

Basically, we had a three-country steamfoller against a divided opposition, with a stab for a win. Glean and simple. But the dynamics of convoying a Turkish army to England and getting Russian fleets into the Med demanded close cooperation. Turkey really went out on a limb, allowing her forces to be divided. I kept wondering when Dave was going to hit Turkey for four or five centres on one move. He didn't, but Turkey had nothing other than diplomatic skill to prevent it.

Dave's complaint about Windy is well-taken. Imagine my position as GM receiving four or five postcards per season with partial orders on each, scratched out, over-written, with ambiguous instructions on which set they overrode. When one of these cards arrived from a different source, without code word, I cried "Enough!" and raised a stink about it. Windy settled down somewhat after that until he HMRed out.

Mensa #17 (1983 V) GM: Steve Hutton zine: No Fixed Address

Fall, 1905: Two more players bite the dust, including the last original player!

Well, one more player drops out, and the stand-by doesn't send orders. What's a mother to do?

This game has certainly had a strange history. While I realize that Steve has his own unusual type of humor, this is one game that has had more problems than any of the participants deserved. There has been a seven-way draw proposed. Does that give you any idea of the level of frustration of some the players?

At the moment, the strongest player on the board is Ron Brown (Germany) who has nine centers to his name and controls Scandinavia. The next highest total (eight) belongs to Turkey which has just now been assigned to Paul Milewski. (Didn't I tell you that a new stand-by entering this game could do well?)

Rounding out the game, we have five other players, ranging from two to four centers each, who are Mike Ehli, Kevin Brown, John Ellis, Dave Carter, and Dave Lincoln (playing A, E, F, I, & R, in that order).

Mensa #18 (1983 AV) GM: Scott Hanson zine: Irksome

This game has made it to Fall, 1906, and now appears to be shaping up as a horserace between Kevin Brown's France and Ron Brown's Russia, both of whom have eleven centers. Both of them have posted gains in the last game year.

The rest of the game board is arranged in two tiers, with three players at the 3-4 level, and two more who are at 1 unit each. The 3-4 level has Ellis, Michael Keller, and Mark Keller, while the two folks staving off elimination at the one level are Tighe and Reges.

It should be noted that Paula Dodge has resigned from her games, citing both the problems surrounding "Manifest Destiny" and also her sudden and abrupt transfer to Manassas, VA.

Mensa #19 (1984 CJ) GM: Konrad Baumeister zine: Give Me a Weapon

As you can see above, this game has been assigned a Boardman number. Its first deadline passed a little while before this is being written, so by now its first season of results are certainly on their way. This means, of course, that I can't tell you anything about this game, but promise to be able to next time.

It should also be mentioned to those who are interested that the quality of reproduction of GMAW has improved, with assurances that that happy state of affairs will continue in the future.

Mensa #20

There are 3 players signed up for the next game. A gamesmaster is also needed. It should be commented on at this point that the GM does not need to be a publisher of a zine. A number of SIG games have been played "by flyer" which means that the Gamesmaster issues game reports that are nothing but game reports, not a magazine that prints letters, articles, etc. So if you've thought of GM'ing a game, but don't want to get heavily into publishing, this could be the way to approach it. I must warn you that I will not consider a novice as a GM--a GM must be a player who has a couple of completed games behind him/her. (Why? Because a GM of all people has to be a reliable participant, even when things get frustrating or boring or you-name-it as things inevitably will on occasion. I could write a whole article on the fact that every game starts out with seven players, but ends up with one win.)

Mensa #14 revisited

While I was typing this section, a game report for Mensa #14 came, so you deserve some more information about it. Namely:

Fall, 1910: France and England go to war!

A five way draw was defeated, and the battle for Europe continues, with Dave Lincoln's France picking up Edinburgh, but losing Brest and Belgium...he's still the strongest country on the board with 10 units. Following him at about 6-7 units each are Craig Reges's England, Ralph Baty's Russia, and Ken Hager's Turkey. Rick Young has resigned as the Italian player, for reasons that are not mentioned, leaving Italy with questionable ownership as the stand-by called for did not respond. Anybody who wants to pick up the ownership of a four-center Italy should immediatly write to Steve as follows: Steve Hutton, 704 Brant St., London, Ont. N5Y 3N1 (Canada). Next deadline is September 6th.

Olympic Mensa Game?

As an international organization, Mensa may be the perfect place for an international game of Diplomacy. 
