STATE OF THE SIG

We did not have anyone volunteer to serve as Election Commissioner. So, here's what we'll do. Bruce Poppe and I have both agreed to serve another two-year term as Sr. Committeeman and Chairman, respectively. If anyone else is interested in running for office, please let me know, and I'll turn the matter over to Bill Young. If no one else wants to run, then Bill will declare us re-elected by acclamation. The deadline for hearing from you is August 3, 1987. The terms in question begin November 1, 1987.

Several people have volunteered to run future Mensa games. Bruce Poppe says he'd be ready to run another game starting in August. Ralph Baty would be ready to run one in September. And Tony Dousette could CM one after September. Thankyou very much, guys. The assignments will depend on how fast future games fill.

The Mensa #24 and #25 games have gotten under way. Their reports will be found inside. As I type this, we're still waiting for another player for Game #26. I hope we can fill this one shortly.

Readers are reminded that if you want to follow the Mensa #22 game, now being run here in DIPLOMAG, either as a spectator or a standby, please send me \$2.00, and I'll send you copies of the "in-between" game reports for those months when this newsltr. does not appear. If you do so, please advise me whether you just want to follow the game, or wish to be a Standby.

I did not attend the AG in Dallas over the July 9th weekend. If any of our SIG members attended and would care to submit a report, we'll be glad to print one. We do intend to be at the joint U.S.-Canadian AG in Montreal in 1988. I attended DipCon in Madison, Wis., and will have a short report inside.

At the Mid-Year point (June 30th), we had taken in \$66.50, and spent \$55.68 this year. Adding that \$10.82 increase to the \$99.44 on hand in the Treasury gives us a balance of \$110.26 as of 6/30/87.

DIPCON XX HELD IN MADISON

About 50 Diplomats gathered on the campus of the University of Wisconsin in down-town Madison to participate in the 1987 DipCon, over the weekend of June 5-7. While most of the participants came from Illinois, Michigan and Wisconsin, there was a scattering of players from other areas. The only other SIG members present were Scott Hanson, from Minneapolis, and Bruce Linsey, from Mass.

There were five rounds of FTF Diplomacy. Everyone had to play in at least two games in order to be eligible for awards. Most people played in only two or three, as Saturday's rounds overlapped. The starting times were 6 p.m. Friday, 9 a.m., 1 p.m. and 6 p.m. Saturday, and 9 a.m. Sunday. With no time limits, some of the evening games were carried over to the hotel when the Student Union closed at 1 a.m., and the battles fought out to "the dawn's early light." The Sunday game did have a 3:10 p.m. time limit, since the Awards Ceremony was scheduled for half an hour later.

The scores of the two, three or four games played were averaged. If one did poorly early on, there was nothing to lose to get into more games. However, if you did excellent in any early game, there'd be no point in playing more than twice and risking losing it all with an annihilation.

The Tournament winner was <u>David Hood</u> of N.C., with an average score of 5.36. He had the only Rulebook Victory with an 18-Center Turkey. Second place went to <u>Greg Ellis</u> of Texas, with 4.6. <u>Mark Frueh</u> was third (4.05) and <u>Scott Drane</u> 4th (4.00).

A complete list of all scores will be published in several zines. Don't look for my name. I got a big fat zero. Scott Hanson won the Best Austria Award with an 11-Center finish, which is very tough to do in Tournament play.

DipCon XXI will be held in San Antonio, Texas, from July 1-4, 1988. Western SIG members may wish to try to make that one. Of course, in 1989 the DipCon is scheduled to rotate to the West Coast, which may be even more convenient for many of you.

SIG GAMES REPORTS

MENSA #23, 1986 CZ. GM: Scott Hanson, BIG HITS OF MID-AMERICA

Scott had to prepare a corrected Fall 1903 adjudication, since the orders for France (Dave Coufal) were accepted late, due to no fault of his own. This enabled France to remain even with 5 SC's. Italy (Tony Dousette) stayed at 5 instead of going to 7. Also, Austria (Bob Cheek) went up 1 to 6, to lead the pack. The next deadline was July 14th, so we have to go to press without the results.

MENSA #24, 1987AZ. GM: John Barnes (by flyer)

In Spring 1901, many of the usual moves were made, including standoffs in Galicia and the Black Sea. Unfortunately, Walter Compton was unable to get in his Italian moves from Venezuela on time. John used the "traditional" Italian neutral orders, as prescribed by Edi Birsan, to avoid a Spring 1901 NMR. This is something almost every CM will do, since a Sp '01 NMR can virtually ruin a country's position.

Walter was able to get back into the game in Fall 1901, so Mensa #24 has a full crew aboard. France (Kevin Self) had the most successful first year, picking up 3 SC's to go up to 6. Germany (Andy Thomas) and Turkey (Steve St. Clair) both gained two Centers, to control 5 each. Russia (Gerry Johnson) also has 5 Centers, although he gained only Rumania. England, Italy and Austria all own four Centers. Sweden remains neutral following a Russo-German standoff. There were several good press releases.

