THE ADVENTURES OF FANGMASTER IN FRANCE

Let's All Play "Metro"

Gather around children and Uncle Fangmaster will explain the rules of a game to you. It is called "Riding the Paris Subway" or "Metro" for short. Your Uncle Fangmaster and Aunty Helpmate spent many happy hours in Paris learning the rules and participating in this game. The object is to get from where you're at to where you want to be in the least time and with the least amount of effort. (The latter a Fangmaster hallmark.)

The first thing you must do upon your arrival in Paris is get a "Plan de Metro". This is a sort of conference map of the playing field. These are easily obtained free of charge. Most hotels have them as do many guide books. Each Metro station has a large scale map but it is rather awkward to rip one of these off the wall and carry it with you. Looking at the plan you will note there are thirteen different colored lines on it. There are thirteen different subway lines. At the end of each line in large print is the final destination of each line. These are important. The two end destinations of line 1, for example, are Pont De Neuilly and Chateau De Vincennes. When you enter a station on line 1 you have to make a choice on which passage way to follow, "Direction Pont De Neuilly" or "Direction Chateau De Vincennes." You would know which "Direction" to go if you had checked your "Plan de Metro" to see if your destination is between you and Pont De Neuilly or between you and Chateau De Vincennes. On the "Plan" each line is marked with little dots that are the stations on the line. Marked with circles are stations that are "correspondances". These are stations where you can change from one line to another. In some instances there are as many as four lines converging at one "correspondance". To change lines requires walking, stair climbing, and sometimes even moving sidewalks.

Now getting back to the game. Pick your destination. Then determine the station where you are. If for some reason you can't read just look at the wall map and the spot that is worn through from constant finger poking is the place you are at. Since where you want to go is never on the same line as where you are at you will have to change lines. Route yourself to your destination using as few "correspondances" as possible.

Money is no factor because the price is the same no matter how far you go. The price of the ticket depends on the quantity and class. First Class tickets cost 2.2 francs each (about 50¢) or 10 for 13.5. Second Class tickets cost 1.5 francs each (about 35¢) or 10 for 9 francs. Every train usually has five cars with the middle one being First Class. I have determined by many observations that the First Class car does not go any faster than the Second Class cars surrounding it. I always buy Second Class. Also, since I play many games of "Metro" I usually buy the ten pack. After all, just one trip between our hotel and American Express for more money uses up 4 tickets for Helpmate and myself.

Riding first class also has another disadvantage, except at rush hour you can usually find a seat. This takes a lot of the sport out of the game. You watch the trains come by you and you see the fore and aft cars jammed with people hanging onto straps, poles, and each other, while the folks in first class are leaning back and calmly reading newspapers. Read a newspaper indeed when you can get in there and try to elbow someone out of a recently vacated seat.

On each car there are certain seats reserved for (and in this order) (1) disabled veterans; (2) civilian blind, persons injured at work, and civilian disabled; (3) pregnant women and persons accompanied by children less than four years old. This did offer some possibilities to my fruitful mind. However: (1) In the army I once got my finger jammed in a typewriter carriage--but they probably only mean veterans of the French army. (2) I thought of using my old football injury but the splinters don't show when I'm sitting down. (3) Helpmate refused to dress as a four year old. Come to think of it, it's not so bad standing and holding onto that pole near the door. You get to bump into a lot of interesting people that way and have a much better chance of pushing out the door when you reach your stop.

I didn't win every game of "Metro" of course. Once I wanted to take the subway to Montmartre--the famed artist section of all the guidebooks. I routed myself to a

stop called "Montmartre". This turned out to be rue Montmartre and nowhere near the section of Montmartre. In fact, you can't really take the subway to Montmartre, although there are a couple of stops within hiking distance.

In conclusion, for those who really don't want to play the game but merely get from point "A" to point "B" there is that category above first class known as the Taxi. However, during the rush hour you can't find a seat on one of these either....they are all taken.

THE DIPLOMAT'S OTHER TABLE

Springerlie
(A traditional German Christmas cookie)

by Tom McCloud

(I have been meaning to send this in since last Christmas. Oh well, better late than never.)

Preparation time: 30 minutes mixing, 8 hours drying, 22 minutes baking.

Number of servings: 40

Source of recipe: My mother, Jane M. McCloud nee Benton, who had it from her mother, Julia U. Benton, nee Ulrich. (Just to let you know where the "German" came into it.)

Ingredients: 2 cups sugar $4\frac{1}{2}$ cups unsifted flour anise seed
 $\frac{1}{2}$ eggs (extra large) $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp anise extract
 Butter to grease cookie sheets

Special tools: To make these properly you need either a springerlie rolling pin, or springerlie boards. These have pictures carved into them. The springerlie rolling pins are sold commercially, and should not be too hard to find. But ask for "the rolling pin with pictures carved in it" they might not know it by name. Springerlie boards are hand carved and handed down from one generation to the next. The pictures are about $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches by 2 inches if you want to carve your own. However, the cookies may be cut out with cookie cutters, or even simply cut out with a knife, they still taste just as good.

