THE FUTURE OF DIPLOMACY--ANOTHER VIEW

I found Don Pitsch's "The Future of Diplomacy--As I See It" very interesting, probably because the future of this hobby affects me as Boardman Number Custodian more than it affects any other single person in Diplomacy. However, my feelings to growth in this hobby are somewhat different than Don's. Let me amplify.

I am not sure of Don's definition of commercialism, but I find it difficult to believe that it will ever play a major role in postal Diplomacy. This game, especially when played by mail, does not have the attributes upon which other games and sport activities have gained fame and great popularity. Diplomacy only has minor spectator appeal. Even at the Chicago DipCons the proportion of non-players to players has been almost nil. And if there is to be money made in a sporting activity it is from the spectators not the players. The other attribute that Diplomacy lacks is wide player appeal. Almost anyone can sit down and play a one or two hour social board game. Thus the appeal of these games to the general public. However, far fewer people enjoy the luxury of spending a whole afternoon or evening playing a game--especially when six other people are needed. Postal play lasting up to two years or more is hardly the answer for most people, also.

So, what can we expect? The hobby will continue to grow, regardless of whether it is good or bad. But it will grow from the addition of people like those that can be found in the hobby today: the dedicated player-publisher. No one will be able to make real money off this hobby (except for perhaps the USPS), although there will always be those like Gordon Anderson, who will lose money trying. We will see other mines like DIPLOMACY WORLD, but if you think that is professional then visit a local bookstore's magazine rack and discover the slick glossy. The non-profit amateur publisher (and that includes Walt Buchanan and myself) will continue to be the way of this hobby. We may gain some degree of renown, but it will be with our present format of dedicated money-spending amateur hobbyists.

(Ed note: Shhhhhh! Helpmate doesn't know what this really costs.)

STAR PROBE ANYONE?

Since readers have shown interest in a play by mail game of Star Probe I am proceeding further with it. For those of you that don't know, Star Probe is a commercially published game and available for \$6.00 from TSR Games, P.O. Box 576, Lake Geneva, WI 53147 (the D&D people). I have no monetary interest in the game. I do see it as a potentially interesting play by mail science fiction game.

I have in mind a number of rule changes to adapt it for mail play on monthly deadlines. As now constituted Star Probe is a multiplayer face to face game. There is no contact between players on the board. All the conflict comes from what is found on the new worlds. Each player has but one exploration ship. I would change this so that players would have more than one ship, would come in contact with one another, and there could be much negotiating between moves. However, players could reveal their identities or not as they saw fit. Through racial names and code words for planets, other players would not know locations unless told.

There would be opportunity to do such nefarious deeds as to induce another player to land on a planet where a monster awaits the next visitor with venomous fangs. The detective in you would be catered to also. Can you deduce from the game reports how many chips a player has and what his wealth is? Can you discover the ship locations and set a trap to destroy another's ship so that he will never know who did it?

Finally, there is grist here for the writer's mill. Players can chronicle their adventures in space. Game reports could be given in story form.

Let me know if you are interested. I plan to charge a modest game fee of \$1.00 plus a subscription. You will have to have the game in order to participate. There are many many rules in the rule book that I am not changing and the map has over 2000 star systems.

THE DIPLOMAT'S OTHER TABLE

Fangmaster's Impossible Coconut Custard Pie

For the novice cook the hardest part of pie baking is making the crust. Some solve the problem by making crumb crust (no rolling) or by buying ready made crust (no class). Here is another solution for those that don't want to roll their own, a pie that makes its own crust.

Ingredients:

- 3/4 cup of sugar
- 1/4 cup all purpose flour
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1/2 tsp baking powder
- 2 eggs
- 2 TBS butter or margarine (softened)
- 2 oz coconut (about 1/2 cup)
- 1/4 tsp vanilla or lemon flavoring
- 1 cup milk

Mixing: Blend sugar, flour, salt, and baking powder. Add eggs and mix well. Add remaining ingredients and blend. Pour the mixture into a greased 9 inch pie pan. The mixture will be lumpy from the coconut and butter.

