COMMENTARY FROM TURKEY

I was pleased to win this game as I was quite unhappy in the early stages. First, I opted for a Rus-Tur alliance, but I later was to regret it as Russia was a poor diplomat. Often, his replies came one or two days before the deadline, if at all. This made planning very difficult. I decided to look elsewhere for an ally, and planned to stab the Russian at the earliest possible moment. My real problem was an apparent Aus-Ita alliance. However, Austria kept trying to get me to ally with him as he mistrusted the Italian from previous experience. I didn't like the attitude of the Austrian, so I made a strong diplomatic effort towards Italy. My telling him of the Austrian mistrust helped to cause him to stab the Austrian. This made my position look a little better.

Meanwhile, the Eng-Ger alliance was beginning to look very strong, and this again prevented me from stabbing the Russian. Without him on my side, they (E-G) would grow too fast. Italy was under siege from France and not really in a good position to help me. I was quite sure at that point that the game would end in a 4- or 5-way draw.

Then England came forth with a very daring offer to simultaneously stab both our allies. I would hit Russia, and he Germany. I agreed to this figuring it was worth the risk, and it would prevent the draw I felt was unacceptable. However, I did not follow through on one part, that was my attacking Italy. I figured he would be my ace in the hole. As it turned out England never kept his agreement past the original stab, so I was glad to have Italy on my side. All that I had to do now was wait for the right moment. Obviously, my timing was right.

I thank Jerry for being a great ally, I'm sorry it had to be him as my victim. Thanks also to Bob Sergeant for hanging on as he did. His offer to fight only England if I would leave him alone was very important to my strategy. A tip of the hat to Steve for an excellent example of first class gamesmastering.

COMMENTARY FROM GERMANY

I initially wanted an alliance with France against England. I heard from Austria that he and France were already allied--in the first letter. Phone usage being what it is, I saw no reason to doubt it. However, I did not care for the implications of Austria and France taking out Italy immediately, so I tried negotiations with England.

England was very non-committal, which usually means problems. Then France attacked me and claimed Italy had given him information that I was going to attack Burgundy. He claimed Italy had given him the information over the phone. I called the Italian and discussed it. He pointed out that he never used the phone in playing, and that had been my experience. Then in the Fall, after I told France I would be covering myself, he moved into the Ruhr. A rather foolish move, unless he was counting on an alliance with England.

However, in 1902 England attacked France with me and France began to suicide against Italy for some unknown reason. In 1903, I had to decide whether to attack Italy or England. I would have preferred to attack England since my position was better against him, and he was the major long-term threat. But I received a letter from Italy stating that an attack on England would be an attack on him. England had made no such statement so I attacked Italy.

In 1904 I received a letter from Turkey saying that he would attack his ally Russia if I would stab England, otherwise he threatened to throw up a stalemate line. I was not convinced that Turkey and Russia were in a position to do that, so I refused his offer. England was evidently more convinced than I was by this ploy because in 1905 he stabbed me. Presumably Turkey had written him the same thing.

England did not, however, have the armies to make this stab profitable, and most importantly, he did not have any of his forces on the other side of the customary stalemate line. To win, and Turkey's offer was a race for a win, NOT a draw, England had to completely take my centers, and the one belonging to the French puppet. England was forced to use the services of Russia, which meant that the Russian centers were going to go to Turkey, since they had no stalemate line there either. I told Turkey I was willing to play for second, and if he would not attack me I would hold England off until Turkey could achieve the win.

I did this simply because I do not like to be stabbed ineptly. A year later, a stab by England might have won him the game. At the time he did it, he was simply not in a position to win by doing it, if I chose to fight him.

I was not at my best in this game. At the time it started, I was suffering a temporary loss of enthusiasm so I sat back and let the more active diplomats take direction of the game. And that's always a losing policy. I congratulate Lee Kendter on his victory, and assure him there are no hard feelings.

