Mensa #15 (1981 HR) GM: Ed Bapple zine: MIGRAINE (Glenn Overby to Fall 02)

After a year of trying only two game years have been played. First there were the long delays caused by Mr. Overby. Ed's adjudication of Spring, 1903 was challenged by a player and an ombudsman was not agreed upon when Ed left on vacation. So, we're awaiting the outcome of this little disagreement. In 1902, Ron Brown's Russia had 8, J. R. Douglas' France was at 7, with Larry McCloud's Austria at 6. H. D. Bassett's Italy had 4 centres, and all the rest had 3: Mark Warner (Eng), Dan Wilson (Ger), Lynne Cicotte (Tur).

In this variant the number of units a supply centre can supply varies randomly from 0 to 3. I didn't mark all the times a power played short, as it happens so often. The numbers show the number of units a power was entitled to, which is not the same thing as the number of centres he has.
