1980CM ENDGAME STATEMENTS

From Art Italo (Winner, Turkey):

Before I begin reminiscing about a particularly satisfying war, I would like to pay tribute to some of the other players in the game. First, thanks to Don Ditter, who took over a hopeless Italian position vacated by the removal of Bernie Oaklyn. Although Don and I were adversaries during the game, I was glad to see him remain a factor to the last unit. Next, a sincere (but unregretting) apology to Matt McKibbin for taking advantage of his vulnerable position when he trusted me so completely. No sarcasm here; I really labored over the decision to stab Matt because he is such a nice guy. Finally to Robert Wood and Bob Olsen who maintained an alliance from the beginning of the game to the end, my compliments on sticking together despite my best diplomatic efforts to get you at one another's throats.

This win was particularly satisfying since it was my first postal diplomacy game. I was aided by a number of factors, not the least of which was the fact that four of seven players were in their first postal game. It was, however, a tough game from the first season.

My first gameplan was to convince Bill Gosvenor (Russia) to play an alliance with me as Turkey. I wrote and wrote but there was no reply. At the same time I wrote letter after letter to Oaklyn (Italy) with no response. My only hope of not being overrun by 1903 was McKibbin (Austria). This was not a very promising "last best hope" in that every letter I wrote to Gosvenor suggested that he join me in attacking Austria. Luckily, he didn't tell this to McKibbin or someone else would be writing this now.

McKibbin didn't trust Oaklyn, so he joined with me and together we managed to hold off Russia and Italy. About this time Wood (France) was trying to decide whether to ally with Germany or England. He chose Germany and jumped on England.

I kept the channels open to both Wood and Olsen throughout the early part of the game and slowly, McKibbin and I began to make headway with our expansion. Wood began to move in on Oaklyn from the west and McKibbin began to move in from the east. Bernie began to feel the pinch and I started to make headway with Gosvenor. Bernie was then removed in 1902 and McKibbin decided to make a giant push to take Italy.

I was having a slow arduous time with Gosvenor and McKibbin moved everything (and I mean everything) west in Spring of 1903. McKibbin was set to take another center having already taken Venice. That would have brought him to seven centers.

After much soul searching I decided that I was not going to get anywhere with Gosvenor so I perpetrated a vicious stab on poor Matt. I took three of his Balkan centers and gave him unwanted support from Venice back to Trieste. Gosvenor took Rumania from me leaving the supply centers at: Turkey 7, Russia 6, and Austria 3 (should have been 7).

After the stab, Gosvenor wrote to me immediately and proposed an alliance. McKibbin called and offered to puppet for me if I would let him stay in the game. I agreed to both but later decided to finish McKibbin off with Gosvenor's help.

Meanwhile, Ditter and Wood with a side order of Olsen decided that we were getting too strong. Wood and Ditter threw up a stalemate line in the Mediterranean that continued through central Europe into Germany.

I told Gosvenor that he should go west and in 1905 when he did I uh well ... I did it again. I took Sevastapol. Right after that Gosvenor NMRed and was never heard from again.

At that point, there was no hope of diplomacy for me. I was a habitual thruster and not to be trusted lest they be thrusted. I offered Olsen a draw if he would help me against Wood. No way! I offered Wood a draw if he would stab Olsen. Futile.

The game moved on slowly until 1908 when Cooper made a blunder that let me into Moscow and I outmaneuvered Wood for Venice, Ditter's last center. When I took Warsaw in Spring '09 I gained some running room in the North, but Wood and Olsen rotated their forces so as to tip the balance of power in the Mediterranean in their favor. The best I could hope for is to get back to a stalemate line. So, looking at a game that could have gone through the Great Depression, I did the only sane thing: Asked for a concession to me.

I'm a little surprised that Wood and Olsen conceded. I feel that I had a shot at getting the 18 centers but it would have taken a long time. There is a possibility that the tables could have turned. That point is now moot however, and I am quite happy to have won it. Again guys, great game. I look forward to playing with you again!

From Bob Olsen (Germany):

A rather tedious game, actually, which just goes to show that you get back what you put into it. I could have made it more "colorful" by stabbing my French ally, but the result would have been the same--or worse--so why bother? This game seemed to me to demonstrate a classic weakness of the F-G alliance; unless England is destroyed very quickly, the western powers tend to waste too much time on England while events get out of control in the east. That surely happened here since Art had (it seemed from Berlin) a fairly easy time of it while Robert Wood and I grappled with the English. Matt McKibbin (Austria) proved a bit too trusting and disappeared in a flash. Say what you want about Bernie Galyln, the fact remains, as a player he's excruciatingly boring. About the only bright spot was that my French ally did not stab me. Thanks, Robert, but you blew it a little; you should have taken the F-T draw when it was available.

