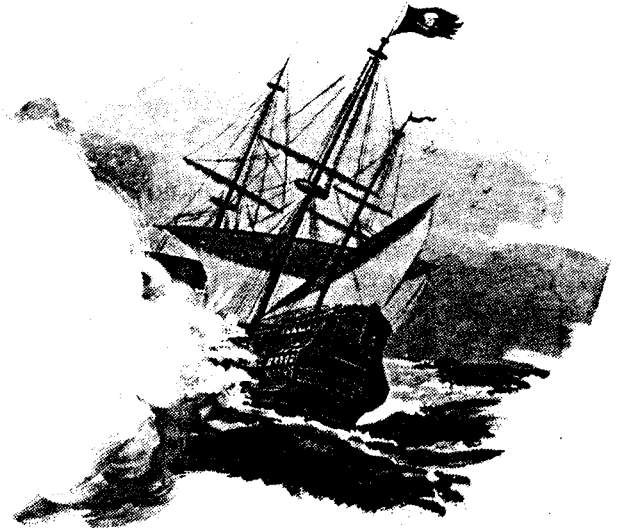

## LETTERS:

Dear Dennis,

I'm writing in response to your comments in Command #10, about the IDAEC and my zine the Tetracuspid.

First of all let me explain the IDAEC to you. It does evaluate zines using a standard that Big Brother may or may not have passed. If it would have passed using the current standards then maybe they should be changed, but the way to change them is to write to the IDAEC and not to write sweeping editorials about it.

Of the four zines you mentioned only two, yours and Impassable would be rated acceptable. Erewhon hasn't come out in months and admittedly the Tetracuspid is more than three days late on the average.

The IDAEC was formed by an act of the IDA. It consists of a group of people, one for each of several regions who do the evaluations and one to head it all. Their qualifications are that they care enough to do something for this hobby. The list is compiled for anyone interested.

As to the Tetracuspid, I do not consider myself to be in the same class as people like John Royer. I

"Then there is the IDAEC. This organization irritates me almost more than I can say. This group purports to review zines that have requested such review and rates them on acceptability of GM and zine. They do NOT tell you which zines are unacceptable. They list only those zines which are and by implication the rest are not. There is no way of distinguishing between an acceptable zine which has not requested evaluation and an unacceptable one. The idea seems to be that publishers will come to ask for evaluation, just to avoid the impression that they are unacceptable. This seems to smack of coercion to me. I have not requested rating of this zine, and I do not intend to do so. And the worst sin I have seen them commit is rating as acceptable a zine which has not published an issue since late June. I don't find this acceptable and it leads me to question the judgement of the IDAEC on those zines with which I am not familiar."

GAME REVIEW TOBRUK (AM)  
by Bob Beardasley

Tobruk is a simulation of individual tank/squad combat during the battle of Gazala, 1942. Why it isn't called Gazala is somewhat of a mystery to this writer because most of the scenarios feature that battle rather than Tobruk.

Tobruk is a combination board game/miniatures contest that has previously received mixed to bad mixed reviews since its publication in 1975. Even Avalon Hill's publicity and advertisements have been "low profile" on the game, as if the game is something of an embarrassment to the company. I can't understand why. It's a fine game chock full of good ideas.

The good ideas start with the conversion of the board game to a miniatures, and vice versa. Now, we board gamers can find out why miniatures gaming has become more and more popular every year.

Imagine the thrill you get when you maneuver your 15 Italian Sem-vente tanks against 3 lonely British Grant tanks in for the kill. Imagine the farther thrill you'll get as you watch your Italian armor piercing shells bounce off the Grant's hulls all day long, as the Grant's 75 mm and 37 mm guns make garbage cans of your tanks.

There's more to the game than tank duels, although those are great fun in themselves. You have anti-tank guns, mortars, squads of infantry, mines, hedgehogs, anti-tank traps, dummy gun emplacements, etc., etc. Weapons are rated against each possible target (different CRT for each case!) and you'll soon discover each strength and weakness of every weapons system on the board.

You'll also learn about the different rates-of-fire of each weapon, about acquired sights and initial sights, about the importance of hit locations and other goodies. Sound complicated? That is one of the criticisms of the game, but I don't find that to be the case.

