KING SPEECH COACH SLAIN

CHICAGO, Sept 10—It
always seems a bit
strange when someone
of whom there is per-
sonal knowledge among
the news staff is him-
self involved in a news
story.

Such is the case in
the brutal murder last
night of 68 year old
Everett Clarke, a for-
mer voice of "The
Whistler" on radio, and
long a Chicago fixture
as speech teacher and
drama coach.

Everett Clarke was
the man who taught Rich
King how to talk on the
radio. Well, that's not
exactly accurate, since
King attended sessions
with Clarke for only 3
months several years
ago. But many current
Newsradio staffers have
been students of the
well-known downtown
theatrical figure.

Reacting to his mur-
der, King told the STAR,
"I didn't know him too
well, and we certainly
weren't close. He was a
strange guy, very highly
strung and emotional."

That characterization
of the victim squares
with accounts given by
other news staffers. In
fact on the afternoon of
his death, Clarke was
heard screaming, "No,
Paul, No!" But those in
his office building pas-
sed it off as just
another voice lesson.
And as we go to press, it
still is unclear whether
that's what it was, or
whether it was a real
call for help. A strange
man and a strange case.

NAPERVILLE--Augusta opened its TBA exhibition season this weekend with 2 resounding victories over the host Naperville Suns.

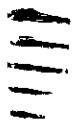

Butterfield also dismissed suggestions that his motivation for the event was rooted in the shellacking his team took earlier in the week in an exhibition contest with Hattiesburg.

Both games were typical pre-season affairs; constantly shuffled lineups of rookies displayed incredible inability, ineptitude, and confusion that occasionally bordered on vaudeville. Somehow, the Sols found themselves on the short end of 110-92 and 104-84 decisions.