COMMENTARY FROM ITALY

I'm too trusting for my own good. Who else still drives an Edsel, has a quadraphonic stereo, a three dimensional 35mm camera, and owns 500 shares in the Studebaker Auto Co? But Lee played it well and deserved the win. By the way, Lee, I've decided against that Florida property you mentioned.

A lot of the praise for a good game goes to the GM, a bad one can make the time like a spell of major dental surgery, without anesthesia. Thanks, Painless McLendon.



COMMENTARY FROM ENGLAND

I began by writing a lot of letters to France, Germany, and Russia. France and Germany both corresponded at great length with me, and I agreed to ally with each of them. My early moves were quite ambiguous; I made it a policy to tell each of my allies what I was going to do, as far as possible, in order to build up their confidence in my reliability.

In Winter, 1901 I chose Germany to ally with "permanently"--which means several years, at least. Germany seemed the better choice because he projected an image (which turned out to be true) of 100% honesty, while France was too much of a realist and too obviously a dangerous player to successfully project such a trustworthy image. I played honest with Germany, and would have remained so throughout the game in the absence of an opportunity to stab.

BUT, there was an opportunity. In 1904 the game seemed to have pretty well settled down into a dull grind (as the GM's headlines reflected)--England and Germany were firmly allied and so were Russia and Turkey. The game seemed to be headed toward a 4- or 5-way draw. I would soon have no units in position to betray my ally, and would have been forced to stab with him until the end. So I began an active campaign by mail to persuade Turkey to join me in a double stab, he of Russia and I of Germany. Turkey agreed. Had he not, I would have continued my alliance and the course of the game would have been completely different.

The Houserules which combined the Winter, 1904 and Spring, 1905 seasons, and which allowed Turkey and I to make our Spring, 1905 orders conditional upon each others' winter builds, made the double stab possible. If the GM has kept my original orders he can verify that if Turkey had not sent in the particular build that he did, my moves would have remained completely loyal to my German ally and in fact would have shifted me out of position for an effective later stab.

With the combined seasons my anti-German Winter, 1904 builds did not cause him to take any defensive measures in Spring, 1905--he would have had to have been psychic to send in the right conditional orders. I agree that combined seasons are great for speeding up a game, but in this case they were somewhat unfair since they, in effect, gave the stabbers a free move.

After setting up the double stab, I went one step further and stabbed a stabber. I sent complete information about Turkey's intentions to Russia, along with suggested countermeasures for Russia to protect himself. Had he taken my advice, I think that I had a good chance to roll over Germany with my stab while Turkey would have been stalled and would have made essentially no progress. I believed that I had a genuine chance for a quick win--until I saw the zine and read that Russia had NMR'ed and dropped out! That action went a long way toward determining the outcome of the game.

I tried to ally with the new Russian player and get his aid against Germany, but he was hesitant and it ended up taking me several years longer than I had planned to reduce the German forces sufficiently. Turkey, in the meantime, made great progress against weak Russian defense and simultaneously managed to enlist Italy as a puppet, I suppose in exchange for some small favors (perhaps Italy or Turkey will explain). My last chance to stop the Turkish win was in 1908, but my pleas with Italy to join me and form a stalemate line and a 3-way draw failed. I don't know why Italy refused to go for the draw with me, and accepted a 1-unit finish instead; Turkey's intentions were obvious. Perhaps my correspondence was insufficiently persuasive--I tried as best as I could.

That's the game as I saw it--an ambiguous opening which let me choose my ally as late as possible, a loyal middlegame in which we made progress together, a double-stab that could have been a triple-stab but for an NMR, and an unfortunate (for me) endgame. Besides the desire to win, a major motivation on my part (and probably on Turkey's part) for the stab was the goal of making this a more exciting "demo" game for the GM's zine. Perhaps we succeeded.

