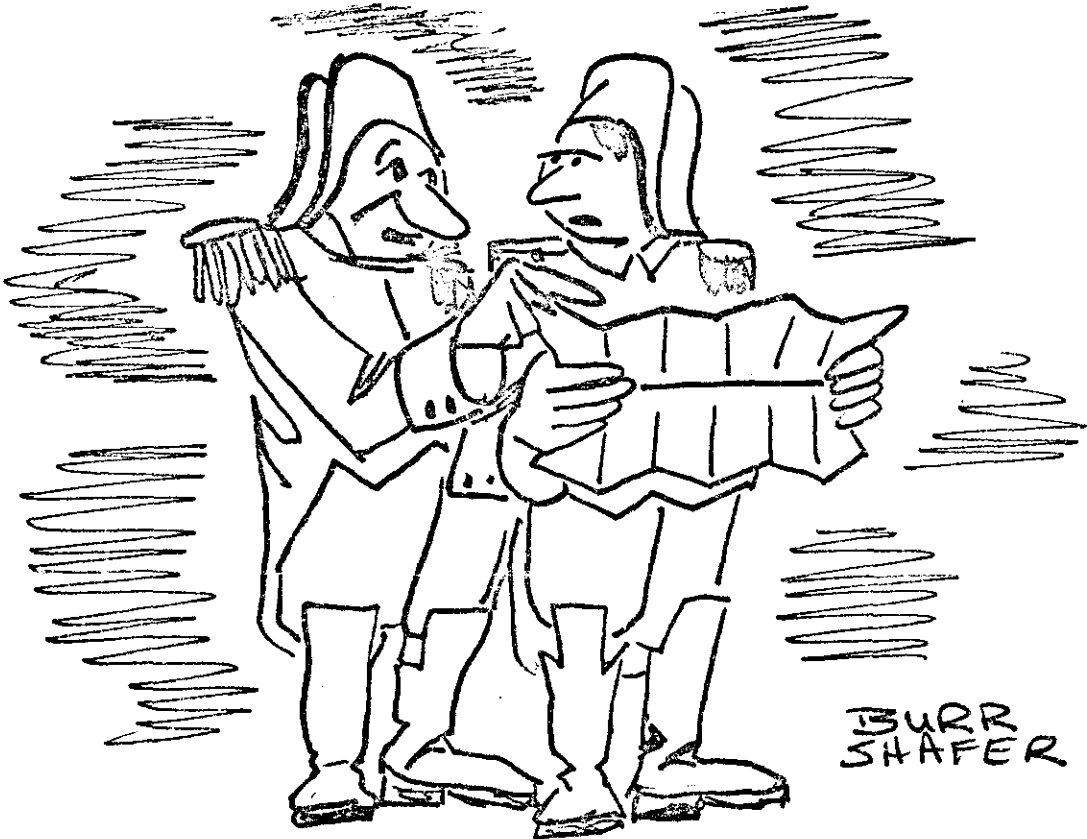

NEWS OF THE REALM

CONVICT HAS LONG WAY TO GO AFTER CLEMENCY

Argil Martin, a convict serving two life terms in the Oklahoma State Penitentiary for two murders, has won a clemency recommendation from the State Pardon and Parole Board.

If the governor signs the clemency recommendation, Martin can stop serving the first life term and begin serving the second.

DRUG CHARGES FILED AGAINST MOTORCYCLE

The state couldn't convict the rider so it filed suit against his motorcycle.

Kelly Pearce, director of the Idaho Department of Law Enforcement, filed suit in 7th District Court against a 1970 Honda 750. The suit alleges the motorcycle was used to transport marijuana and should be awarded to the state.

The case against the motorcycle's rider, Allen Ireland of Idaho Falls, was dismissed Aug. 29. But the case against his bike lingers.

Jimmy's Learning Curve

Every U. S. president since the end of World War 2 has been tested by the leadership of the Soviet Union to determine how far he could be pushed. Stalin threw the Berlin blockade and the Korean war at Harry Truman and got tough, effective reaction that thwarted Soviet aims. Nikita Khrushchev pounded his shoe at Dwight Eisenhower and moved offensive ballistic missiles into Cuba under the nose of Jack Kennedy. Again, the reactions were determined and effective, and the Soviets backed down.

During the so-called Cold War from the Berlin blockade to the Cuban missile crisis, the Soviets achieved little by their brute force approach. With the advent of Richard Nixon, the Soviets came up with the strategy of detente, with which they hoped to achieve by guile what they had been unable to achieve by force. Unfortunately for this country, it has been singularly successful.

