A Couple days after I mailed the May DIPLOMAG, I received a statement from Eric Young of Armstrong, B.C. advising me that he wished to run for office. He had mailed this from British Columbia on May 2nd, but it took 14 days to get here! (I think a man on horseback could have delivered it quicker). Since it was timely mailed, I had to re-open the nominations. All of our officers and publishers were notified, and those of you playing in certain Mensa games saw the notice in the various M Dipzines. In any event, you'll find a ballot enclosed with the candidates' names and addresses on it, plus campaign statements. This ballot is to be returned to our Election Commissioner, Bill Young, at 507 N. Spruce St., Ebensburg, PA. 15931, by August 29, 1992. Bill will certify the results and let me know in time for printing in the September newsltr. The winner will take office for a two-year term effective November 1, 1992.

TWO GAMES TRANSFERRED TO NEW GM'S

Our oldest game, Mensa #30 (1989 Y), has been transferred from John Galt's THE ASSASSIN'S BLADE to Craig Reges! AGAINST THE ODDS. John was unable to continue publishing, as his new job requires a very lengthy daily commute for him in the Bay Area, so he had neither the time nor the energy to continue. I adjudicated the Fall 1911 season here, and then forwarded the material on to Craig.

Mensa #37 (1991 AP) is now being GM'd by Ralph Baty. Dennis Klein's zine folded after the Fall 1902 orders were printed, and the Ombudsman asked him to re-do that season. So, THE SPINDLE has ended its short life, and Baty's BATYVILLE GAZETTE will run yet another Mensa

HOBBY AWARDS WINNERS

The winners were announced at DipCon XXV in Kansas City. I'm pleased to report that there was a good turnout of voters this year. The winners were:

Don Miller Award for Meritorious Service - John Boardman, for publishing over 600 issues of GRAUSTARK. Theoretically, the Awards are supposed to cover activities in the year 1991, but in John's case it's obviously in recognition of his founding of the Postal Dip hobby in 1963, and his non-stop publication of the hobby's oldest Dipzine ever since. A well-deserved recognition, in my opinion.

John Koning Best Player Award - Gary Behnen, again. That makes three years in a row for this diplomat. Gary has offered to voluntarily disqualify himself for consideration next year, but a more reasonable suggestion is to have the Awards Committee rule that no one is eligible to win this award two years in a row. The Committee will vote on this after David McCrumb takes over as Chairman this Fall.

Melinda Holley Quantity Participation Award - Kathy Caruso. Again, this recognition is for a lifetime of service, and not just a single year. Kathy has served as BNC, Orphan Games Custodian, published KATHY'S KORNER, and, in the past couple of years, has been an invaluable standby player.

Rod Walker Literary Award - In a very close race, Garret Schenck won this award for producing the ZINE REGISTER. This is one of the most difficult jobs in the entire postal hobby, running over 64 pages of small print. I'm told a question was raised as to whether it wouldn't have been more suitable to have placed this nomination in the Miller category, leaving the Walker Award for works of fiction and fandom. However, there are precedents for thinking otherwise. In 1988, I shared the Walker Award with Mark Berch for my production of the 1987 N. American Variant Bank Catalog, another thankless task involving much minutia. So, ZR follows the same path.

Plaques are being sent to all of the winners, to hang on their walls or display on their mantelpieces. Thanks to the generous contributions from many voters, there remain enough funds in the Treasury to continue sending plaques next year.

Over 100 North American zines are reviewed, as well as a few from Oversea. This is much improved over issue #19. Much of the bitterness in #19 has been dropped, although there's still room for improvement.

Garret gives quite a few plugs to the Mensa Diplomacy SIG here. He recognizes that the SIG has brought a lot of "New Blood" into the Postal hobby over the years. This has also resulted in an increase in the number of Dipzine publishers. There are good reviews of RAMBLING WAY (Andy York), TACTFUL ASSASSIN (Eric Young) and WAR FAIR (Steve Glasgow) in #20. Oh, yes, DIPLOMAG, too. Read it, you'll like it.