This game marks a great time for me, actually, since contrary to Bruce Linsey's expectations, I actually survived. I don't lose all my games, Bruz...just most of them.

Thanks for the kind words about P&S and also for the bunch of D&L issues. You've got quite a sine going for yourself and I assume you've been pubbing for at least several years (maybe 4-5) since you're up to No. 60+. By the way, you will find enclosed my check for a sub plus CF/NMR so sign me up:

I found an address for Ron Kelly but no luck with J. H. Fleming. Rod Walker sent me to Jack Fleming, PARANOIAC'S MONTHLY, but it wasn't the same guy. I had quite a lot of correspondence with J.H. when I was playing and I had hoped I might get back in touch with him. Oh well...

Several people have warned me about this "Bernie Oaklyn" guy but you're the first to mention that he's none other than Tretick. I remember him from when I played years ago. So he's still hanging around... some people never learn I guess.

I noticed you have an Apple. What kind of printer are you using to produce the sine? I've been looking at the Apple and also the IBM but I haven't made up my mind yet. Any suggestions you might have on what to buy or not to buy with the Apple would be appreciated. I want to use it for 1) just plain fun - games with graphics and lots of them and 2) prototyping a production scheduling system for my job which will require lots of memory due to the amount of data I will have to reference and update. I imagine that I'd almost be forced into some kind of full screen edit capability to use it satisfactorily with the scheduling system. I'm thinking at this point that I will have to have the full 64K onboard and possibly two drives rather than just one but I haven't used an Apple for any length of time so I'm guessing. The unit I've used infrequently has 64K and a single drive but we've run out of space several times and had to go to machine language to save room. That's okay but takes a lot of time and I'm still not adept at it. Another thing that I'm still deciding is that if I go with an Apple should I buy it local at a dealer or try shopping thru the mail (or maybe a trip to D.C. to check prices there before buying). How'd you buy yours?

Enough about that. I didn't have any of the old issues of P&S left but I did get a handfull from Mark Berch - very helpful. I'd like to try GM'ing and pubbing again but it will be awhile. I thought I'd try playing for a bit to get myself reacquainted with the hobby first. I really missed playing but made up for it in a local wargame club I helped start here in Richmond a few years ago. The club took the direction of playing only large games like War In The West and they take too much time for me so I'm not active any longer. There is a small group I play with now and then who I'm introducing to Diplomacy and Dragonquest (D&D by SPI). Unfortunately I'm trying to pick up a degree in Information Systems at night and my new bride is going back to school too, making time very limited. (The girl I was married to when P&S was around is gone - we got divorced way back which was partially the reason for P&S folding - the divorce wasn't bad but financially it was horrible, at least for me). D&D is fun, isn't it? I got introduced to it in the early 70's I guess and had a lot of fun. Several of the guys I play with now want to try it but I'm the only one who knows the rules well enough to GM it and I'd have to review them myself.

In California, you can be convicted of a misdemeanor if you are caught shooting at any kind of game except a whale from a moving automobile or airplane.

Two of our states are doing their bit to save the endangered whale. Legislators in Ohio passed a statute that specifically outlaws whale fishing in any of the state's lakes, streams, or rivers on Sundays. And Oklahoma has gone further, by banning fishing for whales seven days a week in the state's inland waters!

In Louisiana it is illegal to rob a bank and then shoot at a bank teller with a water pistol.

In Spades, Indiana, you aren't allowed to open a can of food by shooting at it with a revolver! The law says nothing about shooting open a can of food with a rifle or a machine gun.

Be careful about avenging insults if you live in Massachusetts. An old piece of legislation outlaws any form of dueling when it is undertaken between two opponents who wish to use water pistols. Yes, the law specifies water pistols.

Corvallis, Oregon has a law that forbids "young ladies" to drink coffee after the hour of 6:00 P.M.

In St. Louis, Missouri, no female wearing a nightgown, sheer or otherwise, can be rescued by an on-duty fire fighter. The law is specific when it states that a woman of any age must always be fully dressed before a fire fighter can help her during a fire.

Springfield, Massachusetts, has a funny law concerning taxi drivers. Cabbies are prohibited from making love in the front seat of their vehicle during their working shift. //Guess it's okay to do it in the back seat, as the law doesn't mention this location.//