Baking: Put pie into a 350° (325° if glass is used) oven and bake for 30 to 40 minutes. Pie will be firm when done. Custard pies can be tested for doneness by inserting a silver (stainless steel?) knife into the center. When it comes out clean the pie is ready to come out of the oven. Cool and serve. Recipe may easily be doubled if you want two pies at one time (one for eating and one for throwing).

THE ADVENTURES OF FANGMASTER IN FRANCE

Paris Sans Oeufs and Mona

Several years ago columnist Art Buchwald wrote about a friend's successful attempt to set the four-minute Louvre. This was predicated on two facts: (1) tourists in Paris are in a hurry so that they can get out of town before their money does, and (2) there are three "must-sees" in the Louvre museum, the Mona Lisa, the Venus De Milo, and Winged Victory. According to Buchwald, the goal has always been to accomplish the feat of seeing these three attractions in four minutes or less. Buchwald's friend went on Sunday when there is no admission charge and he wouldn't be slowed by buying a ticket. He went early when most of the tourists were still in their hotels learning that a continental breakfast doesn't include eggs.

I consider Buchwald's friend only the holder of the Sunday record. On a rainy Wednesday having little else to do, I decided to have a go at the Wednesday record. It also had rained on Tuesday, but as the Louvre is closed on Tuesday, it is difficult to make a good time since a Gendarme will be clutching each leg. However, my dreams of the four-minute Wednesday Louvre were soon dispelled. Everybody else had the same idea. With the rain and the previous day's closing, there were wall to wall people. It took four minutes to move up two places in line for the ticket window. With lunch-time only a couple of hours off we decided to forgo the Louvre trip.

Consulting my map, we set out walking for a restaurant not too far away. Le Souffle is recommended by all the guide books and since souffles are one of my special weaknesses I was anxious to try the restaurant. We arrived there, after a couple of wrong turns, shortly before noon. There was not a customer in the place. We asked for a table for two. The maitre d' took one look at me and indicated they were all booked up. (I must get those fangs capped.) We then went to a nearby restaurant and learned what an eggless lunch was like. With my luck, all I would get for dinner would be eggs. After lunch we went back by Le Souffle....it was still empty. I presume they had been booked for lunch by a tourist group. I hoped that when that bus load of tourists arrived they made so much commotion that all the souffles fell.

It turned out that I didn't have eggs for dinner that night. We went to one of my favorite French restaurants from previous visits, Chez Rene on Boulevard St. Germain. My only problem was that I remembered it being on the opposite end of the street from where it really was so by the time we reached it I had worked up a very good appetite. We were directed to a table and our waiter, whose name we learned was Girard, appeared. Helpmate ordered her meal in her impeccable menu French. I grunted and pointed at the menu like a ravenous Neanderthal (that's not a bad description). Girard got the message, lots of food and quick.

Girard apparently took a liking to us and he soon revealed to us that he could speak some English. He spoke it with a cockney dialect. He explained to us that when he was in the French army he had been stationed in England for a year. (This was the first time that I had heard that France ever occupied England...but I digress.) And, as Girard put it, the way to learn a language is to sleep with a dictionary. His dictionary obviously had a cockney publisher.

For dinner we started off with quenelles. These fish dumplings (not an adequate description) are a measure of good French cuisine. When they are right they are featherly light and delicious. And when they are not....ugh! Well, these were so light we had trouble keeping them on the plate--because they were soon on the fork headed mouthward. These were followed by veal, green salad, chocolate mousse (Helpmate's) and gateau (mine). This was all surrounded by several glasses of Beaujolais.

The meal was very good, the wine was very good, and Girard was very good (or should I ask his dictionary?) and we certainly plan to return. The next time you are in Paris visit the Boulevard St. Germain, drop in on Chez Rene and ask for one of Girard's table. Tell him that Fangmaster sent you.

