**BASKETBALL: THE TBA TODAY
 JACKSON HOLE GETS DOWN PAYMENT ON "PAY-
 BACK" IN COW PALACE SHOWTIME!**

JACKSON HOLE, WYO, Oct 4--In a stunning and powerful display of scoring and rebounding, the Jackson Hole Dudes, a downtrodden 2-18 last season, overwhelmed Frontier Conference foes Augusta and Nevada this past weekend in blowout scores. The Dudes, playing before sell-out crowds at the Cow Palace, completely dominated the Winds 112-99 in the opener, and just a few days later, unhorsed the luckless Desert Riders 117-85. Winners just twice a year ago, the Dudes have now evened last year's victory total and must now be viewed as serious contenders, not only for the Frontier title, but also for the TBA crown.

Against Augusta, Jackson Hole put the damper on any drama the crowd may have entertained by jumping out to a 35-16 lead, increasing it to 69-36 at intermission.

Michael Praetorius, acquired from Whitehorse before the season, scored only eight points but pulled down nine boards in the opening frame. He simply wasn't needed after that. Lionel Trane, a free agent pick-up scored 11 in limited duty. The Winds never had a chance.

Nevada came to town pumped up but left badly shaken after their 32-point blowout. The spread could have been 50. The Dudes, leading by 62-43 at halftime, eventually swelled their spread to 110-76 late in the game. Rider stars Clark Drexel and Doug Kennedy both left the court early in the second half and didn't return, having slipped on the greasy Cow Palace floor. Praetorius also went down for the game minutes into the first quarter, but he wasn't needed. Rattlesnake struck from inside, outside, scoring 32 and pulling down 16 boards. Only Blaze Logan distinguished himself, leading the Riders with 17 point and 10 rebounds.
