SIG BUSINESS

Since Bruce will be very busy getting established in a new job and a new home, he has decided not to run for re-election as one of our ExComm Commissioners. He has also volunteered to step down from his post a few months early, to enable his successor to get a running start.

Tony Dousette has agreed to be a candidate_for the next full two-year Commissioner's term beginning November 1, 1989. Accordingly, I am accepting Bruce's resignation effective May 31st, and am appointing Tony Dousette to fill out the last five months of his unexpired term.

I also plan to run for another two-year term as SIG Chairman (Coordinator). So, Tony Dousette and I will both be candidates for office this summer. If any other SIG members would like to run for either office (Chairman or Committeeman), please let me know by May 1st. If we need to have a formal election, I will appoint someone as Election Commissioner to run it.

I will continue to process any orders for Diplomacy variants or for the Catalog received by April 1st. There will then be a brief histus. I am keeping a back-up file, as I did before I took over the NAVB from Rod Walker some \$3\frac{1}{2}\$ years ago. This is a collection of about 200 games, as compared to the 900+ titles in the main Bank, but it includes most of the key and/or more popular designs. My collection was dubbed the "NAVB-East" when the main Bank was in California, and it seems it's stuck with that title, at least for now. Another collection is maintained by Doug Acheson of Barrie, Ontario, for the Canadian Variant Bank, and various individuals also have private collections. This is important, to enable the hobby to reconstruct any games which might be damaged or lost due to flood, fire, or disappearance of the custodian. The more backup files existing the better.

NOMINATIONS ARE NOW IN ORDER FOR...

what are collectively called the Hobby Awards. These are annual awards voted upon by the entire Postal hobby for hobby services, for best player, and for literary effort. The Don Miller Memorial Award is presented to the person who is deemed to have performed the best services for the hobby in 1988. The John Koning Award goes to the person voted the "Best Player" of 1988. And the literary award, in whatever shape or form that is decided by the hobby, is called the Rod Walker Award.

If you wish to nominate anyone for any of these Awards, send your entries to: Larry Peery, P.O. Box 8416, San Diego, CA. 92102. Any literary nomination ought to be accompanied by a photocopy of the nominated article, story, etc. if it doesn't exceed, say, 4 pages. If you're nominating a book or a series of articles, please include enough information to identify it. Deadline for nominations is Ferch 31st.

Nominating committees will review the nominations, and select about 5 or 6 names in the Miller and Koning Award categories, to go on the final ballot. There may be a larger number of nominees on the Literary Award ballots. The ballot will be included in the pages of many Diplomacy zines, beginning around the end of April. If you do not see any Dipzines except DIPLOMAG, you may ask me for a ballot, but I probably won't print it here automatically.

The winners will be announced at DipCon in San Diego in July. Winners will be presented with some very nice plaques. I know they're nice, because I order them from the dealer!

SIG GAME REPORTS

MENSA #23. 1986 CZ. CM: Ralph Baty (by flyer)

The 4-way Draw proposal was defeated, so the war continued thru Spring & Fall, 1911. Austria (Robert Cheek) regained Trieste and took Con and Bulgaria, while losing Smyrna to Italy, to go up to 10 Centers. Frence (John Barnes) also climbed to 10 SC's as he put an Army into Liverpool and recaptured Berlin from the English. England (Linc Beaumont) kept the French out of Edi and saved Kiel, but dropped to 7. Italy (Tony Dousette) also dropped to 7 in the see-saw battle with Austria, but dislodged the Austrian A in Rumania with the aid of its Black Sea fleet. The SIG's oldest game.

MENSA #25, 1987 HO. GM: Kate Robison, THE DIPLOMATIC RAG

After Fall 1908, Russia (Tony Dousette) and Turkey (Eric Young) remained deadlocked with 16 Centers each. England (Bill Port) lost Edi and Holland to drop from 4 to 2. Turkey had picked up the last Italian SC in Port and Budapest from Russia. In Spring 1909, Russia NMR'd for reasons beyond his control, giving Turkey a slight edge. The two-way Russo-Turkish draw having failed, a new proposal for a 3-way draw has been made by England. Assuming that Russia returns to the lists for the Fall season, this may be the only way to break the deadlock. Tune in next month and see.

MENSA #26, 1987 HT. CM: Bruce Poppe (by flyer)

The GM delayed the deadline to mid-February, and then played only the Winter 1906 season, due to his upcoming move. The next deadline is March 31st, by which time Bruce may be living in California. Turkey (Bruce Filbeck) is the leader here, with 12 Centers. He built 3 units, to go up to 10, and is still two units short. Second place (7 Centers) is shared by England (Roger Belfay) and Italy (George Kilmer). Belfay is also moving, all the way to Australia. G'day, mate:

MENSA #28, 1988 AI. GM: Tony Dousette, THE CONTINUING CRISIS

Don Samelson had resigned the English position in Spring 1903, but was requested to submit orders for Fall '03 while a replacement player was found. Since he did not do so, his F North Sea was dislodged and all other units held. The new English player is Marty Norman.* Frence (Robt. Struppeck) gained Liverpool to lead the pack with 7 Centers. Austria (Eric Young) went down one SC to 6, losing Greece. Austria played 1903 two units short, and had no room to build in Winter '03, as all his Home Centers are occupied. Italy (Ralph Baty) gained Greece to go up from 4 to 5, while Russia (Bill Port) recovered Sev, to return Russia to its initial strength of 4. Germany & Turkey each had to remove a unit, to drop to 4 and 3, respectively. Two players had requested a separation of seasons, so Winter 1903 was played separately. To make up for this, players have been given a three-week deadline for their Spring 1904 moves. * England stands pat with 5 SC's.

MENSA #29, 1988 HP. CM: John Barnes, NO NAME FLYER

In Spring 1901, Leslie Fife's Turkish orders arrived one day late, so neutral orders were used to insure a Turkish move. Players made the usual opening moves, with the only clash coming on an Austro-Russian bounce in Gelicia. In Fall '01, England, France, Italy & Russia gained two Centers each, while Austria and Turkey both gained one. The German orders from Peter McCann arrived late, so German units were forced to hold, thus depriving him of any gains. Germany did take Denmark, but the Italian A came over the Alps and seized Munich. Austria attempted to take Bulgaria with Russian support, but the Turkish forces held on.

Lisa Shea, Queen of England, reports the birth of Prince James Tiberias Shea at 3:19 am. on January 3, 1989. She says she regrets the lack of any English press for this season, but she has been "very busy with the munchkin." Congretulations, Lisa. I'm sure you'll enroll him in his first postal game in a couple of years.

THE MENSA #30 Game will be run by John D. Galt in a zine to be called THE ASSASSIN'S BIADE. One of the seven initial starting players did not respond to the request for country preferences and payment of game fees, so a new player had to be furnished. Hopefully, the Spring 1901 deadline will be announced soon.

RETERER, we're now signing up players for MENSA #31, which will be run by Creig Reges. Three people were signed up when this was written. This is a chance to get into a new Mensa game quickly. All we need are four more people.