RESCUE AT JEWEL CAVE NATIONAL MONUMENT

During the first week of August, 1975, four members of the Mother Lode Grotto, National Speleological Society, accompanied by five members of the California Cadet Corps State Rifle Team traveled cross country to attend the National Rifle Association's Championship Matches held in Camp Perry, Ohio. Several Cave Trips were scheduled during the trip including two spelunking tours at Jewel Cave National Monument in South Dakota.

Jewel Cave was discovered in 1900 by Albert and Frank Michard when they found air coming out of a small hole in the side of a canyon. They enlarged this hole and began mining the Calcite Crystals they found on the cave walls. This mining and an attempt at making the cave a tourist attraction ended in failure.

In 1908, the cave became a National Monument. It was kept closed to the public until 1940. At this time the cave was believed to be rather small with its only significance being the Calcite Crystals covering its walls. In 1958, park rangers found some new passages beyond the one half mile of passage known up to that time. Since then, Herb and Jan Bonn have mapped over 53 miles of passage making Jewel Cave one of the longest caves in the United States.

About 300 million years ago, sea creatures deposited a large bed of Calcium Carbonate in the Black Hills area. This bed was gradually converted to limestone over a period of many years. About 70 million years ago, a series of up lifts created both of the Rocky Mountains and the Black Hills. This up lift caused many fractures in the bed of limestone. Rain water moved from the surface into these fractures; and some of the rock was dissolved. As the water moved through the fractures, more and more of the limestone was removed forming the cave passages. Most of Jewel Cave was formed below the water table and it appears that the cave has drained and flooded several times. The reason why the water started depositing the Calcium Carbonate rather than dissolving it is a mystery, but it is most likely due to changes in water temperature. Since the Calcite Crystals are covered with a gray cap of clay, the last flooding of the cave must have been very muddy.

The first day in the cave was spent scrambling, chimneying and doing easy climbs. Eight hours were spent seeing some of the most spectacular natural formations known to man. Features like the Hydromagnisite Bubbles are not known to exist anywhere else on earth. Other interesting features included Gypsum Spiders, Moonmilk, Globulites and forest work.

This was only the third cave that Gary Johnson had been in, however he had adapted very well to the strenuous scrambling and crawling. Despite his inexperience, he was neither too cautious or overly ambitious in his caving. We had some concern about Gary on the morning of our second day at Jewel Cave. Gary's size, 6' 4" and 240 lbs, might limit his movement in the area of the cave that we were going to visit. The two tight places are known as Hurricane Corner and the Brain Drain. Plans were made with the park rangers to have Gary bypass the two tight places if he could not make it through them. Gary, however, wanted to see as much of the cave as possible and was therefore going to try to get through the tight spots before turning back. I think that he felt a great deal of peer pressure at this time.

When we arrived at Hurricane Corner, four of us including myself went through first. This squeeze goes from about a four foot crawl way into a small room. The squeeze itself

is about fourteen inches high. Although the squeeze was tight on Johnson he made it through without difficulty. This success greatly increased his confidence. After spending about twenty minutes observing the soda straws and rare flow stone we left for the brain drain.

There is a tight uphill squeeze located just before you get to the brain drain. I was the first person through and found it fairly tight. It took me three or four minutes to get through. Johnson was the fourth person to enter the squeeze. He spent about fifteen minutes working his way through. We gave him much moral support and kidded him about losing some weight if he was going to become a real caver. As soon as he made it through we went on to the Brain Drain.

I was the first person through the Brain Drain; and I found it far easier than the first squeeze. As a result I really believed that Johnson could make it through. He decided to try it on his back since the crawlway bent up on the far side of the squeeze. Johnson worked about thirty minutes at the squeeze and was almost through. His hips seemed to be the thing holding him back. He had been given a great deal of encouragement and some help to get him as far as he had gotten. At this point Johnson announced that he was tired and starting to get cold. He decided to back out. He moved back about one and one half feet and stopped. He said that he could move no farther and was stuck.

At this point, Johnson's best friend, Ray Miller, lost control of himself. He started crying and yelling that they should have never come on this trip and that Johnson was going to die in the cave. I think that Johnson started to panic when he heard this. Don Currier started talking to Johnson to calm him down while I pushed Miller on down the passage to get him away from Johnson. I told him to get hold of himself and then come back and help us.