In closing, I would like to publicly apologize to Bob Sergeant for betraying him so viciously(?). Bob, I like you a lot, more than anyone else I've met by mail in this hobby. Your honesty--above-all strategy will pay dividends in the long run, in terms of better alliances and higher average results. I would only suggest that you not trust your allies quite as much as you trusted me--most of them (like me) will repay your honesty as long as you don't tempt them too much. You can certainly argue that we both would have done better had I not stabbed you--we did have 18 centers between us in 1904, and the game result is evidence for your argument. But I think that my expected result (had Russia not dropped out in Spring, 1905) from the stab made my choice justified. Maybe I'm wrong. In any event, I hope we can still be friends, Bob.

I also want to thank Frank McIlvaine for getting my part of the board off to an interesting start, and to thank Don Ditter for being such a fine ally for the last half of the game. My congratulations to Lee Kendter, Sr for a nice win!

This is my last game of Diplomacy, and I'm glad to see it over. I think that Diplomacy and the Diplomacy concept (simultaneous movement, no random factors, multi-player alliances) is probably the most significant gaming development of the past few centuries, and I wish the hobby well. But I find that I no longer have sufficient free time and energy to give the game the extended correspondence and attention it deserves if it is to be really well-played. (My double/triple stab of 1905 was my last burst of effort).

I've also become absorbed in what I think of as the most significant gaming development of the last few millenia--the game of go. Go takes simplicity of structure to its peak; the game is an extraordinary example "much out of little", to quote John Wheeler. Go is what chess should have been and isn't--it emphasizes positional play and pattern recognition, not tactical tree-searching. The best computer chess programs have almost reached master level; the best go programs are utter novices that a person can best after playing the game for only a few hours.

I could try to say more about go, but it probably wouldn't make much sense unless the reader knows the game, and I won't make you type it up, Steve. I'd like to thank you for an excellently run Diplomacy game--you're on a par with John Boardman as a great GM, and your zine is always a pleasure to read.

Well, there you have it. I am very humbled by all the nice compliments, but believe me this game was my pleasure. It was really hard fought by a class group of guys. It saddens me that Mark is leaving the hobby, I wish it were not so. You're a fine player, Mark--one of the best. We will miss you. So much talent has been lost to the hobby during the past 3 or 4 years; I fear our little organization may be crumbling.

Gone are Buchanan, Boyer, Birsan, Rocamora, Pulsipher, Beyerlein, Calhamer, and Lakofka. These talents will never be replaced, although some will argue that the last one doesn't need to.

## LETTERS

From Rod Walker:

Dear Steve:

This will not be short. D&L 25 is here today and this is a response. Craig Reges' comments are valid (and he's after all in the right discipline; I'm not), but I'm not sure a list of exceptions necessarily invalidates a whole point. I did, I confess, quite forget the fact that many micro-organisms produce toxins. Even so, I still contend that we must not assume that the medical science of an alien culture will be of much benefit to us.

In a recent article, Isaac Asimov estimates there may be currently in the galaxy some 50,000,000 cultures more advanced than ours. You ask if there might not be at least 1 which understands (or could understand) Man. It's quite possible they all understand us...which would certainly explain why they are having nothing to do with us.

Whether the USSR is today significantly more powerful than China is a moot point. China's reinvestment rate was approaching 30% at the end of the last decade, which is phenomenal. I would guess that a strategic military superiority over Russia will be achieved by the PRS not later than 1984/85.

Russia's chances of winning a Sino-Soviet war diminish each year. Siberia is sparsely populated, and the people of Central Asia are not exactly great lovers of the Russians. My estimate is that the Chinese will have little difficulty reaching the Urals.

Whether the Russians are "desperate" depends on how you define the term. The USSR now has more force at the Chinese frontier than in Europe. She is building military highways in Central Asia as fast as possible. She is bending all her efforts to create a strong military presence south of China via the Indian Ocean and Southeast Asia. The Russians feel more and more caught between us and the Chinese... a situation not fully appreciated, nor exploited, in Washington.

Well, on to the bible quotations.

The correct citation is Isaiah 40:22. (Isaiah 40 is the first of the chapters composed by the Deutero-Isaiah toward the end of the Babylonian captivity.) In the King James it reads: "It is he that sitteth upon the circle of the earth...." The word "circle" might be better translated as "sphere", true. However, this single passage in no way shows that the Deutero-Isaiah, nor the ancient Hebrews/Jews, thought of the world as it is, a globe in space circling the sun. There is enough material in the Bible to convince scholars that the Hebrews conceived of the surface of the earth as a flat plane.