Preparation: Butter two cookie sheets 10" x 14" or larger, sprinkle anise seed generously all over each sheet. (I'd call $\frac{1}{4}$ to 1.0 seeds per square inch adequate, it isn't critical. Beat eggs until thick, add sugar gradually beating well between each addition. Beat at medium speed 4-5 minutes more. Add anise extract and blend. Fold in flour lightly. (This is the one point where the recipe is critical. My wife and I have taken to using the following procedure. Fold in flour with the electric mixer until it threatens to stall out. Then fold in more flour with a wooden spoon until about a cup remains. (There's nothing special about wood, it's just that our metal handled spoons bend in this dough, and of course, plastic spoons are utterly hopeless.) At this point I take over because my wife isn't quite strong enough to fold in the remaining flour, even I find it hard. Furthermore, I do not add all of the flour. Instead I stop when the dough has reached the right consistency, about that of pie dough, and is no longer sticky. If you add too much flour, the dough becomes dry and powdery. This can be corrected by adding minute amounts of water, say $\frac{1}{3}$ tsp at a time, until the dough is moist again. (Why so much problem with the flour? Well, if you will look back at the ingredients you will see that the only liquids are the eggs and anise extract.) If you can't manage to fold in all of the necessary flour with a spoon, you may knead in the last part of it. (However, this may promote hardness, see below.) On our current batch, I had $\frac{1}{2}$ cup of flour left over.

Flour a surface for rolling. With an ordinary rolling pin roll part of the dough about $\frac{1}{2}$ inch thick then press or roll design firmly over dough. Cut along the lines of the imprint into shapes. Or simply cut into $1\frac{1}{2}$ x 2 inch rectangles, rolled somewhat thinner. Place on seeded buttered sheet. Repeat with the rest of the dough. Let cookies stand overnight to dry and set imprinted pictures.

Put the cookies into the oven at 375° F. for 2 minutes. Turn oven down to 300° and bake about 20 minutes or until barely brown on the bottom. The tops should still be white. (How do you see the bottom of a cookie? Lift it up with a fork and look.) Let cool a bit, then eat or store in a closed can.

Quality of result: The first time my wife made these, they came out with a thin crust on top, and then sort of an air bubble. I'd never had them like that, so we called my mother to see what had gone wrong. It turned out that nothing had gone wrong, that crust effect is the sign of perfection in springerlie, and my mother had simply never achieved it.

If you don't have that kind of beginner's luck, the most common flaw in the results is that the cookies come out hard. At a guess, our last batch here came out about 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ on Moh's scale. The problem when they are too hard, is that the dough did not have enough air beaten into it, or that the air was kneaded out. Note that there is neither yeast, nor baking powder, nor anything similar in this recipe, it depends entirely on hard work.

If your batch does come out hard, they are still quite edible, so long as you are careful not to break a tooth. Dunking in milk, tea, or coffee helps a great deal, in fact my father regards them as a dunking cookie and almost always eats them that way.

Are they worth it? I think so. I have been eating these for over twenty five years, and they are absolutely my favorite food of any kind. Christmas wouldn't be Christmas to me without them.

I do not recommend sending a batch of hard springerlie to a Diplomacy opponent to get revenge by breaking his or her teeth, for one thing you might be sued for the dental bill. On the other hand, I am sending this recipe to Don to get revenge on his waistline for what his "Seven Layer Bars" are doing to mine!

ANALYSIS of 1975HF

Austria appears to have pulled off a diplomatic coupe. With a firm Italian ally and apparently a cooperative Russian he is capable of manipulating the board. Unless there is a coalition forming in the wings, Italy and Austria will go to victory as absolute chaos in the west poses little threat and a triumvirate marching on Turkey will leave him helpless. From here, Austria has pulled himself into the lead.

France seems to be changing horses in midstream. However, this will probably benefit him as he can now direct his armies against a crumbling Reich and southward towards his future threats. His play is comparable to Austria's, but he will need a few swift tactical and strategical operations to snatch victory from the jaws of defeat.

Germany was slowly losing ground as it stumbled downhill, now it's rolling faster than the houses in California. His NMR will render him offensively impotent, although his defensive capabilities remain. A few breaks could change things, however, at this time it looks like a long, drawn out losing battle on the central plains.

Italy is playing a stupendous game. He has solidified his borders and has extended his sphere of influence into Turkey and southern Germany. Although moving methodically, his side of the steamroller won't bog down in the muck and mire. It looks like he has a 2-way split with the Archduke.

England has made a glant effort to take the fishing factories in Norway, but ever imperialistic Russians have thwarted her attempts. However, it appears she has plugged the leaks in the Royal Barge as the Frogs have changed face. I have to give credit for a stupendous diplomatic feat if this is the case as she had an assured doom. It may be that the appearance of Princess Peggy has whipped a sense of pride and stubbornness into the Limeys.

Russia has regained its feet and is already expanding its borders. Numerically, he has the largest force on the board. However, his probable adversary, Austria, outnumbered him on the land by more than 2 to 1. I feel Russia will be beaten into oblivion in the near future, especially if Austria is threatened by more Russian armies. Ironical, well, yes. But my choice would be to defend and bring war on than to delay it and bring sure defeat.

Turkey seems to be going under, but the spirit of the young Sultan seems to be in his troops also. I'd say Turkey will be around for a good long time, and may even prosper at Russia's expense if he is willing to play a minor role in the steamroller coalition.

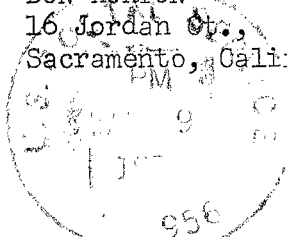