In the meantime we had Johnson try several things to free himself. We had him try and move sideways but he was unable to. We tried to calm him down by talking to him (this might relax his muscles and he would be able to free himself) but this didn't seem to help. We pulled on his legs but this only caused pain in Johnson's rib cage. Finally, Johnson's coveralls were cut in order to remove them and give him more room, however this also failed to help.

At this point we dispatched a party for help. We were located about forty-five minutes travel time from the elevator entrance to the cave. It took about two hours for help to arrive. During this time every possible thing was done to make Johnson comfortable and to keep him warm. The blanket from the Cave Rescue Bag was placed under Johnson's body as much as possible. The rest of it was draped over him. Several members of the party donated sweatshirts and coats to the cause.

By this time I noticed that Johnson had started to develop the symptoms of hypothermia. He began shivering and would go into short periods of incoherence. Two Carbide lamps were placed close to Johnson's head and upper body in an attempt to increase his heat supply. Johnson said that the light and heat that they produced helped him. We also gave him a couple of candy bars to increase his energy reserve.

When the rescue party returned with hammers and chisels a knob of calcite crystals (Nailhead Spar) was chipped away. About seven cubic inches of rock was removed. Johnson then slid his body to the right and freed himself. He then spent about a half an hour resting and drinking hot tomato soup brought in by the rescue party. By this time Johnson was in very good spirits and he moved out of the cave under his own power.

Lessons Learned and Recommendations

1. Care should be taken when encouraging new cavers in tight squeezes. Peer pressure should be reduced to minimum.
2. First aid for hypothermia should begin early in the rescue.
3. A good first aid and survival kit should be taken on every cave trip.
4. Every caver should carry a high carbohydrate food with him.
5. The decision to remove or cut clothing should be weighed heavily. The removal will cause increased heat loss.
6. A light source should be placed close to the victim's head so that what he sees is well lighted.

7. All cavers should carry enough light for twice as long as their planned cave visit.
8. Any person that panics should be quickly removed from the vicinity of the victim.
9. The largest and most inexperienced persons should be in the middle of the group.
10. One individual should stay within eyesight of the victim at all times.
11. Carbide lamps are a good source of external heat for the victim.
12. Antihistamines or other tranquilizers might be given to the victim to relax his muscles. However, consideration should be given to the drug's effect on hypothermia and the victim's eventual movement out of the cave.

RULES COMMENTARY: My practice, which is not followed by all game masters, is to allow an ambiguous order to be executed if it has only one possible legal interpretation. This turn Russia ordered F Swe-Nor, which is ambiguous (several provinces and seas begin with Nor; see 1971 Rules VII.7). The only legal possibility, however, is F Swe-Nwy. By contrast, F Ska-Nor would not be permitted. One ambiguity which will never give rise to confusion involves Tyrolia and the Tyrrhenian Sea. F StP-Liv must mean Livonia; however, A StP-Liv could mean Livonia or a convey to Liverpool and will not be obeyed.

The situation in Rumania illustrates 1971 Rules VII.7: "If two units are ordered to the same space, and one of them is dislodged by a unit coming from that space, the other unit may move."

Only one player submitted conditional builds so I am making Autumn/Winter a separate season. Retreats and builds (which may be conditional on the retreats) are due February 28th.

Austria has continued his steamroller effects on Germany, Turkey, and now, possibly, Russia. His occupation of Ankara will create an interesting situation because if he is truly at war, we will see a gallant fight here as this is about the only open approach to the Russian south. I recommend stabilizing the center and fighting it daringly in the south.

Turkey has had tough luck. Obviously his attempts for peach have failed, but maybe he'll have new life as Russia would be wise to enlist his aid. He may play a very, very important role in Syria.

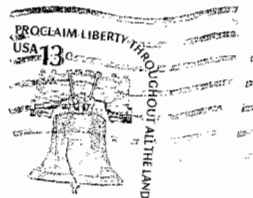