But the word "circle" or "sphere" here comes from a Babylonian milieu, and has to be understood from the point of view of Hebrew Cosmology as modified by Babylonian beliefs. The Hebrews early believed in a universe which consisted of earth in the center, heaven arching above and Sheol arching below. Through this surrounding sphere the Sun, Moon, and five planets. (The seven branches of the menorah originally commemorated the seven bodies just mentioned.)

The Babylonians, however, postulated seven spheres, one for each of the seven heavenly bodies, one inside another. At the time of the Captivity, if not before, the Hebrews adopted the Babylonian cosmology, just as they picked up Mesopotamian creation myths, the tale of the Flood, and so on. This gradually changed into a cosmology of seven heavens and seven earths, and elaborate descriptions of all of them were developed. This material may still be found in a book which once had a high reputation among the Jews, but is not now regarded as canonical, EE Enoch.

Most of this cosmology is not detailed in the Hebrew books now accepted as canonical. However, the word "heaven" appears in the plural quite frequently in the Bible, often in reference to that cosmology. In fact, the verse you cite goes on: "[It is he...that stretcheth out the heavens as a curtain, and spreadeth them out as a tent to dwell in...." That has reference not only to the 7 heavens, but specifically to the lowest, Wilon, which was regarded as a curtain which was drawn back at night to let the moon and stars shine.

When the Greeks adopted the Babylonian cosmology, some philosophers speculated that the heavenly spheres vibrated and produced perfect musical tones. That's the origin of our expression, "music of the spheres". Anyway, the passage in Isaiah is using "sphere" in that same sense, the "sphere of the earth" relating to the sphere which surrounds the planar earth on which we dwell.

**\*\*However, if you wish to have it that the Second Isaiah is saying that the world is a globe, there's no real objection to that. He lived in Babylon, which was still (in its decline) the major center of astro-nomic research and knowledge of the ancient world. Although there is no concrete evidence that any Babylonian observers believed in a spherical earth or a heliocentric planetary system, there is nothing to suggest it impossible, either. It is difficult to believe that they could have accumulated as much data as they did without some observers tumbling to the fact that the earth, moon, and sun (at least) were spherical bodies. The Deutero-Isaiah could have picked up that idea, possibly. There is nothing in the notion of a spherical earth which would conflict with the essential Hebrew weltanschauung. Anyway, while Isaiah II may or may not have accepted the idea of a spherical earth, his ideas were drawn from the Babylonian milieu and nowhere else.**

The passage you quote ~~xxx~~from Revelations stems ultimately from the same source as that from Isaiah (see below). I'd like to preface by observing that pulling fragmentary quotations from the Bible and extracting "meanings" from them without any regard to context (not to mention the intent of the author) is a bad procedure.

In the traditional Christian context, "Rejoice, ye heavens, and ye that dwell in them..." is merely a poetic way of saying, "Rejoice, ye angels...". This simplistic interpretation in no way does violence to the intent of the author and the basic meaning of the phrase.

However, the phrase actually has deeper meanings, in that it is related to oriental mystery beliefs. Egyptian and Babylonian beliefs mingled throughout the ancient Middle East, producing all sorts of hybrid forms whose most important common feature is that their credo and cult were considered mysteries, to be revealed to the initiated only. Modern Masonry is a distant and feeble echo of those earlier secret societies.

In Egypt the mystery cult was Gnosticism, and there was a Gnostic branch of Christianity which deeply influenced the early Church in both positive and negative ways. That is, some Gnostic ideas were taken over by the Church, on one hand. On the other, some Church doctrines were developed specifically for fighting Gnosticism...the Trinity is foremost of those.