All the fuss about where to advertise for potential Diplomacy players lately. Garret put an advert in a SF magazine. Others say that's not a good source, that the best place to advertise is in the pages of Avalon Hill's THE GENERAL. I'd like to add that the second-best source is the Mensa magazine, MENSA BULLETIN, which has a circulation of about 55,000. Over the years, our SIG has brought about 100 people into the Postal hobby, not that all of them stayed. It's amazing how many M's have heard of Diplomacy, but many don't know the game can be played by mail.

PLUG: I'm pleased to report that a new discussion-type zine has made its appearance. It's called FOOLHARDY, and it's edited by Douglas Kent, 54 West Cherry St., #211, Rahway, N.J. 07065. Subs are \$1 an issue in the US or Canada, and \$2/issue Overseas.

This zine is seen as a successor to the late HOUSE OF LORDS as a place for the discussion of anything related to the Postal hobby. This is broken down into separate categories, plus a posing of several questions "For Next Time" on the last page. I like FOOLHARDY much better than HOL. For one thing, there isn't any of the meanness and hatred which permeated the pages of HOL. For another, I feel it's better written, without going on endlessly like some issues of HOL. This issue is just 17 pages, which is enough for anyone to read at one sitting. Of course, as readership grows, FOOLHARDY may become larger. Anyway, you may want to see a Sample issue before deciding on whether to sub for a longer period.

THE THREE DIGIT TELEPHONE AREA CODES in North America are just about used up. After the recent batch were assigned, I've been told that there are just three of these numbers unassigned. (The middle digit has to be a "O" or "1", while "1" cannot be used as the first digit). With the rapid increase in the use of ear phones and fax machines the system has about reached its limits. I'm told that a switch to a four-digit Area Code system is imminent. These changes may require a change in the definition of a "local game" by the BNC. Many years ago, a local game was defined as any Postal Dip game where three or more starting players shared the same Area Code. These areas are now a lot smaller in many cases. New York, has two Codes, 212 and 718, just for itself, for example.

I think we're going to have to change the definition to one where any three players live in the same metropolitan area. In my games, I always tried to use the stricter rule of not allowing more than one starting player from each State or Province, except California, where I allowed players from Northern & Southern California to play in the same game. However, there were times when I had to permit two people from New York or Pennsylvania into a game, since I ran variant games, which were always harder to fill. I did try to make sure they lived in different parts of the state, however.

Perhaps this is a topic worthy of debate in our new discussion zine, FOOTLOOSE.

AVAION HILL NEWS. The "official" flyer posted in our local game and hobby shop states that the Deluxe Diplomacy set (Item #8191) will be available in the stores in Sept., 1992. However, I've been advised by Rex Martin that this is more likely to make its appearance around November.

Also, the revised <u>Gamers Guide to Diplomacy</u> was supposed to go on sale in November, 1992. This is very likely going to be pushed back to January or later. This project is just getting started. Rod Walker will not be a participant in this revision. Just how much of Rod's original material will be used has not yet been decided, but I do know that other people will be asked to put their 2¢ worth in on subjects with which they are familiar I may contribute something on Variants. I've sent Rex Martin, who is to be the editor, a copy of SUPERNOVA, as a possible source or inspiration for Dip material. In any case, there will be a considerable updating of the current <u>Gamers Guide</u> information. I've been assured that the Postal aspects of play will be given a lot of space.

