front (i.e. A Den-Pru). Fleet Baltic: Again Sweden is a highly plausible goal. The question then is simply how to take it. There is an English fleet Nwy which might become involved, but the English fleet Barents Sea has StP(nc) as its only plausible goal, and it will require the assistance of the English fleet Nwy to avoid a standoff with Russian F Bot-StP(sc). The same Russian fleet in the Bulf of Bothnia forces Germany to use support to guarantee capturing Sweden. So either A Den-Swe & F Bal S A Den-Swe or F Bal-Swe & A Den S F Bal-Swe would be logical. Mr. Torrey chose the latter.

Finally, we come down to the two armies that Mr. Torrey discusses in his article. First Army Livonia: Possible goals are of course Mos and War. StP is presumably eliminated by diplomatic considerations--the English are going to take it; they will have no need of support. The remaining goals are Moscow and Warsaw. Next, Army Silesia: Warsaw is the obvious goal. There is, however, a defensive consideration, the Italian army in Tyrolia and the unoccupied center of Munich. However, Mr. Torrey apparently had believable assurances that Munich was safe.

This brings us back to the matrix that opened this article. Or does it? Actually, we have only considered the first two of Germany's possible strategies, and none of Russia's. But for Russia's we need only consider those that would be chosen if one of the German strategies were known. The others will be dominated. This leads promptly to the two by two matrix and the flip of the coin described above.

There is one final question to answer. Do any of the strategies ignored by looking at goals offer better results? The answer is clearly no. The payoff's in the game theory matrix represent the attainment of the desired goals (not neglecting defensive goals). No attempt at a goal means no chance for a payoff. In the defensive case it means the chance of a negative payoff. Hence, such a strategy is always dominated, if any strategy that might attain the goal is available.

Since there are rarely an unmanageable number of goals for any one move season, given the diplomatic situation, we can conclude that it is generally possible to reduce the choice of tactics for a Diplomacy season to a manageable game theory matrix. It won't ever win a game, but it just might help win a season.

THE DIPLOMAT'S OTHER TABLE

LIVER TRIOMPHE

To the otherwise brilliant, witty, and discerning observers who are confusedly watching 1975N a certain preoccupation on the part of Gamemaster Doug McMullin with food will have already been apparent. (It may be that in emulating the porcupines of his native British Columbia to whom C&F #52 was dedicated, he has eaten too much of his cambium layer.) This preoccupation has caused him to comment about eating French press in Issue #50. But, he IS blessed, it also has caused him to exercise his genius in recognizing the true ecstasy of liver and apricot brandy. Observers have noticed that Fangmaster Horton also has a certain appreciation for liver. Is this a hobby-wide attribute?

Undoubtedly, Mr. McMullin can be prevailed upon to reveal his unique recipe for liver and apricot brandy but those desiring the sensual experience immediately can find delight in the recipe below. It does have some application in Diplomacy. The recipe, incidently, is the work of a loyal ally (Austria-Hungary to my Italy) in an office FTF contest, Myrna Collins.

Ingredients:

3/4 pound liver
 1/2 cup apricot brandy
 1/3 cup flour
 1/2 teaspoon Sea Salt
 1/4 teaspoon monosodium glutamate (MSG)
 1/4 cup currants
 2 tablespoons butter
 bitters
 1/2 teaspoon arrowroot

Wash and drain the liver. Cut into serving sized pieces. Dredge liver in flour, salt, MSG mix. Plump currants in brandy and 2 dashes bitters (20 minutes). Sautee liver in two tablespoons butter until delicately done, remove to a hot platter. Turn off frying pan. Put currants, brandy, bitters mix into remaining butter in pan with 1/2 teaspoon arrowroot and stir until slightly thickened, scraping in pan juices. Pour mixture over liver and serve with rice. Salade d' Artichauts a'la Grecque is recommended. Serve with sparkling wine of your choice. Serves 2 to 3.

If served to Diplomacy opponents the bitters can be replaced with strychnine. Serve yourself last. Sure win by default.

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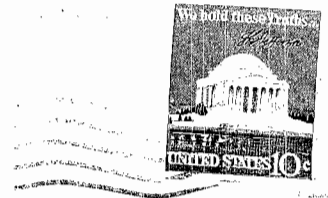