With Richard Nixon desperately seeking foreign triumphs, they found a willing tool. Nixon was abetted by the Spenglerian doom of his chief adviser, Henry Kissinger, whose 18th Century European mind has never been at home in 20th Century America. Kissinger privately agreed with Soviet leadership that the tide of history was flowing for them and visualized his role as achieving the best possible concessions from the Soviets before U. S. power faded to impotence. Kissinger espoused this view privately as often as he denied it publicly. It is this philosophy that led to the incredible series of concessions to the Soviets in strategic arms negotiations of SALT 1 and 2 and the ABM treaty.

Against this background, Jimmy Carter moved into the White House with a campaign reputation as a tough, pragmatic, plain-speaking leader, who could do a more effective job of dealing with the Soviets. His first moves indicated that he might. He hit the Soviets in their two most vulnerable chinks by publicly supporting their prominent dissidents and proposing a genuine reduction in strategic arms. The howls of Soviet rage measured how accurately he had probed their vulnerability. For how can the supposed hope of the world's oppressed be revealed as the worst oppressor of all? And how can the world's most pious peddler of peace and disarmament be exposed as adamantly opposed to any real strategic arms cut?

But this great start at reestablishing a more equitable and realistic relationship with the Soviet Union quickly dissolved in what has now become a hallmark of the Carter Administration—vacillation and retreat.

Instead of recognizing the Soviet vituperation as a sign of success and continuing his tough realistic policy, Carter backed down and sent emissaries to Moscow offering concessions. Then, in what must be the most naive gesture an American president has ever made, he canceled the B-1 strategic bomber program without even asking for any reciprocal concessions from the Soviets. The Soviets had been trying to eradicate the B-1 as a priority goal in every series of arms negotiations, but Carter blithely gave it

to them for nothing. We think that thoughtless gesture, more than any other single fact, convinced the Soviets that Carter's tough talk was a thin facade that would soon crumble before their bullying. And so it proved.

Every set of concessions offered by Carter's emissaries on the SALT 2 negotiations has been rudely rejected by the Soviets with the tactic that more resistance would produce more concessions. Unfortunately they were right. As a result, the campaign to expose Jimmy Carter as a paper tiger and the U. S. as a fading power on the world horizon accelerated into an unprecedented crescendo.

The Soviet dissidents were convicted in spectacles that were deliberately brutal to show all the world the Soviet leadership's contempt for Jimmy Carter and his concern for human rights. U. S. newspapermen in Moscow were provoked and harassed as never before. Two of them were hauled before a kangaroo court and fined for allegedly slandering Soviet television. When Soviet espionage agents were caught in the U. S., the Soviets boldly grabbed a U. S. businessman off the streets of Moscow to hold as an exchange hostage. Carter called for an increase in NATO strength to oppose the massive Warsaw Pact military buildup but then waffled on whether to provide the neutron bomb as a NATO weapon. He called off the sale of a computer to Tass, the Soviet news agency, but approved the sale of a vital U. S. oil equipment manufacturing plant.

Encouraged by U. S. impotence in the Angola civil war, the Soviet Union has accelerated its campaign of intervention all over Africa. It is pouring arms into Ethiopia on a scale that has already surpassed 20 years of U. S. aid, arming raiders into Rhodesia, crippling the West's cobalt supply in Zaire and building a strategic base in Yemen. At the same time, Soviet leadership is brazenly warning the U. S. to stay out of Africa.

Meanwhile, there are signs that Jimmy Carter is getting worried about where Soviet policies are going. Three times he has publicly made speeches warning the Soviets and then each time has had a spokesman follow with an interpretation that he really didn't mean what he said. This vacillation has only encouraged the Soviets to get tougher in every area of confrontation in an effort to create an illusion of Soviet strength and U. S. weakness.

But the Soviets may be on the verge of another one of their grave miscalculations that led to their defeats in the Berlin blockade, the invasion of South Korea and the Cuban missile foray. For their present strength is based more on an appearance of U. S. weakness and vacillation than on genuine Soviet power. And there is a growing tide of anger and resentment in the grass roots of America over the hypocrisy and brutality of Soviet behavior. In the meantime, Jimmy Carter had better get his leadership in order and speak with a single voice in the type of language that the Soviets understand.

