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DIPLOMACY SIG CETS NEW CM'S

Membership has been growing by leaps and bounds, which leads to the probability of more and more All-M games. Apparently, many Mensans have become familiar with Diplomacy through FTF play, although many were unaware of the extent of the Postal hobby. However, CLAW & FANG is going to coase publication when all of its current games end. Until now, all of the SIG's Regular games have been carried by Don Horton in C & F. (Don and I co-founded the SIG, with the arrangement whereby I would be the Coordinator, and he the GM. We thought we'd be lucky if we got 14 members!) Obviously, new GM's are going to be needed to run the All-M games, without which the SIG would have no reason for existence.

I am pleased to report that we already have three volunteers who are willing to run future postal games. They are:

None is currently running a zine of his own, but they have received copies of my House Rules, and some other helpful hints. Ron Brown states that he would be ready to start a game in September, after he returns from his honeymoon. Ron is an Anglo-phone, and lives only some 70 miles from Ottawa. He says that mail from the U.S. (even the West Coast) reaches him in no more than 5 days, so he would not be handicapped insofar as postal communications go. He will gladly run one Regular game, which he can print on his school's mimeograph. Ed Bapple describes himself as a "two-fingered typist" who is ready to go whenever we can get seven victims together, with Xerox copies. Chip Charnley can run games by carbon copy. However, as the mails to Iceland are not running too well right now, Chip will be the last of these three to get a game, in hopes that there will be some improvement in service by then.

I had originally intended to give Ron only players from Canada and the Eastern U.S., and the rest to Ed. However, that doesn't seem necessary now. I already have six people signed up for the next Regular Mensa game. I'll give the first group of players to Ed Bapple, and the second group to Ron Brown. We have one small problem. As a general rule, GM's try to avoid having two players from the same local area in the same game. This gives such players an unfair advantage over the others. Within the U.S., this usually means having no more than one player from each State in a game, except in the cases of California and Texas, where North/South and East/West, respectively, are considered as separate States, because these areas are so large. (Also, because about 15% of the entire Postal Diplomacy hobby membership lives in California). We also try to avoid having players from adjacent States in the same game if they live within a few miles of each other, as in the case of players in New York City and Northern New Jersey, or Washington, D.C. and its immediate Maryland and Virginia suburbs. Unfortunately, three of the six M's signed up live in Southern California. If any of you will send me a preference to play in Ron Brown's game instead, I'll drop you from Ed Bapple's list. Otherwise, I'll have to toss a coin or otherwise select one of these S. California players for the next Mensa game.

I would like to send each new GM a list of 7 players and at least one stand-by, so if you'd prefer to be a stand-by, please advise me on that, too. Stand-bys usually receive the game reports at a lower rate. In any case, here are the names of the M's who have signed up for the next game. If I've inadvertently failed to list anyone's name, please let me know. Also, you can now add your name to the list (as player or stand-by) if you're interested:

I will be very happy to have more Mensa GM's, so if anyone is interested in running a game, please let me know. You have to be available for the next 18 months to two years to do so. If you're engaged, make sure your fiancee understands this form of insanity before you commit yourself (no pun intended).

Anyone running a SIG game or games would also be a logical candidate for the SIG Executive Committee. I don't know whether Don Horton plans to run for re-election. We have traditionally had two publishers and one non-publisher on the Committee. While there's nothing that says this must be the case, I'd prefer to keep that sort of ratio on the Committee. So, let's have your thought on this, too, if you're willing to become a publisher. (See next article).

Please let me hear from you, if you're interested, no later than June 18th, as I'll be leaving for San Francisco for the AG a couple of days later. We'll print the news on new game starts and new publishers in the July DIPLOMAG, along with some brief comments on DipCon. (I'll be at DipCon June 6,7,8, if you want to talk to me there).

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ELECTION COMMISSIONER NEEDED

The next order of business is to select an Election Commissioner for the September elections. The terms of the Chairman and one Commissioner (Don Horton) will expire November ist. In May, we select a person to run the election; in July we call for nominations, with a deadline sometime in August. If more thankone person is nominated for office, the Election Commissioner sends out ballots around August 20th, with a voting deadline in sufficient time to report the results in the September issue of DIPLOMAG.

ELECTION COMMISSIONER (Cont.)

Serving as Election Commissioner has one perk; it earns you a free SIG membership for the following year. The Commissioner is expected to promptly contact all nominees for statements of candidacy, if they wish to make them, and to be able to print sufficient copies of the ballots and any statements for the membership. (In a pinch, we could print them here, but it would be better if the Commissioner did his own work). The SIG will pay the Commissioner's postage expenses. It is most important that the Commissioner take these actions promptly. In the event that two or more people volunteer, the Cheirman reserves the right to select the Commissioner from among them.

Incidentally, my personal choice would be to continue to serve as SIG Chairman, and publisher of DIPLOMAG, and have others GM the SIG's Regular games. It is certainly not possible for one person to do both. I'll continue to GM Variant games, one at a time, in DIPLOMAG.

DIPCON NEWS

DipCon XIII will be held as part of MichiCon IX, on June 6,7,8, 1980, at Oakland University, Rochester, Michigan. This just outside of Pontiac, a few miles north of Detroit. The Diplomacy Tournament will begin at 10 a.m., Seturday, June 7th. Entry fee is \$1.00. The code number is "037" if you want to sign up new. The Pre-Registration Weekend Ticket costs \$10.00 if purchased before May 25th, or \$12.00 if your letter is postmarked after than date. Make checks out to Metro Detroit Games, and send a single check for both Registration at the Dip Tourney Fee to: Metro Detroit Games, M-9 Pre-Reg., P.O. Box 787, Troy, Mich. 48099.

