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SEASONS GREETINGS!

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Germany has the Lowlands, Denmark, and all of France. England has Iberia and Scandinavia, while Turkey has Bulgaria, Rumania, Sevastopol, Moscow, and Tunis. Austria has Serbia, Greece, and Warsaw. Italy has its three home centres. That is as of Winter, 1905. Spring, 1906, has just been played and seen little change as an English-German alliance is fighting for position against an Austrian-Turkish-Italian alliance.

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As of Winter, 1902, Turkey leads with Bulgaria, Sevastopol, and Serbia. England has Norway and St. Petersburg. France has Iberia. Germany has the Lowlands and Denmark, but not Munich. Italy has Tunis and Rumania. Russia has Moscow, Warsaw, Munich, and Sweden, while Austria has its home centres.

Mensa #14 (1981 AQ) GM: Glenn Overby zine: JIHAD:

The Fall, 1902, deadline has passed, but I haven't yet seen the results. This game has earned the title "The Press Game" in JIHAD: because of the reams of press generated each season—which is unusual for the M games I've seen. The first game year was unusual in another respect. Michael Casucci's France gained three centres (Spain, Portugal, and Munich), while Errol Platt's Germany gained two despite losing Munich (Denmark, Holland, and Belgium). Peter Simpson's Italy gained Triest and Greece, but not Tunis. The other powers made the usual 1901 gains. As a headline for this game read, "Curiouser and curiouser."

Mensa #15 (1981 HR) in Glenn Overby's JIHAD! has just passed its first game year.

Mensa #16 has filled and will be carried in SNAFU! as soon as I receive the list of players. Some are already subscribers and I've saved copies of last issue to mail to the rest as soon as I get their names. If you act quickly you can still subscribe at 50¢ an issue, but after January 1st new subscriptions will cost \$8. for 10, mainly due to astronomical Canadian postal rates. Game fees are \$4.00. Positions will be assigned by lot. Players will get a note from me when I get the list, and House Rules, if they don't already have them. SNAFU! is now running about 20 pages an issue and is carrying 9 games with 5 week deadlines. It's photocopied and has just gone to reduced type in a digest format to save costs.

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Mensa #17 is open to applicants. Apply to Glenn Overby. It also needs a GM. This is a good opportunity for someone thinking of starting a zine, or who just wants GMing experience. That's how SNAFU! began (with Mensa #12). I used to think that getting out one game report was a big job, but now I find a single game adjudication a snap. To GM you need to thoroughly understand the Rule Book and to have a fairly good idea of what you'll be doing for two or three years. (If you're thinking of changing jobs, travelling, or having a pre-frontal lobotomy maybe you should hold off until that's settled.) You'll also need access to reproduction equipment, a steady source of income (so you can buy postal stamps during lean times), a sense of humour, and a few hours free time every month. Let Glenn know if you're interested. If you write me, I'll give you lots of free advice.