Dear Steve:

D&L #22 dropped in my box yesterday. I enjoyed very much the two articles which appeared there & in #23. I thought I might send you a short (I hope) response to the former.

I, too, wish we would put a higher priority on extraterrestrial exploration. It would be incredible to me if we did not find that we were surrounded...and at fairly close quarters...by intelligent and civilized life. If it is possible to move things from point A to point B with a shorter elapsed time than a photon could make the trip, then some of those intelligent beings have certainly found out how to do it. I'm not a UFO nut, and I view with strong skepticism all reports of so-called sightings and encounters. However, they're not impossible. What seems to me likely is that we have no doubt been discovered and charted by one or more star-faring races. The lack of contact would be easily explained: when you are dealing with a race of aborigines that tends to be phobic and hysterical about foreigners, you simply let them alone.

However, I am equally skeptical that we could learn much from these beings. Most sf writers in the past have tended to depict aliens as being pretty much like us, in psychology if not in form. It would be quite hard for us to conceive of beings so alien that there is little or no common ground between us...and even harder to express such concepts in writing. I've seen one or two stories which did so quite well, however.


We must face up to the fact that extraterrestrials may be alien to exactly that extent. The fact that they have solved their internal problems would mean nothing to us because they would not have been the same problems. Even on our own planet, the inability of one culture to understand others is common...each tries to see the others in its own terms and thus fails to understand them. I'm reminded of the Chinese official who, in about 1839, memorialized the Emperor to the effect that Western civilization would collapse if China ceased exporting tea and rhubarb. [I'm not kidding!]

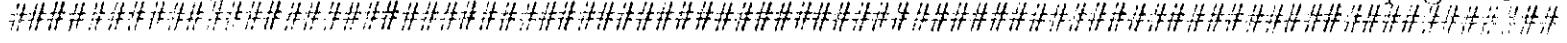
The same would hold true with such things as disease. Our diseases are unique to us. At this point we don't even know if "disease" elsewhere would mean the same sorts of disorders, operating through the same sorts of mechanisms. Even so, if another world had eliminated (say) viral infections, the techniques might not work here. Some sf writers assume that alien microorganisms would be able to affect us, but I tend to doubt that because every microorganism which is disease-producing is also species-specific. However, there's no reason to be careless about that possibility, either.

It seems to me, therefore, that contact with aliens, in no matter how beneficent they might be, will be more bane and less boon for us. We are probably not going to be able to understand them (nor they us, very well), and you know what our instinctive reaction is to things we don't understand. No wonder extraterrestrials would rather avoid close encounters of any (third or otherwise) kind. [Sf stories based on the idea of humanity qua pariah are not uncommon. They may be right.]

And we may find ourselves relatively alone, too. But I believe we ought to devote a lot of effort to finding out. If we are to have any long-term future as a race, it must be out there, not down here. Have you ever read Stapledon's First & Last Men? Modern taste would find it flawed as literature, but there is something at once exalting and sad in what he accomplishes there...and his study of human character in large is (in my opinion) quite penetrating.

Well, NASA is presently our best hope for the future. I wish you guys luck.

//Thanks for your letter, Rod. Your arguments are the ones I have heard the most frequently, mainly because they have a lot of merit and are hard to dispute. Yet they are still a priori, as are all postulates of this theme (even mine). So let's take an extreme case. Suppose that tomorrow we came in contact with a race so dissimilar to ours that we and they would be mutually exclusive even in the same room. They breathe hydrogen and eat U235 for snacks. Their blood is liquid mercury and they have enough appendages to give an octopus heartburn. Their sociological structure is based on the relative phases of their three moons. Does it automatically follow that they can do us no good, that there is not much we can learn from them? Maybe it will turn out that they can't, but it certainly should not be axiomatic.

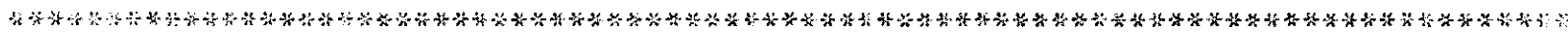

We did decide that prizes will be awarded for this game. First place gets to play in a game with Bob Sergeant; second place gets to play in two games with Bob Sergeant.

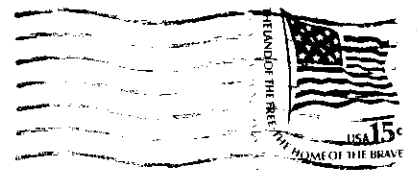
