Mensa #19 (1984 CJ) GM: Konrad Baumeister zine: Give Me a Weapon

Now we've got a game report coming through on this one. The biggest item here is that the game is finally down to 5 players, with the elimination of Steve Piper's England. (Sorry about that, Steve!) But it is appreciated when a player hangs in there and plays out his position—thank you.

Ralph Baty's Austria is stalled at 4 units. Germany annihilated one in Bohemia, but Ralph will be able to rebuild in Vienna, which is where that unit was going anyway.

Brandt's Italy lost a supply center and will have to pick out one unit to disband. Which won't necessarily be an easy choice, considering the four units are A Ser, and Fleets in Adr, Ion, & Gre.

H.D.Bassett's Turkey held steady at 7 units. He seems to be going at it against Italy in the area around the Aegean Sea, while holding steady across the northern frontier.

Now as for Dave Lincoln's France (9 units) and Bob Addison's Germany (11 units) -- both of whom picked up a supply center -- well, I'm not sure who's going to do what to whom. Germany is fighting it out with Austria on their border, but doesn't seem hostile to France or even to Turkey, at least yet. France, on the other hand, is moving a lot of firepower down into the Mediterranean Sea, and is apparently hostile to the Austrian-Turkish group. Maybe this game is going to be a 3 against 2 crunch (F-G-I vs A-T). What happens after that? Maybe a France-Germany draw, or maybe either F-I vs G or G-I vs F.

MENSA #21 GAME TO START

Very recently, the #21 game sign-up list filled. Yours truly will operate the game as GM, starting out by flier. If all goes well, I may expand it at a later time. This is made possible by Fred Davis's reassurances that he will take over the SIG as of November 1st as scheduled. (Leaving me with only one more issue of Diplomag to do.) So after the September-October issue, I'll be free to concentrate on operating the game.

After 1902, the clear leader is Kirk Larsen's Russia with 9 units. In a highly successful year, he captured Vienna, Budapest, and Norway. With an apparent Turkish ally and no other strong powers emerging, he may be the player to watch for quite some time.

In second place is "Big Al" Autovino's Germany with the same 6 centers he had last year. France survived potshots from England and Italy to hold 5 units. James Cook's England, still reeling from an early NMR' has yet to make a capture. This western group has been rather congested this year, with few units moving. Maybe the addition of a new French player (Craig Reges) will liven things up a bit.

Sean Morgan's Turkey captured Greece, giving him 5 units.

Andy Cruickshank's Austria is being battered from all sides, but managed to pick up Venice. Both Austria and Scott Shacter's

Italy sre down to 3 units.

As you may recall, at this time last issue, I was setting up camp in upper New York state, when along came a strange collection of folks in a van. With about 8 or 10 identical tents.

These folks turned out to be foreign nationals, from a variety of places, who had paid their money to go on organized camping trips covering the greater portion of the continental United States.