Tobruk's rules are written in a programmed instruction format. In other words, you read two pages and play a scenario! The first scenario is a full-blown (pardon the pun) tank battle. Then you read two pages more and play an infantry scenario. After you play the first nine scenarios you've learned all the rules. Written clearly and precisely, it's almost fun to learn the game. It's incredibly more simple than learning AM's Third Reich, and not much more difficult than Panzerblitz. By the way, Tobruk is nothing like Panzerblitz and the famous Panzerbush technique. Although movement is sequential, fire is done after movement one tank at a time, alternating sides. In other words, you fire one of yours, then I fire one of mine.

Another criticism of Tobruk is that the playing board is featureless. True enough, but I feel that isn't detrimental to the game. You can change the nature of the board with mines, hedgehogs, fortified positions if that is what you want. If you're looking for mountains, forests and rivers, forget it.

A further criticism is the amount of dice rolls involved in combat resolution. There are plenty involved, but basically it only takes two rolls for each time you fire a shot. On the first roll you determine if you've hit your target; on the second roll you find out where you've hit it. The second roll isn't necessary if you've missed the first roll. Generally speaking, each tank can fire two shots per turn with their initial fire. So, if you don't mind rolling dice, you won't have any complaint on this count.

The last criticism dealt with here is the excitement level of the game. Some say there isn't much, but I disagree again. In a recent multi-player contest (yes, you can play very effectively, with more than two people) involving this writer, your Command pubber, Dennis "the butcher" Agosta, and Rich "let's go for the lucky hit" Marcell, many huzzahs and cheers (and assorted noises) were heard everytime Rich and I scored a hit on Dennis. (Let it be recorded here that Dennis was extremely lucky in destroying 17 of our 21 tanks while only losing 4 of his 9. No wonder we cheered when we hit one of his!)

I highly recommend Tobruk to any gamers who enjoy tactical games like Wooden Ships and Iron Men. I believe it is the best game to come out in 1975 (including Third Reich) and hope you'll find it to be as enjoyable.

This game is rapidly becoming a best so far as a dice game goes; it may be worthwhile in showing new

and players how to take out a standardly position. Charles Reinsel quit because he's Charles Reinsel; I replaced Ralph Ragan because he was missing turns as much as he was sending them in; it now appears that Len Lakofka has quit because I replaced Ragan (even though I told Len that Ralph wrote to me and asked to be replaced); it now appears that the problems that are preventing Charlie Spiegel from printing Stab, are also preventing him from playing postal Diplomacy. That's the situation going into Winter 1904.

Anyway, here are my thoughts on the tactics of the first few turns. I hope that the many novices who read these pages will get something worthwhile out of it. Reader response is strongly requested.

Turkey opens with an immediate attack on Russia which is further strengthened by A Moscow's move north. Turkey's move would had taken on added strength had he been able to form an alliance with Austria, but as the game progressed it became obvious that Turkey was working alone. This is not surprising since Mr. Reinsel's style of diplomatic negotiation can best be described as "do what I say or else!" Had Russia moved A Mos-Ukr and A War-Gal, his chances for survival would have been greatly improved; this is not to say that A Mos-St.P is a bad move in general- it's not. It is a risky move that is soundly defeated

Turkey moving A Sny to Anania.  
 On the western front, Germany opens aggressively with F Kiel to Denmark; I would have preferred to move A Munich to Ruhr, but since France attempted to move to Burgundy these moves are just as strong. Italy's move to Piedmont (most likely at Edi Birsen's suggestion) is an early indication of France's problems to come. France cannot really expect to gain Belgium unless he allies with Germany. While England is usually in a position to support France into Belgium from the North Sea, Germany's A Munich to Ruhr can stop this most of the time.

Turkey's moves are obvious and quite devastating to the Russian. At this point Russia is quite out of it. Austria takes good advantage by making an excellent move F Alb-Ion, getting the most out of his pieces. At this early stage, Austria is in the swing position usually occupied by Italy; Russia is weak, Turkey is committed to fighting Russia, and Italy is attacking France who is weaker than usual.

Germany's move east indicates he isn't worried about England, a point which France doesn't appear to notice. France's game is now totally dependant upon England, a dangerous situation.