The official convention motel is the Northfield Hilton, 5500 Crooks Rd., Troy, Mich. 48084. A rather stiff rate of \$44.00/night single is offered, although it's just \$46.00/night for a double. Make your reservations directly with the motel. Dorm rooms are available on a first-come/first-serve basis, 6 \$10.14/night eingle, or \$8.47 per person per night for a double. Make reservations through the Conference Dept., Oakland University, Rochester, Mich. 48063, and make checks payable to (over)

"Oakland University." You must pay the entire amount in advance. Considering the difference in rates, I've made my reservation for a single room in the dorm.

The DipCon Society Meeting will be held at 9 p.m. Saturday. This is the meeting at which the site of the 1981 DipCon will be selected. This will be followed immediately by the business meeting of the IDA and NADF. Admission is free to all of these sessions. There will also be a DipLomacy Seminar at 10 a.m. on Sunday morning (Code No. 105, also free). This will give you an opportunity to discuss your favorite DipLomacy theories or pet peeves with others. See you there.

NADF is the North American Diplomacy Federation, an organization of most of the people rendering hobby services, such as the Boardman and Miller No. Custodians, the Editor of DIPLOMACY WORLD, the Hobby Archivist, the Novice Package Director, and the Custodians of the several Variant Banks, to name a few. The NADF will be holding its first FTF Business Meeting at DipCon. It is expected to come up with arrangments for all Publishers and Guest GM's to join the group at this meeting.

Incidentally, I (Fred Davis) have been appointed as Chairman of the DipCon Society Site Committee, and, as such, will get to chair that meeting. If you know of any wargaming convention which might be interested in submitting a bid, please tell them to contact me ASAP. The only absolute rule is that DipCon cannot be held twice in a row in the same State. The rules also favor a bid from a different geographical region over one coming from the same region. The people attending the meeting will vote on the site selection.

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NEW SIG PUBLISHER

Vermon E. Schaller, 207 Garfield Ave., Cherry Hill, N.J. 08004, has started a zine called DREADNOUGHT to carry his Gunboat Diplomacy Tournament. Gunboat Diplomacy is a variant very similar to "Anonymity," in that none of the players know who any of the others are. The difference is that NO PRESS will be permitted, so, unlike Anonymity, there will be absolutely no communication of any kind between the players. The Tournament consists of 7 players playing 7 different games, one as each Power, simultaneously A point system has been established for Victories, Draws and Survivals. Sounds like the games will decided by plain brute force. Sub rates are 10 issues for \$4.00, if you want to follow the games. I don't know whether Vern needs or wants any stand-by players but you can ask him about this.

(In response to a letter from a reader to THE OWLET, newsletter of the Mensa Gifted Children SIG, the Coordinator, Debby Gunther, replies):

"I found this letter very disturbing... Your attitude is that the gifted have a wonderful lot in life, and all complaints of the gifted are groundless. You must have had a beautiful childhood in order to make that claim, but I believe for the majority of us it was not so. It is not wonderful to be different, so different, in a world that expects conformity. From what I have seen, most of their propblems come from people fearing them, with the fear increasing proportionally to the abilities. ...people wrongly assume that gifted children are happy to be always the best in their classes, and that they can achieve to the best of their abilities without extra help; this has been proven wrong in studies. Gifted children are not an elite corps of super-minds; they are only children, and they need a special sort of education in order to develop into the type of people who can help this world."

Current Strength AUSTRIA (Baumeister): Build A Vienna 7 (71 Will be 1 unit short ENGLAND (Kenesson): Build A Edinburgh, A London 13 (+1) Was 1 unit short ITALY (Montgomery): Build A Venice, F Naples 8 (+2) RUSSIA (Schaller): No change 4 (n.c.) In a NMR situation, a dislodged unit gets first choice for removal. Thereafter, in this game, the GM is supposed to remove the units which will least affect the game, or be the least likely to result in the gift of a S.C. to another Power. In my opinion, A/F Tyrr. Sea met this criterion best. All other Swiss units are either in a S.C., in the Homeland, or in a space immediately adjacent to the Homeland.

PRESS: ST. PETERSBURG: Russia seeks peace with his Austrian and Italian neighbors.

WE HAVE ALREADY RECEIVED ONE OFFER from a member of the SIG to GM an All-Mensa Regular game. This came from Ronald Brown, who lives in Quebec, Canada. Ronalds offered to start a game in September, after he has returned from his honeymoon, and settled down to another year of teaching school. I have thanked Ron, but advised him that since mail service is so bad between Eastern Canada and the Western U.S. (and vice-versa), I would want to give him only the names of Canadian and Eastern U.S. M's (only those living east of the Mississippi, or in Minnesota.) We are going to need at least one more volunteer, preferably in the Western U.S., to run Regular Dip games.

The reason for this need is that CIAW & FANG will not start any more games, ever. Don Horton is going to complete all of his current games, and then fold C & F. We have had more than seven years of first class publishing from Don, but nothing lasts forever. This means that we <u>must</u> replace CIAW & FANG with new publishers able to run at least one or two Mensa games apiece, or there is no point in going on with the SIG. So, let me know if you get the publishing bug. Don and I would send you copies of our House Rules, to help you get started.