Gnosticism is a bewildering complex of ideas and beliefs, some of which are not mutually compatible. Egyptian religion had for millennia been a process of doublethink in which mutually exclusive or contradictory ideas may be simultaneously believed. So Gnosticism is typically Egyptian in that regard. The most basic common denominator of the Gnostic systems is the ~~xxxxxxx~~ idea that God did not create the universe. Instead, God in one way or another caused the Demiurge to be created (some Jewish heretics regarded Jehovah as the Demiurge). The Demiurge then created the material universe. The human soul is a divine spark imprisoned in a material shell (and the aim of the hidden beliefs of Gnosticism is to enable the enlightened soul to free itself from the travail of incarnation). The Gnostic Christians regarded Jesus as a creation of God, who opposed the essentially evil Demiurge/Jehovah.

In Judea there was a widespread sort of Gnosticism, which adopted much of the Gnostic cosmology (which resembled the Babylonian in its myriad heavens and hells) but rejected its theology. YHWH (Jehovah) was both God and Creator, opposed by the Enemy (a borrowing from Iranian dualism). These beliefs were held in varying ways by Pharisaic mystery societies, the Essenes, and North Palestinian sects generally... of which the modern Mandaeans (who regard John the Baptist as the Messiah) are direct descendants. These groups and sects shared the belief that Israel must be purified before the Messiah would come... although the Essenes seemed to believe that the efforts of their community alone could bring about that result. Jesus was influenced by Essene theology, but not their cosmology, which he rejected...apparently. Paul, however, was the Jewish equivalent of a Mason and accepted the cosmologies of the Pharisaic mystery societies.

The Book of Revelation, despite its enormous debt to Daniel, also owes a great debt to the Book of Enoch...which Paul himself (not to mention the author of Jude) regarded with such favor...see Hebrews 11:5 and Jude 14. In addition, where the symbology of Revelation's author is not drawn from Daniel (e.g., the Beast), or created for his own purposes (e.g., 616, the Number of the Beast [long since miswritten as "666"]), it is often clearly Gnostic (e.g., the Woman Who Is With Child).

By the way, the Gnostics are fascinating. There is good coverage of them in Joseph Campbell's Masks of God series (see the volume Occidental Mythology). The best book on them I've seen is Jean Doresse, The Secret Books of the Egyptian Gnostics, which includes the complete text of the Gnostic Gospel ("Thomas").

Anyway, Revelations 12:12 must ultimately be understood against the background of Gnosticism and Jewish mysticism. (Earlier, in Colossians, Paul wrote [1:16]: "For by him were all things created, that are in heaven, and that are in earth, visible and invisible, whether they be thrones, or dominions, or principalities, or powers:...". These are four orders of angels, higher than archangels, according to Gnostic and Jewish-mystic beliefs. The author of Revelations is similarly influenced. He appears to have been of Egyptian (Alexandrian) background; a Jew who had learned Greek, although not with surpassing fluency. When he speaks of the heavens and those who dwell in them, he is speaking of the seven heavens of Jewish mysticism and all the inhabitants: angels, archangels, thrones, dominions, principalities, powers, seraphim, cherubim, phoenixes, and whatnot. Oddly enough, the Book of Enoch has heaven doubling somewhat for hell. Sinners await judgement in the Second Heaven. Eden lies in the Third Heaven, but the tortures of Gehenna lie just north of Eden. The Fallen Angels are imprisoned in the Fifth Heaven. The Babylonian Talmud (compiled c. 500 A.D. but containing traditions far, far older) has some contrasting views: the Hariba tractate also lists 7 heavens, but with considerably different functions. The author of Revelations was probably familiar with Enoch, but not with gavil.

I'll quit in a minute. Just a note here about the Number of the Beast, since I brought it up. Early MSS mostly read "616". This was apparently miswritten at some point to "666"...which is in itself a mystic number of gross imperfection...that is, it misses the perfect [mystical] number 7 thrice by 1.

