YOUR CHAIRMAN PUTS ON HIS JUDGE'S CAP

There was an appeal for a replay of the Summer and Fall, seasons of 1975HG (Mensa #5) in CLAW & FANG. In accordance with Article 3.d. of our By-Laws, I was asked to adjudicate the dispute in binding arbitration. The CM, Scott Hightower, did a thorough job in furnishing me with all the pertinent material. We hope to be able to settle any issues involving Mensa games without having to go to the IDA/NA Ombudsman. In this case, I completed my actions on February 8th, whereas the new Ombudsman did not take office until February 16th, after the 1978 IDA elections, so we were able to save considerable time by handling the protest as a SIG matter.

I rendered a decision that the Summer 1910 retreat season would stand as printed, but the Fall 1910 season would have to be replayed, on the basis that several of the players had not been notified of the change in players for Turkey.

Marvin Grosswirth, AMC's Publicity Officer, is writing an article on the operation of Mensa Games SIGs for the magazine, GAMES. Every game SIG has been asked to send Marvin a letter concerning the history and operations of the SIG. I have done so for Diplomacy, with an assist from Don Horton. As a compulsive writer, I sent Marvin three pages of single-spaced typed information. He promises to send me a copy of the magazine when his article is published. I concluded my letter by saying:

"One terrific thing about postal Diplomacy, and all postal gaming, is that you get to make pen pals in other parts of the country, and, indeed, all over the world. I have pen pals in England, Germany, Switzerland, Australia and Brazil, as well as in America. I find that regardless of whether they are Mensans, they are interesting people... In my trips to Europe in 1970 and 1976, I was able to visit some of these people at their homes, which is a far better way to see a foreign country than from a sight-seeing bus. I strongly believe that playing games by mail promotes international friendship and understanding."

We had a Maryland Mensa/Diplomacy SIG Diplomacy party at the Davis home on Sunday, February 26th. The snowdrifts had been cleared up by that date, so about 14 people came, including a reporter for the Baltimore Sun, who is writing a feature article on Diplomacy players. SIG members John Bell, Steve Ralston and Bill Young attended, as well as some other M's. Prominent among the non-M's were Buddy Tretick, a former publisher, who is now reviving his old zine, IA GUERRE, and Bob and Linda Johnson of Washington, both BUSHWACKER players.

We started an "old pro" game early, in the basement. With late arrivals, and with two people (Tretick and Bob Johnson) playing on both boards, we started a second game upstairs around 2:30. As host, I waited till the second game to participate. Since I was in it, I have better details on this game. We only played to Fall 1904. Here are the final figures:

Austria (Dan Mathias/Bill Young) - 7 (Bill & Inge took over their spots in 1903)

England (Fred Davis) - 2

France (Bruce Montz) - 11 (winner)

Germany (Buddy Tretick) - 1

Italy (John Bell/Inge Davis) - 4

Russia (Bob Johnson) - 5

Turkey (Linda Johnson) - 3

This only adds up to 33. Either Russia or Austria had one more build coming.

In the "pro" game in the basement, the winner was Buddy's son, Jim Tretiek, who took Germany to 8 Centers by Fall 1906, at which point time ran out. Steve Ralston finished second with a 7-Center France. There was much running up and down stairs by Bob and Buddy, and later by Bill. Forturately, no one had a heart attack. Perhaps we can make this an annual affair.