MENSA #30, 1989 Y. New GM: Craig A. Reges, AGAINST THE ODDS

I had to rescue this game from John Galt, who has left the publishing business, and call for new sets of orders from all four surviving players for the Fall 1911 season. I did not receive a set for Ralph Baty's France by the deadline, but the others were able to do so. I then sent out a flyer with the results, and have turned the game over to Craig Reges. No earthshaking events occurred in F 11. Tony Dousette's Germany kicked the French out of Kiel in the Spring, and then out of Munich in the Fall, but he already owned Munich. Phil Reynolds put a Russian F into North Africa, but was unable to take Trieste from Turkey, and remains at 6 Centers. Russia (Kate Robison) had her attacks on Trieste, Sev and Rumania blocked, to stand at 11 SC's. Ralph Baty cannot be charged with an NMR here, since the loss of his orders was not his fault.

MENSA #35, 1991 A. GM: Andy York, RAMBLING WAY

In Fall 1907, France (Marc Hight) captured Rome, and supported Austrian A Tyrol to Venice. This eliminated Italy (Kevin Kinsel) and brought France to 14 Centers. Jim Lewis' Austria lost Trieste and Serbia to the Ottomans, dropping from 4 to 3 SC's. While the Sublime Porte (Jim Grose) was able to add those provinces to its empire, it lost Rumania to the Bear, and also saw a Russian F in the Black Sea. Peter Kohnke's Russia now has 10 Centers, and is the second Power of the board. A French concession win was proposed, but this was defeated in Spring 1908, as the French took Venice.

MENSA #36. GM: Tony Dousette, THE CONTINUAL CRISIS. 1991 IG (At last!)

Jim Allen resigned the German position in Spring 1904, leaving a 4-Center country with the ownership of Edi and Liverpool. Ralph Baty has been asked to take over. France (David Hood) leads the pack with 8, including Munich, but helped the Germans get back into Berlin. Austria (Andy York) is coming up on the rail with 7, advancing units into Russia and Turkey. Russia (Eric Young) is down to 4, but has been able to take Norway. Italy (Jeff Eide) has 6, While England and Turkey are down to two apiece. The Turkish player, Ram Avrahami, at least has units in his own country. Jim Lewis' England owns only Denmark and Sweden.

MENSA #37, 1991 AP. GM: Ralph Baty, BATYVILLE GAZETTE

The Fall 1902 season was replayed without the Italian orders, per the Ombudsman's instructions, and Winter 07 was then played separately, to give all of the players a chance to get back into the game. Jim Loughran is now playing the 3-Center Italy. Briefly, Turkey (Jim Grose) gained 3 Center in 1902 - Moscow, Rumania & Sev - to lead the league with 7; while Austria (Jim Lewis) added Greece to go up to 6, and second place. Winter 1902 was played separately.

MENSA #38. GM: Craig A. Reges, AGAINST THE ODDS

There was a separate Winter 1901 season in June, with the players building 8 Armies and just 3 Fleets. The next deadline was July 8th, which was too late for our deadline.

MENSA #39, 1992U. GM: Stephen Glasgow, WAR FAIR

Spring 1901 has now been played, with the only conflict being the usual Black Sea standoff between Russia and Turkey. Tim Shaw NMR'd as Turkey, and Marc Hight submitted back-up orders. Marc will become the player of record if Tim drops out.

Five people are now signed up for the Mensa #40 game, which will be run by Eric Young in THE TACTFUL ASSASSIN. Just two more and we can get started!

MENSA #33, 1990 HT. GM: Eric Young, THE TACTFUL ASSASSIN

The Spring 1910 issue took 14 days to get here from British Columbia, so it missed the last issue of DIPLOMAG. Germany (Mike Morris) is in the lead, with 9 Centers, and Russia (Peter Kohnke) is second with 8. There was a June 5th deadline for the combined Fall & Winter 1910 season (this game uses the British system of play). However, there was a mailing problem. Eric left the printed zines in the Canadian equivalent of a Contract Station, paid the postage, and asked them to run them through their postage meter. Instead, some idiot dumped them into the mail without any postage. As a result, Eric arrived home from a 5-day trip to find them all back on his desk! The zine was remailed, from a Post Office, on 1 July, but too late to make this issue of DIPLOMAG. The 5-way draw proposal failed.