MENSA #25, Boardman No. requested. GM: Kate Robison, THE DIPLOMATIC RAG

This game has finally gotten underway. The starting positions are: Austria - Keith Johnson; England - Bill Port; France - Stephen Hutton; Germany - Ralph Baty; Italy - Steve Longbotham; Russia - Tony Dousette; Turkey - Eric Young. The first deadline for Spring 1901 is July 15, 1987, so we can't wait for it.

MENSA #21, 1985 HW. Final word, by Bruce Poppe, GM:

It is with fond memories that I will remember this game. My first gamesmastering effort. It certainly saw me through a lot in my personal life. ...

One of the most enjoyable aspects of this game for me has been the teaching aspect of it. There is a part of me which could be happy as a teacher, and answering novice—type questions has been an important part of my enjoyment of this game. In that regard, the SIG's games are an especially nice venue in which to GM, because they tend to have a few more novices in them than the rest of the Postal Diplomacy hobby.

Another great aspect of this particular game has been the nice volume and nice content of the press. Frankly, the press in this game has been a joy to read. I've been in the uniquely privileged spot of being intimately involved in this game, and yet a neutral party to all that's gone on. Great!

My comments wouldn't be complete without commenting on an aspect of it that I found both curious and interesting and yet troubling in its own way. Are you guys really that serious about not wanting to break any alliances? Jesus! What I wouldn't give for a little enlightened treachery. Remember, it is supposed to be just a game.

I'm looking forward to running into you at future gatherings. I'm going to be at the A.G. in Dallas in July. And after that, who knows... I'm sure I'll be around. Or look me up if you get to the Baltimore-Washington area.

ORIGINS 187 HELD IN BALTIMORE

There were both a Regular Diplomacy Tournament and a small SkinnyDip Variant Tourney at ORIGINS, over the weekend of July 3-5, 1987. Other SIG members attending included Bob Addison, Bill Port and Bill Young. If I missed seeing others, my apologies.

The Regular Tournament was a two-round affair, starting at 9 a.m. on both Saturday & Sunday. There was a sweep of all top three places by Marylanders. First place went to <u>Jim Yerkey</u> of Baltimore, who had a Rulebook Victory as Italy. Second was <u>Bill Thompson</u>, and third place went to our own <u>Bob Addison</u> of Silver Spring, Md. <u>Jim does not play postally; otherwise, he would have a national reputation as a top player. Many of the Tournament leaders were MaryCon regulars from the past four years. Since there was no MaryCon in 1987, they came to Baltimore instead.</u>

Incidentally, Dick Warner came up from Fredericksburg, Va., to announce that there would be a MaryCon over the weekend of June 3-5, 1988. Put that on your calendar now, if you live anywhere within 350 miles of Washington, as MaryCon is one of the better East Coast events. It is also an all-Diplomacy con, which makes for a nice in-group, with no interference from role-players or other gamers.

I ran the SkinnyDip Tournament on Friday night, with Bill Young's help. We had expected to run three boards, as 25 tickets had been sold, but had to settle for two when only 16 players showed up at starting time. SkinnyDip features a scaled-down board, where most Powers have only 2 Home Centers, and there are a total of only 22 SC's. It had been hoped that the small size would enable the games to come to early conclusions. However, a combination of an 11 p.m. curfew and the fact that most of the players were seeing the board for the first time resulted in four-way draws on both boards. One game ended in 1904, and one in 1905. Had we been able to play two more game years, I'm sure there would have been some two- or three-way draws, and further country eliminations. This game has great possibilities for a convention, or any other time when time is short. However, we decided that a few adjustments need to be made, such as not allowing Russia to get an automatic build for Moscow in W 1901. Perhaps we'll try this again at MaryCon in '88. Come and see!

SkinnyDip ended in a two-way tie between Maurice Page (Russia #1) and Bill Stapel (England #2), who both finished with 6 Supply Centers.

There was also a Diplomacy Seminar, and a "Hobby Official Meeting," both hosted by Robert Sacks. The issue of Sacks' creation of a duplicate and conflicting Miller No. Custodian for recording Variant Postal games was discussed with some heat. It appears that some novice publishers were confused by the publication of the announcement of the name of another party as "MNC Under the Covenant." For the record, let it be clear that the Miller No. Custodian for North America is: Fred G. Hyatt, 60 Grandview Pl., Montclair, N.J. 07043. He is recognized as such not only by my own North American Variant Bank, but by all of the other Variant Bank Custodians around the world, and virtually all other Postal Diplomacy hobby leaders.

See copies of my forthcoming August BUSHWACKER for further details. I feel that I've said all that is proper to say in the SIG's newsletter.

FALL 1904 REVISITED: There were a couple of errors in last month's game report. Brest is owned by France, not England. Austria succeeded in taking Rumania from Turkey. And the last English F is in Picardy, not Norwegiah Sea. A corrected game report was sent to all of the players.