Revelations has been variously dated, but it is now generally agreed to the mid-90s. That fits perfectly. The Imperial seal [of Domitian] for the year 95-96 (a new one was made annually) would have read "ID KAIΣAKOΣ"...and the Greek values for those letters add up to 616. The inscription also has "10 heads"...that is, letters, which is one of the pointers involved in the symbology of the Beast. Oddly enough, the Greek values for NERO KAIΣAR also add up to 616, but Nero is manifestly not the Beast on chronological grounds alone...not to mention linguistic, since one has to drop a letter from the correct NERON KAIΣAR in order to get the right result. On the other hand, NERON KAIΣAK adds up to 666....

We will now have a 15-minute quiz.

It is true that most of the ancient Hebrews thought of the earth as flat. But, many times, what people believe the Bible says and what it actually says are entirely different. Examples abound; many Christians today picture Satan (the Devil) as a sinister-looking demon with a tail, horns, and pitchfork. But the Bible actually says that Lucifer was the most beautiful of the angels; many Christians in the 1930s believed that Hitler (and in the latter 1940s, Stalin) was the AntiChrist, yet the Bible plainly stated that this could not be.

And of course Isaiah 40:22 in no way shows the earth as a globe in space circling the sun. I didn't say it did. In fact, it makes no mention of that aspect. All it says is that the earth is a sphere. Period.

My philosophy is to interpret Biblical passages literally, unless it is obvious that the passage is symbolic. The Bible is not a book that says one thing and means another. It has generally only one simple meaning. If a few passages have a double meaning, that is quite clear from the passage itself or from parallel passages. One cannot, as it is commonly believed, get a thousand different meanings from any one passage.

The Bible is not a specimen of God's skill as a writer or logician. It is a book written by men whom God used to record His revelation. God used these men by giving them freedom of expression to use their own language and ways of expressing truth. All that inspiration guarantees is unity of thought, not the sameness of words and expression.

The Bible is not a book of systematic discourses on any one subject, but it does give divine information on practically every subject. One must collect together here and there all God's information through various writers in order to get the whole truth. When this is done, there is perfect harmony throughout the Bible, and everything about the subject that Man really needs to know, is clear.

Too often this is not done, or, people try to see symbolism in every passage. This is why there are so many different sects within the Christian faith.

I agree wholeheartedly that "pulling fragmentary quotations from the Bible and extracting 'meanings' from them without regard to context (not to mention the intent of the author) is a bad procedure." But there are many Biblical passages that do stand by themselves. The passage of Rev 12:12 means exactly what it says, and you are taking unfounded liberties to say that it means simply, "Rejoice, ye angels.....". That Paul is referring to only spiritual beings is sheer speculation. At any rate, natural, flesh-and-blood life as we know it is certainly not prohibited.

You say the phrase actually has deeper meanings? Baloney! There you are trying to find hidden symbolism when a literal interpretation makes so much more sense. What you are doing is directly analogous to what God told Adam and Eve in Gen 2:16-17 and what they said God told them in Gen 3:2-3. Adding to and subtracting from, looking for hidden meanings--can get you in trouble.

The "ten heads" you speak of have nothing to do with letters at all. Rather, they are ten nations that form, in conglomerate, what was the old Roman Empire (territorially speaking). The AntiChrist (or Beast) will come from one of these ten nations. Specifically, the Bible makes it plain that the AntiChrist will come from Syria--not Russia, not Greece, not Germany, nor anywhere else.

Our basic difference, however, is that you believe that most Biblical writers borrowed from other cultures--Babylon, Egypt, China, etc. It is my belief that these writers had but ONE source. //

From Dwayne Shreve:

I'm inclined to think that alien cultures are avoiding direct contact with us because of the potential damage to our cultures. This would, of course, be radically different from the missionary mentality of the dogmas on our planet and presupposes some level of alien benevolence.

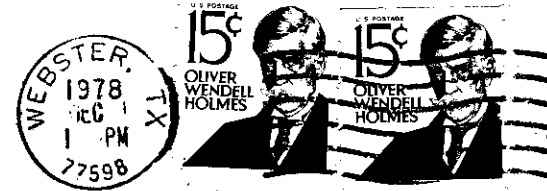
